- 1 **EOA's Position:** The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department
- of Health, would like to provide comments on SB1025. We support the intent of this measure
- 3 provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities within the Administration's
- 4 executive biennium budget.
- 5 **Fiscal Implications:** This measure appropriates \$2,000,000 in SFY2020 and the same amount
- 6 for SFY2021 for the implementation of the Kupuna Caregivers Program and includes amending
- 7 the kupuna caregivers program allocation cap from \$70 per day to \$350 per week.
- 8 **Purpose and Justification:** EOA notes that the appropriation in this bill is a priority of the Ige
- 9 Administration. Governor Ige's budget request maintains a total base budget of \$1.2 million
- from SFY2019 through SFY2021.
- 11 Since enactment in 2017, EOA established the program guidelines, created public information
- sheets, developed a caregiver's employment verification process, adopted a caregiver burden

- assessment tool to prioritize applicants and measure program effectiveness, and executed
- 2 contracts with the four area agencies on aging (AAAs). All planning and implementation work
- 3 was completed by existing EOA staff, and the Kupuna Caregivers Program (KCGP) was
- 4 officially launched on December 13, 2017. None of the \$600,000 initially appropriated during
- 5 the first six month of the project in SFY2018 was used to cover any administrative costs but was
- 6 used predominately to provide a full day of Adult Day Care (ADC) services to the care recipients
- of 101 caregivers which allowed caregivers the ability to work a full day at the cost of
- 8 approximately \$70 a day. For SFY2019, the Legislature appropriated \$1.2 million which
- 9 currently is serving 110 caregivers. Additional funding would be needed to expand the Kupuna
- 10 Caregiver program because to maintain gainful employment, the assessed caregiver needs at
- least 3-5 days of services per week. In addition, the current language for the Kupuna Caregivers
- Program Statute, HRS 349-18, specifies a maximum amount of \$70 a day for services which
- limits the number of individuals who received Kupuna Caregiver services. If the language was
- amended for a weekly amount, this would give the AAAs more flexibility on how the funds are
- used to meet the assessed needs of the caregivers.
- 16 **Recommendation**: The Kupuna Caregivers Program is a part of the Administration's base
- budget request. We support advancing this measure provided that its enactment does not reduce
- or replace priorities with the Administration's base budget. Should there be a surplus of funds
- 19 available for this measure, we would be very supportive of funding this important initiative.

Dear Chair Baker, Vice Chair Chang and Members of the Committee,

My name is Meizhu Lui, and I Chair the Hawaii County Advisory Committee on Aging. The Committee is a volunteer body of people from every island District, mostly kupuna ourselves, who bring issues to the attention of our Executive on Aging, Kimo Alameda.

I and my fellow members strongly support Senate Bill 1025, relating to the Kupuna Caregivers Program. We feel that one of the best ways to help our kupuna is to help their caregivers, without whom their quality of life would deterioriate. SB1025 continues the funding for the Kupuna Caregivers program, begun last year, to address the financial needs of family members who must miss work and income to take care of their elders. Since as a state, we have a basic commitment to ohana and we value the contributions made by our elders, therefore we want them to be able to age with dignity in the place of their preference, and for many, that is their own home. But to do so, they need help - often provided by their children or younger family members. These caregivers are performing not only a family service, but a social service, relieving the state of the burden and the cost of elder care. Their efforts should not be made at the expense of their own loss of financial stability, which puts them at risk of being poor elders themselves at some point in the future.

This bill will provide \$2 million in funding for this new and vital program. It will also change the statute so instead of providing \$70 per day in services it would provide up to \$350 per week (the same as \$70 per day for 5 days a week) so that the Executive Office on Aging is able to better negotiate with vendors and be able to provide more in-home services. We are at the tip of the silver tsunami, and programs like this one will need to be expanded and improved as the numbers of kupuna relative to younger people continues to rise. Our state can get ahead of the wave!

Our members are employed in hospitals and health care facilities, the Department of Education school system, and private practice. We are human movement specialists and are part of the spectrum of care for Hawaii, and provide rehabilitative services for infants and children, youth, adults and the elderly. Rehabilitative services are a vital part of restoring optimum functioning from neuromuscular and musculoskeletal injuries and impairments to improve and enrich quality of life.

