
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STRUCTURE OF GOVERNMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
2 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
3 as follows:

4 **"CHAPTER**

5 **ENERGY**

6 **§ -1 Definitions.** As used in this chapter, unless the
7 context indicates otherwise:

8 "Department" means the department of environment.

9 **§ -10 State program for energy planning and**
10 **conservation.** The department shall develop a state program for
11 energy planning and conservation. The program shall consist of
12 short- and long-range planning for the development and adoption
13 of methods to encourage voluntary conservation of gasoline,
14 diesel oil, natural gas, propane, heating oils, other fuels, and
15 electrical energy, and efficient development of new or
16 alternative sources of these fuels and energy. The information
17 resulting from the methods shall be disseminated to the people



1 of Hawaii through all forms of mass communication media, public
2 and private schools, private and civic organizations, and all
3 other appropriate means. Public information offices of other
4 state and county agencies may be called upon for assistance in
5 the development of the program.

6 **§ -11 Renewable energy facilitator; establishment;**

7 **duties.** (a) There is established within the department the
8 position of renewable energy facilitator, which shall be a full-
9 time, temporary position exempt from chapters 76 and 89. The
10 renewable energy facilitator shall possess a requisite level of
11 knowledge and expertise in the areas of renewable energy, state
12 and county permitting processes, and management necessary to
13 carry out the duties of the position.

14 (b) The renewable energy facilitator shall have the
15 following duties:

16 (1) Facilitate the efficient permitting of renewable
17 energy projects, including:

18 (A) The land parcel on which the facility is
19 situated;

20 (B) Any renewable energy production structure or
21 equipment;



- 1 (C) Any energy transmission line from the facility to
- 2 a public utility's electricity system; and
- 3 (D) Any on-site infrastructure necessary for the
- 4 production of electricity or biofuel from the
- 5 renewable energy site;
- 6 (2) Initiate the implementation of key renewable energy
- 7 projects by permitting various efficiency improvement
- 8 strategies identified by the department;
- 9 (3) Administer the day-to-day coordination for renewable
- 10 energy projects on behalf of the department; and
- 11 (4) Submit periodic reports to the legislature on
- 12 renewable energy facilitation activities.
- 13 (c) The renewable energy facilitator position shall be
- 14 funded by the energy security special fund.

15 **§ -12 Energy security special fund; uses.** (a) There is
16 created within the state treasury an energy security special
17 fund, which shall consist of:

- 18 (1) The portion of the environmental response, energy, and
- 19 food security tax specified under section 243-3.5;
- 20 (2) Moneys appropriated to the fund by the legislature;



1 (3) All interest attributable to investment of money
2 deposited in the fund; and

3 (4) Moneys allotted to the fund from other sources,
4 including under section 196-6.5.

5 (b) Subject to legislative appropriation, moneys from the
6 fund may be expended by the department for the following
7 purposes and used for no other purposes, except for those set
8 forth in this section:

9 (1) To support the Hawaii clean energy initiative program,
10 including its energy division, including funding staff
11 positions within the division, and projects that
12 ensure dependable, efficient, and economical energy,
13 promote energy self-sufficiency, and provide greater
14 energy security for the State;

15 (2) To fund the renewable energy facilitator pursuant to
16 section -11 and any other positions necessary for
17 the purposes of paragraph (1) as determined by the
18 legislature; and

19 (3) To fund, to the extent possible, the greenhouse gas
20 emissions reduction task force, climate change task
21 force, grants-in-aid to the economic development



1 boards of each county, and grants-in-aid to economic
2 development agencies of each county to meet the stated
3 objectives of the Hawaii clean energy initiative
4 program.

5 (c) The department shall submit a report to the
6 legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
7 each regular session, on the status and progress of existing
8 programs and activities and the status of new programs and
9 activities funded by the energy security special fund. The
10 report shall also include:

- 11 (1) The spending plan of the energy security special fund;
- 12 (2) All expenditures of energy security special fund
13 moneys; and
- 14 (3) The targeted markets of the expenditures, including
15 the reason for selecting those markets; the persons to
16 be served; and the specific objectives of the
17 expenditures, including measurable outcomes.

