Chair Lee and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General opposes this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to decriminalize the possession, use, distribution, and cultivation of marijuana. The bill proposes instead civil monetary sanctions for such conduct. The bill further proposes the expungement of prior criminal marijuana convictions and dismissal of pending marijuana charges. Moreover, the bill seeks to create a working group which would be administratively attached to the Department of the Attorney General and designed to examine how marijuana might further yield financial revenue.

As this bill has nothing to do with the limited use of marijuana for medical purposes, this testimony does not address or pertain to that issue.

We oppose this measure for the following reasons:

1. Marijuana possession, cultivation, and distribution is illegal under federal law.

As the bill acknowledges, marijuana is still a Schedule I controlled substance under federal law. It is a violation of federal law to grow, distribute, or use marijuana. Although this bill could decriminalize conduct prohibited under state law, federal laws regarding the nonmedical use of marijuana cannot be ignored.

Importantly, the United States Department of Justice (DOJ) issued a memorandum withdrawing earlier directives and instructed prosecutors to enforce federal laws related to marijuana activities (Sessions Memo). Although the Blumenauer

amendment to the continuing resolution extending the appropriations act restricts funding for federal law enforcement actions by the DOJ, this limitation applies only to the medical use of cannabis.

Unless and until the federal government changes its laws regarding marijuana, the State should not expand the legalization or decriminalization of this drug beyond medical use.

2. Specific legal concerns with the bill.

Section 2 (pages 2-4, lines 17-2) seeks to replace the term "marijuana" with the term "cannabis." Providing a new term and definition is unnecessary and likely to produce unwarranted confusion as the term "marijuana" is already defined and used throughout chapters 329 and 712 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Section 20 (page 26, lines 9-11) seeks to repeal parts V (dismissal/expungement of marijuana charges/convictions) and VI (new civil offenses in chapter 281 of the Hawaii revised statutes) of the bill on July 1, 2021. The repeal of part V of the bill would mean that accused/offenders would lose the ability to dismiss or expunge such offenses after July 1, 2021. This temporal restriction creates constitutional equal protection concerns for those who fail to take action within the limited time frame. Moreover, with respect to the repeal of part VI, it is unclear whether the newly proposed offenses would cease to exist and leave no restrictions on the conduct at issue.

Based on the above concerns, we respectfully request that this bill be held.

H.B. 1383 RELATING TO MARIJUANA

The Hawaii Department of Transportation (DOT) **opposes** this bill which decriminalizes certain offenses relating to marijuana, establishes a schedule of monetary fines for violations, provides for the dismissal of charges and expungement of criminal records based solely on cannabis offenses, and establishes the cannabis evaluation working group.

Based on the information we have collected from our State accident history and reports from other states that have legalized marijuana, DOT believes that decriminalizing marijuana in Hawaii will increase the risk of drivers, who shortly after consuming marijuana drive their car, being involved in a traffic incident/crash and causing additional injuries and deaths on Hawaii's roadways.

As the bill is currently written, there is no representation from DOT and each county's law enforcement in the cannabis evaluation working group to ensure that the membership includes those who are directly involved with the transportation of cannabis, whether it's via our roads, air or waterways. The working group is also tasked with examining other state laws and outcomes pertaining to cannabis and ways in which cannabis use other than for medical purposes may provide benefits or raise questions in the State.

Chair Lee, Vice-Chair San Buenaventura, members of the House Committee on Judiciary, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu submits the following testimony in <u>opposition</u> to H.B. 1383.

The purpose of this bill is to downgrade essentially all levels of marijuana possession and cultivation—even in concentrated form or in extremely large quantities—to a violation punishable only by monetary fines. Not only would this lower the severity of possessing (for example) fifty pounds of marijuana to something less than possessing an open bottle of beer, but in the larger scope, it would essentially eliminate any significance that the legislature, law enforcement, and ultimately the public, place on regulating this Schedule I controlled substance.

Pursuant to both State and Federal schedules, possession of <u>any amount</u> of marijuana is strictly prohibited, except by qualifying patients registered to use medical marijuana (and their caregivers). In fact, the Federal schedule of controlled substances was recently updated in <u>December 2018</u>, and continues to list marijuana as a Schedule I controlled substance. Even in recent years, numerous and ongoing studies have shown that marijuana presents significant health concerns, particularly to youth, who will inevitably receive the message that marijuana is simply "not that bad" because "it's not even a crime." Businesses who currently allow smoke breaks for those who smoke cigarettes would potentially see a sharp increase in smoking marijuana on or off the job, because "it's not even a crime." Given the strong potential for widespread abuse and negative effects on the community, the Department strongly maintains that marijuana should continue to be strictly regulated and enforced, and that current statutes are appropriate in this regard.

For this reason, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu opposes H.B. 1383. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.

SUBJECT: House Bill No. 1383, Relating to Marijuana

I am Major Calvin Tong of the Narcotics/Vice Division of the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), City and County of Honolulu.

The HPD strongly opposes House Bill No. 1383, Relating to Marijuana. This bill, in part, seeks to defacto legalize marijuana by removing from the Hawaii Revised Statutes existing criminal prohibitions and penalties related to marijuana.

Marijuana is harmful. The Rocky Mountain High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area released their report, "The Legalization of Marijuana in Colorado: The Impact," Volume 5, Update September 2018. The purpose, as the title suggests, is to track the impact of marijuana legalization in the state of Colorado.

Some of their findings are summarized below: (Note: the numbers reported below occurred after Colorado legalized recreational marijuana).

- Marijuana related traffic deaths increased 151 percent;
- Traffic deaths involving drivers who tested positive for marijuana more than doubled from 55 in 2013 to 138 in 2017;

- Colorado past month marijuana use for ages 12 and under is ranked third in the nation and is 85 percent higher than the national average;
- The yearly number of marijuana-related hospitalizations increased 148 percent;
- Marijuana-only exposures more than tripled (2013-2017);
- Seizures of Colorado marijuana in the U.S. mail has increased
 1,042 percent from an average of 52 parcels (2009-2012) to 594 parcels (2013-2017); and
- Marijuana tax revenue represent approximately nine tenths of one percent of Colorado's fiscal year 2017 budget.

The HPD is concerned that the increasing availability of marijuana in the state will have a negative impact on public safety and increase costs especially in the areas such as impaired driving and diversion of product.

Keeping drugs illegal reduces their availability and lessens the willingness to use them. Legalizing drugs increases their availability and misuse regardless of the controls that are in place.

