II. Background and Summary

- 1. The applicant, Pa`upena Community Development Corporation (CDC), is an Upcountry Maui-based homestead organization under the auspices of the 1921 Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) federal trust. Incorporated Nov. 29, 2016, in Hawai`i, Pa`upena CDC is an IRS 501(c)(3) nonprofit, whose mission is to provide resources and training to empower fellow Hawaiian Homes trust beneficiaries to build homes and self-sufficient communities. Its vision is to fulfill 10-term congressional delegate Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana`ole's century-old dream for native Hawaiians to reconnect with Waiohuli ahupua'a (land division) in thriving agricultural and pastoral communities, and to share this paradigm throughout the pae 'āina (archipelago).
- 2. The proposed Project HO`ALA (To awaken, rise up) is an awareness campaign to communicate with, engage, educate and train beneficiaries of the 1921 Hawaiian Homes Commission Act federal trust, to know their entitlements; to advocate to get onto their `aina, and to prepare themselves to farm successfully.

HO`ALA is an acronym for: Hawaiians Organize for Agriculture, Lokahi (teamwork) and Assignments (kuleana; 25 core-group participants form teams of six to 10, to cultivate 5 acres per hui). Project goals and objectives are 1) to organize and engage 25 HHCA beneficiaries; 2) to train them to farm by planting 15 acres in kalo (taro), `ulu (breadfruit), `awa (kava), soursop and/or other native and tropical crops and trees, and 3) to hold farming- and ranching-related events, as follows: 10 mini-lectures, five workshops and one puwalu, or conference.

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- 3. The public purpose is to help achieve Gov. David Ige's Sustainable Hawai`i Initiative goal of doubling the food supply in Hawai`i by 2020. The needs to be served are to empower those Native Hawaiians who've been waiting decades for Hawaiian homestead awards, and to increase food self-sufficiency and security because we live in an island state that relies on 85 to 90 percent imports as its primary food source, per state Department of Agriculture figures.
- **4.** The target population is more than 5,200 HHCA beneficiaries on waitlists for Maui agricultural and pastoral homestead awards numbering 4,663 on the DHHL ag waitlist and 615 on the pastoral waitlist, as of December 2018. These 5,278 waitlisters have 50 percent Hawaiian-blood quantum, and some of their dates of homestead application go back more than five decades, to April 1967, according to the 57-page 12/31/2014 DHHL Applicant Summary.
- 5. The Upcountry Maui geographic coverage embraces 1) the three native Hawaiian homesteads of Keokea farm lots, and Waiohuli Phase 1 and 2 residential subdivisions, and 2) especially a 4,128-acre Waiohuli-Keokea homelands parcel. The latter offers the potential to provide 1,200 half- to 1-acre sustainable-agriculture homestead parcels.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

- 1. Organize, engage and train 25 HHCA beneficiaries to farm, with a Native Hawaiian culturally appropriate approach emphasizing cultural aspects of farming, e.g., planting according to moon phases; 'olelo Hawai'i, or Hawaiian-language farming terminology, and ag-related oli, or chant, and protocol.
 - Communicate via letter, email, social media and/or website to identify project participants and establish a database; implemented by the project manager and the operations specialist, in Month 1.
 - Survey via letter, email, website and/or person-to-person to assess farming and ranching experience and needs; by project manager, Month 1.
 - Meet monthly to organize, inform, educate and motivate; by project manager, months 2 to 12.
- 2. Plant 15 acres in kalo, `ulu, `awa, soursop and/or other native and tropical crops and trees.
 - Five multi-day workshops; led by the ag instructor;
 - Prepare soil, months 2 to 6.
 - Install fencing, months 3 to 5.

November 9 — "Ag-related oli (chant) and protocol" by kumu hula Kapono`ai Molitau.

November 30 — "Hawai'i Farmers Union United's Maui programs" by Vincent Mina.

December 14 — "Lo`iloa (many taro patches) at `lao Valley" by Maui police officer Kawewehi Pundyke.

December 28 — "Native Hawaiian land stewardship at Kapoho, Waihe`e" by Kapono`ai Molitau.

 One puwalu; organized and presented by the Executive Director and Operations Manager, Month 9.

- 4. Project HO`ALA's quality assurance and evaluation plans to monitor, evaluate and improve results include 1) post-lecture, post-puwalu and quarterly on-1-to-10-scale written surveys also seeking recommendations for improvements; 2) post-workshop participants' verbal comments also seeking recommendations for improvements, with a secretary/recorder noting all input; 3) a wall chart with goals, objectives and recommended improvements to be adopted, with target dates and dates of completion, and 4) an attendance wall chart with gold stars awarded for perfect attendance.
- 5. Measures of effectiveness for expending agency DHHL to assess the project's achievement and accomplishment are: 1) quarterly written progress reports to the Hawaiian Homes commission and to DHHL regarding Pa`upena CDC meeting its quantitative project goals and objectives, with participants presenting testimony on their project experience and gains, and 2) semiannual and project-ending PowerPoint presentations on if and how Pa`upena CDC met quantitative project goals and objectives, with participants' commentary and a summary of post-event written surveys.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Pa'upena CDC's list of projects in the last three years demonstrates its skills, abilities, knowledge and experience related to the proposed project, as follows:

10/1/16 through 5/1/17 — Pa`upena CDC served as the Project Advisory Committee implementing a \$100,000 USDA Socially Disadvantaged and Veteran Farmers and Ranchers grant project on behalf of grantee Hi`ilei Aloha CDFI (Community Development Financial Institution).

