A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE KUPUNA CAREGIVERS PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in 2017, 17.8 per
- 2 cent of Hawaii's population was sixty-five years or older, and
- 3 with projections of an increase to 19.4 per cent by 2020 and 23
- 4 per cent by 2030, caring for Hawaii's kupuna is a high priority
- 5 of the legislature.
- 6 The legislature finds that currently there are 154,000
- 7 unpaid family caregivers in Hawaii who are taking care of their
- 8 parents, spouse, or other relatives who need extra care. Family
- 9 caregivers play a crucial role in the State's health care system
- 10 by providing long-term care to the elderly, all unpaid.
- 11 However, it is imperative to ensure that the caregivers take
- 12 care of themselves and have the necessary support and services
- 13 to sustain their own health as well as the health of the family
- 14 member for whom they are caring.
- To address this issue, the kupuna caregivers program was
- 16 established on July 6, 2017, and aims to provide working
- 17 caregivers with additional resources to cover a variety of



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- 1 support services such as adult day care, assisted
- 2 transportation, homemaker services, and many more important
- 3 services to qualified kupuna. The program ensures that
- 4 caregivers continue earning their own retirement benefits, which
- 5 helps businesses retain experienced workers and provides peace
- 6 of mind that loved kupuna are well cared for while caregivers
- 7 remain in the workforce. This program allows caregivers who are
- 8 juggling their own employment with their caregiving
- 9 responsibilities to simultaneously take care of their kupuna and
- 10 themselves.
- 11 Since the establishment of the kupuna caregivers program,
- 12 the executive office on aging has reportedly received hundreds
- 13 of calls from Hawaii residents wishing to receive the benefits
- 14 of the program. While the creation of the program was an
- 15 important first step, the legislature believes that the program
- 16 requires additional third year funding to have the impact it
- 17 needs. With the high volume of residents showing interest in
- 18 the program, the current funding needs to be increased in order
- 19 to better serve the people of Hawaii.
