Chair Rhoads, Chair Dela Cruz, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Esther Brown, and I am the Acting Complaints and Enforcement Officer of the Department's Regulated Industries Complaints Office (RICO). RICO appreciates the intent of S.D. 1 and offers enforcement-related comments.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) establish licensure of midwives; (2) exempt Native Hawaiian healers from licensure requirements; (3) require registration for current practicing midwives by January 1, 2024, and the obtainment of full licensure thereafter; (4) provide provisional licensure until full licensure can be obtained; and (5) appropriate funds from the Compliance Resolution Fund (CRF).

RICO appreciates S.D. 1's establishment of a single licensure scheme for midwives and the removal of language that would have established a dual licensure pathway. However, RICO offers the following enforcement-related comments.

Page 4, line 11 requires licensure of a person "engage[d] in the practice of midwifery" without defining the scope or duties that the "practice of midwifery" is meant to encompass. This could create confusion among practitioners as to whether they are subject to licensure requirements and may cause individuals to engage in unlicensed conduct based upon a misunderstanding of the type of conduct the licensure program seeks to regulate.

Page 5, line 20 exempts from licensure a person acting as a "traditional midwife," which is defined on page 2, lines 15-21. As this definition is not narrowly drawn, this exemption may exclude a large number of individuals from licensure requirements and even encourage unlicensed activity that RICO would need to enforce in circuit court proceedings.

Since S.D. 1 enacts a new licensure program and RICO anticipates enforcement challenges, especially with regulating potential unlicensed midwifery activity, RICO requests a CRF fee assessment schedule for licensed midwives that is similar to the CRF fee assessment schedule for nurses, as set forth in Hawaii Administrative Rule section 16-53-27.

RICO defers to the Department's Professional and Vocational Licensing Division (PVL) on issues relating to the administration and implementation of the midwifery licensure program. In addition, RICO is amenable to working with the Committees on any amendments to S.D. 1, should this measure move forward.

Chair Rhoads, Chair Dela Cruz, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Charlene Tamanaha, and I am the Acting Licensing Administrator of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (DCCA or Department)

Professional and Vocational Licensing Division (PVL or Division). The PVL appreciates the intent of S.D. 1 and offers comments.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) establish licensure of midwives; (2) exempt native Hawaiian healers from licensure requirements; (3) require registration for current practicing midwives by January 1, 2024, and the obtainment of full licensure thereafter; (4) provide provisional licensure until full licensure can be obtained; and (5) appropriate funds from the Compliance Resolution Fund.

The PVL recognizes that S.D.1 is more aligned with the Oregon licensure model than the original version of S.B. 1033; however, the Division still has the following concerns with S.D. 1:

- Page 4, lines 16-18 provides that the DCCA Director "may begin to accept applications for licensure beginning on July 1, 2019." The PVL is concerned this is not sufficient time for the Division to begin receiving and processing applications by July 1, 2019. The PVL requires adequate time to create applications, update its database, and create implementation policies before it can accept applications.
- Page 6, lines 8-14 mandates that the DCCA Director issue a provisional license to a person who satisfies the licensing requirements but who has not yet acquired a license pursuant to section -5. For the Committees' information, section -5 of S.D. 1 addresses exemptions from licensure, and not the actual license requirements, which are outlined in section -8.
- Page 12, lines 1-10 requires registration of all currently practicing midwives
 offering services. This section is problematic, as the DCCA Director has no
 means to determine who is currently practicing and whom the Department should
 notify regarding the new registration requirements.
- The PVL has been advised that the licensee population consists of approximately 13 individuals. DCCA's self-funded licensing model is based on dividing the cost of the program by the anticipated licensee population. The costs associated with licensing approximately 13 midwives would be \$203,000.

The PVL is amenable to working with the Committees on any amendments to S.D. 1, should this measure move forward.