SPECIAL REPORT ON THE STATUS OF THE KUPUNA CAREGIVERS PROGRAM

(Based on information generated by the January 28, 2019 Kokua Council Summit on Kupuna Caregivers)

On January 28, 2019, the Executive Office on Aging, the City and County's Elderly Affairs Division, and Caring Across Generations reviewed what we know about the program, and how to promote and improve it.

FUNDING: Distress Among the Providers and the Vulnerable. Although the informal Kupuna Caucus has recommended \$2 million to fund the program, the Governor's budget did not reflect this, and the Chair of House Finance has questioned the effectiveness of the program and completely de-funded it in the Budget Bill: HB 2 HD1.

As a result, community providers of services to the vulnerable and their clients are filled with great concern, panic and stress. Providers who could be spending more time serving clients now must spend more hours at the Legislature trying to "save" the program. Employees hired by providers to implement the program find their jobs at risk. Intended or not, some proposals demonstrate an indifference as to the impacts that target the most vulnerable. HB 2 is similar to a government shutdown: Provider employees don't know whether they need to seek another job.

Last year the funding was \$600,000. (To put this into perspective, \$600K would, under our expensive procurement code, air condition just six DOE classrooms. An appropriation of \$2 million for Kupuna Caregivers, would air condition just 20 classrooms.)

STATEWIDE STATISTICS: As of December 2018, last year's funding of \$600,000 served 110 caregivers, or 112 clients. This is broken down by county:

Hawaii: 11 caregivers/ 11 clients;

Kauai: 8/8;

Maui: 22/23; and

Honolulu: 71/68.

TYPE OF SERVICES: For the State: there were:

Adult Day Care: 104;

Home Delivered Meals: 1;

Personal Care: 15; In-Home Respite 3; Homemaker: 4; Chore: 1; and

Assisted Transportation: 2.

One reason for the preference for Adult Day Care is that the limit of \$70 per day corresponds more closely with receiving day-long adult day care, and conversely, other services, charging by the hour, are more expensive. On Oahu, there are eleven (11) providers of Adult Day Care at twelve sites.

CHALLENGES

- No administrative support is funded, imposing more tasks on ADRC staff who are already busy implementing other Kupuna Care programs.
- Early premature promotion of the program without adequate public education led to a surge of interest and demand well before the program could begin, and well beyond its funding capacity.
- Late arrival of State guidelines and funds meant some ADRCs only had five months to implement the program.
- No ability to use family income and other supports to determine priorities.
- There are some federal guidelines that inhibit flexibility in crafting some ADRC programs. Thus, even though ACT 102 funds are all state money, when other programs are also accessed, this complicates the process.
- Overlap with other Kupuna Care services that are free.
- Caregiving is not always provided by just one working caregiver;
 thus, the assumed model may be too one-dimensional to take into account multiple support networks.
- No ideal profile of the age or status of a caregiver has been developed to assist ADRCs to identify priority clients for the limited

funds.

- It is not completely clear which EOA program "guidelines" are hard wired to provisions of the law, and which are internal agency decisions. Suggestions to change some aspects of the program may or may not require legislative action.
- ACT 102 says until EOA adopts administrative rules for ACT 102, the rules for Kupuna Care can be guides – however there are no administrative rules yet for Kupuna Care.
- Public skepticism of legislators, including attempts to restrict funding to one client to \$70 a week undercuts the effectiveness of the program. No provider believes \$70 a week will be enough incentive to keep a caregiver in the workforce.

Top Five Kokua Council Priorities for 2019

- 1. Funding, structure, and implementation of the **Kupuna** Caregivers Law.
- 2. **More funds to serve more seniors** in other programs: Kupuna Care, ADRCs, etc.
- 3. **Less bureaucracy and timely payments** for vendors delivering Kupuna services.
- 4. **Condo legal and financial protections** for low income, vulnerable senior residents.
- 5. Greater transparency and collaboration in legislating, designing, and implementing polices, programs and practices impacting seniors & their families.

The Hawaii Fire Fighters Association (HFFA), Local 1463, IAFF, AFL-CIO represents approximately 2,100 active-duty professional fire fighters throughout the State with more than 338 HFFA members serving in the County of Hawaii Fire Department – the only fire-based emergency medical service (EMS) among the four County Fire Departments and State Airport Rescue Fire Fighters.

