The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports HB1908 HD1 that would make it a felony to manufacture, sell, lend or possess "bump stocks" in Hawaii.

The League of Women Voters of the United State adopted in 1990 a position on gun control which reads:

The League of Women Voters believes that the proliferation of handguns and semi-automatic assault weapons in the United States is a major health and safety threat to its citizens. The League supports strong federal measures to limit the accessibility and regulate the ownership of these weapons by private citizens. The League supports regulating firearms for consumer safety.

Consistent with this position, the League of Women Voters of Hawaii supports HB1908 HD1. HB1908 HD1 proposes a change to Hawaii's gun laws which is supported by most of the US population.

Polls in 2017 reported that from 76 to 82 percent of American's surveyed favored a ban on devices that allow gun owners to modify semi-automatic rifles to mimic the rate of firing of automatic weapons (see

http://thehill.com/blogs/blog-briefing-room/news/355376-poll-82-support-a-ban-on-bump-stocks; or

https://poll.qu.edu/national/release-detail?ReleaseID=2492 among others).

The terrible toll of mass shootings in the United States is an indictment of our gun control policies at least as much as of our mental health support system. Australia's experience offers strong support for the effectiveness of prohibiting rapid fire weaponry ownership:



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"The country made sweeping gun control measures after a man killed 35 people with a semi-automatic weapon in Tasmania. Weeks after the April 1996 tragedy, the country and its states began banning rapid-fire guns to tamp down on mass shootings and then offered to buy the prohibited firearms.

Research suggests it's worked.

The University of Sydney, in a 2016 study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, found Australia hadn't experienced a fatal mass shooting — one in which five or more people are killed — since the 1996 shooting. In the 18 years prior, 1979-1996, there were 13 fatal mass shootings in Australia." (USA Today, Feb. 15, 2018).

Please help prevent mass shootings from taking innocent lives in Hawaii by passing HB1908 HD1.

Please vote NO and DEFER HB1908, HD1.

I have new testimony regarding HB1908 HD1 to follow, but I would like to re-submit my testimony regarding the original version of HB1908 as submitted to the Committee on Judiciary hearing as it applies also to the HD1 version. HB1908 originally read "device... attached... to discharge... shots in a burst". That language has been replaced in HD1 by "device... simulates automatic gunfire... with a static positioned trigger finger". So when you read my original testimony below, following this testimony, please make the appropriate substitutions, as all the reasoning still applies.

The greatest "problem" with this legislation is that no criminal will obey the law, as they do not obey

any laws at all that they decide impede them in their pursuit of victimizing innocent people. That's the definition of criminal. All your proposed law would do is turn otherwise law-abiding citizens into criminals, and felons at that, possibly for wearing pants (don't look at me, I didn't write the law).

One problem involved here is that "burst" (and thus "multiburst") has an already established meaning that is not commensurate with its use in HB1908 HD1. (See my previously submitted testimony following this current submission.)

So now we have introduced new language "simulates automatic gunfire", but the bill includes no definition of what that means. I cautiously *assume* it may have something to do with "rate of fire", but if so, what is the rate of fire threshold that meets the definition of "simulate[d] automatic gunfire", and below which it is NOT "simulate[d] automatic gunfire"? Or is this just some "subjective" decision to be made by law enforcement independent of any actual standards? What if there are two law enforcement officers present and one thinks he heard "simulate[d] automatic gunfire" and the other doesn't? Arrest or no arrest? Felon or no felon?

Another problem is that there are many "devices" that can be used "with a static positioned trigger finger" to increase the rate of fire to what may or may not be the undefined "simulate[d] automatic gunfire" rate. Many of these are ordinary household items such as rubber bands and string, twine, shoe laces, etc. Is possession of any of these items going to be grounds for felony arrest and prosecution? If not, why not? They meet the definition of the proposed law. It seems that perhaps you have created another totally subjective standard for enforcement or non-enforcement of the law. Is that really what you want to do?