18 **§ -13 Building energy efficiency revolving loan fund.**

19 (a) There is established in the state treasury the building
20 energy efficiency revolving loan fund, which shall be



1 administered by the department, and into which shall be
2 deposited:

3 (1) Funds from federal, state, county, private, or other
4 funding sources;

5 (2) Moneys received as repayment of loans and interest
6 payments; and

7 (3) Any fees collected by the department under this
8 section.

9 (b) Moneys in the building energy efficiency revolving
10 loan fund shall be used to provide low or no interest loans or
11 other authorized financial assistance to eligible public,
12 private, and nonprofit borrowers to make energy efficiency
13 improvements in buildings. Moneys from the fund may be used to
14 cover administrative and legal costs of fund management and
15 management associated with individual loans, to include
16 personnel, services, technical assistance, data collection and
17 reporting, materials, equipment, and travel for the purposes of
18 this section.

19 (c) Appropriations or authorizations from the fund shall
20 be expended by the department. The department may contract with
21 other public or private entities for the provision of all or a



1 portion of the services necessary for the administration and
2 implementation of the loan fund program. The department may set
3 fees or charges for fund management and technical site
4 assistance provided under this section. The department may
5 adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to carry out the purposes of
6 this section.

7 (d) All interest earned on the deposit or investment of
8 the moneys in the fund shall become a part of the fund.

9 (e) The department may establish subaccounts within the
10 fund as necessary.

11 **§ -14 Office of climate change and sustainability,**
12 **establishment; responsibilities.** (a) There is established
13 within the department an office of climate change and
14 sustainability. The head of the office shall be known as the
15 director of the office of climate change and sustainability.
16 The director of the office of climate change and sustainability
17 shall be nominated by the governor and, by and with the advice
18 and consent of the senate, appointed by the governor without
19 regard to chapter 76, and shall be compensated at a salary level
20 set by the governor. The director of the office of climate
21 change and sustainability shall be included in any benefit



1 program generally applicable to the officers and employees of
2 the State. The director of the office of climate change and
3 sustainability shall retain staff as may be necessary for the
4 purposes of this chapter, in conformity with chapter 76. The
5 director of the office of climate change and sustainability
6 shall report to the director of environment and shall not be
7 required to report directly to any other principal executive
8 department.

9 (b) The office of climate change and sustainability shall
10 gather, analyze, and provide information to the governor to
11 assist in the overall analysis and formulation of state policies
12 and strategies to provide central direction and cohesion in the
13 allocation of resources and effectuation of state activities and
14 programs and effectively address current or emerging issues and
15 opportunities regarding climate change and sustainability. The
16 office shall engage in the following activities:

17 (1) State comprehensive planning and program coordination.
18 Formulate and articulate comprehensive statewide
19 goals, objectives, policies, and priorities, and
20 coordinating their implementation through section



1 226-108 of the statewide planning system established
2 in part II of chapter 226; and

3 (2) Climate adaptation planning. Conducting plans and
4 studies and preparing reports as follows:

5 (A) Develop, monitor, and evaluate strategic climate
6 adaptation plans and actionable policy
7 recommendations for the State and counties
8 addressing expected statewide climate change
9 impacts identified under Act 286, Session Laws of
10 Hawaii 2012, through the year 2050;

11 (B) Provide planning and policy guidance and
12 assistance to state and county agencies regarding
13 climate change; and

14 (C) Publish its findings, recommendations, progress
15 reports, and its annual reports to the governor
16 and the legislature."

17 SECTION 2. Chapter 26, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
18 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
19 read as follows:



1 "§26- Department of environment. (a) The department
2 of environment shall be headed by a single executive to be known
3 as the director of environment.

4 The department shall administer programs designed to
5 protect, preserve, and improve the environment.

6 (b) The functions and authority exercised by the office of
7 environmental quality control, the environmental council, the
8 state energy office, and the sustainability program administered
9 by the office of planning are transferred to the department of
10 environment established by this chapter."

