# II. Background and Summary

## 1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Founded in 1975, ALU LIKE, Inc. is a *statewide*, private, non-profit, multi-service,

Native Hawaiian serving organization, in its 43rd year. The name ALU LIKE means, "working
together," and its purpose is "to raise the economic, educational and social levels of
underprivileged residents of the Hawaiian community," which is accomplished through its
mission "to *kōkua* (assist) Hawaiian natives who are committed to achieving their potential for
themselves, their families and communities." It is governed by a six member volunteer Board of
Directors, who are representative of each island or district. The board is responsible for
establishing organizational policies and has ultimate fiduciary responsibility.

As a whole, ALU LIKE annually administers approximately \$11.4 million (2017 Audit Report) in federal, state, county, and private grants in projects focused on services in the areas of employment and job training, family literacy, financial literacy, at-risk youth prevention and intervention services, comprehensive elder services, as well as STEM and career and technical



education (CTE).

ALU LIKE, Inc. ensures high quality programs and services in Career and Technical Education in particular as they have administered the Native Hawaiian Career and Technical Education Program for 32 years (NHCTEP). Its function is to provide an overarching framework from the Native Hawaiian perspective, to advocate, sponsor, and guide the shape, types, and initiatives of community-based projects. These projects expand and enhance participant activities and are grounded in best practices to make career and technical education at high schools, community colleges, and adult training programs more effective for Native Hawaiian students.

ALU LIKE's role has been as a consortium leader for its projects, working together to shape new expansions of services and serving as sounding board for continual improvements in the use of culture-based educational strategies. The consortium model is aimed to address the academic gap in Hawaiian students' written communication and math skills, which affect their ability to successfully enroll and complete post-secondary education, as indicated by the Hawaii Data eXchange Partnership. ALU LIKE, Inc.'s consortium partners benefit from concerted efforts to increase industry-related technical skill, better link students to practice experiences, and build the bridges for successful transitions to the workforce, college, higher degrees, and economic self-sufficiency through occupations in sustainable and emerging careers in our global economy.

In just the past five years, the ALU LIKE, Inc. NHCTEP Consortium has served over 1,500 unduplicated students, assisted in helping over 900 students obtain industry recognized certifications and degrees, and an average 90% internship completion success rate.

ALU LIKE, Inc. supports all its consortium partners through ongoing technical assistance,

monitoring and collaborative solution support, as well as cultural and professional development activities throughout the program year. The design and purpose of the consortium serves to elevate all programs together in order to improve sharing of effective methods (such as recruitment and retention techniques), express challenges in a supportive environment, and strive for continuous improvement through interactive partnerships and concerted approach. The consortium currently consists of Castle High School, Honolulu Community College,

Kanehunamoku Voyaging Academy, Kauai Community College, Marimed Foundation, and Windward Community College. The goal of this program would be to incorporate Leeward and Kapi'olani Community Colleges into the NHCTEP Consortium, providing students at these institutions with vital retention efforts and support for successful program completion. This program would also provide stipend support for community college students statewide for unpaid internships that further students' academic and career goals.

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## 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Despite their representation, Native Hawaiian students at community colleges statewide have not demonstrated the same academic achievements as their non-Hawaiian peers in several areas:

- Course Completion Rate
- Retention Rate
- Graduation Rate
- Limited Opportunities for Practice-Based Learning
- Limited Exposure to Emerging and High-Wage Career Pathways
- Low Self-Sufficiency Income Standards

Reports have outlined the social inequalities and hardships faced in Native Hawaiian communities and 'ohana (families) due to low incomes and disparity between the economic status of Native Hawaiians and other Hawaii residents (Hostetter 2014). Native Hawaiian households have the lowest mean income compared to all major ethnic groups in the State of Hawaii. This is compounded by the fact that Native Hawaiian youth and young adults who are neither enrolled in school nor employed in the workforce are at a higher percentage compared to all other ethnic groups in Hawaii. (Ka Huaka'i, 2014). There is a need to improve the economic self-sufficiency, and a successful education is one powerful tool in this process. Current research advocates for collaborative approaches in order to amplify the impact of individual programs, in



turn, generating broad, positive change in the future. (Hong, 2011). Investments made toward education and postsecondary options will provide building blocks that can support Native Hawaiians toward improved levels of self-sufficiency. Specifically, careers in CTE and STEM-related fields offer more lucrative employment opportunities and can serve as a springboard for Native Hawaiian youth and young adults toward economic self-sufficiency.

To address these needs, ALU LIKE, Inc. is proposing to integrate Kapi'olani Community College and Leeward Community College into the ALU LIKE, Inc. NHCTEP Consortium. In joining the consortium, these schools would be able to benefit from the innovative guidance and support services coupled with cultural activities to improve course completion rates, retention, and ultimately certificate/degree attainment among the Native Hawaiian students. Moreover, NHCTEP would like to extend specific student support services to community college students statewide, through targeted unpaid-internship stipend support. In this way ALU LIKE, Inc. will be able to facilitate student retention and course completion, and the accompanying economic advancement that comes with degree attainment and professional development opportunity.

## 3. Describe the target population to be served

The target population for all ALU LIKE, Inc. programs are primarily Native Hawaiians; however, ALU LIKE, Inc. also serves Native Americans and Alaskan Native descendants, as well as persons of high economic need (qualifying for TANF benefits). This program will target Native Hawaiian students statewide; however, if resources are not fully utilized by the target population, the program will be available to non-Native Hawaiian students similar to other ALU LIKE, Inc. programs and services.



## 4. Describe the geographic coverage.

This program will primarily provide support on the island of Oahu at Kapi'olani and Leeward Community Colleges; however, the stipend support for unpaid student internships will be available to community college students statewide.

#### 2. Facilities

ALU LIKE, Inc. program staff will be located in current facility space in the Mapunapuna central office, consisting of 2 cubicle spaces, 2 offices, as well as shared common areas. Program specialists will travel as needed to community colleges to coordinate with college staff and ensure student support services and deliverables. College staff facilities are currently



provided by the campuses themselves. ALU LIKE, Inc. staff will utilize available common areas for student support programming in coordination with campus staff.

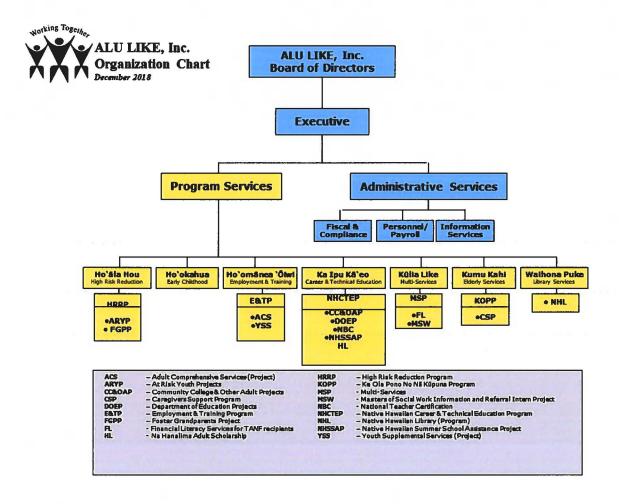
