## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE CONSERVATION AND TOURISM COMMUNITIES TO COLLABORATIVELY IMPLEMENT A STATEWIDE RESPONSIBLE TOURISM INITIATIVE TO HELP ACHIEVE THE ALOHA+ CHALLENGE SUSTAINABILITY TARGETS, IMPROVE VISITOR EXPERIENCE, AND PROTECT OUR NATURAL AND CULTURAL HERITAGE FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS.

WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii has committed to the Aloha+ 1 Challenge, a statewide pledge to achieve six interconnected 2 3 sustainability goals by 2030; and 4 WHEREAS, the Aloha+ Challenge is recognized as a localized 5 framework for the global United Nations Sustainable Development 6 7 Goals; and 8 WHEREAS, concurrently, the State's visitor industry has 9 invested in a range of initiatives to promote sustainable 10 11 tourism, improve the visitor experience, and promote responsible tourism; and 12 13 WHEREAS, visitors travel to the Hawaiian islands to 14 15 experience the beauty of its natural resources, ecosystems, and cultural values, contributing nearly \$17 billion to the state 16 economy each year in doing so; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the number of visitors to Hawaii continues to 19 increase, nearing ten million visitors annually; and 20 21 WHEREAS, although each visitor to the State spends an 22 average of \$201 per day, Hawaii spends only \$9 per visitor to 23 protect the natural resources that visitors enjoy and community 24 members rely on; and 25 26



WHEREAS, comparable tourism destinations spend considerably 1 more per visitor, such as \$92 in Palau, \$370 in the Galapagos, 2 \$188 in the Great Barrier Reef, and \$137 in New Zealand, placing 3 Hawaii at a competitive disadvantage; and 4 5 WHEREAS, although the health and sustainability of our 6 communities and economy are closely intertwined with the health 7 and management of our pae'āina, the State only invests one 8 percent of its budget into its natural resources, leaving an 9 estimated \$360 million conservation budget deficit; and 10 11 WHEREAS, this conservation budget deficit creates a strain 12 13 on our coral reefs, forests, watersheds, and biocultural infrastructure; and 14 15 WHEREAS, surveys show that Hawaii residents are concerned 16 about the negative impacts of tourism on the State; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, residents rank this concern as having the highest relative importance when considering the future of tourism in 20 21 Hawaii; and 22 23 WHEREAS, the effective management of our environment and 24 natural resources will benefit both the visitor experience and the quality of life for our residents and communities; now, 25 therefore, 26 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 28 29 Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2019, the Senate concurring, that the tourism and conservation 30 communities are urged to implement a statewide responsible 31 32 tourism initiative to help achieve the Aloha+ Challenge sustainability targets, improve visitor experience, and protect 33 the State's natural and cultural heritage for future 34 35 generations; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, 38 39 Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, 40 President of the Hawaii Tourism Authority, Executive Director of the Hawaii Chapter of the Sierra Club of Hawaii, Executive 41

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Director of the Nature Conservancy of Hawaii, and President of
Chamber of Commerce Hawaii.