11 SECTION 3. Section 26-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12 amended to read as follows:

13 **"§26-4 Structure of government.** Under the supervision of
14 the governor, all executive and administrative offices,
15 departments, and instrumentalities of the state government and
16 their respective functions, powers, and duties shall be
17 allocated among and within the following principal departments
18 that are hereby established:

19 (1) Department of human resources development (Section
20 26-5)



- 1 (2) Department of accounting and general services (Section
- 2 26-6)
- 3 (3) Department of the attorney general (Section 26-7)
- 4 (4) Department of budget and finance (Section 26-8)
- 5 (5) Department of commerce and consumer affairs (Section

- 8 (7) University of Hawaii (Section 26-11)
- 9 (8) Department of education (Section 26-12)
- 10 (9) Department of health (Section 26-13)

- 14 (12) Department of agriculture (Section 26-16)
- 15 (13) Department of Hawaiian home lands (Section 26-17)

- 18 (15) Department of transportation (Section 26-19)
- 19 (16) Department of labor and industrial relations (Section
- 20 26-20)
- 21 (17) Department of defense (Section 26-21)



1 (18) Department of public safety (Section 26-14.6) [-]

2 (19) Department of environment (Section 26-)."

3 SECTION 4. Section 26-56, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

5 "(b) The commission shall review and recommend an
6 appropriate salary for the governor, lieutenant governor,
7 members of the legislature, justices and judges of all state
8 courts, administrative director of the State or an equivalent
9 position, and department heads or executive officers and the
10 deputies or assistants to the department heads of the
11 departments of:

12 (1) Accounting and general services;

13 (2) Agriculture;

14 (3) The attorney general;

15 (4) Budget and finance;

16 (5) Business, economic development, and tourism;

17 (6) Commerce and consumer affairs;

18 (7) Defense;

19 (8) Environment;

20 [-8+] (9) Hawaiian home lands;

21 [-9+] (10) Health;



- 1 ~~(10)~~ (11) Human resources development;
2 ~~(11)~~ (12) Human services;
3 ~~(12)~~ (13) Labor and industrial relations;
4 ~~(13)~~ (14) Land and natural resources;
5 ~~(14)~~ (15) Public safety;
6 ~~(15)~~ (16) Taxation; and
7 ~~(16)~~ (17) Transportation.

8 The commission shall not review the salary of any position
9 in the department of education or the University of Hawaii.

10 The commission may recommend different salaries for
11 department heads and executive officers and different salary
12 ranges for deputies or assistants to department heads; provided
13 that the commission shall recommend the same salary range for
14 deputies or assistants to department heads within the same
15 department; provided further that the appointing official shall
16 specify the salary for a particular position within the
17 applicable range.

18 The commission shall not recommend salaries lower than
19 salary amounts recommended by prior commissions replaced by this
20 section."



1 SECTION 5. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

3 "(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
4 comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter
5 established and embrace all personal services performed for the
6 State, except the following:

7 (1) Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii
8 National Guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii
9 National Guard that are required by state or federal
10 laws or regulations or orders of the National Guard to
11 be filled from those commissioned or enlisted
12 personnel;

13 (2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where
14 the director of human resources development has
15 certified that the service is special or unique or is
16 essential to the public interest and that, because of
17 circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel
18 to perform the service cannot be obtained through
19 normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such
20 contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;



- 1 (3) Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
2 with a court order or decree if the director
3 determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
4 civil service procedures would result in delay or
5 noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
6 decree;
- 7 (4) Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
8 or any committee thereof;
- 9 (5) Employees in the office of the governor and office of
10 the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
11 Washington Place;
- 12 (6) Positions filled by popular vote;
- 13 (7) Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
14 commission, or other state agency whose appointments
15 are made by the governor or are required by law to be
16 confirmed by the senate;
- 17 (8) Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
18 public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
19 attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
20 temporary service;



1 (9) One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court
2 who shall have the powers and duties of a court
3 officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one
4 secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme
5 court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court,
6 and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for
7 the judicial council; one deputy administrative
8 director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief
9 justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each
10 associate justice of the supreme court and each judge
11 of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for
12 each judge of the circuit court, two additional law
13 clerks for the civil administrative judge of the
14 circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law
15 clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the
16 circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law
17 clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the
18 first circuit, two additional law clerks for the civil
19 motions judge of the circuit court of the first
20 circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal
21 motions judge of the circuit court of the first