Another item that can be used to achieve an accelerated rate of fire is any firm object of appropriate length placed against the shoulder that allows the trigger finger to be in that static position. This could be any sort of wood, metal or plastic. My particular problem is that on my four acres of ohia trees, pine trees, fruit trees, and bamboo I have at least dozens, more likely hundreds or thousands of such

"devices" lying on the ground from both natural falling from the plants and huge piles of prunings full of "devices". Is law enforcement going to come to my property and arrest me on 3,417 counts of felony possession of plant material devices? If not, why not? That's how the proposed law reads.



Finally, there is the belt loop device. Are you going to arrest everyone with a belt loop on their pants? I'd venture that some of the people sitting on the committee today would qualify as felons if you actually enforce the law as written. If you are not going to prosecute people with belt loops, why not?

Then there's the biggest problem of all with your attempt to outlaw any increased rate of fire (which may or may not meet the undefined standard of "simulate[d] automatic gunfire"): the fact that that can be done without any device at all, merely by using one's hands and arms to achieve the effect. Are you going to arrest everyone with hands and arms, or are you going to not count those as "devices"?

Please, this bill is both literally nonsensical as well as totally useless to accomplish any enhancement of public safety, and it puts ordinary law-abiding citizens in legal jeopardy for owning common items subject to completely non-standardized arbitrary and whimsical enforcement interpretations.

Vote NO and DEFER HB1908 HD1.

Please defer HB1908 by voting **NO**.

This bill does not address an existing problem and thus cannot solve any known problem effecting public safety. This bill uses language (134-_ (a)(b)(1)), as commonly understood according to the currently existing definitions and meanings, that would ban weapons that are already totally banned in the state of Hawaii. Section (134-_ (a)(b)(2)) cannot accomplish the supposed goal of preventing a person from firing a weapon at an "increase[d] rate of fire of that firearm", since that can be accomplished quite easily without any "device" being "attached" to a semi-automatic firearm. Of course I would be remiss were I to fail to mention that even if this law were to pass, that it would not have any effect on a criminal intent on perpetrating crime, as we have seen time and time again (See: "Xerox murders" in 1999 committed 7 years after the magazines used by the murderer had been banned in Hawaii, etc.). Thus, nothing at all is accomplished to enhance public safety if this bill were passed into law, and its vague, if not meaningless language, could be used to ensnare law-abiding citizens with no criminal intent, and so I ask you to defeat it.

There is no known problem of crime being committed in Hawaii, nor anywhere else, with either weapons as described in 134-_ (a)(b)(1) or in 134-_ (a)(b)(2), with the exception of two cases in the past 50 years. In the first case the criminals **illegally possessed** fully automatic weapons, and in the other case it has been argued by knowledgeable people, that as horrific as the killings and injuries were, it could have been worse had the murderer NOT used the "increased rate of fire" devices (See: The University of Texas at Austin "tower shootings" in 1966 where the murderer used a bolt action hunting rifle incapable of even ordinary semi-automatic rates of fire).

What is being banned by 134-(a)(b)(1)?

"§134- **Multiburst** trigger activator; prohibition. (a) Any person in this State who manufactures or causes to be manufactured, imports into the State, keeps for sale, or offers or exposes for sale, or who

gives, lends, or possesses any **multiburst** trigger activator shall be guilty of a class C felony.

- (b) As used in this section, "multiburst trigger activator" means:
- (1) A device designed or redesigned to be attached to a semiautomatic firearm, which allows the firearm to discharge two or more shots **in a burst** by activating the device;"

I found it highly unusual, so to speak, that the word "multiburst" was "defined" as more than one "burst", but "burst" was never defined. I wrote to several of the "introducers" of HB1908 asking for clarification, but received no replies.

I asked, because in fact there already exist definitions and common uses for the term "burst" in connection with firearms:

"In automatic firearms, burst mode or burst fire is a firing mode enabling the shooter to fire a predetermined number of rounds, usually two or three rounds on hand held weapons and 50-100+ on anti-aircraft weapons and autocannons, with a single pull of the trigger."

