Background

Anaina Hou Community Park ("Anaina Hou") is a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit organization located on the beautiful north shore of Kaua'i. We were founded in 2010, by Bill and Joan Porter, to provide a gathering place for our kama'aina community and serve the needs of the thriving visitor market. When Joan Porter and her late husband, Bill, relocated to Kauai, they were moved to give back to our community. They met with countless members of the community to discuss ideas about how to protect the highway frontage from industrial development and to identify the needs of our diverse population. Bill and Joan purchased the land that became our 15-acre campus, along with the adjoining 500-acre Wai Koa Plantation, and founded Anaina Hou as a gift to our community.

The Mission of Anaina Hou is to provide a gathering place in Kilauea rooted in the values, history and culture of our diverse island community. The Vision of Anaina Hou is to enrich the lives of the members of our community and the many guests of our island who visit our campus. Today, the Anaina Hou campus proudly offers: Kaua'i Mini Golf and Botanical Gardens; a Café and Gift Shop specializing in locally sourced products; Wai Koa Loop Trail (a 5 mile trail for bicycles and pedestrians); weekly farmer's markets; community classroom/meeting room facilities; the Porter Pavilion (a 4,000 sq ft multipurpose community event space); a Skate Park; and our newest addition- the Anaina Hou Playground.

Proposal

This proposal seeks support to complete the Anaina Hou Playground ("Playground") - a community-inspired and driven project that is far more of a community centerpiece than a typical playground. It was designed by the same company who designed the beloved Kamalani playground in Lihue, Kaua'i, and promises to be a north shore landmark for many years to come. The 17,000 Square foot Playground is elaborate, with a volcano climbing structure, replica of a sailing canoe, multi-level ahupua'a-themed structure, and replica of a sugarcane train. The community demonstrated great support for the project, with

more than \$600,000 raised through private donations, grants, and in-kind donations. The community even helped construct the playground under the guidance of experienced Leathers & Associates contractors, with more than 200 volunteers participating in community-build days in August, 2018. Like all construction projects, Playground construction encountered some difficulties that could not be foreseen. Most of the hiccups merely required dynamic thinking and were resolved without causing a major set-back. However, Hurricane Lane came dangerously close to the island of Kaua'i during the community build days, causing a break in construction, and the resulting heavy rains left the playground site extremely saturated. This did cause a significant delay and resulted in some components not being completed during the supervised volunteer build days. In addition, a factory where some of the slides were located burned down, so those slides could not be installed during the build days. Despite these issues, Anaina Hou was able to open the Playground to the public on October 28, 2018 and a steady flow of visitors and residents visit daily to enjoy the culturally-inspired equipment. As of January 15th, 2019- a total estimate of visitors to the playground has exceeded 5,000.

While the Playground has been well-supported and extremely well-received by the community, the project is not entirely complete. This application for a grant-in-aid seeks support to complete some important components of the original design that must be completed by professionals because they were not achieved during the volunteer build portion of Playground construction. In addition to the final touches that could not be completed by volunteer labor due to Hurricane Lane, Anaina Hou also seeks support to install a sidewalk throughout the playground area to make it more accessible to those with disabilities, add a thatched-roof hale so families can take shelter from the elements, include educational signage, and add temporary portable bathrooms until funding can be obtained to install permanent bathrooms. This final phase of construction will maximize enjoyment and use of the one-of-a-kind Playground, making the most of contributions the community has already invested in the project.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Goal: Create a community hub where families can enjoy free, healthy activities at any time of the day.

Objectives

* Construct a hale with a thatched roof where families can enjoy shade and take shelter from rain while children play. The hale will also serve as an important shelter for the camp programs held at Anaina Hou each summer.

Goal: Ensure the Playground respectfully represents elements of Hawaiian culture and history and shares accurate information about the same with visitors.

Objectives:

* Design and install educational signage throughout the Playground, consulting with Devin Kamealoha Forrest, a well-respected expert in Hawaiiana who sits on our Board of Directors.

Goal: Complete installation of all Playground infrastructure and equipment so the community can enjoy it to the fullest extent.