1 circuit, and two law clerks for the administrative
2 judge of the district court of the first circuit; and
3 one private secretary for the administrative director
4 of the courts, the deputy administrative director of
5 the courts, each department head, each deputy or first
6 assistant, and each additional deputy, or assistant
7 deputy, or assistant defined in paragraph (16);

8 (10) First deputy and deputy attorneys general, the
9 administrative services manager of the department of
10 the attorney general, one secretary for the
11 administrative services manager, an administrator and
12 any support staff for the criminal and juvenile
13 justice resources coordination functions, and law
14 clerks;

15 (11) (A) Teachers, principals, vice-principals, complex
16 area superintendents, deputy and assistant
17 superintendents, other certificated personnel,
18 not more than twenty noncertificated
19 administrative, professional, and technical
20 personnel not engaged in instructional work;



- 1 (B) Effective July 1, 2003, teaching assistants,
2 educational assistants, bilingual/bicultural
3 school-home assistants, school psychologists,
4 psychological examiners, speech pathologists,
5 athletic health care trainers, alternative school
6 work study assistants, alternative school
7 educational/supportive services specialists,
8 alternative school project coordinators, and
9 communications aides in the department of
10 education;
- 11 (C) The special assistant to the state librarian and
12 one secretary for the special assistant to the
13 state librarian; and
- 14 (D) Members of the faculty of the University of
15 Hawaii, including research workers, extension
16 agents, personnel engaged in instructional work,
17 and administrative, professional, and technical
18 personnel of the university;
- 19 (12) Employees engaged in special, research, or
20 demonstration projects approved by the governor;



1 (13) (A) Positions filled by inmates, patients of state
2 institutions, persons with severe physical or
3 mental disabilities participating in the work
4 experience training programs;

5 (B) Positions filled with students in accordance with
6 guidelines for established state employment
7 programs; and

8 (C) Positions that provide work experience training
9 or temporary public service employment that are
10 filled by persons entering the workforce or
11 persons transitioning into other careers under
12 programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
13 Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
14 Service Employment Program of the Employment and
15 Training Administration of the United States
16 Department of Labor, or under other similar state
17 programs;

18 (14) A custodian or guide at Iolani Palace, the Royal
19 Mausoleum, and Hulihee Palace;

20 (15) Positions filled by persons employed on a fee,
21 contract, or piecework basis, who may lawfully perform



1 their duties concurrently with their private business
2 or profession or other private employment and whose
3 duties require only a portion of their time, if it is
4 impracticable to ascertain or anticipate the portion
5 of time to be devoted to the service of the State;
6 (16) Positions of first deputies or first assistants of
7 each department head appointed under or in the manner
8 provided in section 6, article V, of the Hawaii State
9 Constitution; three additional deputies or assistants
10 either in charge of the highways, harbors, and
11 airports divisions or other functions within the
12 department of transportation as may be assigned by the
13 director of transportation, with the approval of the
14 governor; four additional deputies in the department
15 of health, each in charge of one of the following:
16 behavioral health, environmental health, hospitals,
17 and health resources administration, including other
18 functions within the department as may be assigned by
19 the director of health, with the approval of the
20 governor; an administrative assistant to the state



1 librarian; and an administrative assistant to the
2 superintendent of education;

3 (17) Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
4 other law; provided that:

5 (A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
6 expire three years after its enactment unless
7 affirmatively extended by an act of the
8 legislature; and

9 (B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
10 shall be included in the position classification
11 plan;

12 (18) Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
13 positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
14 in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
15 shortage or in special projects;

16 (19) Household employees at the official residence of the
17 president of the University of Hawaii;

18 (20) Employees in the department of education engaged in
19 the supervision of students during meal periods in the
20 distribution, collection, and counting of meal



- 1 tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
2 school hours on a less than half-time basis;
- 3 (21) Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
4 Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
5 more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
6 workforce in any housing project maintained or
7 operated by the authority shall be hired under the
8 tenant hire program;
- 9 (22) Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
10 nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
11 require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
12 live in the areas they serve;
- 13 (23) Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
14 who are certified by the state vocational
15 rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
16 safely the duties of the positions;
- 17 (24) The sheriff;
- 18 (25) A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
19 judiciary;
- 20 (26) Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
21 education programs;



1 (27) In the state energy office in the department of
 2 [~~business, economic development, and tourism,~~
 3 environment all energy program managers, energy
 4 program specialists, energy program assistants, and
 5 energy analysts; and

6 (28) Administrative appeals hearing officers in the
 7 department of human services.