HFFA <u>supports S. B. 877</u> as Hawai'i Island has experienced a number of factors that justifiably warrants the need for the additional EMS units, including the increase in EMS call volume; population growth; and the sheer land mass of the island.

Access to primary and acute medical care within the Puna and Makalei districts Hawaii Island has been chronically challenging as services are currently as much as 30 miles away for many residents. The volume of EMS calls have slowly increased each year without a correlated increase in EMS services to the areas and with the projected population growth, this will no doubt continue to impact the ability to deliver high quality EMS services to our Hawai'i Island residents.

The request presented in S.B. 877 would aid not only our first responders in meeting the ever-increasing demands and needs for emergency medical services on Hawai'i Island, but it would also better serve our communities.

On behalf of the Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, I am pleased to extend our **support** for Senate Bill 1025, which provides funding for a Kupuna Caregivers Program and changes the program allocation cap from \$70 per day to \$350 per week. Through this program, caregivers, including those who provide care for individuals with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia, are awarded a voucher to cover costs for services such as transportation, personal care services, respite care, adult day care, etc.

Although the Alzheimer's Association provides numerous services to family caregivers, there are still many services that are needed beyond what we provide. And despite the growing number of individuals affected by the disease (28,000 individuals with the disease and the 66,000 caregivers of someone with the disease) in the state of Hawaii, there is still a substantial lack of support and resources for these families. According to the results of the Hawaii 2015 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) survey, more than 40% of Alzheimer's and dementia caregivers provide at least 20 hours of care per week. 74.5% of those individuals manage household care such as cleaning or cooking and 72% manage personal care such as feeding or bathing. Furthermore, the level of intense care that is provided has also lead to numerous negative effects on the caregiver. Results of the Hawaii 2015 BRFSS indicated that the impact of Alzheimer's and dementia caregiving lead to 8.5% of those caregivers having frequent poor physical health and 12.7% of those caregivers reported a history of depression.

The Kupuna Caregivers Program helps alleviate such issues by providing much needed services and support to families affected by the disease. Respite and assistance with daily living activities is critical to the long term success of caregiving for someone with Alzheimer's or a related dementia. I appreciate the opportunity to comment on this legislation and applaud your leadership in bringing it forward.

Thank you for hearing **Senate Bill 1025**, which will provide funds to continue the Kupuna Caregivers program. Through the Kupuna Caregivers program, our dedicated family caregivers will receive the support that they need to help keep kupuna safe at home and their family stress level from becoming unmanageable.

We know that the need for the Kupuna Caregivers program is very high for families across Hawaii. Within just a few weeks of launch, the Executive Office on Aging documented over 500 requests for services. Each of those requests represents friends and neighbors who have few other resources to turn to for caregiving support. My name is Marcie Saquing and I am the Executive Director for Hawaii Island Adult Care in Hilo. We are the largest adult day center in the state and licensed to serve up to 105 kupuna on a daily basis. We currently have 140 enrolled in our program and serve on the average of 65-72 kupuna per day. We have seen our applications to attend day care jump 200% in the last month. This bill continues the needed funding for the Kupuna Caregivers program, a critical part of the infrastructure to help our kupuna and their caregivers.

The cost of of professional caregiving continues to rise and our families simply cannot afford to take care of a loved one and remain fully employed. This program helps those in the gap group who are not eligible for medicaid or medicare to help with the costs, but are still barely making it, at times at risk of losing their jobs or having to reduce hours at work because the duties at home are too great. This reduces the income earning power of the caregivers, their social security benefits, at times risking their insurance coverage, and placing them closer and closer into poverty.

It will also change the statue so instead of providing \$70 per day in services it would be an average of up to \$350 per week (the same as \$70 per day for 5 days a week) so that the Executive Office on Aging is able to negotiate more freely with vendors and be able to provide more services.

Dear Chair Baker, Vice Chair Chang, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Kathleen Wyatt, President of Hale Hau`oli Hawai`i and Director of an adult day care center in Aiea. Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony in support of SB1025 which provides \$2 million in funding for the Kupuna Caregiver Program. Our adult day care center is one of the contracted Kupuna Caregiver Program providers with the City and County of Honolulu Elderly Affairs Division, and we currently have 14 elders whose family caregivers benefit from this program.