The HPD urges you to oppose House Bill No. 1383, Relating to Marijuana.

Dear Chair Lee, Vice Chair San Buenaventura, and Members of the Committee on Judiciary:

The Maui Police Department strongly OPPOSES the passing of HB 1383, which approves the legalization of recreational marijuana use in the State of Hawaii.

As Law Enforcement, we understand the reasoning behind decriminalizing and regulating small amounts of marijuana for personal use, establishing a licensed scheme for the cultivation, sale, and use of small amounts of marijuana for personal use, to tax marijuana sales in the same manner as state excise taxes and subject income derived from marijuana sales to state income tax. Marijuana, however, is a gateway drug, meaning that a person who ingests marijuana is more than likely to progress to other drugs such as Cocaine, Methamphetamine, Heroin, and prescription pills. The harm of allowing the public to possess personal use quantities of marijuana outweighs the benefits.

We understand that there are medical issues tied to marijuana, but the vast majority of the public does not suffer from these medical issues. We cannot allow the public to medicate themselves at their discretion. In addition, by allowing possession for personal use, where is the regulation for the people who ingest/smoke marijuana. It is proven that second hand smoke from marijuana can and will affect the surrounding people. We do not want marijuana freely ingested in the public, nor do we want marijuana ingested or smoked near children. These concerns have not been addressed in this bill.

Furthermore, even though the bill lists the transfer of marijuana or sale to people of 21 years or older does not preclude the fact that if marijuana possession and consumption were to be legal, the general consensus is that it would be tolerated by all. This mind set not only puts our youth in danger but downplays the dangers of unregulated marijuana use.

Members of the Maui Police Department have spoken to law enforcement from Colorado, one of the first states to fully legalize marijuana consumption and possession. Many if not all of those law enforcement entities in Colorado spoken to have relayed the downfall since the legalization. They cite increased crime, driving under the influence of marijuana and illegal sales of marijuana as major pitfalls to the legalization of marijuana. Many have reported their desire to abolish that law.

Marijuana is already regulated in Hawaii. Why decriminalize it so those people who have no medical condition are allowed to get "high?" The medical community is also divided on the use of marijuana. With the creation of Marinol, a pharmaceutical drug which gives a patient the benefits of the marijuana plant with very low psychoactive properties, there is no need to ingest marijuana. Many patients opt not to take this drug. Why? They want to get "high." Marinol has been proven to give the patient appetite and other benefits of marijuana with low psychoactive properties. By decriminalizing the use of marijuana, we are giving the public the go ahead to get "high" without consequence.

Studies have shown marijuana sent to the University of Tennessee for TetraHydroCannabinol (THC, the active ingredient in marijuana) from the state of Hawaii has increased in THC levels over the years, some having 30% THC levels or more. Bear in mind that marijuana previously had THC levels of 10% or less. New strains are being bred to contain higher levels of THC. There is a growing concern because the high levels of THC on a person have not been studied enough in the medical community. In fact, there are more Emergency Room visits in Colorado from marijuana use then there has ever been before.

Due to these concerns the Maui Police Department OPPOSES HB 1383.

Dear Chair Lee, Vice Chair San Buenaventura, Committee Members:

The Drug Policy Forum of Hawai'i (DPFHI) supports this measure to decriminalize all offenses related to cannabis ("marijuana"). In particular, we applaud the provisions to dismiss pending charges and expunge convictions related to cannabis offenses. While we support full-scale legalization of adult use cannabis, this bill also begins to reverse the brutal impact of the decades' long, needless criminalization of this substance. Regarding legalization, we note that the suggested evaluation working group proposes to address this in considering the future of cannabis in Hawai'i. Below we offer some thoughts and suggested amendments.

Just last week, on January 29th, the Baltimore, Maryland prosecutor, Marilyn Mosby, said her office would stop prosecuting cannabis possession no matter the person's criminal history. Going even further, she also requested that the courts vacate some 5,000 convictions. Juxtapose that with how our county prosecuting attorneys are likely reacting to this very bill. It's crucial to note that Mosby is doing this in a state that has already decriminalized cannabis possession. It's the continued disparate impact on communities of color that compels her office to act. It is our hope that this bill by

Some numbers:

- From 2008-16, nearly 8,000 adult Hawai'i residents were arrested for simple cannabis possession. Many others are arrested for growing for, or selling to, those in possession. During the same period, thousands of juveniles were also arrested. The collateral consequences in terms of denied student loans, housing, jobs and for some immigrants, deportation, are devastating for an individual, their family and ultimately the community;
- Just a few weeks ago, we finally got the crime numbers for 2017, and contrary to public sentiment, the opinions of our candidates for electoral office and the national trend, enforcement continues and the number of arrests for adults at 630 and juveniles at 380 per year remains steady;
- Beyond sheer volume, the disparate impact of cannabis criminalization is most keenly felt by the enforcement in the Native Hawaiian and Filipino communities.
 While studies show that cannabis use is nearly uniform across groups, e.g. at 130, the number of Native Hawaiians youth arrested in 2017 for cannabis possession was the same as the number of white youth arrestees;

If we do not address the inequities created by the criminalization in the first place, then history has taught us nothing. It is therefore of the essence that any cannabis legislation such as this bill include the types of <u>social justice policies</u> like the dismissal of charges and expungement mechanisms found in this bill.

Suggested Amendments:

- In contemplating expungements, it is important to remember that many obstacles remain for an individual to actually apply for this relief. California last year enacted a law that automates the expungement, in part because some jurisdictions made it easy while others did not, and individuals who would benefit from it could not also find the time to, or were even aware that they could, apply;
- Regarding the fines to be set for the new cannabis offenses, commendably set forth in Chapter 281 (Intoxicating Liquor and Cannabis) Hawai'i Revised Statutes instead of in Chapter 329 (Controlled Substances), we suggest they remain as low as possible and commensurate with the offense. Further, high fines that cannot be paid may result in the eventual criminalization of an individual;
- For the evaluation group, we suggest the inclusion of the following representatives among others:
 - Two current medical cannabis licensees;
 - A representative from the Drug Policy Forum of Hawai'i;
 - A representative from the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawai'i;
 - A representative from an ancillary cannabis business in Hawai'i.

We are hopeful that this bill, by ending criminalization, can mark the start of a serious conversation on the future of cannabis in Hawai'i. Working together, we will get there.

