The grant will be used for a public purpose pursuant to Section 42F-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes. See item #3 in Background and Summary.

II. Background and Summary

The Searider Productions Foundation (SPF) respectfully request a third-year of funding in the amount of \$450,000 to establish three new strands in a College/Career to Employment pathway that will provide the Leeward Coast secondary students and residents with educational support, job training, and workforce development opportunities for success in the job market. The three new service strands are:

- 1) Early College Courses Six new dual credit courses will be offered in Hospitality, Creative Media, and Natural Resources to assist students to obtain a post-secondary degree with less financial burden when they graduate from high school.
- 2) Community Education additional adult education courses and expansion of professional development and afterschool activities. Work closely with Leeward Community College to offer workforce development courses for adult residents to learn the skills needed to be a successful worker. Expand afterschool activities to build a foundation and interest in hotel and travel industry services.
- 3) Entrepreneurship and Commercialism courses and activities.

 Entrepreneurship the process of designing, launching, and running a new business. Students will learn the 7 essential skills of entrepreneurship ambition, willingness to learn, ability to listen, creativity, assertiveness and confidence, perseverance, and courage and risk taking. Commercialism the application of

practices and attitudes toward maximizing profits. Students will research and design new uses for products that are grown or developed in the grant project.

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Searider Productions Foundation (SPF) is a Hawaii non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation whose mission is to provide the Waianae Community on the Leeward Coast, especially it's youth, with the educational support, job training, and workforce development opportunities for success as citizens of the local and global communities.

SPF strives to ensure that our leaders of tomorrow will honor and carry the values and traditions of our community forward as college graduates and career-ready citizens.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this grant is to provide our secondary students and adult residents on the Leeward Coast with the educational support and workforce development training to be successful in the job market.

The objectives of this grant are:

- 1. Provide relevant dual credit college courses and job training for students in hospitality, creative media, or natural resources to accelerate obtainment of their college degree.
- Provide appropriate community education programs and training for adults, teachers, and students to learn the workforce skills in the hotel industry and related services.
- Provide entrepreneurship and commercialism opportunities through which students will research, design, and experiment with developing new products for Ko Olina Resorts and the local businesses on the Leeward Coast.

These objectives are in alignment with the Hawaii Department of Education's Strategic Plan Goals for preparing students for success in college, career, and citizenship in order to build a better future for themselves, their families, and the Westside Community on the Leeward Coast.

The public purpose and need to be served;

The Nanakuli-Waianae Complex Area (NWCA) is characterized by high unemployment and low academic achievement. The median household income is \$55,000 and per capita income is \$16,333, compared to the state average of \$67,492 and \$29,227 respectively. Approximately 62% of the families live below the federal poverty guidelines and due to this NWCA is the only Complex Area in the state where all nine of their schools qualify for the Federal Community Eligibility Provision Program which provides free transportation, breakfast, and lunch to all of their students.

The ethnic makeup of NWCA community is mixed, with relatively low percentage of Caucasians and Asians and high percentage of multiracial, other Pacific Islander, Hawaiian, and Part-Hawaiian residents. The community has the highest rate of native people in the state with approximately 68% of the population claiming Hawaiian or Part-Hawaiian ancestry. It is estimated that 10% of the students in the community are homeless. Approximately 11.1% of adults 25 years or older have attained a Bachelor's Degree or higher. A vast majority of our students are the first in their family to go to college. Our efforts in preparing students to become college and career ready also involve educating parents about why higher education is important, college entrance requirements, financial literacy, and what they can do to support their children to graduate from college.

The coast is plagued with homelessness, poverty, and startlingly low academic achievement. Leeward Coast families struggle with meager wages and comparatively high living costs, high unemployment, poor health indicators, low achieving schools, and a host of socio-economic challenges. A depressed economy and fewer job opportunities in the Leeward area have continued this vicious cycle of poverty which ultimately impacts educational attainment and hope for a successful future and the development of a thriving economically sustained community.

As the development of hotels in the Ko Olina Resort area increases, students and adults in the Leeward Coast are challenged in finding work because they lack the skills and experiences for jobs in and related to the hospitality industry. The need exists to have skilled workers who can provide high quality service to the hotel guests, provide marketing services to inform and attract visitors to Ko Olina Resorts, and to provide products for use in the hotels, restaurants and other service areas.

We have the potential workforce in our schools and community and this current undertaking will prepare students and adults through a partnership with schools, the UH college system, and the Ko Olina Resort hotels.

4. Describe the target population to be served

The Nanakuli-Waianae Complex Area is made up of nine schools: Nanakuli High and Intermediate (grades 7-12), Nanakuli Elementary, Nanaikapono Elementary, Waianae High, Waianae Intermediate, Waianae Elementary, Maili Elementary, Makaha Elementary, and Leihoku Elementary.