Objectives:

- * Install the remaining three slides, which were not installed during the initial volunteer build days due to failure to receive them in time due to a fire in the factory where they were created.
- * Extend efforts beyond minimal ADA compliance to ensure children and family members with disabilities can enjoy the Playground as much as possible by connecting the parking lot to the play area with a cement sidewalk and extending the sidewalk entirely around the play structures. This will require retaining a civil engineer to oversee surveying and grading and a cement contractor to lay the cement.
 - * Cap and sand posts and edge rails throughout Playground area.
- * Install portable toilets until funding can be obtained to build permanent bathrooms adjacent to the Playground.
- * Design and construct a siltation control system to prevent eroded soil surrounding the Playground from washing off into the bio swale.
 - * Install parking striping and blocks
- * Remove existing electrical installation (an electric pole and box that is not in use) from Playground area.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Most residents of the Kilauea area are families with children (6% higher than the State average). A significant majority of families in this area with children under age 5 have both parents in the workforce but approximately 17% of these children live in poverty (a percentage that is higher than the State average). A majority of students attending Kilauea Public Elementary School qualify for free/reduced lunch.

Sadly, this area scored negatively on a "Protection Index" calculated by the UH Center on the Family. The index assesses 9 indicators of family, community strength. Higher scores are associated with communities with "children who are nurtured and doing well in school, families that are healthy, and communities

which are economically vital." The assessment tells us that families in Kilauea need more support.

The families in this area—our community—very much need organizations like Anaina Hou and projects like the Playground. They need safe and stimulating places for children to play. They need affordable places for families to gather. They need a central location for community programming. They need to have a voice at the table in deciding how projects and programs like this play out. Anaina Hou is dedicated to meeting those needs and the Playground is an important step toward those goals.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The primary target population for this project are children ages 0-10 who reside on the east and north shores of Kaua'i. This area is home to approximately 25,000 people, with 51% of that number representing families with children (6% higher than the State average). Visitors to Kaua'i will also enjoy the Playground facilities while visiting the Anaina Hou campus, easily located right off Kuhio highway. Last year over 40,000 visitors and 13,000 local residents enjoyed time at our mini golf course and educational botanical gardens. In addition, more than 1,000 community members visited the campus to enjoy free movie nights at Anaina Hou last year. At least 26,000 community members visit the campus for the local farmers' market each year. Anaina Hou also partnered with a number of local organizations and individuals to bring the community together to host nonprofit fundraisers, concerts, and a free Thanksgiving dinner which drew 400 attendees in 2018. Additionally, the completion of the Porter Pavilion and community events therein continues to increase campus traffic. Given the high volume of traffic already occurring on the Anaina Hou campus, it is conservative to estimate that over 20,000 community members and 25,000 visitors will enjoy the Playground facilities each year. Given the demographics of the surrounding community, a significant number of those community members will be families in which both parents work but are still struggling to make ends meet. Providing a free, active and safe place to gather and play (at any time that can work with their schedule) is of utmost importance to these families. In addition, approximately 30 families send their children to summer camp at Anaina Hou to ensure the children have a fun, healthy, active and safe place to be while they work - the Playground and hale will significantly increase the quality of enjoyment of the summer camps.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Kilauea is a central point connecting the north shore (spanning 15 miles to the west) with the population hub of Kapa'a on Kaua'i's eastern shore (17 miles to the east). Anaina Hou is also proud to say that residents come from around the entire island to enjoy Kama'aina Sundays (free mini golf) and believes that will also be the case with the Anaina Hou Playground. Beyond Island residents, visitors from a multitude of countries and geographic origin will enjoy the

Playground. Approximately 40,000 visitors enjoyed activities on our campus last year.

- Remove Electrical Service
- Installation of Portable Toilets

C. Responsibilities

Oversight of the Anaina Hou Playground completion is led by Anaina Hou Community Park Board Member and Recreation Committee Chair, Frank Rothschild. Frank is a retired judge and well-versed in contract agreements. Frank will be assisted by Board Member Michael James, who has over thirty years experience in the construction management industry. Under their guidance, the Recreation Committee is responsible for leading the planning, design, and construction efforts as well as liaison between contractors.

Quality Assurance

Anaina Hou Community Park shall ensure the quality of all work meets industry standards through it's capable and experienced leadership in the Recreation Committee, led by Frank Rothschild and Michael James. This committee has successfully managed the design, construction and completion (completed in 2018) of the Porter Pavilion, a \$4 million project resulting in an impressive 4,000 square foot multi-use event space on campus. Construction expenses and financial management relating to Playground completion shall be monitored by CPA Amy Meharg, who has over twenty years of experience managing the budgets of non-profit grant capital projects. Additional oversight will be provided by Board Member and Finance Committee Chair Ken Rosenthal- who brings over 25 years of experience with a non-profit economic development lending company.