YPDA strongly supports the decriminalization of marijuana in Hawai'i. We would prefer full legalization, however. Most of the following arguments are true for both decriminalization and legalization, though the revenue generation aspect would be lower with decriminalization compared to full legalization.

Prohibition has completely failed to reduce marijuana use. Despite the fact that police departments have made aggressive enforcement of marijuana laws an increasing priority and states have spent billions of dollars on such enforcement, it has failed to diminish marijuana's use or availability. In 2002, there were 14.5 million people aged 12 or older (6.2 percent of the total population) who used marijuana in a given month; by 2011, that number had increased to 18.1 million (7 percent of the total population). The White House's Office of National Drug Control Policy found that marijuana prices dropped and stabilized after the early 1990s, and several surveys show marijuana use rose and stabilized among youth in the same time period.

Prohibition has resulted in mass incarceration and over-policing. More than 20,000 people were incarcerated for marijuana possession in 2010. Between 2001 and 2010, there were 8,244,943 marijuana arrests, of which 88 percent, were for possession. In 2010 alone, there were 889,133 marijuana arrests—300,000 more than arrests for all violent crimes combined—or one bust every 37 seconds. Marijuana arrests have increased between 2001 and 2010 and now account for 52 percent of all drug arrests in the United States.

Prohibition exacerbates institutional racism within the prison system. On average, a Black person is 3.73 times more likely to be arrested for marijuana possession than a white person, even though Blacks

and whites use marijuana at similar rates—a disparity that increased 32.7 percent between 2001 and 2010. Such racial disparities in marijuana possession arrests exist in every part of the country, in counties large and small, urban and rural, wealthy and poor, and with large and small Black populations. These numbers are similarly reflected in Hawai'i for Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders when compared to other ethnic groups. Legalization is the smartest and surest way to end targeted enforcement of marijuana laws in communities of color.

Marijuana is more than 100 times safer to use than alcohol. In a comparative analysis on the risks of recreational drugs, alcohol was the top contender, while cannabis was considered the lowest risk.

Marijuana has legitimate medicinal value. Studies are starting to show marijuana's potential in shrinking aggressive cancerous brain tumors. Furthermore, a recent American study found that treating epilepsy and other seizure disorders with CBD reduced seizures by 54 percent. Use of THC reduced spasticity in sufferers of multiple sclerosis by 30 percent. Cannabis may also reduce depression and relieve anxiety.

Youth marijuana use rates have remained stable. Since adult-use recreational cannabis was legalized in Colorado, many feared that it would lead to increased consumption among youth. In fact, legalization has had the exact opposite effect: due to education and regulations restricting use to adults, the percentage of teenagers in Colorado using cannabis has been steadily dropping from 22 percent to 20 percent between 2011 and 2013, and remains below the national average of 23.4 percent. Teen levels are holding steady nationally as well.

Legalization has not made our roads less safe. The total number of arrests for driving under the influence of alcohol and other drugs has declined in Colorado and Washington, the first two states to regulate marijuana for adult use. There is no clear correlation between marijuana legalization and crash rates. The crash rates in both states are statistically similar to comparable states without legal marijuana.

Legalization has not resulted in a public health crisis. Calls to poison control centers and visits to emergency departments for marijuana exposure remain relatively uncommon. In Oregon, less than 1 percent of calls to the state's poison centers in 2016 were related to marijuana exposure. In Colorado, a mere 0.04 percent of the state's 2.3 million emergency department visits in 2014 were for marijuana exposure.

Marijuana legalization is linked to lower rates of opioid related harm. Early studies have revealed a correlation between states with access to medical and adult-use recreational marijuana and lower rates of opioid overdose mortality (M.D. Livingston et al., "Recreational cannabis legalization and opioid-related deaths in Colorado, 2000-2015," American Journal of Public Health, 107, No. 11, November 2017, p. 1827-1829). This analysis of opioid overdose deaths in Colorado found that, after marijuana was legalized for adult use, there was a reduction of 0.7 deaths per month in the state and that the decades-long upward trend of overdoses began to decline after 2014, the first year of marijuana retail sales in the state. In states with legal access to marijuana, overdose death rates are almost 25 percent lower than in states with no legal access, and the reductions in overdose death rates have strengthened over time (M.A. Bachhuber et al., "Medical cannabis laws and opioid analgesic overdose mortality in the United States, 1999-2010," JAMA Internal Medicine, 174, 10, 2014, p. 1668-1673). Legal access to

marijuana has been associated with a 23 percent reduction in opioid dependence or abuse-related hospitalizations and 15 percent fewer opioid treatment admissions.

Legalization will save states hundreds of millions of dollars. Enforcing cannabis possession laws costs the U.S. \$3.6 billion annually. Arrests for marijuana in all legal marijuana states and Washington, D.C. have plummeted. The reduction in arrests has resulted in substantial savings, estimated at hundreds of millions of dollars, for law enforcement and the judiciary. It is yet unknown how much reductions in opioid use will save states in long-term medical costs.

Legalization will generate hundreds of millions more in new revenue. Marijuana sales in Washington generated \$315 million in tax revenues in the 2016-17 fiscal year, and \$70 million in Oregon, more than double the predicted revenue. Since sales began in Colorado in 2014, the state has collected almost \$600 million in revenue. A 2010 paper from the libertarian Cato Institute found that universally legalizing marijuana would net all levels of the government \$17.4 billion annually—half of that would come from reduced spending and costs (particularly for drug enforcement), and the rest would come from taxing marijuana like alcohol and tobacco, and from new economic activity.

Revenue from regulating cannabis sales has been put to immense social good. Colorado distributed \$230 million to the Colorado Department of Education between 2015 and 2017 to fund school construction, early literacy, bullying prevention, and behavioral health. Oregon allocates 40 percent of marijuana tax revenue to its state school fund, depositing \$34 million into the fund so far. The state also distributes 20 percent to alcohol and drug treatment. Nevada's 15 percent wholesale tax is projected to bring in \$56 million over the next two years to fund state schools. Washington dedicates 25 percent to substance use disorder treatment, education and prevention. The state also distributes 55 percent of its marijuana tax revenues to fund basic health plans. Alaska will collect an estimated \$12 million annually, which will fund drug treatment and community residential centers. Massachusetts and California, by statute (M.G.L.A. 94G § 14(b)(v); Cal. Rev. & Tax. Code § 34019(d)), will invest a share of their marijuana tax revenues in the communities most adversely impacted by drug arrests and incarceration, particularly low-income communities of color, to help repair the harms of unequal drug law enforcement.

