# HOUSE BILL NO. 871 RELATING TO AGRIBUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

My name is James Nakatani, Executive Director of the Agribusiness Development Corporation ("ADC"). The ADC provides comments on House Bill No. 871, which requires the Department of Agriculture to conduct a management and financial audit of the Agribusiness Development Corporation.

A management and financial audit will disrupt the daily and project based tasks of the ADC staff; creating possible delays in meeting milestones and requirements for fiscal and managerial administration. Additionally, it is not clear for the reason of the audit, as no negligence in fiscal nor managerial administration has occurred nor been reported. Also, the cost of the audit is absorbed by the audited organization. ADC does not have funds appropriated for an audit action.

# H.B. NO. 871, RELATING TO THE AGRIBUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Hearing: Wednesday, February 13, 2019, 8:30 a.m.

The Office of the Auditor has **no position** regarding H.B. No. 871, which requires that the Office of the Auditor conduct "a management and financial audit of the agribusiness development corporation." **However, we offer the following comments and request clarification of the intended scope of the audit.** 

We strongly suggest that the committee identify the specific programs or activities that it wants assessed to ensure that our report covers the issues that the Legislature is most interested in having us examine. We conduct performance audits in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. Those standards require us to properly plan, document, and carry out work necessary to address "audit objectives" that we identify during the planning phase of our audit work. Without more specific direction we may develop audit objectives that may be different from those envisioned by the Legislature, and for that reason, the report may offer less value to the Legislature.

With respect to the required financial audit, we do not perform any financial audits in-house; rather, we contract with certified public accounting (CPA) firms to audit the financial statements of State agencies and for the State's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. If the intent of this bill is to have us audit the Agribusiness Development Corporation's financial statements, we require an appropriation of no less than \$125,000 to contract with a CPA firm to do so or request that the bill specifically direct the Agribusiness Development Corporation to reimburse us the cost of the financial audit.

Finally, we note that, in addition to the financial audit, the bill directs us to conduct a "management" audit of the Agribusiness Development Corporation. The audits we regularly perform assess the performance of an agency's operations, which may or may not include issues relating to the agency's "management." Unless the legislature has specific management-related issues that it wants us to assess, we suggest the words "management audit" be replaced with "performance audit" – a broader definition that may allow us to assess performance issues that may be more significant than management.

# TESTIMONY IN STRONG SUPPORT OF HB871 RELATING TO THE AGRIBUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Aloha Chair Creagan, Vice Chair DeCoite, Members of the House Committee on Agriculture,

My name is Jun Shin. I serve as the Environmental Justice Action Committee Chair for the Young Progressives Demanding Action (YPDA). YPDA represents approximately 1,000 Hawai'i residents, mostly of Honolulu who seek to build a Hawai'i that is just, equitable, and sustainable. YPDA is in **strong support of HB871 relating to the agribusiness development corporation** which if enacted will require an audit of the Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC).

The ADC is a public corporation that has broad powers to execute its mission. As such it has received large legislative appropriations to acquire and manage large swaths land of Hawaii's prime agricultural land and water systems. Yet despite receiving and managing millions of taxpayer's dollars, the ADC has never undergone an independent audit.

YPDA looks at this issue very seriously. We are in strong support of increasing our state's local food production and diversifying our agriculture because of the benefits and opportunities it can bring to local farmers. Alongside this, it can encourage more people to buy locally, which has benefits in itself including food safety, as well as helping the environment and supporting your local economy as Michigan State University pointed out in 2013 [1]. It is also a matter of thinking in the long term not only for us in the present, but the generations that will inherit the planet after us.

In the case of severe natural disasters and the gradual effects of climate change that are getting worse and worse, we as a state may find ourselves cut off from the mainland due to one of these factors. At that point, we need to be able to sustain ourselves and not be in a state of panic due to being cut off from imports. YPDA believes that with so much at stake, we need to do a lot more to hold the Agribusiness

Development Corporation accountable because as a public corporation with the mandate of diversifying agriculture and large amount of natural resources at their discretion, they have a big role in creating a much needed sustainable future for the islands.

An audit of the ADC will give legislators and the public a better sense of how it is utilizing public funds to execute its mandate of diversifying agriculture, and also a sense of how well it is aligning with Hawai'i's food security goals. I have recently gained interest in the mission and purpose of ADC, in which a lot of questions still remain. I have recently experienced working with ADC members in trying to advocate for communities in which ADC's recent land purchases have affected. In the search of educating myself, I have found a lot of information and have seen and heard of the ways ADC does business which is very concerning. This concerns me not only as a resident who has been directly affected but also as a person who is rooted in Hawai'i and it's culture. Agriculture and Land use is one of the biggest connections Hawaiians have to their culture, in which ADC has a lot of control over.

Mission of ADC to diversify and work towards food sustainability sounds appropriate, however, breakdown of the recent ADC lands by island can be found its own recent <u>report to the legislature</u>, however it is not clear how much food is being grown for local consumption on these lands:

Kekaha, Kaua'i -28,000 acres

Kalepa, Kaua'i – 7,000 acres

Central O'ahu – 1,200 acres

On Kaua'i it appears that their largest tenants are the agrochemical companies instead of being small local farms producing food for local consumption. From this report, it also appears that the agency has a contract with the local military base, PMRF. It is concerning that and agency tasked with "diversifying Hawai'i's agricultural lands" has basically substituted one pesticide intensive monoculture (sugar and pineapple) for another (seed corn).

In Central O'ahu the ADC managed lands, recently acquired from Dole, are currently at the center of a recent evictions dispute. For decades, Whitmore Village community members had taken it upon themselves to malama the long abandoned Dole lands, supporting local food sufficiency by growing taro and banana patches, fruit trees, livestock and making their imu pits. Residents were given an eviction notices and large areas of their food abundant homesteads were bulldozed. Although the new ADC plans for Whitmore Village include a "food hub", it is not clear how the long-time community-based efforts will fit into that plan.

The ADC is a multi-million dollar public corporation that has broad powers to execute its mission. As such it has received large legislative appropriations to acquire and manage large amounts of Hawaii's prime agricultural land and water systems. Yet despite receiving and managing millions of taxpayer's dollars, the ADC has never undergone an independent audit.