Providing Comments

My name is Dr. Charles Neal, Jr., MD, PhD and I am the Neonatology Clinical Section Chief and Medical Director of the Newborn Intensive Care Unit at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women and Children (Kapi'olani). Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women and Children (Kapi'olani) is an affiliate of Hawaii Pacific Health. Kapi'olani Medical Center is the state's only maternity, newborn and pediatric specialty hospital. It is also a tertiary care, medical teaching and research facility. Specialty services for patients throughout Hawai'i and the Pacific Region include intensive care for infants and children, 24-hour emergency pediatric care, air transport, maternal-fetal medicine and high-risk perinatal care.

I am writing to offer comments on SB 1033, SD1 which establishes licensing for midwives in Hawaii. The bill creates a licensing scheme and oversight of the practice of midwifery which will improve consumer safety and afford greater quality of care for women who elect to deliver with a midwife and for their babies. However, we are concerned with certain aspects as outlined below.

- More specificity is needed to delineate educational requirements of certified professional midwives in order to obtain licensure and address scope of practice.
- More specificity is needed to acknowledge that licensed midwives should be authorized to obtain and administer certain legend drugs we feel are critical to have in deliveries such as oxygen, anti-hemorrhagic agents and epinephrine for neonatal resuscitation to name a few.

Language address the above concerns was contained in the original version of SB 1033 and should be reinserted. While it is important to respect mother's choices with regards to delivery options, the safety and well being of the unborn baby appear to be overlooked and must be considered.

The Hawai'i Section of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (HI ACOG) represents more than 200 obstetrician/gynecologist physicians in our state, and we would like to provide comments for SB 1033_SD 1. HI ACOG strongly supports the intention behind SB 1033_SD1 which is to license the profession of midwifery as that would increase access to safe, high-quality maternity care for Hawai'i's women and infants. However, as it is written, we cannot support the bill until amendments are made.

HI ACOG agrees with the State Auditor's Report No-17-01 which determined that the Hawaii Regulatory Licensing Reform Act "supports licensure of the entire midwifery program." We agree with the State Auditor's statement that "given our determination that the nature of the services provided by midwives may endanger the public's health and safety, we conclude that the Hawaii Regulatory Licensing Reform Act mandates that the profession of midwifery be regulated."

We highly recommend that amendments be made that would more specifically delineate educational requirements of certified professional midwives in order to obtain licensure, address scope of practice, and acknowledge that licensed midwives should be authorized to obtain and administer certain legend drugs we feel are critical to have in deliveries such as oxygen, anti-hemorrhagic agents, and epinephrine for neonatal resuscitation to name a few. Language to this effect was in SB 1033.

Childbirth is a normal biological function, it is *not* a medical event or the practice of medicine. The skills of a midwife are compiled from ancient knowledge that predates the modern medical era. Childbirth does not need regulation of any sort. Requiring mandatory certification for the licensure of midwives, as defined by SB1033sd1 interferes with body autonomy.

This bill is discriminatory and culturally insensitive, especially in the state of Hawai'i.

The certifying NARM test:

- 1. takes approximately 8 hours to take
- 2. is only available to be taken at one testing site in the state
- 3. is only available in English

The NARM certifying exam makes no attempt at equal opportunity and is unabashedly discriminatory to non-English speaking midwives.

There is already limited access to specialty healthcare providers on the more rural, less populated outer islands. This bill would serve to further widen a gap of prenatal and postpartum care for those with the greatest need.

An all-inclusive statewide registry for the midwives who work in the community birth setting might be an alternative to a license. This would honor the long-standing traditions and cultural practices of the VAST number of cultures represented in Hawai'i.

Please deeply consider this important decision, it is not a simple or straight forward thing to require certification and licensure of ancient knowledge. There are many recognized pathways of learning midwifery. We believe that if **ALL** parties involved were to come together in a working group a resolution could be found that doesn't leave any midwives behind in the process. Please invite a homebirth consumer, a non-certified traditional midwife, and a representative each of Hawai'i Homebirth Collective and Hawai'i Midwifery Council to take part in the working group. We support these communities to sit together in a working group to help facilitate a positive working relationship between the medical and holistic sides of childbirth.