"The number of rounds fired in a burst is almost universally determined by a cam mechanism that trips the trigger mechanism for each shot in the burst. Some designs, as employed on the M16 series, will *terminate the burst* if the *trigger is released* before the burst is complete."

Automatic firearms (aka "machine guns", and/or "select fire" weapons (which can be set to semi-auto, "burst fire" (usually three rounds), or "full auto" modes), require NFA application and registration with BATFE and are ALREADY ILLEGAL IN HAWAII, so unless the authors of this bill are using the Humpty Dumpty view of language ('When I use a word,' Humpty Dumpty said, in a rather scornful tone, 'it means just what I choose it to mean, neither more nor less.'), this section of the bill is making illegal what is already illegal. What's the point of that?

As for section 134-_ (a)(b)(2):

(2) A manual or power-driven trigger activating device constructed and designed so that **when attached** to a semiautomatic firearm it **increases the rate of fire** of that firearm." [Emphasis added.]

The problems with this are:

- 1. A person can mimic the rate of fire accomplished by a "device attached to a semi-automatic firearm" without an attached device, and without any device at all. It is (seemingly?) impossible to outlaw firing a firearm at "an increased rate of fire", and certainly HB1908 would not accomplish that.
- 2. There is no law that would prevent a person with criminal intent from possessing any attachable

device that would increase the rate of fire (Again, see: "Xerox murders"). "Criminals don't obey laws, including gun control laws". I believe most of the criminal acts committed in Hawaii by criminals using firearms are cases of illegal possession of firearms, i.e. criminals ignored the law making them "prohibited persons". What makes anyone think they would obey this law?

3. Even if this law passed and was enacted, it would have no effect on a person with criminal intent from firing a firearm at an "increased rate of fire" without using any "attached device" or unattached device, aka "bump firing".

This law is vague, the language is muddled, if not outrightly simply "wrong", and will have no effect in enhancing public safety since the single effect ("increased rate of fire") it would theoretically "outlaw" can be accomplished outside the restrictions of the law.

Please vote NO, and defer HB1908.

Aloha Chair and Committee members. As a law abiding and long time firearm owner, hunter and target shooter and like many others here in Hawaii that enjoy the hobby with our family and friends I am very concerned about this measure.

For one, I have many old rifles passed down from generation to generation and are still in use today. As a precision shooter and hunter, for both accuracy and for humane reasons we often have adjustments made or replacement triggers added that help facility a softer pull which translates to better accuracy and better shot placement.

When hunting we do not just blast animals. As with any ethical hunter, shot placement is what we strive for so that game will be dispatched quickly, and does not needlessly suffer. Most firearms utilize a manual trigger device and can be modified or replaced with softer pulls or better ergonomically designed triggers for precision shooting.

How will the legislature or whoever will be enforcing this bill know what the purpose of my trigger modifications are for? Are we to be criminalized for having precision rifles that has been part of my family for generations?

I am sorry that some people in society miss use firearms but as this measure stands, we cannot support this type of legislation. TESTIMONY FOR HOUSE BILL 1908, HOUSE DRAFT 1, RELATING TO FIREARMS

Honorable Chair Takumi and committee members:

I am Kris Coffield, representing IMUAlliance, a nonpartisan political advocacy organization that currently boasts over 400 members. On behalf of our members, we offer this testimony in strong support of House Bill 1908, HD 1, relating to firearms.

On October 1, 2017, 64-year-old Stephen Paddock of Mesquite, Nevada opened fire on a crowd of concertgoers at the Route 91 Harvest music festival, leaving 58 people dead and 851 more injured. Paddock fired more than 1,100 rounds from his suite on the 32nd floor of the Mandalay Bay Hotel. Notably, 12 of the rifles found in the gunman's room after the attack had been modified with "bump stocks," an attachment that enables a semiautomatic rifle to fire faster.