A legal cannabis industry would create thousands of new jobs. Preliminary estimates suggest that the legal marijuana industry already employs between 165,000 to 230,000 full- and part-time workers across the country. Colorado has created 10,000 new jobs in the legal cannabis industry since 2014, boosting the economy and contributing to a lowering of the unemployment rate to just 6 percent, making it one of the lowest in the nation.

A legal cannabis industry would undercut the black market. Mexican cartels were once the top suppliers of cannabis to the United States but, since legalization has swept across four states and Washington, D.C., the amount seized by the U.S. Border Patrol has dropped 24 percent in the past year, and the price of Mexican-grown cannabis has dropped from \$90 down to \$30 per kilogram, dramatically reducing the profitability of illegal activity. Legalization brings proper regulation and infrastructure, and ushers in potency testing, product variety, warning labels, and overall peace of mind for the consumer.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i ("ACLU of Hawai'i") writes in support of H.B. 1383, which seeks to decriminalize certain offenses relating to cannabis. This measure is a meaningful step towards ending Hawai'i's participation in the failed war on drugs, and will reduce the targeted enforcement of current cannabis laws.

H.B. 1383 provides a safe and smart alternative to current cannabis laws.

Our state's ineffective cannabis laws have damaged civil liberties in many ways – eroding protections against searches and seizures, putting large numbers of non-violent individuals behind bars and targeting people of color. Eliminating criminal penalties for certain cannabis offenses will prevent thousands of people from becoming needlessly entangled in the criminal justice system, eliminate many collateral consequences that flow from cannabis arrests, and allow Hawai'i to reinvest the money it saves for important community needs.

H.B. 1383 takes a step towards ending Hawai'i's participation in the nation's failed War on Drugs, which has cost taxpayers \$1 trillion but has produced little to no effect on the supply of or demand for drugs. The War on Drugs has sent millions of people to prison for low-level offenses and seriously eroded our civil liberties and civil rights while costing taxpayers billions of dollars a year, with nothing to show for it except our status as the world's largest incarcerator. There are 2.2 million people behind bars in this country—around 21 percent of these individuals are locked up for drug-related offenses.

H.B. 1383 will reduce the number of unreasonable arrests for cannabis possession in our already bloated criminal justice system.

In 2017 alone, there were 627 arrests for cannabis possession in Hawai'i. Arrest for possession of small amounts of cannabis is one of the most common points of entry into the criminal justice system. Removing criminal penalties for certain cannabis offenses will keep people out of jail, and will eliminate the many collateral consequences that flow from cannabis arrests, thereby reducing the gross number of people entering or otherwise harmed by the criminal justice system. Money currently spent on enforcement could be used for efforts that would *actually* increase public safety.

Decriminalizing certain cannabis-related offenses will reduce targeted enforcement of cannabis laws against communities of color.

Not all communities have been impacted equally by current enforcement of Hawai'i's cannabis laws; these laws overly impact men under 25 and people of native Hawaiian descent. These groups are arrested in numbers disproportionate to their share of the population.¹

H.B. 1383 would allow for the expungement of criminal records for those previously convicted of cannabis offenses.

Thousands of people in Hawai'i have criminal records due to cannabis possession that seriously impact their ability to get a job, receive a loan, or rent/buy a home. H.B. 1383 allows for the expungement of criminal records for people who were, prior to the effective date of this legislation, convicted of a cannabis offense. This is an important provision of the bill because it alleviates some of the harm caused by the failed War on Drugs.

For the above reasons, we urge the Committee to support this measure. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Aloha and thank you for the opportunity to provide our testimony in opposition to the decriminalization of marijuana. Hawaii Family Forum is a non-profit, profamily education organization committed to preserving and strengthening families in Hawaii, representing a network of various Christian Churches and denominations. As such, we have serious concerns about this bill and its ultimate ramifications on the wider community – especially with regards to our keiki. Although we leave the discussion as to the regulatory functions and applicability of its passage to the experts, we do offer these reasons why many parents in our community are opposed to the decriminalization of marijuana:

Marijuana is still illegal under federal law.

While Hawaii has legalized marijuana for medical purposes, it is still illegal to possess, use or distribute marijuana according to federal law.

Legalization will directly impact Hawaii's keiki.

According to the Hawaii State Department of Health, an estimated 45 percent of high school students and 26 percent of middle schoolers across the state said they have used e-cigarettes. In fact, a report by Hawaii Public Radio indicated that it was higher than the national average. If they are already dabbling in an illegal substance, do we really believe that marijuana will somehow escape their attention and use?

A recent news story in Washington reported that more kids are now using drugs since marijuana was legalized. There is no doubt that if marijuana were legalized and/or decriminalized, more people, including our keiki, would have access to it. Even though proponents have tried to dismiss this argument, clinical studies continue to prove that marijuana's easy access can and will hurt our keikiⁱⁱⁱ.

Hawai'i's roads could very well become a testing ground for legal limits

In Colorado, drugged driving went from killing roughly one person every 6.5 days to now every 2.5 days, since legalization was passed iv. Marijuana use affects driving because it stays in the system way longer than alchohol. It is the most prevalent illegal drug detected in impaired drivers, fatally injured drivers and motor vehicle crash victims. That number increases when you add other factors like alcohol consumption.

The process for determining if a driver is intoxicated by marijuana is far more complex and costly than the roadside breathalyzer. In its 2019 testimony to the Senate Judiciary Committee, Hawaii State Department of Transportation reported that "22 percent of fatal crashes that occurred during calendar years 2013 to 2017 resulted in positive findings for marijuana in drivers, bicyclists or pedestrians."

Family factors can serve both protective and risk functions in adolescents' substance use.

There is considerable evidence that individuals who have a close family member with a substance use history are at an increased risk of later problematic substance use^v

The bottom line is that by decriminalizing marijuana, we believe it will affect adolescents' use by increasing its availability through social connections, by creating a message within social norms that show marijuana use as a normal thing, or by reinforcing beliefs that marijuana use is not harmful.

Decriminalization of marijuana will open a door that can't be shut once opened and most assuredly will pave the way for recreational usage. Surely Hawai'i deserves better than that!

HB 1383, RELATING TO MARIJUANA

FEBRUARY 4, 2019 · HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE · CHAIR REP. CHRIS LEE

POSITION: Support.

