In consideration of **HOUSE BILL 2425** RELATING TO COMMERCIAL FISHING

House Bill 2425 proposes to authorize the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to issue commercial marine licenses and subtypes of commercial marine licenses for the taking of marine life. The Department supports this measure, subject to the following amendments and comments.

The intent of the measure is to clarify that the Department has the authority to issue commercial marine vessel licenses (CMVLs). The Department is currently in the process of amending its commercial marine license (CML) rules to establish a new CMVL category. In December, the Board of Land and Natural Resources approved the rules for public hearing, subject to clarification that the Department has the statutory authority to create and issue CMVLs. This bill, if enacted, would provide clarification.

Local fishers have been asking the Department to create a vessel license for many years. Currently each individual on a fishing vessel must have their own CML to participate in a commercial fishing trip. This causes problems when random and infrequent visitors or part-time crew members are needed for a commercial fishing trip. The CMVL would cover everyone on board under one license and eliminates the need for individual licenses. It is more convenient for fishers, and potentially more cost effective. For the Department, the CMVL would clarify who is responsible for submitting catch reports for the vessel.

The proposed bill also includes clear authority to issue other types of commercial licenses. The Department has considered the idea of issuing different categories of commercial licenses to distinguish between full-time and part-time commercial fishers. This bill, if enacted, would

provide the Department with the flexibility to use appropriate tools to better manage Hawaii's commercial fishery.

The Department offers a number of proposed amendments (in grey highlight) to provide clarity and precision. In subsection (a), it is not clear what is meant by a "subtype" of license. The Department recommends amending the language to read:

(a) The department of land and natural resources shall issue commercial marine licenses for the taking of marine life for commercial purposes. The department may establish different [subtypes] types of commercial marine licenses, including but not limited to fishery and gear specific commercial licenses, commercial [fishing] marine vessel licenses, and professional or part-time commercial fishing licenses, and shall specify by rules, the requirements and qualifications for the issuance of these [subtype] licenses.

In subsection (b), the language requires each person to obtain a separate CML prior to taking marine life for commercial purposes. There is no exemption for individuals fishing from a vessel covered by a CMVL. To address this issue, this Department recommends amending the language to read:

(b) No person shall take or land marine life for commercial purposes whether the marine life is caught or taken within or outside of the State, without first obtaining a commercial marine license [or subtype license, if applicable,] as provided in this section; provided that the Department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to exempt persons taking marine life for commercial purposes pursuant to a valid commercial marine vessel license.

The Department also recommends amending subsection (c) to keep the existing language, as follows:

(c) Additionally, any person providing vessel charter services in the State for the taking of marine life in or outside of the State shall obtain a commercial marine license[+]-[+] [or subtype license, if applicable.]

STRONG SUPPORT of HB 2425 RELATING TO COMMERCIAL FISHING

HFACT is a not-for-profit, IRS 501c (5) organization, that advocates for small boat commercial, non-commercial, and recreational fishermen throughout Hawaii. HFACT board members sit on a number of international, regional, and federal fisheries management and endangered species advisory committees as well as state marine and coastal zone advisory committees; and, HFACT is thoroughly familiar with and participates in ocean and marine resource management in Hawaii and the Western and Central Pacific.

HFACT <u>STRONGLY SUPPORTS HB 2425</u> as it addresses a long outstanding issue by Hawaii's small boat and nearshore fishing communities with the necessity of requiring of each crew person aboard a fishing vessel or supporting another engaged in commercial fishing (for sale of the catch) to hold a Commercial Marine License (CML). At \$50 per CML it was a strain on the captain and crew members but now (effective January 16, 2018) at \$100 with another increase projected in 2019 to \$150, this becomes an economic burden. As small business operators, captains and individuals rely upon a rotating group of several individuals to be secured on short notice. These escalating costs become operationally prohibitive. This situation is further exacerbated when a child, relative, friend or visitor wants to join the trip.

As such, a subtype of license such as a Commercial Marine Vessel License (CMVL) as proposed and discussed during the public informational meetings, in 2017, on raising the CML fee gained the support of the small boat and nearshore commercial fishermen. It is also important to note that the vessel owner/captain sells and reports the catch under a vessel or principle individual's name and not by individual CML holders associated with the trip thus eliminating the need for having individual CML's for such fishing trips.