Immediately after the attack, the National Rifle Association announced that it would support tighter restrictions on such modifications. A bump stock replaces a rifle's standard stock—the part of a rifle held against the shoulder. Bump stocks enable semiautomatic guns to slide back and forth more rapidly, harnessing kickback energy generated upon firing. Essentially, the stock "bumps" back and forth between the shooter's shoulder and trigger finger as the shooter holds his or her trigger finger in place, allowing the weapon to fire at nearly the rate of a machine gun.

As last week's tragedy in Parkland, Florida shows us, we must take action to protect our citizens from gun madness. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify in support of this bill.

On behalf of the nearly 600 registered members of the Young Progressives Demanding Action (YPDA) Hawai'i, I would like to express **strong support** for HB1908. In the wake of Parkland, Umpqua, Santa Monica, Rancho Tehama, Marysville, Sandy Hook, Virginia Tech, Columbine and the now decadeslong history of mass shootings at schools, I am angry, afraid and so tired of watching the news segments; of waking up to text alerts that more of my fellow millennials—and those even younger than us—will never grow up. And for what? Campaign donations exchanged for beneficial regulatory terms for arms manufacturers? The perpetuation of a gun culture that can be used to generate partisan points on a political score board? Defense of an archaic interpretation of the Second Amendment? Enough is enough.

Military-grade weapons have no place in society. They are unnecessary for self-defense, hunting or target practice. Bump stock triggers modify semi-automatic weapons to allow for up to 800 rounds fired a minute, mimicking fully automatic firearms—assault weapons. Popular among mass shooters, assault weapons pose a distinct threat to the safety and security of Hawai'i's people, and people all over the world. After the expiration of the federal ban on assault weapons in 2004 and the failure to renew it by Congress, it now falls upon the states to pass sensible laws to prohibit these deadly weapons and any trigger mods that emulate them.

I've watched the videos from the Parkland massacre. I've seen the charts that show just how many school shootings have taken place in America. Since 2000, there have been at least 188 shootings at schools and universities. It's hard to cite a definitive number, because the federal government does not study gun violence in the United States, despite recommendations from the Center for Disease Control that it do so; the National Rifle Association has opposed any measure to fund research or accounting of America's gun epidemic. But one statistic points out just how horrible our country's gun sickness is. Between 2000 and 2010, 57 incidents of mass shootings with two or more victims occuring on school

campuses were recorded in 36 different countries. Twenty-eight—half of all those incidents—took place in the United States.

I've heard arguments made that this kind of restriction would make it impossible for people with certain disabilities, such as nerve damage, to fire their weapons; that bump stock mods are the only way that they can pull their triggers. To those people, I say to bad. Find a different hobby. Your ability to shoot at things is nowhere near as important as our lives. Our children deserve to go to school free from the fear that they may never see their parents again; that any given school day might be their last on Earth. That is absolutely unacceptable.

We need strict gun control regulations on assault weapons; on trigger modifications; on licensing, ammo, background checks, firearm training and carrying capacity. For the love of humanity, gun regulations should be *at least* as strict as regulations on driving an automobile.

Yesterday, just days after witnessing their friends brutally murdered before their eyes, the survivors of the Parkland massacre watched as their state legislature refused to even consider a proposed assault weapon ban. Those kids, and young people all across the country, will hold responsible any and all politicians that put the interests and money of the NRA and its supporters above the lives and futures of America's youth. And here in Hawaii, we will do the same. No more hiding behind the Second Amendment. We're done waiting for elected leaders to do the right thing. We demand gun reform now.

Removing law abiding citizens access to firearm accessories will do nothing to stop or deter criminals and their activities regarding weapons use. Instantly turning lawful citizens into felons because of owning certain property without due process, nor compensation, is in clear violation of the 4th, 5th, and 14th amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

If you pass this bill, how will people to abide this law, without automatically turning into a felon and criminal, if they **already own these items?**

These items that are being legislated against already have been vetted and deemed legal and defined legal by the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms (ATF), according to firearms laws.