RATIONALE: IMUAlliance supports HB 1383, relating to marijuana, which decriminalizes certain offenses relating to marijuana and establishes a schedule of monetary fines for violations; changes statutory references from "marijuana" to "cannabis"; provides for the dismissal of charges and expungement of criminal records based solely on cannabis offenses; and establishes the cannabis evaluation working group.

It is high time that Hawai'i stopped criminalizing people for smoking small amounts of a plant. While marijuana remains illegal under federal law, where it is classified as a Schedule I substance, the facts about cannabis consumption are clear. To begin, marijuana has a lower organic toxicity and addictive risk than alcohol, along with fewer correlating incidents of influence-related accidents and violence. More than half of all traffic fatalities in Hawai'i involve alcohol, yet no one seriously discusses the possibility of prohibition because of path dependence. In other words, alcohol is ingrained in our culture in a way that marijuana consumption is not, despite the former being more dangerous, statistically speaking, than the latter.

Similarly, marijuana abuse and dependence afflicts approximately 1.7 percent of the U.S. population, while alcohol abuse afflicts roughly 7.5 percent—over four times as many individuals. Marijuana is also not conclusively linked to an increase in violent behavior. Rather, reports supposedly linking marijuana to violent crimes typically rely on information gathered by the Office

of National Drug Control Policy, which, in turn, relies on source material that a) does not account for drug-trafficking and dispositional or psychological disorders; and b) fails to account for levels of deviancy (increased usage beyond average consumption rates). A more stark statistical correlation exists between increased alcohol consumption and violent crime, including child and intimate partner abuse, yet, again, no one is introducing, much less considering the merits of, limiting the personal consumption of alcohol.

Additionally, only 30 percent of frequent (every other day or more) cannabis users report symptoms suggesting dependence, in contrast to nearly 70 percent for nicotine and 88 percent for harder drugs, like cocaine, calling into question legal opinions asserting that marijuana and hard drugs can be readily correlated to one another. If we do not criminalize overconsumption of the more dangerous drug of alcohol, in and of itself, why, once more, do we unduly criminalize cannabis consumption, particularly in small amounts?

Furthermore, decriminalizing marijuana possession is an issue of restorative justice. As the visitor industry reaps record profits and supports expansion of the local prison-industrial complex, people of Native Hawaiian ancestry, who comprise approximately 25 percent of the state's population, suffer the pangs of a biased criminal (in)justice system. Approximately 39 percent of incarcerated detainees are Hawaiian, according to a comprehensive study by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, with the proportionality gap being even greater for Hawaiian women, who comprise 19.8 percent of the state's female population, but 44 percent of the state's female inmate population. Researchers also found that, on average, Hawaiians receive longer sentences, more parole revocations, and, importantly for this measure, harsher drug-related punishments than other ethnic groups, including for marijuana possession. Therefore, passage this measure is a step toward reforming and preventing more people from becoming victims of our unjust and racially coded prison system.

We would prefer that marijuana be legalized, which would generate an estimated \$70-\$100 million in tax revenue annually for our state, even when excluding criminal justice savings, which could be spent delivering a quality education to our keiki, building basic infrastructure, expanding access to healthcare, constructing truly affordable housing, and more. That said, we support recreational decriminalization as a fine first step toward the ultimate goal of legalization.

On behalf of Hawai'i Health and Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC), I am writing in strong support of HB 1383, which would eliminate criminal penalties for various cannabis possession offenses and replace them with monetary fines for violations.

HHHRC strongly believes that those who use substances not be subject to criminal sanctions absent actual harm to others, including those who use substances as a consequence of underlying mental health conditions.

In short, behavioral health issues are best dealt with by employing a therapeutic model and not a criminal justice framework. Subjecting those who are struggling with substance use, with or without a co-occurring mental health condition, to criminal sanctions – including probation and parole -- exacerbates harms to those persons, their families, and our larger community.

Criminalizing drug users significantly perpetuates and compounds social, medical, and legal stigma. Dehumanizing drug users and those who have substance use problems with the coercive force of law increases the negative impacts of their use upon themselves and those around them.

With cannabis, the case for decriminalization is strengthened by the underlying reality that it is safer than two widely used licit substances, alcohol and tobacco, in terms of the levels of injury, illness, and death associated with its use. As our medical cannabis laws recognize, cannabis serves to ameliorate the impacts of a variety of condition, including chronic pain.

Hawai'i Health and Harm Reduction Center serves Hawai'i communities by reducing the harm and fighting the stigma of HIV, hepatitis, homelessness, substance use, mental illness, and poverty in our community. We focus our efforts on those disproportionately affected by social determinants of health, including but not limited to: people living with and/or affected by HIV, hepatitis, substance use, and the transgender, LGBQ and the Native Hawaiian communities. We foster health, wellness, and systemic change in Hawai'i and the Pacific through care services, advocacy, training, prevention, education, and capacity building.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on behalf of this important reform measure.

My name is Donna Van Osdol, and I am a resident from Mililani. I am submitting strong testimony opposing this bill for reasons stated below.

This bill has been referred to only one committee, the Judiciary, and in the new part being created for Cannabis Violations, the bill does not have any monetary offenses included making the bill incomplete. The people of Hawaii should know exactly how much the penalties will be, especially when the offense is at the commercial level of growing, producing, distributing, and selling cannabis. Without those amounts listed in HB1383, how will we know the fines will justify the offense?

More importantly, I strongly believe that criminals who grow, produce, distribute, and sell high quantities of cannabis (25 pounds or more at least) should also be punished with prison sentences. Without prison terms, we are sending a clear message to drug cartels that it is okay to grow, produce, distribute, and sell large quantities of cannabis because these monetary fines are simply a slap on the wrist.

