3. Public Purpose

This grant <u>shall be used</u> for a public purpose pursuant to Section 42F-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes,

Mapping the senior community in Waikiki to ensure they are accounted for during natural disasters, providing them with disaster preparedness kits and education, and facilitating disaster preparedness planning in their residential communities will insure they can age in place with greater security and increased support.

Knowing who this vulnerable population is and where they are located will allow us to ensure they are to be accounted for before, during, and after any future disaster or emergency and allow the proper agencies and care support organizations to address current needs and better plan for the future.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Kanu Hawai'i is a 501(c)(3), organization that seeks to cultivate connection between people, community, and 'āina. Through empowering both individual and collective action, Kanu addresses critical environmental, sustainability, equity, and community challenges.

Starting in 2006, Kanu has organized "at scale" community engagement campaigns. Since that time, Kanu has grown to over 19,000 members representing every zip code in Hawaii. Our "I Will…" campaign drew over 25,000 commitments to build a better Hawaii; our "Eat Local Challenge" campaigns encouraged tens of thousands to eat more locally sourced foods; and our recent "Volunteer Week Hawaii" 2018 campaign

mental conditions that limit their ability to independently care for themselves, without regular check-ins from family or other caregivers.

In Louisiana, about 71 percent of those who died as a result of Hurricane Katrina were older than 60, and nearly half were older than 75, according to a 2006 federal report¹. About two weeks after Hurricane Sandy hit in 2012², the New York Times reported that close to half of those who died in the storm were 65 or older³. Many of these elderly victims drowned at home; others died from storm-related injuries, hypothermia, and other causes. Many of these deaths were related to responders simply not knowing they were there. We have an opportunity to get ahead of the curve and not only map where our seniors live, but also provide proactive preparedness engagement that will help them to be safe during a disaster.

The C&CoH's Report titled, "Making Honolulu an Age-Friendly City: An Action Plan" (March 2015) cites in several of its goals the need to identify and support seniors through the approach outlined in this application; these actions have yet to be performed.

4. Describe the target population to be served

The over 5,000 seniors in Waikiki; however, we see this as a pilot project that, while addressing the largest population of seniors in Hawaii, can also inform future outreach and mapping exercises in other communities.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The coverage area includes Waikiki.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

During 2018, the Waikiki Consortium working group performed door-to-door outreach in an effort to contact and begin mapping the senior community in Waikiki; however, it was challenging to get to actual doors because many buildings in Waikiki have security or locked entryways.

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

Kanu Hawaii has taken an active role in community resilience and disaster preparedness work. Kanu is:

- A contributing organization to the City & County of Honolulu's (C&CoH) Resilience Plan
- A member of the C&CoH's Disaster Preparedness working group
- The representative for Waikiki in the Cross Island Communities Resilience Network (CICRN) organized by the Department of Emergency Management - this network is made up of community responder organizations recognized by the C&CoH as representatives for their respective communities in the space of disaster preparedness
- The organizer of a statewide network of community responders, a group of people that actively responded during the floods, volcanic eruptions, hurricanes, and fires on Kauai, Oahu, Hawaii Island, and Maui during 2018

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

Kanu Hawaii's executive director has over 12 years of community organizing in Hawaii. He is the co-founder of Malama Kauai on the island of Kauai and directed that organization for 10 years prior to taking on the directorship of Kanu Hawaii in 2017. Further, he was involved through Malama Kauai as one of the primary community responder organizations in the 2018 Kauai Floods, during which he helped to obtain and direct resources (totaling over \$750,000) and direct community relief efforts. He oversaw a staff of 10 employees during his directorship tenure with Malama Kauai and now currently oversees an office of two F/T staff with an additional four P/T contract workers at Kanu Hawaii. Our existing support staff devoted to support this proposal will include a full-time volunteer coordinator who will engage our 19,000 members and new volunteers in the outreach efforts proposed. The scope of work identified under "project manager" will include responsibility for the timeline of implementation, management of outreach to community partners, and serving as the primary point of contact for the project. They will implement the project plan and perform all data collection, host meetings, and provide the required reporting. We have working relationships with several qualified candidates and shall engage with the appropriate party should this application be funded. We also want to continue to engage volunteers, just not rely on them solely to implement the project, thus, support for the volunteer coordination is at . 25 FTE.