11/12/16 — With \$500 in OHA I Mana Ka Lāhui funding, Pa`upena hosted a Makahiki and holiday wreath-making workshop using native plant materials.

7/8/16 through 4/29/18 — Co-sponsored a 20-part mini-lecture and workshop series on agand ranching-related topics.

9/2/17 — Sponsored the daylong Ka Hua Mahi`ai (The Fruitful Farmer) puwalu with presenters from A&B; Lapa`au Farm of Olinda; Maui County Farm Bureau; Maui Nui Botanical Gardens, and Sakugawa Ranch.

11/3/18 – Organized and sponsored the daylong Maui Homestead Summit on ag- and ranching-related topics, whose presenters included two Maui legislators as panelists; Waimea homestead association's president speaking on the WOW! greenhouse tomato initiative, and the Hoaloha Farms proprietor on kalo cultivation with a huli (taro shoots) giveaway and sampling of various kalo varieties.

For fiscal year 2020 — DHHL awarded Pa`upena CDC a \$46,831 grant for a water-catchment and water-intake-monitoring program on six Upcountry homesteads.

2. The adequacy of the project facility lies in the size and scope of the acreage and equipment available. Pa`upena CDC's proposed project facility is a 4,128-acre homelands parcel at Waiohuli-Keokea in Upcountry Maui. The layout offers an upper 123-acre parcel along Kula Highway, and a lower 4,005-acre parcel state-designated "General Agriculture." Available equipment and resources include three pieces of farm-related heavy-equipment machinery: a backhoe, dozer and excavator; and long-term use of two innovative \$26,000 machines key to livestock operations — an atmospheric-condensation machine capable of producing 400 gallons of water daily, and a fodder-producing machine that can provide 114 pounds of fresh livestock feed daily.

The plan to acquire the facility is to participate in a DHHL Planning Office "beneficiary consultation," or hearing, on Pa`upena CDC's Dec. 24, 2016, land-use request for 4,128 Waiohuli-Keokea acres to run cattle and to train waitlist beneficiaries in farming and ranching techniques and practices.

VI. <u>Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing</u>

- 1. Project HO`ALA's proposed staffing pattern; proposed service capacity (full-, three-quarter-or half-time service) for project success; personnel qualifications and experience, and annual salary ranges for the three highest-paid employees are, as follows:
 - Full-time executive director and project manager is an entrepreneur; farmer; educator; IRS licensed Enrolled Agent, and senior tax analyst; salary of \$65,000.
 - Half-time operations manager holds a Ph.D. in education and a law degree; is outgoing executive director of a Native Hawaiian CDFI and founded the fledgling World Indigenous Nations University Hawai`i Pasifika, an isle-based native college; salary \$32,500.
 - Three-quarter-time ag instructor is a chef/farmer, who has grown and marketed a myriad crops, including dryland kalo, kalamungay, neem, heirloom tomatoes, and `ulu; salary range \$8,000 to \$15.000.
 - Part-time curriculum specialist holds a USC educational doctorate, and is a veteran educator, curriculum coordinator at a Native Hawaiian high school and longtime volleyball coach.

Pa`upena CDC staff's ability to supervise, train and provide administrative direction is reflected in its Executive Director, an entrepreneur managing an innovative, successful Maui Goat Yoga business and used to providing administrative and accounting direction.

The Operations Manager not only has written and evaluated national grants, but also implemented and supervised grant projects. All four Pa`upena staff members are educators and trainers.

On behalf of Hoaloha Farms, I write this letter of support and commitment for Project HO'ALA that is worthy of a legislative Grant In Aid for the Maui-based nonprofit Pa'upena Community Development Corporation. Pa'upena CDC is an Upcountry beneficiary organization under the auspices of the 1921 Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) federal trust. The mission of the IRS 501(c)(3) is to provide resources and training to empower Hawaiian Homes trust beneficiaries to build homes and self-sufficient communities.

Project HO'ALA (meaning "to awake, rise up") is an acronym for Hawaiians Organize for Agriculture, Lokahi (teamwork) and Assignments (kuleana). The proposed Project HO'ALA is an awareness campaign to organize, engage and train more than 5,200 HHCA beneficiaries on waitlists for Maui agricultural and pastoral homestead awards. The initiative seeks to train project participants in farming and ranching practices on 4,128 Upcountry acres of repatriated Hawaiian homelands that, until year-end 2018, had been permitted to non-Hawaiian ranchers for nearly a quarter-century.

Here on Maui, I am proprietor of Hoaloha Farms, a consortium of 14 farmers on 309 acres in Waikapu, and also serve as president of the Hawai'i Farmers Union United, Mauna Kahalawai (West Maui Mountains) Chapter. Hoaloha Farms commits to recruit Project HO'ALA participants.
