House Bill 1963 RELATING TO PROCUREMENT

Chair Johanson, Vice-Chair Holt and members of the committees, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on HB 1963. The State Procurement Office (SPO) opposes this bill with the following concerns.

This bill amends HRS 103D by adding a section on joint offers. As stated in the bill:

- "...Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit:
- (1) Two or more separate entities from submitting a single joint offer in response to a solicitation; provided that a joint offer shall be considered by a purchasing agency as one offer; or
- (2) A purchasing agency from awarding a single contract to two or more separate entities that have submitted a joint offer.
- (b) The procurement policy board shall adopt rules, pursuant to chapter 91, that prescribe procedures for joint offers and contract awards to joint offerors."

There are no prohibitions in <u>our Hawaii procurement code or the Federal Acquisition Regulation</u> (<u>FAR</u>) to awarding to a joint venture making this bill <u>unnecessary</u>. Many of our cooperative purchases award to multiple vendors for a single solicitation.

Further, adding this language to the statute could be utilized for nefarious purposes when issues of collusion arise.

The procurement code provides flexibility, whereas, to mandate joint ventures, erodes this flexibility. It should be left up to the procurement officer to decide if joint ventures may or may not be submitted in response to a solicitation. There are risks that must be considered and

weighed with joint ventures involving disagreements and disputes among the contractors. There is no singular party responsible.

There are additional contractual and legal complexities regarding privity and direct payments. Who are payments to be given to? Our current payment system through the Department of Accounting and General Services connects one prime vendor to each contract payment. What if there is non-performance? What happens if one contractor in a joint venture becomes insolvent? For these reasons and others, awards usually result in separate agreements for each contractor though it may be for the same solicitation.