- 2. The legislative body findings listed in part 1 of this bill are erroneous. There is absolutely **NO VALUE** to the State in decriminalizing marijuana/cannabis. In fact, decriminalization of this addictive product would be extremely harmful to residents and will have long term negative repercussions. Many individuals, including young people are already addicted and in treatment facilities. The THC content has increased from decades ago. Treatment is costly and not always successful. People need to be readmitted on multiple occasions. Although users may deny it, marijuana/cannabis has been the gateway drug to even more harmful narcotics that have damaged their lives and in many instances killed them. Marijuana/cannabis use has been linked to domestic violence. We don't need more of that in our state. It has been proven that long term/excessive use of marijuana/cannabis reduces a person's IQ by about 8 points and reduces a youth's emotional intelligence, increases impulsivity and will decrease the possibility of future earnings. We don't need to promote this activity which will ultimately add to the number of residents living below the poverty line, which this bill would likely do. Our students' academic achievement has already been lowered when compared to other states and other nations. We don't need to accelerate the decline which this bill would surely precipitate. Marijuana use in other states has led to increase traffic accidents and death. Statistics also show that the unemployed are more likely to use these products than those with a job – thus reducing their employability in the future and possibly be a drain on the Hawaii taxpayer. Some people argue that alcohol has detrimental side effects; however, alcohol if used wisely, can have some beneficial effects. Alcohol used in moderation does not dull the mind and "give a high" - but the purpose of recreational marijuana/cannabis is to achieve a state of euphoria, a high feeling which leads to reckless and sometimes violent activity. According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse under the heading Advancing Addiction Science, "Instead of relaxation and euphoria, some marijuana/cannabis users experience anxiety, fear, distrust or panic". The same article states that depending on the potency and the person's experience, marijuana/cannabis users may have

"hallucinations, delusions, and loss of the sense of personal identity. These unpleasant but temporary reactions are distinct from longer-lasting psychotic disorders, such as schizophrenia, that may be associated with the use of marijuana in vulnerable individuals".

- 3. Hawaii and others have decided to ignore federal law and allow medical marijuana and other states have legalized certain amounts of "recreational marijuana/cannabis". That doesn't make it right. It shows a blatant disregard for the law and sets a poor example for residents. If the state can flaunt the laws of this nation, it is only right that the people can do the same but we know that leads to chaos and shouldn't be allowed. Hawaii doesn't have to be a "copy-cat" of states that have made bad decisions. Perhaps Hawaii legislators should live up to our state motto and establish "righteous" laws. There will most likely be incidents of residents, oblivious to the fact that marijuana/cannabis is illegal in some states, will find themselves convicted of a crime for having "imported" an unlawful product to a state that upholds federal law.
- 4. The limited availability of resources to combat substance abuse or enforce laws is no excuse not to uphold the law. If you wanted, you could make it profitable without having to create the overhead of licensing fees/audits of taxation/regulations (page 24 of the bill) or negatively impacting the health and safety of our youth, endangering people driving on the road, and workers on the job. Many people are injured on the job due to incapacity due to drug usage which leads to excessive disability claims which will be costly to the state and employers. Some companies, such as the airlines, have significant difficulty finding new employees in our state because job seekers can't pass the drug test. No one would want their aircraft maintained by someone impaired by a mindaltering substance.
- 5. I served for 30 years in the United States Navy. One tour of duty was as Executive Officer at Shore Intermediate Maintenance Activity located on Pearl Harbor Naval Station, where we did critical repairs to ships to ensure the vessels were ready to deploy. Our sailors used heavy and dangerous equipment. It was and should be a requirement for employees to remain drug free or they could endanger their own lives and the lives of their shipmates. There was an active tracking and enforcement program to minimize that danger by random testing all members of the command. By enforcing this practical restriction, we minimized safety and injuries and met deadlines so ships could meet their operational schedule. If you care about the safety of your residents and their neighbors, you won't consider passing HB 1383.
- 6. Rather than decriminalize marijuana/cannabis, it would be much simpler and better for our tax base, to fine abusers of the law and keep increasing the fines if the person is a repeat offender. Those who have sufficient funds to purchase drugs shouldn't be surprised to have to pay a fine for breaking the law. The fines

- would pay for the personnel assets required to enforce the current laws. This would be simpler and more beneficial to the community.
- 7. Do not establish a Cannabis working group. Stop wasting our limited resources. Save our taxes for something important. We don't want to extend the use of marijuana/cannabis beyond medical marijuana. I have noticed that most of the working groups established fail to resolve the problems for which they were established. Our local problems never get resolved but we spend a lot of funds "studying" issues.
- 8. Absolutely do not dismiss or expunge criminal acts that are committed. This is **UNFAIR** to people who commit other crimes and are held accountable. A criminal act is a criminal act. Those who break the law should be prosecuted and their record should reflect violations in accordance to the law at the time of the offense. The punishment doesn't have to be incarceration. A hefty fine could be a deterrent and increase state revenue. It is the violators who should pay for the added burden of enforcement, not the average, hard-working taxpayer.
- 9. The problem of secondary smoke is an issue for marijuana/cannabis. Many find the sweet smell of those products nauseating. Children and adults need to be protected from it. However, the most dangerous to children is when marijuana/cannabis is put in food products such as brownies, cookies, cake things that appear safe but are particularly tempting to children In some of the states when marijuana/cannabis has been legalized, children brought marijuana/cannabis laced food products to school and shared it with their classmates. Marijuana/cannabis in food products are slower to show their effects and therefore the individual may be unaware of the presence of the drug until that have consumed a large volume of the drug. These "treats" could be injurious to many members of the student body.
- 10. One bill being considered this session is a bill banning flavored vape products supposedly to protect children even though it is already illegal for anyone under 21 to use vape/e-cig products (HB 276). Since we know teens vape it is also known that they like not only flavors, they also use marijuana/cannabis with vaping devices. Just think how easy they will be able to get their hands on some marijuana/cannabis if the legislature decriminalizes limited amounts for "recreation".
- 11. Do not pass HB1383. **Vote NO**. The potential for damage/harm is too great if this bill is passed.

I am writing in opposition to HB 1383.

My opposition is for a variety of reasons, and the hasty near-decriminalization is only one of them. First and foremost is that the public has been given, functionally, no time to prepare to respond—testimony was due by 2pm on Super Bowl Sunday.

I am old enough to remember when the medical legalization of marijuana was passed through and the discussion was the same as it always is, "Don't worry, we don't want to legalize/decriminalize marijuana, we just want it to be available for those who would benefit from the medicinal effects, and on."

If the facts, evidence, and science are on the side of the position of approval, bring the issue before the public. Let's have the debate. Allow the public to vote on it as a ballot measure even.

Regarding the bill itself, it begins by stating that the resources of the State are insufficient to simultaneously deal with the policing of marijuana and all the other drugs. Why are they insufficient? Where has the money gone? Is it being spent on something more important? Instead of being more judicious about where money is spent the State will now look for money by legalizing a drug, with the possible intent of capitalizing on the production and exportation of it. This will make the State a legalized drug dealer.

