A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 127A-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsections (c) and (d) to read as follows: 3 The [director] administrator may, from funds allotted therefor, employ technical, clerical, administrative, and other 4 5 personnel and make such expenditures as may be necessary. 6 The [director] administrator shall coordinate the activities of the agency with all county emergency management 7 8 agencies, other state agencies, other states, or federal 9 agencies involved in emergency management activities, and all 10 organizations for emergency management within the State, whether 11 public or private, and shall maintain liaison and cooperate with 12 all county emergency management agencies, other state agencies, 13 other states, or federal agencies involved in emergency 14 management activities as provided in this chapter." 15 SECTION 2. Section 127A-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by amending subsection (i) to read as follows: 17 "(i) Each county, under the mayor's direction, shall 18 coordinate, develop, and implement [an] a comprehensive

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- 1 emergency [$\frac{\text{operation}}{\text{operation}}$] management plan for the county[$\frac{1}{2}$] and
- 2 submit annual reports to the administrator on the status and
- 3 updates of the plan."
- 4 SECTION 3. Section 127A-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended to read as follows:
- 6 "\$127A-6 Emergency management reserve corps. (a) The
- 7 [director] administrator may establish an emergency management
- 8 reserve corps comprising trained specialists to support state
- 9 and county emergency [ex], disaster, or day to day requirements.
- 10 The emergency management reserve corps may include:
- 11 (1) Any employee of the State or county;
- 12 (2) Any employee hired specifically for staffing during
- 13 emergency, disaster, and day to day periods and exercises who
- 14 shall be hired and compensated without regard to chapters 76,
- 15 78, and 88; and
- 16 (3) Any volunteer,
- 17 who shall be detailed in accordance with this chapter.
- 18 Emergency reserve corps positions shall be authorized and
- 19 managed by the agency and do not need the approval of the
- 20 governor.
- 21 (b) The emergency management reserve corps shall support
- 22 state emergency or disaster requirements and, if requested by a

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1 county emergency management agency, supplement the county 2 emergency management agency staff. The emergency management 3 reserve corps may be mobilized during, or in advance of. 4 emergencies or disasters, or for emergency management [exercises 5 and training events.] day to day activities. Emergency 6 management reserve corps members shall attend a minimum of [four days] forty hours of paid [training] activities per year." 7 8 SECTION 4. Section 127A-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended to read as follows: 10 "§127A-16, Major disaster fund. (a) The director shall 11 submit requests to the legislature to appropriate from the 12 general revenues of the State sufficient moneys as may be 13 necessary for expenditure by or under the direction of the 14 governor for immediate relief in response to an emergency or 15 disaster in any part of the State; provided that: 16 (1) The governor has issued a proclamation of a state of **17** emergency; 18 (2) The governor may not expend in excess of [\$5,000,000] 19 \$10,000,000 for immediate relief as a result of any 20 single emergency or disaster; and

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1 In addition to the funds in paragraph (2), an (3) 2 additional \$5,000,000 may be made available solely for 3 the purpose of matching federal disaster relief funds 4 when these funds become available to the State 5 following a presidential disaster declaration. 6 In expending the moneys, the governor may allot any portion 7 thereof to any agency, office, or employee of the State or a 8 county for the most efficient relief for the population. 9 Notwithstanding this subsection, the only exception to 10 paragraphs (1), (2), and (3) is that the [director] 11 administrator may use up to [\$100,000] \$250,000 per year to 12 support emergency management reserve corps [training]. 13 (b) No later than [one month] sixty days after any allotment by the governor or the expenditure of any fund moneys, 14 15 the [director] administrator shall report to the legislature on 16 the purpose of the allotment or expenditure. 17 Except as provided in subsection (d), federal reimbursement moneys for disaster relief shall be deemed to be 18 19 trust moneys and may be deposited into a trust account with and 20 under the control of the department of defense. These moneys 21 and any interest earned thereon shall be used for the purpose

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1	identified in subsection (a) and shall not lapse to the general
2	fund.
3	(d) In cases in which the department of education expends
4	the funds appropriated to the department for purposes deemed to
5	be reimbursable by federal reimbursement moneys for disaster
6	relief, the federal reimbursement moneys shall not lapse to the
7	general fund and shall be credited directly to the department of
8	education without regard to whether the original appropriation
9	has lapsed. Such funds shall carry over in accordance with
10	section 37-41.5(c)."
11	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

tropical system Olivia in September, Hawaii Emergency Management Agency (HI-EMA) has balanced incidents both natural and human-caused to help

protect lives, property, and the environment. During this time, HI-EMA has been through a leadership change and has set a path ahead to

build morale throughout the

organization, public confidence in

the State emergency management

program, and strength in

partnerships with our public and private sector stakeholders. There are multiple areas in current law

under chapter 127A Emergency

Management that need modifications support these efforts including:

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section 127A-3 Hawaii emergency management agency, section 127A-5 County emergency management agency, section 127A-6 Emergency reserve corps, section 127A-16 Major disaster fund, and section 127A-19 Shelters.
