TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 2738, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, RELATING TO FOUND ELECTRONIC DEVICES.

TO THE HONORABLE SCOTT Y. NISHIMOTO, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (“Department”) appreciates the opportunity to testify in support of S.B. 2738, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, Relating to Found Electronic Devices. My name is Stephen Levins, and I am the Executive Director of the Department’s Office of Consumer Protection.

This bill proposes to protect personal information stored on an unclaimed personal electronic device by requiring law enforcement agencies to remove personal information, such as credit card numbers and account passwords, from the device before providing it to a finder or disposing the device at a public auction or by other means. H.D. 1 amends this measure by changing its effective date to July 1, 2050, to promote further discussion.

Currently, Hawaii law requires local and state government agencies to provide unclaimed property to a finder forty-five days after the device is turned in. A majority of lost and unclaimed property includes personal electronic devices, such as cell phones and laptops, that contain personal information and potentially expose the person who

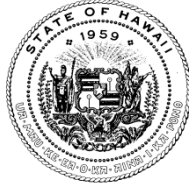

lost the device to identity theft. The Department believes this bill will promote the security of an individual's personal information and assist in preventing identity theft.

S.B. 2738, S.D. 1, H.D. 1
RELATING TO FOUND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

House Committee on Judiciary

The Department of Transportation (DOT) **supports** S.B. 2738, S.D. 1, H.D. 1 relating to found electronic devices by amending Hawaii Revised Statutes Sections 52D-14 and 261-17.7 to authorize the county police departments and the DOT to sanitize unclaimed electronic devices in accordance with guidance provided by the Information Privacy and Security Council, before providing the unclaimed property to finders.

The overall goal of the Department of Transportation (DOT) is to facilitate the rapid, safe, and economical movement of people, goods and mail into, within, and out of the State by providing and operating transportation facilities and supporting services.

The DOT currently has three (3) Divisions: Airports, Harbors, and Highways. DOT provides, operates, and maintains 11 commercial service airports, 4 general aviation airports, 10 commercial harbors, and more than 2,500 miles of highway.

The three (3) transportation divisions are regulated by various federal agencies to ensure compliance with environmental, health, safety, law enforcement, and security requirements.

As such, our ports (Airports and Harbors) are for public use and electronic devices are misplaced, turned over and inventoried by their respective Lost and Found programs. Some of these devices containing personal identification data/information are unclaimed and this data/information must be sanitized prior to being auctioned or disposed of in accordance to guidance provided by Information Privacy and Security Council.

RELATING TO FOUND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Chair Nishimoto, Vice Chair San Buenaventura, and members of the committee:

I am Todd Nacapuy, Chief Information Officer of the State of Hawai'i and head of the Office of Enterprise Technology Services (ETS), testifying in **support** of Senate Bill 2738, SD1, HD1, Relating to Found Electronic Devices, which extends protection of personal information on unclaimed electronic devices.

I am testifying today in my capacity as Chair of the State Information Privacy and Security Council which has requested this bill to permit law enforcement agencies to take necessary steps to digitally sanitize electronic devices that may contain personal information before the unclaimed property is provided to finders or disposed by public auction or other means.

Currently, some local and state government agencies, including county law enforcement agencies, are required under HRS 52D-14 and 261-17.7 to provide unclaimed property to finders as found after forty-five days. Given that cell phones, computers and other such electronic devices may contain personal information, the Information Privacy and Security Council recommends that Hawaii state law be amended to keep pace with technology so that personal information is protected.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of this bill.
