My name is Carol Kramer, and I am the Executive Officer of the Mental Health

Counselor Program ("Program"). Thank you for the opportunity to testify on S.B. 2647, which is
a companion to H.B. 2058. The Program strongly supports this measure.

The Program concurs with generalizing the practicum experience requirement by amending the law to require a total of at least six semester hours or ten quarter hours within at least two academic terms, instead of at least three semester hours or five quarter hours per academic term. The total practicum experience hours will remain the same providing no change to consumer protection.

Honorable Chair Baker, Vice-Chair Tokuda, and members of the Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection and Health, I am Jeffrey D. Stern, Ph.D. and I wish to submit this testimony in support of SB2647, which amends the practicum experience requirements for qualification for licensure as a mental health counselor.

As the former internship director of Hawaii Pacific University's MA program in clinical mental health counseling, I recall there being a few students that were in a bind with licensure for the very reason this legislation seeks to rectify. It may seem like just a housekeeping issue, but for a handful of aspiring counselors, this legislation will mean the difference between being eligible (for licensure) and not.

Streamlining the practicum requirement language brings licensure requirements for mental health counselors in line with requirements of other mental health professionals. This should help qualified mental health counselors to obtain their licenses in Hawai'i where they might otherwise be precluded because of the overly precise language in the current licensure law.