Hawai'i is such a unique place where we honor so many cultures and their traditions. We owe it to every birthing parent to honor their choice. Birth rights are HUMAN rights! Please OPPOSE SB1033sd1. Mahalo

TESTIMONY IN STRONG SUPPORT OF SB1033_SD1, RELATING TO THE LICENSURE OF MIDWIVES

Dear Senator Rhoads, Senator Wakai, Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Keith-Agaran and committee members:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **strong support of SB1033_SD1**. Licensing midwives aligns with one of the Senate's 2019 Sustainable Development Goals: Good Health and Well-Being through improving access to quality health care. We agree with both State Auditor's Reports No. 99-14 and No.17-01 determination that the midwifery profession should be regulated. According to Chapter 26H, the Hawai'i Regulatory Licensing Reform Act, the profession of midwifery meets the criteria for regulation of a profession:

- 1) Regulation shall be undertaken only when reasonably necessary to protect health, safety or welfare of consumers of the service- the state auditor found this was the case, midwifery is a part of healthcare, caring for at times two or more clients in one body.
- 2) Regulation in the form of full licensure shall be adopted when the health, safety, or welfare of the consumer may be jeopardized by the nature of the service offered by the provider the state auditor found this to be the case as the nature of midwifery can jeopardize consumers; we have seen this occur in our state without regulation.

- 3) Evidence of abuses by providers of the service shall be accorded great weight in determining whether regulation is desirable we have seen there are many people attending birth who inform consumers they are midwives and advertise midwifery services for fees yet have not met international and national standards of education, training and certification of midwifery, and persons who have had disciplinary actions in other states move here to practice without oversight.
- 4) Regulations which artifically increase the costs of goods and services to the consumer shall be avoided except in those cases where the legislature determines that this cost is exceeded by the potential danger to the consumer the state auditor found that the potential danger to the consumer outweighs the potential increased cost to the consumer. There is no way to determine how regulating midwifery would increase cost to consumer; it is possible it will decrease cost to consumer as insurance companies could elect to cover midwifery services once the providers are licensed.
- 5) Regulation shall be eliminated when the legislature determines that they have no further benefits to consumers a multitude of research demonstrates that midwifery care provides benefits to consumers. The state auditor has given reasons in the past and recently to regulate the profession of midwifery.
- 6) Regulation shall not unreasonably restrict entry into profession by all qualified persons regulation of midwifery would not unreasonably restrict entry into the profession as there are multiple education opportunities in Hawai'i and all qualified midwife categories would be recognized.
- 7) Fees for regulation shall be imposed provided that the fees are not less than the cost to administer the program we believe that the DCCA can achieve a model that is financially sound.

Hawai'i had regulation of midwifery from the early 1930's through 1998; we believe it is time to restore regulation of midwifery in Hawai'i to integrate midwifery within our healthcare system and ensure that all persons who receive maternity and women's health services are provided the opportunity to choose safe and competent care.

We recognize that SB1033_SD1 has many changes from SB1033 and that there are additional amendments that we will recommend in the future. At this time we seek to continue dialogue with the DCCA in order to learn more about a workable model that will achieve the intended outcome of midwifery regulation in the State of Hawai'i.