For this grant proposal, the target population will be the secondary schools and the adult residents on the Leeward Coast. Approximately 11.1% of adults 25 years or older have attained a Bachelor's Degree or higher. The current secondary student population is approximately 3,750 students with 1,250 in grades 7-12 and 2,500 in grades 9-12.

5. Describe the geographic coverage

This grant covers the geographical area from Nanakuli to Makaha on the Leeward Coast. It will cover the communities living in Nanakuli, Waianae, Makaha, Ohikilolo, Makua, Kahanahaiki, and Keawa'ula.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

The Searider Productions Foundation (SPF) Nanakuli-Waianae Complex Area (NWCA) project will comprise of the following activities:

Provide relevant dual credit college courses and job training for students in hospitality, creative media, or natural resources to accelerate obtainment of their college degree.

- Align and offer a total of 6 dual credit or early college courses: 2 in hotel and related services, 2 in creative media and related services, and 2 in natural resources and related services.
- Provide creative media teaching assistant (internship) opportunities for college students.
- The existing course structure at the high schools will allow schools to add various courses and give students both UH credits as well as high school credits for graduation. The instructor costs will be the same as the agreed upon costs with each higher education institution and the classes will be taught on the high school campuses.
- The Early College Courses fall under the oversight of the School Principal with program implementation responsibilities held by the College and Career Counselors at each school. The grant project will work with the Office of Curriculum, Instruction, and Student Support (OCISS) to establish a CTE Honors Diploma for students who successfully completed required courses and a Performance Based Assessment (PBA). The SPF project coordinator and the NWCA School Renewal Specialist in charge of the College and Career Program will be responsible for the coordination, support, and evaluation of these courses.

Provide appropriate community education programs and training for adults, teachers, and students to learn the workforce skills in the hotel industry and related services.

- Provide adult education workshops and courses to give participants the
 workforce skills needed to be employed in the hotel and business
 industries. Provide job shadowing and/or internship for adults and
 students at Ko Olina Resorts or local businesses. UH system staff and the
 SPF project coordinator will be responsible for supporting, monitoring,
 and evaluating these adult education activities and services.
- Provide professional development workshops and externships for teachers to learn about jobs and careers in the hotel industry and related services.
 Provide after-school hospitality club programs at Waianae Intermediate,

Nanakuli High and Intermediate, and Waianae High Schools. The UH system staff and the SPF project coordinator will be responsible for designing, monitoring, and evaluating these professional development and after-school activities.

 Provide outreach services to the Leeward Coast community to increase interest in hotel and related services. The SPF project coordinator and the UH system staff will be assisting, monitoring, and evaluating these community outreach activities.

Provide entrepreneurship and commercialism opportunities through which students will research, design, and experiment with developing new products for Ko Olina Resorts and the local businesses on the Leeward Coast.

- Develop appropriate entrepreneurship courses. Collaborate with UH system and Ko Olina Resorts to suggest and support possible products for students to research and experiment.
- The SPF project coordinator and the UH system staff will be developing, monitoring, and evaluating these entrepreneurship and commercialism activities.

- 3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results
 - This will be the third year that SPF is requesting funds to refine and <u>establish</u> three new strands in a College/Career to Employment pathway that will provide the Leeward Coast secondary students and residents with educational support, job training, and workforce development opportunities for success in the job market. The challenges that were faced the first year will be addressed through better community outreach, earlier announcement of courses to improve the registration system. Learning from the first year, the current (second) year of GIA funding will provide opportunities to expand student participation in three pathways and to improve and stabilize the implementation of the program. The third (requested) year of GIA funding will provide opportunities to refine and develop entrepreneurship and commercialism practices, skills, knowledge and attitudes.
 - Searider Productions Foundation (SPF) will contract a project coordinator to ensure that the identified activities are progressing on time and the goal and objectives of this project are met. Three School Project Assistants (SPAs) will be contracted to work 2 hours each day, 5 days a week to assist in the implementation and monitoring of project activities at their schools. The SPF project coordinator will work closely with the SPAs to be sure that project activities are implemented with fidelity and on time. The SPF project coordinator will work closely with NWCA School Renewal Specialist who is in charge of Early College Programs to monitor progress of identified activities, make necessary improvements, and give updates to the advisory committee.
 - An advisory committee will meet quarterly to oversee the execution and implementation of the project to be sure that the project's goal and objectives are being met. They will discuss any challenges and provide alternative actions to be taken to ensure the success of the project. Meeting notes will be taken and shared with Complex Area Superintendent, School Principals, and Searider Productions Foundation President to serve as progress reports of the project.
 - A final evaluation report will be submitted to the Legislature one month after the grant project ends.

