A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTHY BEVERAGES FOR CHILDREN.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that over the past thirty
- 2 years, Hawaii has experienced an unprecedented increase in
- 3 obesity and chronic conditions like type 2 diabetes, heart
- 4 disease, liver disease, and tooth decay. The legislature also
- 5 finds that obesity-related health conditions have serious
- 6 economic costs. In 2013, Hawaii spent an estimated \$470,000,000
- 7 on obesity-related medical costs.
- 8 The legislature further finds that soda and other sugary
- 9 drinks are the single largest source of excess sugar in the
- 10 American diet, accounting for nearly half of the added sugars
- 11 consumed. A top source of calories in children's diets, sugary
- 12 beverages contribute to the obesity epidemic and typically do
- 13 not provide any nutritional benefit.
- 14 The purpose of this Act is to promote healthy meal options
- 15 for children and support parents' efforts to feed their children
- 16 nutritious food by ensuring that healthy beverages are the

3	SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
4	amended by adding a new section to Part I, to be appropriately	
5	designated and to read as follows:	
6	" <u>§32</u>	1- Default beverages offered with children's meals.
7	(a) A re	staurant that offers for sale a children's meal that
8	includes a beverage shall offer with the children's meal as a	
9	default beverage one or more of the following:	
10	(1)	Water, sparkling water, or flavored water, with no
11		added sugar, corn syrup, or other natural or
12		artificial sweeteners;
13	(2)	Unflavored nonfat or low-fat (one per cent) dairy mil
14		or non-dairy beverage that is nutritionally equivalent
15		to fluid milk in a serving size of six ounces or less
16		<u>or</u>
17	(3)	One hundred per cent fruit juice or vegetable juice.
18	(b)_	Nothing in this section shall prohibit a restaurant
19	from sell	ing, or a customer from purchasing, an alternative to
20	the default beverage if requested by the purchaser of the	
21	abildren's meal	

1 (c) The department of health shall adopt rules pursuant to 2 chapter 91 to implement this section. (d) As used in this section, unless the context clearly 3 4 indicates otherwise: 5 "Children's meal" means a combination of food and a beverage, sold together at a single price by a restaurant, 6 7 primarily intended for consumption by children. 8 "Default beverage" means a beverage automatically included or offered as part of a children's meal, absent a specific 9 request for a substitute or alternate beverage by the purchaser 10 11 of the children's meal. "One hundred per cent fruit juice or vegetable juice" means 12 any liquid consisting of one hundred per cent natural fruit 13 juice or natural vegetable juice with no added sugar, corn 14 syrup, or caloric sweetener. Natural fruit juice or natural 15 16 vegetable juice is the original liquid, with or without water added, resulting from the pressing of fruits or vegetables. 17 "Restaurant" means a food establishment that serves food to 18 customers for consumption on or off the premises, including 19 fast-food and full-service dining establishments. "Restaurant" 20

includes but is not limited to drive-through or walk-up

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- 1 counters, coffee shops, cafes, pizza parlors, food stands, movie
- 2 theater concession stands, and dine-in establishments. For
- 3 purposes of this definition, a restaurant may provide alcoholic
- 4 beverage sales for drinking on premises; provided that such
- 5 sales are ancillary to food service."
- 6 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2020.