Just because some other states have done it does not make it the correct decision. Have those other states seen positive impacts to outweigh the negative repercussions? Has legalization turned around the lives of so many young people who would have otherwise ended up in prisons?

- -In all of the above locations, there has been significant rise in marijuana use by youth aged 12-17. (National Survey on Drug Use and Health 2006-2017) This has affected student suspension rates and there is a higher correlation of student suicides with marijuana in those states
- -Both Colorado and Oregon hospitals have reported significant increases in annual marijuana related ER visits (costs in medical care are tremendous)
- -Colorado and Oregon also have seen more than 50% increases in illegal grow operations and seizures (the USPS has been highly affected with the number of seizures)
- -Crime in CO increased 11 times faster than the rest of the nation (Mitchell, 2017-increases in both property crimes (8.3%) and violent crimes (18.6%), Alaska had dramatic increases in motor vehicle thefts and larceny, and Oregon had the same for property crime, larceny and motor vehicle theft.
- -Marijuana urine tests in WA and CO were double than the national average in 2016 (Quest Diagnostics, 2016), and insurance claims are now a concern in legalized states
- -CO drivers intoxicated with marijuana and involved in fatal crashes increased from 2013 to 2015 by 88% (National Highway Traffic Safety Admin., 2017); WA also had a doubling in drugged driving fatalities in years following legalization (Johnson 2016)

It will affect productivity and attendance at workplaces and possibly our children's development. It will increase the homelessness situation the state is already having a difficult time managing.

Research has shown that adolescents who used marijuana regularly were significantly less likely than their non-using peers to finish high school or obtain a degree. They also had a much higher chance of developing dependence, using other drugs, and attempting suicide. Several studies have also linked heavy marijuana use to lower income, greater welfare dependence, unemployment, criminal behavior, and lower life satisfaction.

Studies have also suggested specific links between marijuana use and adverse consequences in the workplace, such as increased risk for injury or accidents. One study among postal workers found that employees who tested positive for marijuana on a pre-employment urine drug test had 55 percent more industrial accidents, 85 percent more injuries, and 75 percent greater absenteeism compared with those who tested negative for marijuana use.

Marijuana also affects brain development. When people begin using marijuana as teenagers, the drug may impair thinking, memory, and learning functions and affect how the brain builds connections between the areas necessary for these functions. People who started smoking marijuana heavily in their teens and had an ongoing marijuana use disorder lost an average of 8 IQ points between ages 13 and 38. The lost mental abilities didn't fully return in those who quit marijuana as adults.

Marijuana use can lead to the development of a substance use disorder, a medical illness in which the person is unable to stop using even though it's causing health and social problems in their life. Severe substance use disorders are also known as addiction. Research suggests that between 9 and 30 percent of those who use marijuana may develop some degree of marijuana use disorder.

I think we are all well aware that once recreational marijuana use is legalized, it's availability and use in our middle and high schools is going to increase. Children at

these age are most susceptable to peer pressure, not understanding the negative effects.

Please refer to the National Institute of Drug Abuse (www.drugabuse.gov) for the above statistics as well as more information on the physical/health and mental affects of marijuana, which can be as severe as psychosis and hallucinations as well as effects on babies whose mothers consume marijuana.

I strongly oppose decriminalizing certain offenses related to marijuana for the following reasons:

1) Decriminalizing offenses does not lessen the harmful effects of the use of marijuana. Scientific studies show that teenagers' brains are more susceptible to long-lasting detrimental effects than alcohol according to research published in the American Journal of Psychiatry. Patricia Conrod, lead author and professor of psychiatry at the University of Montreal says, "Cannabis causes cognitive impairment and delayed cognitive development in adolescents." Furthermore, scientists also found that the impaired cognitive abilities did NOT improve even after stopping the use of marijuana.

In 2014 the Laret Psychiatry reported that teens who smoke marijuana on a daily basis are 60% less likely to graduate from high school or college than those who have never used marijuana and are more likely to attempt suicide. (Doesn't Hawaii already have a high suicide rate among teens?)

2) There is no way to prevent marijuana from getting into the hands of children and teenagers. Currently, they have access to adults' alcohol, opioids and cigarettes. Take your pick of one or any combination thereof. The quantity doesn't matter, it's the continued use of the drug. Decriminalization signals to children that it's okay to use a drug and erroneously, tells them that other drugs are worse. But, marijuana has rightly been labeled as the "gateway" drug leading to other dangerous drugs. Given that you, as a legislative body, are concerned with the growing epidemic of opioid use decriminalization would only compound this problem. Our society sees and suffers from drug abuse on a daily basis and continues to place an extreme burden on our physical and mental health professionals, law enforcement and families as well as exacerbating the overwhelming problem of homelessness.

Sound legislation does not contribute to society's problems, rather it seeks to ease them. Sometimes we do not need to follow in the footsteps of other states, especially when we can see statistics from these jurisdictions that experience a rise in criminal activity and auto accidents. It is not "good" legislation just because other states have embraced it, though, much to their dismay. The millions of dollars expected to collected is the real reason government wants this. Despite increased revenue, much of this money will be used to solve the problems that drug abuse causes. So there is no gain for citizens. Decriminalization can only bring more burden to Hawaii. We will be paying for it with the health and well-being of our vulnerable children and those who think getting high will be a thrilling ride into their sunset years.

I write in strong opposition to HB 1383 relating to marijuana/cannabis decriminalization.

I practice family law, and do not see marijuana/cannabis/drug use as having a positive impact on families and children. In fact, substance abuse is often the cause of the breakup of marriages. One spouse will waste limited family resources on marijuana/cannabis/drugs, rather than paying for basic family necessities such as rent, utilities, food, clothing and other necessities. The drug user frequently comes home late after work, and is not available or interested in caring for the children and fulfilling responsibilities in the home. In some cases, it has an adverse effect on their job performance.

Beyond the effects on families, there are societal costs: increased traffic accidents, increased police involvement, increased emergency room visits, increased danger to the public when a user is driving a motor vehicle, costs of drug treatment/education, increased illegal drug activity, etc.

By decriminalizing the use of marijuana/cannabis, you are giving keiki, the drug user and our community the idea that marijuana/cannabis use is acceptable and safe. If this bill passes and recreational use of marijuana (MJ) ensues ER visits and hospital admissions will increase as they already have in states where marijuana has been legalized.

HB 1383 Status

RELATING TO MARIJUANA.