The intent of the Kupuna Caregiver Program is to keep caregivers in the workforce by providing services that will care for their elderly loved ones while they are earning a living. On Oahu, the Kupuna Caregiver Program funds are being utilized for Adult Day Care, which provides 8-10 hours of care during the day and includes meals, exercise and active socialization which are vital for the kupuna while their caregivers continue to work.

To date, 112 elders are benefiting statewide from this program, with \$1.2 million being allocated for the program in this current fiscal year. The average age of the care recipient in the Kupuna Caregiver Program is 88 years old, needing help with an average of 4 Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) such as bathing or showering, dressing, and grooming and 7 Instruments of Activities of Daily Living (IADLS), such as preparing meals, shopping, and managing finances, etc (according to the Executive Office on Aging). The typical client has some form of dementia or physical disabilities that make them unable to safely stay at home alone and unsupervised. These recipients are eligible for nursing home level of care, but they remain at home with family caregivers. The average age of the caregiver is 59 years old, at the peak of their careers and earning potential, and not at the point of retirement. Many have school or college age children and wrestle with their responsibilities between their family and their kupuna which can be financially, emotionally and physically challenging. Keeping them in the workforce is vital for their own financial security, and having their elderly family member cared for during the day alleviates their worries and gives them peace of mind of their safety and well being.

While there are some county resources for Hawaii's older adults, none are earmarked specifically to assist caregivers such as the Kupuna Caregivers Program which is considered a ground breaking program nationwide. The adult day care service covered by the Kupuna Caregivers Program is one of the most cost effective home and community based services. With a benefit of \$70 a day, this service provides 8 – 10 hours of supervised care. In comparison, having in-home care services, which costs an average of \$35 per hour, would only get 2 hours of assistance, a day which would be nearly impossible for a caregiver to be fully employed.

The Kupuna Caregiver Program helps caregivers remain in the workforce by providing additional resources to care for their kupuna. For this particular group of caregivers, this program is a lifeline for them as they remain committed to caring for their elders as well as their family households. Thank you for the opportunity to support this bill.

Testimony of Church of the Crossroads Supporting SB 1025 Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health February 1, 2019 at 9:30 in Conference Room 229

The Church of the Crossroads was founded in 1922 and is Hawaii's first intentionally multicultural church.

The Hawaii Kupuna Caregivers Program was established by the Hawaii Legislature in 2017 and is an important step in creating needed supports to family caregivers. By 2020, nearly 300,000 people in Hawaii will be 65 years of age or older, and the number persons needing some assistance with everyday activities continues to increase.

Family caregivers provide 70% of the care for frail elderly persons and thus bear the major burden and expense of care. The majority of family caregivers are also in the workforce and their employment is necessary to support the needs of their families as well as to assure that they will have sufficient Social Security benefits and savings to support themselves in retirement.

Research in Hawaii as well as nationally has shown that employed caregivers suffer an extraordinary level of stress in trying to balance the obligations of work and eldercare. Consequently, many employed caregivers have reduced productivity at work and many have to limit their hours or drop out of the workforce due the demands of caring.

The Kupuna Caregivers Program is designed to enable family caregivers to continue to participate in the labor force by providing assistance with care for their elder family member. The program offers in-home and community-based services, such as day care, transportation, homemaker services, meals, and personal care services, up to \$70 per day for 5 days a week. Elder persons needing assistance with at least 2 activities of daily living may qualify for the program.

Within a few weeks of the launch of the program, more than 500 persons inquired about it. The program's relatively small budget, however, limited the services to a relatively small number of clients. The current level of funding, unfortunately, is still woefully inadequate to serve the existing need. Legislators, as well as persons in the community, have expressed a strong desire to expand the number of persons being served. The proposed increase to \$2 million per year will allow the program to serve a more significant and meaningful number of employed caregivers.

For the foregoing reasons the Church of the Crossroads supports the bill and urges the committee to pass it.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony <u>in support</u> of S.B.1025 Relating to Kūpuna Caregiver Program. My name is Lynn Wong, Director of Live Well at Iwilei. We are a licensed adult day care center located on the outskirts of downtown Honolulu in the Iwilei district. Live Well has 68 members whom many have caregivers who work nearby and rely on our services to care for their elders during the day.