We believe that women and families in Hawai'i deserve the opportunity to access a midwife who has been certified as having demonstrated international and nationally recognized competencies. We believe that licensing midwives will increase access to midwifery care across Hawai'i, especially in rural communities and neighbor islands. The majority of midwives in Hawai'i who are nationally certified and not nurse-midwives currently live on neighbor islands. Through licensure, midwives will be able to work to their fullest scope and within a collaborative health

care system. According to the Access and Integration Maternity Care Mapping Study (S. Vedam, et al, 2018) the more midwives integrated into the healthcare system, the better outcomes we see for moms and babies. These include increased breastfeeding, vaginal deliveries and vaginal birth after cesareans, and decreased interventions and neonatal death. Currently Hawai'i ranked 40th out of 51 (includes D.C.) in the nation for midwifery integration, meaning we share similar scores with states such as Kentucky, Mississippi, Kansas, and Louisiana. We believe Hawai'i can be a leader in midwifery care once midwives are practicing to their fullest scope.

We urge you to support SB1033_SD1 to establish a regulatory program for the practice of midwifery.

Dear Senators Rhoads, Wakai, Dela Cruz, and Keith-Agaran,

We thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony on behalf of SB 1033 SD1 – A Bill for an Act Relating to the Licensure of Midwives.

The Committee of Midwife Advocates for Certified Midwives (C-MAC) of the American College Nurse-Midwives previously submitted written testimony for SB 1033 in support of licensure of certified professional midwives (CPMs) and certified midwives (CMs). C-MAC continues to be in support of establishing a regulatory process for CPMs and CMs to attain licensure, however we have **strong reservations** regarding SB 1033 SD1.

We request the following amendments to SB1033 S.D. 1:

Problem: inappropriate title protection

As the amended bill SB 1033 S.D. 1 is written, only Certified Professional Midwives will have title protection. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives will be prohibited from referring to themselves as midwives or practicing midwifery. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives should be exempt from title protection in this amended bill.

Committee of Midwife Advocates for the Certified Midwife (CM)



Proposed solution:

- 1) Any licensed person doing work within the scope of practice or duties of the person's profession that overlaps with the practice of midwifery; provided the person does not purport to be a midwife unless the person holds an advanced practice registered nurse license (APRN) as a Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM) pursuant to chapter 457, and/or holds national certification by the American Midwifery Certification Board.
- 2) Under exemptions. (a) Licensure shall not be required of:

(1) Certified Nurse- Midwives (CNMs) who are under the Board of Nursing pursuant to chapter 457 and are licensed as advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) through the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA).

Problem: legal enforcement of unsafe practice

In the current version of the amended bill, there is no provision for Certified Professional Midwives to obtain, carry and administer life-saving medications and preventative medication for the neonate. The amended bill includes no provision to order laboratory tests or diagnostic tests. Without these provisions, this amended bill will result in public harm.

Proposed solution:

Certified Professional Midwives licensed in the state of Hawai'i should have access to every tool of their profession consistent with education, national certification and current evidence-based practice.

Testimony in **OPPOSITION**

Senate Committee on Ways and Means, Honorable Chair DelaCruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran and honorable committee members.

Gentle Beginnings Midwifery stands in STRONG OPPOSITION of SB1033sd1. While we feel that the senate draft 1 is much closer to an inclusive bill, there are many extremely important issues within it that still need to be addressed.

I am a mother to five children ages 3 to 20, four of whom where born at home with non-certified midwives. I had my first baby in a hospital in the 90's. I was so traumatized by that experience, it inspired me to become a midwife. I attended my first birth as a student in 1995. I studied midwifery through the apprenticeship model. It took me 9 years to obtain the skills necessary to be a primary midwife. I was trained by a non-certified midwife, as she was trained by a non-certified midwife, and so on. This bill will not allow me to obtain a license or to continue to practice safely as a non-licensed midwife. How do those of us who will be forced out of practice continue to support our families?

There are estimated to be fewer than 30 homebirth midwives in the state of Hawai'i. Approximately one-third of whom won't qualify for licensure. Licensure for fewer than 20 midwives in Hawai'i is a very costly endeavor, which in turn would create an undue financial burden on the few midwives who would qualify for licensure. It in turn would also create a financial hardship on the consumer who pays out of pocket for their midwife.