- 3. Number of students participating in the after-school hospitality clubs, student feedback on activities offered and change in attitude, if any, and teacher observation and recommendations.

- 5. Number of students participated and student/teacher feedback on the entrepreneurship/commercialism courses and activities.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

SPF obtained its 501(c)(3) IRS tax exemption in February 2013. Since then, it has met regularly with Waianae High School Principal to identify the needs of the students and

program priorities for the school. The focus has been on fundraising to support scholarships, programs and other activities at the school. As the SPF board of directors are either alumni, teachers, community and business members, there is continued focus on how to provide support and implement needed programs to better prepare our students and the larger community to be productive and successful members of the local and global society. SPF received 2018 GIA funding from the Legislature and was successful in administering that grant. SPF received 2019 GIA funding and is currently administering the grant and is implementing activities and submitting progress reports to the Legislative on time.

2. Facilities

The following facilities will be used:

- The early college courses will be held at the high school campus facilities during the school year. During the summer, the courses may be held either at the high schools or at a UH system campus.
- The after school hospitality programs will be at Waianae Intermediate, Nanakuli High and Intermediate, and Waianae High Schools.
- The Adult Education workshops and trainings will be held at the Leeward Community College Maili Campus.
- The Teacher Professional Development and Externship programs will be held at NWCA secondary schools, Leeward Community College Maili Campus and/or the Ko Olina Resorts.
- The Project Coordinator will work at the NWCA district office in Kapolei and at Waianae High School. The school project assistants will work at their respective schools on the Leeward Coast.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing


1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

- A project coordinator will be contracted to oversee the total GIA grant project and ensure that all activities are being implemented with fidelity to meet the goal and objectives of this project. The coordinator has experience coordinating both state and federal grants and was directly involved with the 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) grant, Title I and Title II grants, GEAR UP grant, the UH West Oahu's Early Scholars Program and two GIA grants. The project coordinator will be under the direct supervision of the NWCA Superintendent and the superintendent will provide any training or support needed to improve the skills and knowledge of the coordinator to strengthen the operations of the grant.
- The School Renewal Specialist (SRS) in charge of College and Career Program will be responsible to coordinate and support implementation of the early college courses at the high school and with the adult community education program and to support each high school in the development of the job shadowing programs. The SRS will also assist in

organizing the teacher professional development program, monitoring the progress, and writing the reports for the early college courses and the teacher professional development program. The SRS is under the direct supervision of the NWCA Superintendent and will receive any training or support needed to improve the skills and knowledge required to strengthen the operations of the grant. Qualifications include a bachelor's degree in Education, six years of responsible work experience in education of which four years shall have been in teaching and two years in curriculum or program planning as appropriate.

- The College and Career Counselors work at the high schools and with students to set up class schedules that support transition through high school and to post-secondary education. They coordinate the Early College Program and set up the courses and instructors with each of the respective colleges for each semester. The College and Career Counselors are supervised by their High School Principal and will receive any training or support needed to improve the skills and knowledge required to strengthen the operations of the grant. Qualifications include a bachelor's degree, teacher license as required by the Hawaii Teachers Standards Board and the Department of Education Office of Human Resources minimum requirements; formal or informal preparation for coordination and supervision of college and career programs; experience working with colleges and admissions offices; comfortable working independently; excellent organizational skills and follow through; excellent written and verbal communication skills; and technical ability.
- The After-School Part-Time Teachers (PTTs) and the School Project Assistants (SPAs) are certified teachers and will be selected and hired by their respective School Principal. They will coordinate the after-school programs and oversee the GIA school activities respectively. The PTTs will design, implement after-school activities, ensure safety of students, write progress and final reports of their programs. The SPAs will assist in the implementation of grant activities, make suggestions for improvements, and compile progress and final reports. The PTTs and SPAs will be under the direct supervision of their school principal and they will receive necessary training or suggestions for improvement to ensure the success of the project. Qualifications include a bachelor's degree, teacher license as required by the Hawaii Teachers Standards Board and the Department of Education Office of Human Resources minimum requirements; comfortable working independently; excellent organizational skills and follow through; excellent written and verbal communication skills; and technical ability.

Members on the SPF Board donate/volunteer their time, therefore, no compensation is needed.

4. Future Sustainability Plan

The project is supported by SPF, Waianae High School, Nanakuli High and Intermediate School and Waianae Intermediate School Principals, and the Nanakuli-Waianae Complex Area Superintendent. Once the program infrastructure is put in place and the partnerships developed, additional funding would be needed for the expansion and refinement of the Early College Courses and the Community Education Programs. The advantage of having current personnel involved to implement the project is to build ownership and buy-in to continue the project beyond the funding cycle.