Decriminalizes certain offenses relating to marijuana and establishes a schedule of monetary fines for violations. Changes statutory references from "marijuana" to "cannabis." Provides for the dismissal of charges and expungement of criminal records based solely on cannabis offenses. Establishes the cannabis evaluation working group. Requires a report to the Legislature.

Dear Committee Members:

In 2012, Colorado and Washington voters passed referendums legalizing marijuana, accelerating the growth of a multibillion dollar, addiction-for-profit industry, and causing negative impacts both inside and outside of those states. We now have five years of data, lessons learned, and negative impacts affecting both families and communities.

The goal of the Big Marijuana industry, like any other for profit business is to successfully convert young, casual users into heavy, more frequent users, thus selling more product. As commercialization increases in legalized states, false advertising of marijuana products as being "natural" and "healthier than alcohol and tobacco" have greatly decreased the perceived risk of harm related to marijuana use. The main psychoactive ingredient in marijuana, THC, has now been observed to cause many



different types of mental and physiological health problems— especially in children and youth.

Given this nation's addiction epidemic—deaths driven largely by opioids—the rise of lax legalization policies comes at an especially inopportune time. In the time that the opioid epidemic have increased, the percentage of marijuana users who are using the drug frequently has skyrocketed (Institute for Behavior and Health [IBH], n.d.). This is unsurprising, as peer-reviewed research has revealed early marijuana use more than doubles the likelihood of opioid use later in life. It's also important to keep in mind that marijuana *on its own* is harmful. The average potency of marijuana has skyrocketed since the 1970's and research demonstrates it is associated with substance use disorders, drugged driving crashes, lower IQ, and other negative consequences. Today, more young people are voluntarily seeking treatment for marijuana addiction than for all other drugs combined, including alcohol.

Although marijuana industry lobbyists claim that the mass commercialization of marijuana poses little threat to society, the evidence suggests there are a number of growing public health issues.

The industry has prospered in selling marijuana-infused "edibles" that come in the form of cookies, candy, ice cream, sodas, and other sweet treats that are particularly appealing to children. These edibles comprise approximately 20 to 50% of the market in legalized states (where data is available), thereby increasing their availability to children and youth who are normally unaware of consumption serving sizes and consequences (Colorado Department of Revenue, 2015; O'Connor, Danelo, Fukano, Johnson, Law, & Shortt, 2016). The market for marijuana flower hybrids and concentrates continues to rise with the increase in demand for products with higher THC potency levels. In Seattle, Washington, the average THC potency level far exceeds the national average at 21.24% for marijuana flowers and 72.76% for marijuana concentrates (NHIDTA, 2016). And mislabeling is not uncommon. According to Soldotna, Alaska, Police Chief Peter Mlynarik, testing of marijuana products revealed discrepancies "... of up to 77% difference in THC potency in the samples provided" (P. Mlynarik, personal communication, January 19, 2018). All legal states have had numerous recalls due to poor labeling.

MARIJUANA-RELATED POISON CONTROL CALLS, HOSPITALIZATIONS, AND ER VISITS

The increase in marijuana availability due to legalization has led to increasing numbers of marijuana-related poison control calls, hospitalizations, and ER visits. In Colorado, calls to poison control centers have risen 210% between the four-year averages before and after recreational legalization (RMPDC, 2017). Washington has seen a 70% increase in calls between the three-year averages before and after legalization (WSOFM, 2017).

Marijuana-related emergency room visits have also surged since legalization. According to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, the annual rate of marijuana-related emergency room visits increased 35% between the years 2011 and 2015 (CDPHE, 2016). The burden on the emergency departments stemming from the type of patient care required and the resulting financial implications have been large for hospitals in Colorado (Finn, 2015).

AVERAGE TOXICOLOGY OF SUICIDES AMONG ADOLESCENTS AGES 10-19 YEARS OLD (WITH KNOWN TOXICOLOGY) SOURCE: Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE), Colorado Violent Death Reporting System Increase since legalization. Colorado toxicology reports show the percentage of adolescent suicide victims testing positive for marijuana has increased (CDPHE, 2017). This is not terribly surprising, as daily marijuana use among youth who begin before the age of 17 significantly increases the risk of suicide attempts (Silins et 10 al., 2014).

Direct associations have been made between the frequency of marijuana use and higher THC potency with the development of mental health issues (psychosis, depression, anxiety, suicidality, reshaping of brain matter, and addiction) (Miller, in press; Fischer et al., 2017).

Links to lung damage and serious cardiovascular problems have also been found (hypertension, myocardial infarction, cardiomyopathy, arrhythmias, stroke, and cardiac arrest) (Pacher, Steffens, Hasko, Schindler, & Kunos, 2017; Hall & Lynskey, 2016).

Marijuana use during pregnancy has also been shown to negatively affect the cognitive development of children by increasing their risk of hyperactivity, impulsivity, and inability to focus (Wang et al., 2017; Huizink & Mulder, 2006).

Chronic adolescent marijuana use has been correlated with cognitive impairment and a decreased ability to do well in work or school (Finn, 2015; Meier, Hill, Small, & Luthar, 2015; Arria, Caldeira, Bugbee, Vincent, & O'Grady, 2015; Meier et al., 2012).

Marijuana has a variety of other interactions with mental health. While the popular view holds that marijuana is not addictive, brain scans of marijuana users show changes in the structure of the brain's reward center to be consistent with addiction (Gilman et al., 2014).

Heavy users have also been clearly observed to have withdrawal symptoms (Hasin, Keyes, Alderson, Wang, Aharonovich, & Grant, 2008). In Colorado, marijuana is the second drug most often implicated in addiction treatment admissions, after alcohol (Colorado Department of Health Services [CDHS], Office of Behavioral Health, 2017).

Furthermore, a number of studies have identified marijuana's role in the pathway to other substance abuse. For example, a groundbreaking study of over 30,000 Americans showed that participants who reported marijuana use in the previous year were 2.6 times more likely to abuse prescription opioids (Olfson et al., 2017).

ALCOHOL CONSUMPTION NOT DECREASING • Researchers from Oregon State University found that college students under the age of 21 who are binge drinkers have been one of the primary groups of marijuana users after legalization (Darling, 2017). • The gallons of alcohol consumed in Colorado since marijuana legalization have increased by 8% (Colorado Department of Revenue [CDR], Colorado Liquor Excise Tax, 2017).

Today's highly potent marijuana represents a growing and significant threat to public health and safety, a threat that is amplified by a new marijuana industry intent on profiting from heavy use.