These devices are very expensive property and are considered legal. What kind of compensation will you give to persons who now have to somehow legally get rid of these devices? What is the procedure for surrendering LEGAL items, which this law is intended to summarily turn illegal, with no due process of law or trial, with the assumption that they are intended to be used in any crime?

The 4th Amendment states:

"The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized."

The 5th Amendment further protects property, by stating:

"No person shall be ... deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law;

nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation."

The 14th amendment states:

"All persons born or naturalized in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."

Once again, oppose this bill and please consider working on bills that will actually prevent crimes and catching / incarcerating criminals.

Law abiding gun owners are not the problem in this state.

Again, as a fellow Hawaii resident, I urge you to oppose House Bill 1908.

Your actions have restored some of my faith in the process.

On "Parts Laws"

In my opinion trying to ban firearm accessories in order to reduce violent crime is an exercise in futility that actually creates more problems than it solves. First of all it ties up legislative resources that would be much more useful toward figuring out poverty, inequality, and systemic corruption which, unlike access to firearms, have a much stronger relationship with poor mental health and the resulting acts of individual/group violence that will never run out of clever and inventive methods to kill large numbers of people.

Unfortunately we seem to be living in a decaying society, where laws keep getting passed to make things better but meanwhile if you look out the window anyone can clearly see they are getting worse. Asking the deeper question of what's really going on is a lot more difficult than the knee-jerk banning of random parts. The former is a wholistic approach that challenges true leaders to put aside comfortable biases and try to figure our real solutions to violence, while the other is slapping a band aid on the right leg while the left one bleeds out.

On Automatic Weapons:

My opinion differs from the NRA on automatic weapons. I believe the constitution says we are supposed to have militias and not a standing army. While standing armies are great for bringing home pork barrel money to influential districts and traveling around the world to strip resources from developing nations, militias are made up from people in the community and designed to make the prospect of invasion so distasteful that

hostile powers who would dare set foot into the territory would find themselves quickly ensnared in a painful bear trap and very unlikely to ever try again.

In Iraq and Afghanistan we see two examples of various (and sometimes competing) small forces ultimately defeating what is supposed to be the greatest military in the world with far inferior weapons at a fraction of the cost. Imagine what a properly equipped and trained militia could do for Hawaii as far as freeing up valuable real estate and building community spirit. Imagine the tax money we would save on expensive weapons systems that always cost more than they promise and never work like they are supposed to. As we have seen in the Middle East all anybody really needs for national self defense are Kalashnikovs, rocket launchers, IEDs, HILUX trucks, some video editing equipment, and home field advantage.

Automatic weapons should be available to any adult who passes a background check and develops a documented history of regular training with a local militia or other civil service group where people can keep an eye on each other and report issues if they come up. I strongly support HB 1908 and urge you to do everything possible to pass this important legislation.

On October 1, 2017, a gunman opened fire from a hotel room on the 32nd floor of the Mandalay Bay hotel into an audience of 22,000 at a country music festival in Las Vegas, killing 58 people and injuring more than 500. The gunman fired more than 1,100 rounds of ammunition in 11 minutes, using semi-automatic rifles modified with a dangerous firearm accessory designed to dramatically accelerate the rate of gunfire. These accessories, commonly known as "bump fire stocks," enabled the worst mass shooting in modern U.S. history and turned a concert venue into a war zone.

Fully automatic firearms aka machine guns are banned under federal law. But in the last decade the gun industry began marketing devices intended to circumvent this federal law by allowing a gun owner to modify a semiautomatic rifle—which is currently legal to buy and possess under federal law—in such a manner that it operates with a similar rate of fire as a fully automatic rifle. A bump fire stock harnesses the recoil of a semiautomatic rifle to enable a shooter to fire shots much more quickly than if he or she were simply squeezing the trigger on a firearm not altered with a bump stock. **Equipped with a bump stock, the Las Vegas shooter was able to fire 90 shots in 10 seconds**. While often marketed as a novelty item for recreational shooters, bump stocks and similar devices that accelerate the rate of fire of a semiautomatic firearm are extremely dangerous and pose a substantial risk to public safety.