Evaluation

The Recreation Committee, led by Frank Rothschild and Michael James, will oversee all tasks and make final recommendations to the full Board of Directors regarding the selection subcontractors and to provide oversight of all final phases/ installations and aspects of the playground. The Recreation Committee will meet regularly with contractors to keep abreast of progress, and ensure that any difficulties, both anticipated and unanticipated, will be resolved optimally to

- ensure the playground continues on schedule. The Finance Committee will prepare monthly budget to actual reports as well as track timeline progress.

The Anaina Hou Community Park Board is composed of community members who have significant experience in real estate, construction and finance. The Board is comprised of professionals with a wide range of experience that will benefit the project, including a retired Circuit Court Judge, construction manager, attorney, real estate developer, business owners, certified investment management analyst and certified investment planners. We are especially proud that our board also includes a kumu hula with an M.A. in Indigenous Language Revitalization, Hawaiian Language and Literature. Importantly, the Anaina Hou Community Park Board recently oversaw the successful completion of the brand new Porter Pavilion, a 4,000 square foot multi-use event space as well as multi-purpose meeting facilities on campus totaling over 15,000 feet of

community space. Since opening in July 2018, the Porter Pavilion and meeting facilities have hosted over 14,000 people at community sponsored events.

Let's play

Anaina Hou Community Park's new playground is open for business and already popular with local families, according to organizers. And they're waiting on just a few more details before commemorating the playground with a grand opening ceremony sometime in late January or early February.

With a maze of platforms and slides, a volcano-shaped rock wall, a castle in the middle and a replica of a double-hulled Hawaiian sailing canoe, the playground is themed around the concept of ahapua'a (mountain-to-ocean land areas). It also has sugarplantation-era trains.

"It's a big success," said Frank Rothschild, on the Anaina Hou board of directors and chair of the Recreational Committee that's heading up fundraising for the project. "It's satisfying to me that every time I drive there to go to a meeting there's lots of kids with parents in the playground."

The concept surfaced years ago when the son of Hawaii Volcanic Beverages and husband and wife co-founders and longtime residents Jason and Channon Donovan was playing at a science-themed eco-playground in Florida while they were on vacation.

The Donovans' son, Finn, was 5 years old at the time.

"We had so much fun it was hard to leave, so Finn and I decided we needed to build an eco-learning playground where we live on Kauai," Jason Donovan said. "Huge mahalos to Joan and Bill Porter for accepting our proposal and for donating the land, initial funding, and wonderful heart and soul to make this happen for everyone who lives on or visits Kauai."

After Donovan pitched the idea, though, it was time to fundraise. It took several years before the Recreational Committee was able to raise \$650,000 for the playground's construction.

It was built through a company called Leathers, which partners with "an army of volunteers" to build playgrounds, according to Rothschild.

That's how the Kamalani Playground was built in Lydgate Park. But Anaina Hou wasn't able to get the volunteer base they needed to knock out building their playground in the same way.

Because of that, they had to factor in hiring people to help with the building, and the price tag climbed another \$75,000 — and that's after the board went through and cut away "wish-list items" from the plans for the playground.

"We revised our budget with the idea that we'd have a volunteer week at the very beginning and get a huge amount of work done and then we'd finish with hired help," Rothschild said.

Several volunteers did come out for that volunteer week in August 2018 at the beginning of the project, and they ran into roadblocks in the project immediately — quite literally, they ran into boulders.

"We had to dig 285 holes in the ground to hold the poles and all the features and the fence," Rothschild said. "In at least 40 percent of those holes, they ran into boulders, and that really threw us back. Most of our volunteers were smashing rocks, trying to break it up to get the post in the ground."

The playground is built almost entirely from recycled plastic and locally-sourced, non-toxic, natural building materials, and is touted as "earth friendly."

Keiki and their families are playing in the tunnels and climbing on the volcano, searching the skies for navigational stars as they play on the voyaging canoe, and taking rides down the slides that are existing currently.

And in the next few weeks, organizers plan to finish up final details like adding three additional slides — those didn't come with the original shipment of supplies — grading the road and establishing pathways to the hale overlooking the playground, and installing artwork along a wall that will be shaped to resemble the Kilauea Mountains.

On one side of the wall will be a ceramic mosaic of Hawaii's colorful fish and corals, and on the other side of the wall will be a mosaic of Hawaii's birds — all done in a partnership project with several Kauai artists.

Fundraising is still ongoing for the project, and Rosthchild said Anaina Hou had to take out a loan to be able to keep it on track.

"It's an amazing thing, and we had lots of people that have donated money and in-kind donations, and then we had the super volunteers," Rothschild said. "There were people who have spent a huge amount of time and helped and never charged us."

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