Three of our families are currently in the Kūpuna Caregiver program and grateful for its assistance which enable them to continue working. One program recipient is a 68 year old male who has Alzheimer's Disease, and retired on a modest fixed income. His wife is now the sole breadwinner as well as the primary caregiver since their only child lives on the mainland with her own young family. The spouse works full time as a housekeeper and pays their monthly rent, food and household expenses. The additional cost of her husband's care is an unexpected financial burden on their household income. The Kūpuna Caregiver program has been a god-send for this family which allows the caregiver to earn a living while her husband has the necessary care and supervision to remain healthy and safe at home. They don't have to rely on Medicaid to pay for his care, or be prematurely placed in a residential care or nursing home where they will be living apart.

This family situation is a common story shared by countless caregivers in Hawaii who are struggling to care for their elderly family members while supporting their own household. The Kūpuna Caregiver Program is one of the cost effective solutions that addresses and supports the needs of this aging population. Home and community based services are far less expensive than institutional long term care facilities which can cost up to \$14,000+ a month. Using adult day care and other in-home services help keep the family intact and respects the wishes of our kūpuna who want to remain at home as long as possible.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 607 1025 RELATING TO KUPUNA CAREGIVERS

My name is Pedro Haro, and I wish to testify on behalf of Caring Across Generations in strong support of Senate Bill 1025.

Caring Across Generations is a national movement of families, caregivers, people with disabilities and aging Americans working to transform the way we care in this country, calling for policy solutions that enable all of us to live and age with dignity and independence. Caring Across Generations has worked with partners in Hawai'i for years in support of legislation that will help make quality long-term care accessible to everyone, and we believe that this bill is an important step toward that goal.

There is little disagreement that the lack of long-term care coverage is a critical issue facing our country. For the vast majority of families without private long term care insurance, the only choices available are to either spend down their life savings in order to qualify for Medicaid, or to rely on unpaid family caregivers. Neither choice is sustainable. In Hawai'i, the issue is even more devastating as our cost of home health care is on average \$10,000 more than on the continental U.S. To adequately meet the care needs of families, and of the direct care workforce, we need to support the caregiving infrastructure that the Kupuna Caregivers provides.

Senate Bill 1025 will continue the funding for the Kupuna Caregivers program and will provide the needed respite care that our kūpuna caregivers deserve and the support our working families and businesses need. Study after study shows that the value of unpaid, and often under-recognized, family care is astronomical, and when family caregivers are forced to leave the workforce to provide care for an aging loved one, they risk their own retirement security. No one should be forced to choose between earning a living to provide for their family or leaving a job to provide long term care. **Our own research showed that 1 in 5 people indicated that**

they or someone in the household has had to leave a job or the workforce to help care for an aging loved one.

The benefit offered in this legislation will help ensure that aging adults in Hawaii will have access to the care they need, in a setting where they are already comfortable. And, importantly, family members in the workforce will be able to continue working, which improves their economic security and also stabilizes the workforce for business owners.

Care is a universal issue, and anyone in this room who is not currently providing some form of care to a family member has almost certainly done so in the past...or will do so in the future. Caring Across Generations urges this committee to support Senate Bill 1025 and help ensure that all families have the support they need to provide the care our kūpuna deserve.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON S.B. 1025 RELATING TO KUPUNA CAREGIVERS PROGRAM

The ILWU Local 142 **supports** S.B. 1025, which would appropriate \$2 million for the Kupuna Caregivers Program in fiscal year 2019-2020 and changes the allocation cap from \$70 per day to \$350 per week.

The first of its kind in the nation, the Kupuna Caregivers Program was established in the 2017 session with an appropriation of \$600,000 (increased to \$1.2 million in 2018) to be used to assist family caregivers with support services for their loved ones in order to allow caregivers to retain their own employment. While services are provided to the kupuna, the "client" effectively is the employed family caregiver, who needs assistance to remain in the workforce.

Although a range of services are available, adult day care has been determined the most cost-effective. For \$70 a day, kupuna needing care can receive services at an adult day care facility in the care of professional staff who provide meals and a safe and healthful environment but also facilitate opportunities for socialization during the day while the caregiver is at work.

