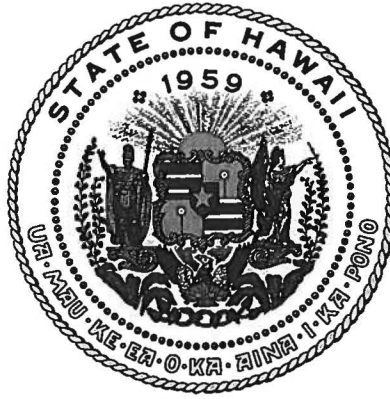



Hawaii Agricultural Foundation

The Governor of the State of Hawaii has made one of his priorities to double food production by 2020. With Hawaii importing 85% of all the food it needs for consumption, food sustainability is of paramount importance. The most compelling use of ag land is for food crops. However, the transition from sugar and pineapple to food crops and diversified agriculture has been a challenge. This grant addresses the State's goals to improve food sustainability and food security in our islands.

As part of this grant, HAF will initiate a Farmer Cooperative and Student Education Center that will: 1) support new and immigrant farmers with education and resources needed to help them build capacity, become self-sufficient and scale; 2) encourage farming as a career option by providing an education center where K-12 students can gather to learn about agriculture and meet with real life farmers.

The target populations to be served are new and immigrant farmers, and K-12 school-aged students.

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Hawai'i Agricultural Foundation (HAF) is a non-profit charitable organization created to promote agriculture and farming. Created in 2007 (initially as *The Hawaii Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture*, and renamed *The Hawai'i Agricultural Foundation* in 2010), the mission of HAF is to support and sustain Hawaii's agricultural industry by addressing critical needs and services of farmers and the agricultural industry in Hawaii, and by better connecting the farmers with the community and vice-versa. This involves educational and outreach programs

in the community, as well as direct marketing, technical, educational and in-the-field support for farmers.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of the HAF's Farmer, Student and Community Education Program supports Governor Ige's goal to make Hawaii more self-sufficient and to double local food production by 2020. It supports the State Department of Agriculture's published mission to promote the conservation, development and utilization of agricultural resources in the State. Furthermore, the grant supports the *Increased Food Security and Food Self-Sufficiency Strategy Plan* that was prepared by DBEDT Planning and HDOA that identified a need to build the agricultural workforce and continue the "Green Jobs Initiative" which provides workforce development services for the agricultural, energy, natural resources and related industries in order to increase food production.

The HAF's Farmer Cooperative and Student Education Center will serve two purposes: (1) support new/immigrant farmers with education and resources needed to help them build capacity and scale; (2) encourage farming as a career option by providing an education center where students can gather to learn about agriculture and farming and to meet with real life farmers.

The project will be built in partnership with the Hawaii Agriculture Research Center (HARC) under a twenty-five (25) year License in which HAF shall have exclusive right to the use of the facility and the option to renew the License for an additional fifteen (15) year term. In consideration, HAF shall pay an annual License Fee to HARC of One Dollar plus Hawaii general excise tax; the parties agree to share the cost of utilities equally. Day-to-day management and cost of the general maintenance of the facility shall be the responsibility of HARC, provided that damages caused by one party shall be paid solely by that party. HAF, at its sole discretion, may allow HARC concurrent or independent use of the facility for educational activities. Both parties agree to procure and maintain without cost to the other a general liability insurance policy with minimum coverage of three million dollars aggregate limits and a per-occurrence limit of not less than one million dollars.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Following the closure of the Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Co. (HC&S) plantation, parent company Alexander & Baldwin publicly stated its plans to keep the lands in agriculture but acknowledged that farming is a scientific and business enterprise and that their current workforce may not be able to transition to these new jobs because they don't have the skill set to be independent farmers.

The sale of 41,000 acres of HC&S land to the venture called Maui Pono LLC at the end of 2018 is promising for the State given the new owner's plans to cultivate "a broad range of food crops." Imperative to its success and the success of the State in attaining its goals for food self-sufficiency is the need for a qualified workforce. This requires education and capacity building.

As part of this grant, HAF will initiate: 1) a farmer education program to develop a model that will help new and immigrant farmers become self-sufficient and to build capacity; 2) development of innovative educational programs that will encourage careers in agriculture among our students.

4. Describe the target population to be served;

The target populations to be served are new and immigrant farmers and K-12 school age students

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The geographic coverage to be served is Oahu.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

The grant will provide the needed funds for HAF to expand its educational programs for farmers and public school students.

Farmer Cooperative and Education Center

On January 1, 2017, HAF assumed responsibility of directly licensing lands on its 220-acre Ag Park in Kunia to 17 immigrant farmers (who were alleged victims of human trafficking). These 17 farmers were initially brought to the HAF Ag Park as part of a human trafficking program from the Pacific Gateway Center about seven years ago. While many of the farmers have been successful in growing and selling their produce, they lack the knowledge of good agricultural practices (GAP) that prevent on-farm contamination of fruits and vegetables. For these 17 farmers, HAF would host workshops and work one-on-one to identify and help them with basic good food safety and business practices. At this Farmer Cooperative and Student Education Center it is envisioned that farmers will be able to gather and learn about food safety and business practices through workshops and one-on-one support.