Since the massacre in Las Vegas, the price of bump stocks and similar devices has more than tripled, and a mad dash to purchase these deadly devices has ensued. Instead of taking responsible measures to ensure that these devices are never again used to commit a mass shooting, the gun industry is profiting off of mass tragedy. At the same time, the estimated financial cost of the shooting in Las Vegas is upwards of \$600 million to say nothing of the human cost of this tragedy on the local community.

In the immediate aftermath of the shooting in Las Vegas, there was widespread agreement that bump stocks and similar devices should be banned: An October 2017 poll found that 82% of Americans support banning bump stocks. And yet the NRA, the Hawaii Rifle Association and other pro-gun lobbyists continue to loudly obfuscate the issue with unfounded arguments.

I am counting on state legislators to ban these instruments enabling mass slaughter of civilians. Thank you.

I support and contribute regularly but in very modest amounts to the Brady Campaign and Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence. I am testifying in **support** of House Bill No. 1908, H.D. 1, Relating to Firearms.

I submit these comments in furtherance of securing the safety of all Hawaii residents from the high economic and emotional costs resulting from the ongoing epidemic of gun violence across the United States.

The danger posed by devices like "bump fire stocks," or bump stocks, is real and serious and has been known for some time. Bump stocks are one of many accessories to firearms that increase their rate of fire and enable otherwise lawful weapons to be converted into the functional equivalent of fully automatic weapons or machine guns. On October 1, 2017, the nation saw how destructive these devices can be in Hawaii's "ninth island". Despite shooting from a quarter of a mile away, the Las Vegas gunman killed 58 people, injured several hundred more, and inflicted extensive emotional distress on thousands of men, women, and children.

Devices like bump stocks pose grave dangers to public safety and have no place in our communities. While we are blessed to live in a State with more common-sense gun regulation than most, the Legislature can and should do even more to address bump stocks and similar devices known as "multiburst trigger activators" through legislation such as H.B. 1908, H.D.1. Legislative action ensures maximum clarity -- to the public, the industry, and law enforcement -- regarding how these dangerous accessories fit into the broader scheme of gun-related policies. Decisive legislative action minimizes opportunities for obstacles and delay for those hoping to forestall corrective action and extract profit in the meantime. The Legislature needs to act now. Time is of the essence in preventing foreseeable future incidents and saving lives.

Finally, as your Committee receives input from the gun industry and gun enthusiasts on the potential impacts of any change in oversight and regulation of bump stocks and other similar devices, please also focus on the importance of public safety -- the lives and safety of men, women and children in Hawaii -- rather than only on the alleged expense and inconvenience to those who manufacture, import, sell, or use these dangerous accessories.

Hello. I, along with many other law-abiding citizens strongly urge you to oppose House Bill 1908. This non-specific legislation will only serve to potentially and arbitrarily turn regular citizens into felons overnight.

On the language 'trigger activating device', it is too vague. Anything that touches the trigger and causes the firearm to discharge is a 'trigger activating device', be it index finger or rubber band, and therefore potentially in violation of this legislation. The language too broadly allows for arbitrary interpretation.

On the language 'attached', it is too vague. Permanently attached? Detachable? Would a normally legal object, say a belt loop, be immediately illegal when brought into contact with the firearm? Again, too much room for arbitrary interpretation.

On the language 'increases the rate of fire', it is too vague. If meaning 'rounds per minute', what is acceptable, what is not, and where is that line drawn? Too much room for arbitrary interpretation.

At best, this bill will prohibit devices which have been used in a small fraction of the murders committed in America, none of which occurred in Hawaii. At worst, everyday objects - sticks, belt loops, plastic drinking straws - will now be deemed illegal "multiburst trigger activators" because an individual possesses one alongside a firearm. If laws are written to specify unlawful behavior, the vagueness of this bill's language is unacceptable and I ask that House Bill 1908 be fully opposed.