Too many caregivers, lacking financial resources for this type of respite care, have been forced to lose work hours and income or resign or retire far earlier than desired. In most, if not all, cases, fewer work hours or early retirement has resulted in financial sacrifice for the caregiver in the form of reduced income security in later years. Likewise, employers have suffered economic hardship when employees must take paid or unpaid leave to care for a kupuna or must leave the workforce prematurely, requiring employers to hire and train replacement workers. With Hawaii's unemployment rate among the lowest in the nation, employers cannot afford to lose qualified and experienced employees

Institutionalization is a final resort but extremely costly. For those who qualify for Medicaid, the burden of the cost rests with taxpayers themselves. Half of Medicaid dollars comes from the federal government and the other half from the State. For those unable to qualify for Medicaid, the cost must be borne by the families themselves, which, at minimum, is \$10,000 a month.

S.B. 1025 calls for a modest increase in the yearly appropriation to \$2 million. Even with this increase, the number served will be small. The Executive Office on Aging has reported that thus far a little more than 100 have been served statewide (with almost \$2 million) while the need is at least 10 times greater.

S.B. 1025 will also allow for flexibility in payments to assist these frail and vulnerable elderly who need care. Instead of \$70 a day, the amount will be capped at \$350 a week.

Encouraging kupuna and caregivers to use funds for services other than day care, like chore and bathing services, home-delivered meals, and assisted transportation, will also allow appropriated funds to go farther.

The Kupuna Caregiver Program needs to be expanded to allow more kupuna and their caregivers to benefit from it. That will, of course, mean more funding must be appropriated, which the Legislature may not be inclined to do. However, a coordinated campaign to publicize the program may identify the true demand for these services and the scope of the problem. Rather than serving only the few who are aware about the program--and who can fulfill the paperwork requirements--the ADRC's, which field the calls for Kupuna Caregiver services, may find there are many more who need help for respite services to allow them to remain in the workforce. Data is needed for the Legislature to enact informed and appropriate legislation.

Another suggestion is a means test to help prioritize those who will access these limited program funds and ensure that the caregivers who receive funding for services are the most needy. These "most needy" are likely to be those working for small businesses at low-wage jobs who lack flexibility in their jobs to provide or pay for appropriate kupuna care.

While amendments as we have suggested above may be needed, the ILWU urges passage of S.B. 1025. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on this measure.

I want to ask all of you: have you ever been, or know someone who has been, a caregiver for an elderly ohana member?

There's a quote by Rosalyn Carter that I'd like to share:

"There are only four kinds of people in the world. Those who have been caregivers. Those who are currently caregivers. Those who will be caregivers, and those who will need a caregiver."

As a former caregiver for my grandmother who suffered from Alzheimer's Disease, I know first hand the financial, emotional, and physical burdens that caregivers experience. In total, I was the primary caregiver for my grandmother, Annie Camacho, for over ten years-- the last four of which took an enormous amount of sacrifice, and countless hours of time. My husband and I endured the balancing act of caregiving, working, and raising three children during this time. Due to the demands of caregiving, I worked part-time. To say the financial and emotional strain nearly broke me is an understatement. I felt helpless and alone. I sought help, but kept hitting dead ends.

Thankfully, my husband had a decent job that helped keep us financially stable, but we could not afford the extra cost to hire a private caregiver to provide us respite care. With my husband working 50-60 hour weeks, much of the domestic life was on me. I could go into immense detail of the day-to-day life of being a full-time caregiver of someone with Alzheimer's, but will spare you the time it would take to read through so many words.

My grandmother passed away at the age of 94, just five months after I was contacted by the Kupuna Caregivers Program to start receiving services. By that time, Hawaii Care Choices was already involved.

I took care of my grandma until her last breath-- a promise I made to her while she was still well. A promise many make to their loved ones.

I had so much I wanted to say, and now that I sit here and type, words seem to elude me.

I'll just leave you with this quote by Tia Walker:

"It is an honor to care for those who once cared for us."

That honor should be celebrated and supported, and Bill 1025 is a great start.

I support added funding for this cost-effective program for targeted assistance with the cost of critical in-home care and services outside the home while family caregivers are at work during the week, they need to continue to work, but they cannot afford the full cost of the services that may be needed.

<u>I write to you in support of Senate Bill 1025 relating to Kupuna Care</u>, which will continue to provide funding for a wide range of programs such as transportation, personal care services, respite care, adult day care, chores and homemaking services; that support the kupuna and their family caregivers.

Living in Hawaii, we are fortunate to be in a melting pot of cultures. A common value that is within our community is having a collectivistic mindset towards our family and friends around us.