8 The director shall determine the applicability of this
 9 section to specific positions.

10 Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil
 11 service status of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."

12 SECTION 6. Section 107-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 13 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

14 "(a) There is established a state building code council.
 15 The council shall be placed within the department of accounting
 16 and general services for administrative purposes only. The
 17 council shall consist of eleven voting members and one nonvoting
 18 member, who shall be the comptroller or the comptroller's
 19 designee. The council members shall serve four-year terms. The
 20 voting members shall include:



- 1 (1) One county building official from each of the four
- 2 counties appointed by the mayor;
- 3 (2) One member representing the state fire council;
- 4 (3) One member representing the department of labor and
- 5 industrial relations who has significant experience in
- 6 elevator safety;
- 7 (4) One member representing the state energy office of the
- 8 department of [~~business, economic development, and~~
- 9 ~~tourism,~~] environment;
- 10 (5) One member representing the Structural Engineers
- 11 Association of Hawaii;
- 12 (6) One member representing the American Institute of
- 13 Architects, Hawaii State Council;
- 14 (7) One member representing the Building Industry
- 15 Association of Hawaii or the General Contractors
- 16 Association of Hawaii, who has significant experience
- 17 with building codes, with alternating four-year terms
- 18 between the two organizations and the first four-year
- 19 term to be served by the Building Industry Association
- 20 of Hawaii; and



1 (8) One member representing the Subcontractors'
2 Association of Hawaii who has significant experience with
3 building codes."

4 SECTION 7. Section 196-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5 amended to read as follows:

6 "**§196-3 Energy resources coordinator.** The director of
7 [~~business, economic development, and tourism~~] environment shall
8 serve as the energy resources coordinator."

9 SECTION 8. Section 196-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

11 "(c) The director of [~~business, economic development, and~~
12 ~~tourism~~] environment may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to
13 impose and collect fees to cover the costs of administering
14 variances under this section. The fees, if any, shall be
15 deposited into the energy security special fund established
16 under section [~~201-12.8.~~] -12."

17 SECTION 9. Section 196-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18 amended to read as follows:

19 "~~[f]~~**§196-10f** **Hawaii renewable hydrogen program.** There is
20 established, within the department of [~~business, economic~~
21 ~~development, and tourism,~~] environment, a Hawaii renewable



1 hydrogen program to manage the State's transition to a renewable
2 hydrogen economy. The program shall design, implement, and
3 administer activities that include:

4 (1) Strategic partnerships for the research, development,
5 testing, and deployment of renewable hydrogen
6 technologies;

7 (2) Engineering and economic evaluations of Hawaii's
8 potential for renewable hydrogen use and near-term
9 project opportunities for the State's renewable energy
10 resources;

11 (3) Electric grid reliability and security projects that
12 will enable the integration of a substantial increase
13 of electricity from renewable energy resources on the
14 island of Hawaii;

15 (4) Hydrogen demonstration projects, including
16 infrastructure for the production, storage, and
17 refueling of hydrogen vehicles;

18 (5) A statewide hydrogen economy public education and
19 outreach plan focusing on the island of Hawaii, to be
20 developed in coordination with Hawaii's public
21 education institutions;



- 1 (6) Promotion of Hawaii's renewable hydrogen resources to
- 2 potential partners and investors;
- 3 (7) A plan, for implementation during the years 2007 to
- 4 2010, to more fully deploy hydrogen technologies and
- 5 infrastructure capable of supporting the island of
- 6 Hawaii's energy needs, including:
- 7 (A) Expanded installation of hydrogen production
- 8 facilities;
- 9 (B) Development of integrated energy systems,
- 10 including hydrogen vehicles;
- 11 (C) Construction of additional hydrogen refueling
- 12 stations; and
- 13 (D) Promotion of building design and construction
- 14 that fully incorporates clean energy assets,
- 15 including reliance on hydrogen-fueled energy
- 16 generation;
- 17 (8) A plan, for implementation during the years 2010 to
- 18 2020, to transition the island of Hawaii to a
- 19 hydrogen-fueled economy and to extend the application
- 20 of the plan throughout the State; and
- 21 (9) Evaluation of policy recommendations to:



