# Schools are safer than they were in the 90s, and school shootings are not more common than they used to be, researchers say

"There is not an epidemic of school shootings," he said, adding that more kids are killed each year from pool drownings or bicycle accidents [not to mention car accidents]. There are around 55 million school children in the United States, and on average over the past 25 years, about 10 students per year were killed by gunfire at school [and that includes suicides], according to Fox and Fridel's research.

The deadly school shooting this month in Parkland, Florida, has ignited national outrage and calls for action on gun reform. But while certain policies may help decrease gun violence in general, it's unlikely that any of them will prevent mass school shootings, according to **James Alan Fox**, the Lipman Family Professor of Criminology, Law, and Public Policy at Northeastern.

Further "premises"/purported statements of "fact" are also false, but let's look at the proposed "solution".

Just today a School Resource Officer, armed with a handgun, confronted an attempted murderer at Great Mills High School in Maryland with the result that the attempted murderer immediately ended his crimes.

It's clear from this example, and others of law-abiding armed people confronting armed criminals that such confrontations almost always either end the crimes or minimize the crimes compared to what would have happened had the criminal not been confronted by armed resistance.

Therefore, rather than merely studying the cost of placing SROs into schools, the study should include the broader solution of arming school personnel (staff, teachers, administrators, custodial, etc.) who would volunteer to be armed and undergo some training to deal with potential violent criminals in the school environment.

Please delete the factually inaccurate statements from this resolution and broaden it to include the possible arming of any volunteering school personnel.
