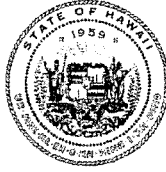

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill.¹ The Campaign Spending Commission (“Commission”) supports this bill.

This bill amends Hawaii Revised Statutes (“HRS”) §11-322(a) by deleting the requirement that candidate committees report their contributions in the organizational report. Candidate committees already disclose their contributions in periodic disclosure reports required by HRS §11-334 and HRS §11-338. Currently, the organization report contains directory-type information only and does not have space for candidate committees to disclose their contributions. The Commission requests that this Committee pass this measure.

Common Cause Hawaii supports SB2153 which would repeal the reporting requirement regarding contributions in organizational reports of candidate committees.

The information provided by the reporting requirement that this bill proposes to eliminate is already provided in disclosure reports that must be filed with the Campaign Spending Commission, and is already available to the public. Thus we believe that this housekeeping measure would streamline the organizational report without sacrificing the quality of, and the public's access to, information.