- 1 (A) Encourage the adoption of hydrogen-fueled
- 2 vehicles;
- 3 (B) Continually fund the hydrogen investment capital
- 4 special fund; and
- 5 (C) Support investment in hydrogen infrastructure,
- 6 including production, storage, and dispensing
- 7 facilities."

8 SECTION 10. Section 196-10.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9 amended to read as follows:

10 "[+]§196-10.5[+] **Hawaii clean energy initiative program.**

11 (a) There is established within the department of [~~business,~~
12 ~~economic development, and tourism,~~] environment, a Hawaii clean
13 energy initiative program to manage the State's transition to a
14 clean energy economy. The clean energy program shall design,
15 implement, and administer activities that include:

- 16 (1) Strategic partnerships for the research, development,
- 17 testing, deployment, and permitting of clean and
- 18 renewable technologies;
- 19 (2) Engineering and economic evaluations of Hawaii's
- 20 potential for near-term project opportunities for the
- 21 State's renewable energy resources;



- 1 (3) Electric grid reliability and security projects that
2 will enable the integration of a substantial increase
3 of electricity from renewable-energy resources;
- 4 (4) A statewide clean energy public education and outreach
5 plan to be developed in coordination with Hawaii's
6 institutions of public education;
- 7 (5) Promotion of Hawaii's clean and renewable resources to
8 potential partners and investors;
- 9 (6) A plan, to be implemented from 2011 to 2030, to
10 transition the State to a clean energy economy; and
- 11 (7) A plan, to be implemented from 2011 to 2030, to assist
12 each county in transitioning to a clean energy
13 economy.

3 subsequent changes in status may be made pursuant to applicable
4 civil service and compensation laws.

5 Any employee who, prior to this Act, is exempt from civil
6 service and is transferred as a consequence of this Act may
7 retain the employee's exempt status, but shall not be appointed
8 to a civil service position as a consequence of this Act. An
9 exempt employee who is transferred by this Act shall not suffer
10 any loss of prior service credit, vacation or sick leave credits
11 previously earned, or other employee benefits or privileges as a
12 consequence of this Act; provided that the employees possess
13 legal and public employment requirements for the position to
14 which transferred or appointed, as applicable; provided further
15 that subsequent changes in status may be made pursuant to
16 applicable employment and compensation laws. The director of
17 environment may prescribe the duties and qualifications of these
18 employees and fix their salaries without regard to chapter 76,
19 Hawaii Revised Statutes.

20 SECTION 21. All appropriations, records, equipment,
21 machines, files, supplies, contracts, books, papers, documents,



1 maps, and other personal property heretofore made, used,
2 acquired, or held by the department of health and the department
3 of business, economic development, and tourism relating to the
4 functions transferred to the department of environment shall be
5 transferred with the functions to which they relate.

6 SECTION 22. All rules, policies, procedures, guidelines,
7 and other material adopted or developed by the department of
8 health and the department of business, economic development, and
9 tourism to implement provisions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes
10 which are reenacted or made applicable to the department of
11 environment by this Act, shall remain in full force and effect
12 until amended or repealed by the department of environment
13 pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes. In the
14 interim, every reference to the department of health or the
15 department of business, economic development, and tourism or
16 director of health or director of business, economic
17 development, and tourism in those rules, policies, procedures,
18 guidelines, and other material is amended to refer to the
19 department of environment or director of environment as
20 appropriate.




1 SECTION 23. Until the salary of the director of
2 environment is otherwise set pursuant to section 26-56, Hawaii
3 Revised Statutes, the director of environment shall be deemed a
4 tier 2 position in the commission on salaries report and
5 recommendations to the 2019 legislature.

6 SECTION 24. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

8 SECTION 25. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.