Today (and I am sure there are more days to come) you have a bill before your committee HB 1908. Please support the ban on these items that can be added.

You have seen the news over the past years of the school shootings and other mass shootings. The pro and con media has been out in full force. I don't need to list them, Google will bring you hundreds of articles. I can only speak from my own experience and heart and ask you to step aside from the politics of winning votes or popularity to truly look at this bill and any other bills that come across your desk.

I am a retired educator, 40 years in elementary classroom, and I can tell you that it was always my job to be the first protector of my students. It is the first job of any teacher to keep their students safe while in their care. Right now, the anxiety and daily stress on teachers and kids wondering and worrying if there school is next is high. Here in Hawai'i, teachers are looking at their classrooms in a whole new light and discovering huge flaws in the system to keep them safe. We have beautiful rooms with lots of windows and open space, ideal for teaching not so much for hiding. Plans in place, procedures learned but in the final moment who is the first line of defense? Teachers, not you who make the laws.

Requesting:

- 1. that you consider actual people, faces when you create and vote on bills, those teachers on the front line
- 2. that you think about it being Hawai'i, not the continent when you consider bills
- 3. that you rethink your reception of \$\$ from the NRA, if you do accept them
- 4. that you think about how we have gotten to this place and time, look for the underlying issue of anger rather than taking the bandaid approach to a gaping wound.
- 5. that you look at the recent increase in violent crime and the media and police response to it as well as the armed response of law enforcement to peaceful protest.

These are just a few things I have been thinking about since the most recent tragic act of terror in Florida. It is not easy to create legislation, but on our basic rights to gather in a school, church or event and feel safe. I'm writing in opposition to HB1908.

Although well intended specific to "Bump Stock" devices and potential increased rate of fire on a specific rifle, the bill as written and presented is broad and overreaching. It was also obvious from the newspaper article published in the Honolulu Advertiser that the understanding by the article's author of what triggers and trigger modifications actually do is not accurate. We need to make things clear that a bump stock is not a trigger nor is it an internal mechanism that determines weather a firearm is automatic or semiautomaic.ALSO TO REITERATE, AUTOMATIC FIREARMS HAVE BEEN BANNED BY LAW FOR CONSUMER OWNERSHIP SINCE 1986.

Many firearm owners modify their triggers to improve the function of the firearm, not to turn them into full auto firearms, but rather to make them more suitable for target practice, self defense, competition, hunting, overcoming a disability and for improved accuracy. This potential law would put those lawful persons at great risk of being charged as felons.

Please take the time to educate yourselves on what are the facts and the specific functions of a firearm before passing laws that serve nothing but a quick rush to judgment and with unintended consequences.

I'm a hunter, Firearms instructor and a huge proponent of safe use of firearms and firearm laws that are reasonable and realistic. This particular bill does not serve the public in ensuring a safer community.. A safer community when it comes to firearm use, is to ensure we enforce existing laws that prevent the wrong people from possessing firearms.

I am in STRONG SUPPORT of HB 1908 HD1.

In the wake of the Florida school shooting last week, let us remember the dangers of semi-automatic/fully automatic firearms. As I understand it, HB 1908 HD1 would prohibit multiburst triggers on firearms, also known as "bump stocks."

As defined by the measure, a "multiburst trigger activator" is a device that simulates automatic gunfire by allowing the standard function of a semiautomatic firearm with a static positioned trigger finger, or a device that fires multiple shots with the pull and release of the trigger. Bump stocks fit over the stock and pistol grip of a semi-automatic rifle and allows the weapon to fire rapidly, as many as 400 to 800 rounds per minute, emulating a fully automatic firearm.

THERE IS NO REASON to allow this type of weapon here in Hawai'i. Period. "For hunting purposes" is absurd. There is no sport, no practical reason that a "hunting" weapon should fire off 400-800 rounds per minute. This weaponry is designed to kill humans in warfare and has no place in our society.

Let's continue to keep our gun laws in Hawai'i strict and pass this important measure.
