A FEASIBILITY STUDY REGARDING THE EXPANSION OF THE MAXIMUM NUMBER OF CHILDREN CARED FOR IN A STATE-LICENSED FAMILY CHILD

CARE HOME FROM SIX TO TEN CHILDREN

<u>**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION**</u>: The Department of Human Services (DHS) appreciates the intent of this resolution to find ways to increase available licensed child care, and offers comments.

PURPOSE: This resolution requests the department to conduct a feasibility study regarding the expansion of the maximum number of children cared for in a state-licensed family child care home from six children to ten children and to submit a report to the Legislature of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2020.

The primary focus of the DHS child care licensing program is on the health and safety of all children in child care. DHS comments that existing county ordinances conflict with increasing the maximum number of children in care at a registered family child care home. DHS does not have the internal expertise to do a feasibility study on the different county processes, building codes or infrastructural impact of an increase in the maximum number of children in care at a registered family child care home. DHS would require an appropriation for contract services to conduct such a study.

Aloha,

Thank you for hearing HCR172. I am a Hawaii State Certified Preschool teacher and a certified Waldorf Early Childhood Educator.

I work from my home and am licensed as a "day care provider", but my program is run as a preschool, The Green Preschool in Kailua. I modeled my school after the many "little schools" that are in the Portland, OR metropolis. In Oregon, these little schools provide a significant and unique niche in Early Childhood Education. However, the licensing rules in Oregon are amenable to such programs.

Our state has a patchwork of rules over seen by different agencies which are not consistent with each other and do not promote the creation of Little Schools in the home.

Some of these same rules actually create potentially unsafe situations in home daycare.

HCR172 asks for a feasibility study to raise the number of children under the basic childcare license from 6 to 10 per day. Raising the number of children will allow for a reasonable amount of children to create a good class size and provide the teacher with a reasonable income and allow her to hire an assistant. It will encourage professionalism in home daycare.

An important amendment to this Resolution is to enable all day care providers on all islands to be able to hire an assistant if they choose to with 6 children per day, or be obliged to if the numbers are allowed to rise from 6 a day to 10 a day.

HCR172 originated from HB1225 which was a comprehensive bill, based on the tried and true licensing rules in Oregon, that not only provide for an increase in numbers of children per day under the basic childcare license, but define curriculum and safety requirements. This increase was designated for preschool aged children only. It also mandated that an assistant must be present for programs that have more than 6 children per day. (The bill was not heard by the Interstate Commerce Committee and so died.)

At this time, day care providers on O'ahu, cannot hire assistants because of City and County Land Use Ordinance Sec. 21-5.350 Department of Planning and Permitting, 2003 that prohibits childcare providers from hiring people to work with them in their homes. The designation is home day care and there for the providers must work with family members only. They can have a substitute for a limited time, in case of personal illness or a family emergency.

On neighbor islands this rule does not apply and home daycare providers can hire assistants if they choose to. They can have people who are not household members working with them in their home daycare programs.

As nearly as I can tell, the said ordinance is mostly concerned with the unsightliness of extra cars in neighborhoods. The same ordinance prohibits us from displaying ANY sign that identifies our presence. So we are licensed and providing a community service, but we cannot let anyone passing by know where we are.

There was a much publicized and unfortunate case in which a young child, Peyton Valiente, suffered severe head injury while in a day care home. The daycare home was licensed, but true to the present rules, only family members where in the home at the time of the abuse and therefore were not compelled to testify against each other. So there was no conviction in that case and it was never discovered how the injuries occurred.

Day care homes are much safer if the providers can hire qualified people who have had background checks and proper first aid training.

The city and county ordinance that prevents hiring of assistants on only the island of Oahu creates a serious safety issue. I am amazed that this ordinance has been in place for so long especially after the Valiente case which occurred in 2015. I can't understand why DHS or some other of the many agencies public or private that promote the safety and welfare of young children, have not fixed this inconsistency.

I hope that HCR172 passes and at least there will be a study regarding increasing the number of children in qualified day care homes, with the possibility of creating more preschool seats for young children in a home environment, with qualified teachers, solid curriculums, with **qualified assistants.**

I am so sorry that HB1225 did not make it this year as it would have fixed the problem of hiring assistants and the safety concerns around that, straight away. From what I understand, state law will supersede city and county ordinances. It would have made it possible for daycare providers on all islands to hire assistants sooner than later.

For now, at least we can amend HCR172 to address this issue and look into creating better licensing rules. Rules that increase the number of preschool aged children in programs that are designed for preschool aged children and run by professionals, from 6 to up to 10 children per day. This will not solve the problem of not enough preschool seats, but it could make a significant contribution to solving the problem with proper the support of better licensing rules.

There are some 600 licensed in home daycares in Hawaii. Some of these daycares would take advantage of new rules I am sure.

Little schools in a home environment create an intimate and loving space for children, supporting them though individualized learning and providing harmonious interactions with peers. I am a much better teacher in a small school. We need to create more little schools.

This is the second year I have come to the legislature with my concerns. Last year Representative Cynthia Thielan introduced HB1679, which also didn't go anywhere.

I am sorry, for the sake of the children of Hawaii, that I am not very good at lobbying the legislature. Clearly it is not one of my skills. However, you folks are legislators. Passing bills and resolutions are your skills. I hope for the sake of our keiki you will pass HCR 172.

My daughter has been attending The Green Preschool in Kailua for almost 2 years now. The preschool is a small school in a home. I feel so fortunate to have found such a gem. From the very first day my daughter, who 2 years ago was very shy and attached to me, was ok with me leaving her. It is such an inviting, warm environment.

I looked into several different preschool programs and locations before choosing this type of setting. I would leave the tours feeling that it wasn't a good fit for a three year old every time until the Green Preschool. Being in a home setting allows the teacher so much room to think out of the box. For example, they are able to learn number concepts while baking bread in the kitchen. Or learn about nature by gardening in the backyard. There are no desks or computer stations. The kids are moving and learning through play. My daughter has absolutely flourished in this environment, and now that she is older, is ready to start school and has the foundation needed to succeed. I also would like to amend the resolution to include allowing "day care providers" to hire assistants on the island of Oahu as providers on other islands can. This is a safety issue as if something were to happen to the one provider she could have the assistant take over or if one child needs extra support and is having a tough day then more 1:1 time can be provided. It also allows for one person to prepare meals or upcoming crafts while the other is keeping a watchful eye over the children. Additionally allowing a pathway for these in-home preschools to run with assistants reduces the amount of illegal in home preschools which have proven detrimental as they are not regulated in any way.

I also think that these "little" schools in the home should be able to display a sign indicating their location on the home to help future parents find the location and also help out approved alternate guardians pick up children when the parent cannot.

Our son has thrived in the small school in a home setting and we are so happy that he has a safe and nourishing environment to help him develop his own unique personality and also respect the land around him.
