The Administration of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) will recommend that the Board of Trustees **SUPPORT** GM573, confirming OHA Nominee, Randall Higa, to the Hawai'i Island Burial Council.

Mr. Higa is originally from Waimānalo on O'ahu, but lives in Pa'auilo, in the Hāmākua moku, and has genealogical ties to Liloa of Waipi'o, where he also has 'ohana and 'āina. He received his BA in Math from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, an AS in Fire Science from Honolulu Community College, took on additional education coursework at U.H. Mānoa to specialize in special education, and received his MA in Public Administration from U.H. Mānoa. He had a fulfilling career as a teacher at Waimānalo Elementary, Central Intermediate, and Kamehameha Schools and as a Fire Education Captain, Training Captain, OSHA Captain, and Engine and Ladder Captain with the Honolulu Fire Department.

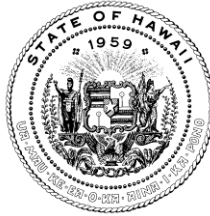
Throughout his life, Mr. Higa hiked all over Ka Pae 'Āina o Hawai'i, and his visits to many pōhaku and heiau on the various islands inspired him to become more involved in the restoration of wahi kapu. After retiring, he attended classes at UH Mānoa to learn oli, and joined Palehua Nākoa in learning to restore and build hula pā. After desiring for many years to learn hāpai pōhaku practices, Mr. Higa was eventually asked to help restore Pu'ukoholā heiau on Hawai'i Island, after it sustained damage from a 2006 earthquake. He agreed, and initially used traditional methods of hāpai pōhaku to restore the heiau several days a month; after making several trips, Mr. Higa volunteered to work on the restoration full-time. He moved to Hawai'i Island and eventually took on a full-time position with the National Park Service to preserve the Pu'ukoholā site and steward the surrounding areas.

Mr. Higa continues to enjoy practicing the Hawaiian arts of hula, wood carving, olokea, and hale building, and additionally serves with the Royal Order of Kamehameha. His 'ohana owns Lālākea fish pond in Waipi'o and are presently utilizing his master skills to assist in restoring it. Mr. Higa also demonstrates a desire to participate in the practices of mālama iwi. He has studied *Ho'i Hou I Ka Iwikuamo'o* (the "Iwi Primer") and is mentored by kūpuna Fred Cachola, Ron Dela Cruz, Les Kululoio, Scott Mahoney, and

Keoni Fox. These experiences and resources will make Mr. Higa an excellent addition to the Hawai'i Island Burial Council.

For these reasons, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS** GM583 to confirm OHA's nominee, Randall Higa, for a term on the Hawai'i Island Burial Council. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports Governor's Message 583, nominating Mr. Randall Higa to the Island Burial Council, Island of Hawai'i expiring June 30, 2021.

The Island Burial Councils are established under Section 6E-43.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes. The Councils determine whether to preserve or relocate previously identified native Hawaiian burial sites, recognize lineal and cultural descendants, and provide counsel/advice to the Department.

Mr. Higa is a resident of Pa'auilo on the island of Hawai'i. He has a B.A. in Mathematics, a M.A. in Public Administration and a Ph.D. in Remedial and Special Education. He spent 32 years with the Honolulu Fire Department and retired as a Captain. Waiola (as he is known by his peers) is a member of the prestigious Royal Order of Kamehameha. He has done extensive volunteers work such as Fort Barrette Field cleanup, Waikele Petroglyph field cleanup as well as ground maintenance at Mauna 'Ala (Royal Mausoleum). He has served on the Board of Directors of several canoe clubs such as Ka Māmalahoa Canoe Club, Kai'ōpua Canoe Club, and Kawaihae Canoe Club. He also has experience in working on projects that involved Hawaiian dry stack wall renovation at Pu'u Koholā Heiau, Kalaupapa, and at the Kaloko-Honokōhau Fishpond. Mr. Higa has been serving on the Council on an interim basis since November of 2018.

Senate confirmation will ensure that Mr. Higa's knowledge and perspective informs the deliberations of the Hawai'i Island Burial Council until June 30, 2021.
