## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE ON ITS PROGRESS TOWARD PROVIDING A WELL-ROUNDED EDUCATION FOR ALL PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS.

WHEREAS, providing a well-rounded education to all public 1 2 school students advances the economic and social health of Hawaii: and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, art, music, and Hawaiian cultural curricula constitute important parts of a well-rounded education that 6 7 address the developmental needs of the whole child; and 8 WHEREAS, in 2013, researchers in the Department of 9 Education Reform at the University of Arkansas found that 10 instruction in visual arts led to gains in critical-thinking 11 12 skills; and 13 WHEREAS, according to a 2014 study performed by Lois 14 Hetland and Ellen Winner of the Harvard Graduate School of 15 Education, education in music and drama shows a generalizable 16 17 causal relationship to increases in verbal achievement and spatial reasoning; and 18 19 WHEREAS, a well-rounded education should uplift special-20 21 needs students, who require special-education services and specially designed instruction; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, the statewide achievement gap between non-high-25 needs and high-needs students, which include English-language learners, economically disadvantaged children, and students 26 27 receiving special-education services, stood at 32 percentage points for language arts and 28 percentage points for math; and 28



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WHEREAS, according to employment data from the Department 1 2 of Education, in the Nanakuli-Waianae complex area, 18 of 19 special-education teachers hired for the 2017-2018 school year 3 and 57 of 63 special-education teachers hired between the 2015-4 5 2016 and 2017-2018 school years had no special-education 6 teaching license; and 7 8 WHEREAS, under Hawaii's weighted student formula allocation system for public school funding, small and remote schools 9 encounter difficulties in recruiting and retaining crucial 10 11 school staff, including librarians, counselors, technology coordinators, and special-education transition coordinators; and 12 13 WHEREAS, a well-rounded education requires manageable class 14 sizes that allow teachers to deliver personalized and 15 individuated instruction; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the Institute of Education Sciences, the research 19 arm of the United States Department of Education, concludes that class-size reduction is one of only four evidence-based reforms 20 that have been proven to increase student achievement; now, 21 22 therefore, 23 24 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 25 2019, that the Department of Education is requested to submit to 26 the Legislature, no later than 20 days prior to the convening of 27 the Regular Session of 2020, a report on its progress toward 28 29 providing a well-rounded education for all public school 30 students; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this report include: 33 34 (1) The average amount of instructional time per year devoted to visual arts, music, theater, dance, 35 Hawaiian and Polynesian studies, Hawaiian language, 36 native Hawaiian culture and customary practices, and 37 physical education for elementary, middle, and 38 intermediate schools; 39



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The number of high schools in which courses in visual 1 (2)arts, music, theater, dance, Hawaiian and Polynesian 2 studies, Hawaiian language, native Hawaiian culture 3 4 and customary practices, and physical education are offered and taught by licensed and certified teachers; 5 6 7 The average number of individualized education (3)programs for which care coordinators are responsible 8 at each school, including information on the method by 9 10 which the allocation of individualized education programs is determined; 11 12 (4) The average number of individualized education program 13 minutes managed by care coordinators at each school, 14 including information on the method by which the 15 allocation of individualized education program minutes 16 17 is determined; 18 (5) The number of special education teachers at each 19 school who are not licensed to teach special 20 education, including information on differences in 21 retention rates for special-education teachers who 22 have completed a state-approved teacher-education 23 program and special-education teachers who have not 24 25 completed such a program; 26 (6) The number of schools that lack a librarian or library 27 media specialist, technology coordinator, or 28 29 counselor; 30 31 (7)The number of secondary schools that lack a specialeducation transition coordinator; 32 33 34 (8) The average class size for each school, including the average size of each inclusion class, fully self-35 contained class, and class for students with limited 36 English-language proficiency; 37 38 The average total student workload for teachers at 39 (9) each school, including the average workload for 40 special-education teachers; and 41



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(10) The number of non-classroom teachers statewide, 1 including at each school and complex area; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 4 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, 5 Chairperson of the Board of Education, and Superintendent of 6 7 Education. 8 9 10 OFFERED BY: MAR 0 7 2019
