A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIRE PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in 1979, the state
- 2 fire marshal's office was abolished and the state fire council
- 3 was established. The state fire council consists of the four
- 4 county fire chiefs and is administratively attached to the
- 5 department of labor and industrial relations. The state fire
- 6 council is responsible for adopting the state fire code,
- 7 administering federal fire-related grants, coordinating
- 8 statewide fire training, collecting data, and establishing
- 9 contingency planning needs for firefighters.
- 10 The legislature further finds that the state fire council
- 11 has the authority to establish statewide qualifications for
- 12 testing, certifying, and credentialing individuals who perform
- 13 maintenance and testing of portable fire extinguishers, fire
- 14 protection systems, and fire alarm systems. The council advises
- 15 the governor and the legislature on fire prevention and
- 16 protection and is represented by a voting member on the state
- 17 building code council.



- 1 From 1979 to 2001, the state fire council had no funding
- 2 for staff and relied heavily upon county personnel to accomplish
- 3 its responsibilities. In 2001, the governor directed the
- 4 department of labor and industrial relations to allocate \$35,000
- 5 to fund the state fire council's first employee. In 2011, the
- 6 legislature appropriated an additional \$71,000 for the state
- 7 fire council to hire two additional employees. In 2014, a
- 8 program specialist was hired to administer the reduced ignition
- 9 propensity cigarette program despite no foreseeable budgetary
- 10 increases. Therefore, the legislature finds that the state fire
- 11 council would greatly benefit from additional personnel so that
- 12 it may promote statewide fire and life safety activities.
- The purpose of this Act to is to authorize the expenditure
- 14 of moneys collected from the reduced ignition propensity
- 15 cigarette fees to fund fire and life safety programs.
- 16 SECTION 2. Section 132C-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:
- 18 "[f]§132C-9[f] Reduced ignition propensity cigarette
- 19 program special fund. (a) There is established in the state
- 20 treasury a reduced ignition propensity cigarette program special
- 21 fund, into which shall be deposited all moneys collected by the

1	state fire council from the reduced ignition propensity
2	cigarette program pursuant to section 132C-4. All interest
3	earned or accrued on moneys deposited in the fund shall become
4	part of the fund.
5	(b) Moneys in the reduced ignition propensity cigarette
6	program special fund shall be administered and expended by the
7	state fire council to defray the actual cost of fire and life
8	safety programs and activities [and requirements of section
9	132C-4,] of the council, including employing one full-time
10	administrator and one full-time assistant [whose duties
11	include: or other part-time personnel.
12	(c) The duties of the state fire council shall include:
13	(1) Adopting administrative rules for program
14	implementation, establishing compliance inspections,
15	and approving forms and enforcement procedures and
16	guidelines;
17	(2) Receiving certifications for approximately six hundred
18	different brands and styles of cigarettes from the
19	manufacturers;
20	(3) Compiling a list of the cigarette brands and styles
21	for which manufacturers have submitted certifications,

1		verifying tax stamp compliance with the department of
2		the attorney general, and posting the list of
3		certified brands and styles on a state website for
4		informational purposes only;
5	(4)	Reviewing and approving, as needed, any alternative
6		test methods or fire standard compliance markings
7		submitted by the manufacturer; and
8	(5)	If needed, submitting certified cigarettes to an
9		accredited laboratory for testing to verify that
10		performance standards have been met."

13	SECT	ION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
