HOUSE BILL NO. 463 HD1 SD1 RELATING TO FOOD SAFETY

Chairperson Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 463 HD1 SD1 which proposes to require the department to partner with the agricultural community to establish a food safety certification training program to assist small and medium sized farms to be certified by the USDA Good Agricultural Practices certification program. The Department supports the intent of this measure provided it does not impact the Department's priorities listed in the Executive Budget.

The Department currently works in partnership with the University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (UH-CTAHR), who performs coaching and training with farmers to comply with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Produce Safety Rule and the USDA Good Agricultural Practices requirements. Under a cooperative agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture, the Department conducts U.S. Department of Agriculture's Good Agricultural Practices audits at the request of farm businesses and restricts auditors from performing outreach and coaching activity.

My name is Murray Clay and I am Managing Partner of Ulupono Initiative, a Hawaiʻi-based impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life for the people of Hawaiʻi by working toward solutions that create more locally produced food; increase affordable, clean, renewable energy; and better manage waste and fresh water resources. Ulupono believes that self-sufficiency is essential to our future prosperity and will help shape a future where economic progress and mission-focused impact can work hand in hand.

Ulupono <u>supports</u> **HB 463 HD 1 SD 1**, which provides funding for the Department of Agriculture to partner with the agricultural community to establish a food safety certification program for obtaining Good Agricultural Practices certification, because it aligns with our goal to increase local food production.

One of the greatest challenges facing agricultural enterprises over the next few years is getting into compliance with new federal food safety regulations. These new rules are expected to protect public health by providing more information about food production. However, the new regulations are expected to be significantly more strict, which requires more time and cost for compliance. My name is Chelsie, and I am currently a graduate student at the University of Hawai`i at Manoa (UHM). I am writing you today in support for HB463 HD1 SD1, relating to food safety. I appreciate that this bill intends to allow the Department of Agriculture to partner with members of the agricultural community in order to develop a food safety certification training program for small and medium sized farms. Living in Hawaii, there's always talk about sustainability. One of the main ways that I hear about how to remain sustainable is to support local farmers and buy local, whether that's fresh produce or package items made from locally grown produce.

However, there's always the potential issue of foodborne illness. One of the more recent cases is the California lettuce recall that occurred back in Dec 2018. Not only is there the danger of actually contracting the disease associated with the recall, it sends the public into a state of panic that can accelerate the spread of misinformation. For example, I remember seeing a FaceBook post from an old coworker around the time when rat lungworm disease first grabbed the media's attention in 2018, stating something along the lines of: "Stop buying local produce! We are all at risk of rat lungworm disease!" It was disheartening to see that, because although she had her and the community's safety in mind, it wasn't a very sustainable practice!

I appreciate that this bill will make it easier for local farmers to comply and remain compliant with the FDA Food Safety and Modernization Act. By educating local farms on the most updated and modern food safety practices, we are taking a step forward in ensuring that chances are foodborne illnesses are minimized during the beginning stages of food production.