Four years ago, HAF initiated Ag Education - Building a Continuum from K-12 and developed a fourth-grade Veggie U program, a second grade Where Would We Be Without Seeds program, an aquaponics middle and high school program, a Kids Cooking Local after-school middle school program and the In the Fields high school program. With the grant, HAF will be able to offer school visits to the HAF Ag Park where a garden will be developed to showcase the different kinds of produce grown by farmers in the park. They will also have hands-on learning opportunities to learn about farming by meeting our farmers at the Center.

It has been successful in developing a number of initiatives including farmer assistance programs HAF Ag Park at Kunia and Local Inside®—a community supported agriculture program; community outreach and education initiatives Localicious® Hawaii, the State's largest restaurant campaign which promotes establishments that source food locally, and EAT THINK DRINK, quarterly public education events that examine sustainability issues affecting production, distribution and access to local food on Hawaii; and K-12 agricultural education programs Where Would We Be Without Seeds, Veggie U, Kids Cooking Local, AqauPono Aquaponics, and In the Fields.

HAF currently operates a 220-acre agricultural park in Kunia for 20 farmers and offices located on Waialae Avenue.

Denise Yamaguchi, Executive Director

Prior to working for the HAF, Yamaguchi was a consultant to the Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation where she helped craft the language, vision and mission of the Foundation. She has more than nineteen years working as a consultant and executive with non-profit organizations specializing in strategic planning, fund development, marketing, government affairs, public relations and community relations. Her past employers and clients include NCL America, Bishop Museum, Japanese Cultural Center, Hawaii Foodbank, U.S. Senator Daniel K. Inouye, 3Rs, Artisans' Farmers Alliance, Durrant Media Five, Hawaii Institute for Public Affairs, Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation, Coast Guard Foundation, Hawaii Forest Industry Association, U.S.S. Battleship Missouri Association, and the State of Hawaii Procurement Office.

Teri Matsukawa, Finance Advisor

Teri Matsukawa serves as the financial advisor for HAF and oversees all financial reporting and budgeting for the organization. She has more than 30 years in accounting and financial management with her last position as the CFO for Louis Vuitton. She is a graduate of the University of Hawaii and is a Certified Public Accountant.

Lucy Ahn, Director of Development

Lucy Ahn currently oversees the day-to-day operations of the Hawaii Agricultural Foundation and manages the HAF's Localicious Hawaii campaign. She has worked in non-profit and government sectors, and was previously in charge of corporate support and grant management for PBS Hawaii, Hawaiian Educational Council, the *Grow Hawaii* program of the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools (HAIS), and Ronald McDonald House Charities. Along with Nainoa Thompson of the Polynesian Voyaging Society and HAIS president Robert Witt, Ahn also played a leadership role in the start-up of a new charter school serving the children and families of Waimanalo.

Iris Mizuguchi, Director of Educational Programs

Iris Mizuguchi currently oversees HAF's educational programs. She has more than 38 years working in the classroom and as an administrator for the Hawaii State Department of Education. Prior to her retirement in 2015, she held the position Education Specialist, Career and Technical Education where she oversaw all CTE activities inclusive of four student organizations (Family, Career and Community Leaders of America, National Future Farmers of America, Future Health Professionals and SkillsUSA). She was also responsible for managing CTE state budget and eight district resource teachers.

Kacey Robello, Kunia Ag Park / Local Inside Manager

Kacey Robello currently serves as HAF's Kunia Ag Park/Local Inside Manager. Previously employed by the Hawaii Farm Bureau for eight years as Farmers Market General Manager, she was responsible for coordinating and managing seven Farmers' Markets on a weekly basis working with 150 vendors. Robello brings her coordinating and management skills as well as her background of working with over 50 producers that produce locally -grown, -caught, and -raised products. She also brings her relationships with restaurants and chefs as vendors, customers, and participants with farmers' market demos.

Elizabeth Stanton, Educational Manager

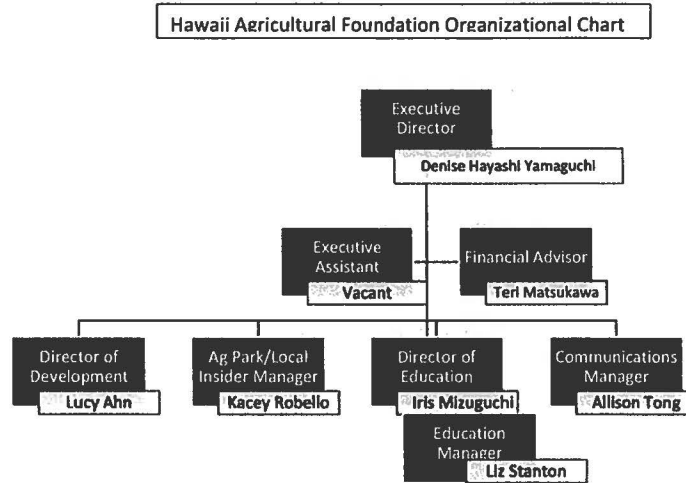