HFACT asks that the Committee on Water and Land support fishing industry small businesses and prevent unnecessary and burdensome expenses. We understand that the Hawaii Longline fleet (averaging six crewmen per vessel) will be assessed \$1,500.00 per longline vessel, which is five times the current fee they are currently assessed.

HFACT thanks the chair, vice-chair, and committee members for this opportunity to provide testimony.

I am getting into commercial fishing this year and will have to purchase their CML for \$100.00 each to be able to fish with me. The recent increase to \$100.00 and proposed increase to \$150.00 in 2019, this cost will be difficult for me just starting out. I personally have two to three individuals that will fish with me. Under the increased fee structure I would not want my crew to pay the \$100-150 so my cost will be over \$500 plus my daughter and her friends who live out of state and visit me wish to go fishing with me during their stay. The fish caught aboard my boat will be sold by me under my name and my boat but my crew needs to hold a CML in order to comply with current DLNR/DAR rules that requires any person taking aquatic resources must have a CML.

Aloha,

The fact of the matter is that if you have a commercial marine license (CML) and you go out on a boat with the intent of catching fish to sell, everyone on your boat at that time is required to have a commercial marine license. Yes, even if you're wife is just along for the ride, she will need a CML as well if you intend on selling the fish. If she doesn't have one, you are not supposed to sell the fish, by law. It costs \$100 for a CML, so with your wife thats another \$100 for maybe one time she goes out with you. So what happens when you want to have your kids on board? what about your mainland friends visiting? The costs start to add up. So what to do? fish by yourself? while many do, it is very dangerous and could risk your life.

This bill will allow the DLNR to create different types of licenses that can alleviate this concern. A "vessel license" where the license is attributed to the boat/owner and not each person on the boat will allow the fisherman to both be safe by having crew members or allow for friends and family to enjoy the fishing trip as well.

There may be other instances that the DLNR may want to create a separate sub-license as well (species-specific for those species that are in need of extra attention perhaps? or different gear types where data is needed?). This provides the DLNR with the opportunity to do this type of management, which would require Board hearings and a whole host of transparency under the Sunshine Act. Supporting this action doesn't mean it will happen, but gives an opportunity to look at whether creating sub-license types are warranted and the community supports it through the existing rule-making process.

Please support this bill and help take the burden of the people and keep them, their families and their communities safe. Mahalo

HB2425 - RELATING TO COMMERCIAL FISHING

Honorable Chair Ing, Vice Chair DeCoite and Members of the House Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources and Hawaiian Affairs:

STRONG SUPPORT

As a commercial bottomfish fisherman I normally fish with a crew of 1 or 2 others. In the past we paid \$50 per person for a Commercial Marine License (CML) as the rule (\$189-2) requires that every person who takes marine resources must hold a CML. This has been a real and frustrating issue with those of us in the smallboat and small business nearshore commercial fishery (~\$3-5 million fishery) as only the owner or captain of the vessel reports the catch in detail to the State Department of Land and Natural Resources/ Division of Aquatic Resources DLNR/DAR, sells the catch (there may be a few exceptions), is paid for the catch, pays associated taxes including the General Excise Tax (GET) under "PRODUCING," and responsible for ensuring that State and Federal rules and regulations respectively are followed and NOT the crew.

Beginning in January 2018 the CML fee has been increased to \$100 and scheduled to go to \$150 in 2019. As such these rising operating costs become burdensome on us (a rise from \$100-\$200 annually in 2017 to \$200-\$300 this year and \$300-450 next year. The establishment of a Commercial Marine Vessel License (CMVL) would also increase the efficiency of the (DAR) by eliminating all extraneous and unnecessary licensing and record keeping of those who will never submit a Catch Report or Sales Report.

While attending public informational meetings and hearings discussing the increase in CML fees, there was a strong request from the smallboat community especially to implement a CMVL to properly charge only those who actually catch and sell eliminating the need to issue, monitor and manage CML holders who would never submit fish catch or sale information. The CMVL is the most fair and equitable way to license these small business sectors of our fishing community. Passage of this legislation would allow the Department and Division to initiate the establishment of the CMVL providing us with much needed relief. Additionally, I would be hard pressed to purchase a \$100-\$150 CML for my visiting family or friend for a one day trip denying them the opportunity to join me on a day at sea.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on this measure.