When a loved one ages they may need living assistance and in our community it is common that a family member or close friend will take the role as a family caregiver for the kupuna. According to AARP there are approximately 154,000 unpaid family caregivers in Hawaii. Given the increasing population of kupuna living longer, there will likely be an increase of family caregivers also.

Unfortunately statistics have shown the negative side effects of caregiving which can contribute to depression and stress, neglecting their own health care appointments, and eating a poor-quality diet (Schulz, 2008).

Family caregivers contribute to society by allowing kupuna to live at home, instead of a nursing home. Especially for kupuna who have a physical illness,

Dr Jim Davie a consultant in medicine for older people stated that "Most people do not want to be admitted to hospital. Older people who have physical illness and/or confusion are often happier at home and often recover better in their own environment.

Letting Kupuna live at home allows them to have control over their lives, and providing services may assist the Kupuna in having a sense of independence.

If this bill passes, family systems will benefit across the state. SB 1025 is a long-term solution to help the Ohana of Hawaii take better care of Kupuna on both ends of the caregiver and person needing assistance. I know that one day if this bill passes it will contribute to the next generation because I will be in a position of being a family caregiver for my parents.

I have witnessed the challenges of being a family caregiver, which oftentimes requires a lot of sacrifice. I had a friend whose ex-husbands parents were older and required assistance in everyday living while being at home. The ex-husband was in jail and the elderly couple's daughter was incapable of being their caregiver since there was emotional and physical abuse involved when she was. My friend chose to drop out of her PhD program and take on the responsibilities of taking care of her ex-husband's parents and also her mother. Fortunately my friend was financially stable which helped ease some stress of being a family caregiver, but I saw that her life consisted of bathing the Kupuna on a daily basis, grocery shopping, helping with their bills, organizing medication, taking them to the doctors, providing meals, and above all being a support system to them. I know that the elderly couple and her mother are forever grateful for the care she has invested in them so that they can still live comfortably at home.

Overall, I support SB 1025 relating to Kupuna Care because it will allow our kupuna to continue live at home and ease the stresses on family caregivers.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of SB1025 Relating to The Kupuna Caregivers Program. My name is Linda Dorset and I am a concerned aging resident and live in the Wailuku area.

I believe that the Kupuna Caregivers Program helps maintain strong communities by lowering barriers facing family caregivers working outside the home as they balance work with caregiving. Providing that care can often create financial and emotional stress. In 2016, the cost home health care in Hawai'i was almost \$10,000 higher than the national average. The annual cost of hiring a home health aide was nearly \$60,000 in 2016 and is expected to increase to more than \$75,000 over the next decade.

By 2020, nearly 300,000 people will be age 65 or older in Hawai'i. That means that most of us will either be caregivers or need care. Working caregivers need to keep their jobs; not just to support their families now, but also to protect retirement security because leaving their jobs to provide care will reduce their Social Security credits.

The passage of this bill is important to me because my husband, who has lung cancer, is going to need a caregiver when he undergoes radiation treatment. I might need leave my job to make sure that he is fed, bathed, supervised, transported to his doctor or for any other activities of daily living. This appropriation would allow me to get services to help with these activities so I could continue to work to support us. I am concerned, not just with salary, but if I need to drop below full time work, I will lose my employer sponsored health insurance plan which covers both of us. I know there are many others with the same concern.

Please allow this bill to move forward out of committee and to expand, not restrict, access to *Kupuna* Caregiving to realistically help working caregivers keep working.

Comments:

I strongly support SB1025 regarding the Kupuna Caregiving Program. It will help seniors get services that they need, and help caregivers stay in the workforce.

I was a teacher at Wahiawa Middle, and retired in December 2016. I had only 28 years of service with the State (15 years as a teacher), and took the early retirement penalty. My father was at risk of falling and needed help in walking, and later, with personal care. My mother (a stroke survivor in her late 80s, and less than 100 pounds) was not able to assist him in walking. After Dad passed away in July 2018, I decided not to return to work because Mom needs some help with fetching the newspaper and mail, buying her groceries and supplies, doing her banking, and other chores. She doesn't need much help, but she likes having someone around in case she needs help.

If this program had been available to me, I might have been able to keep working. I know of several other teachers who have retired or are considering leaving due to parental care issues. Please vote for SB 1025 and expand access to Kupuna Caregiving so that caregivers can continue to work and Kupuna can get the care they need.