Traditional midwives have existed since the beginning of humankind. There are two types of traditional midwives, the certified practical midwife (CPM) and the non-certified traditional midwife (DEM). To be VERY clear, both CPM and DEM midwives are traditional midwives. CPM credentialing began in the mid 1990's. This bill would unfairly disallow many of the state's traditional midwives from obtaining a license or even using their title "midwife." The majority of uncredentialed midwives are the longest practicing, elder midwives within the community.

This bill is discriminatory and culturally insensitive, especially in the state of Hawai'i.

The certifying NARM test:

- 1. takes approximately 8 hours to take
- 2. is only available to be taken at one testing site in the state
- 3. is only available in English

The NARM certifying exam makes no attempt at equal opportunity and is unabashedly discriminatory to non-English speaking midwives.

There is already limited access to specialty healthcare providers on the more rural, less populated outer islands. This bill would serve to further widen a gap of prenatal and postpartum care for those with the greatest need.

Instead of this bill, the majority of Hawai'i's midwives support the creation of an all-inclusive statewide registry for ALL midwives who work in the community birth setting, regardless of their pathway or type of midwifery education. This would also honor the long-standing traditions and cultural practices of the VAST number of cultures represented in Hawai'i. The Hawai'i Midwifery Council, Hawai'i Homebirth Collective, and Mama Hawai'i have already taken the necessary steps to begin this process. The registry would have the elders of the midwifery community sit together on a council to hear complaints and with their collective wisdom, help facilitate a positive working relationship between the medical and holistic sides of childbirth.

Please deeply consider this important decision, it is not a simple or straight forward thing to require certification and licensure of ancient knowledge. There are many recognized pathways of learning midwifery. I believe that if **ALL** parties involved were to come together in a working group, we could find a resolution that doesn't leave any midwife behind in the process. Please invite a homebirth consumer, a non-certified traditional midwife, and a representative each of Hawai'i Homebirth Collective and Hawai'i Midwifery Council to take part in the working group.

Hawai'i is such a unique place where we honor so many cultures and their traditions. We do not try to do things as they are done on the mainland. We owe it to every birthing parent to honor their choice. We owe it to future generations to fight for their birth rights!

Birth rights are HUMAN rights!

Testimony of Laulani Teale, MPH in OPPOSITION to SB 1033, SD1 Relating to the Licensure of Midwives

COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY/WAYS AND MEANS

Aloha and mahalo for this opportunity to testify.

Although I appreciate the good intent of this measure and its amendments, it still is highly problematic and I must oppose it strongly. The issues surrounding birth and midwifery are very complex, and need comprehensive solutions and real communication. I urge you to stop this measure, and instead to support the development of a framework for this communication and solution-building to take place.

Here are some of the major problems with SB 1033 SD1, as it stands:

- The definition of "traditional midwife" is extremely problematic.
 - First, this definition is not traditional at all, in any sense of the term or by any cultural standard.
 - Cultural practices are almost always spiritual in nature. For this reason, they
 must be defined according to the mandates of culture, and not by external
 requirements that do not fit that culture (See Kahuna Statement). This applies to
 all cultures.
 - o "low risk pregnancy" is an arguable term, hotly debatable at best. It is not defined in this bill. This is likely to cause severe conflict in implementation.
 - o "provides the required disclosures to clients that the individual is practicing midwifery in this State without a license to practice midwifery" is just a mess. First, real traditional midwives would not even have access to the language of said disclosure, much less a computer or printer to print them out. Second, the whole sentence is grammatically confusing. This requirement, in essence, is that a traditional midwife with hundreds of years of culture behind her, gives out a paper saying she is not a real midwife.
 - o "does not use legend drugs and devices" is redundant, as these are already prohibited, and not available except by prescription.
 - o "does not advertise as a midwife" is problematic, as the term "advertise" is not defined here, and its boundaries are very unclear.
 - The entire term is externally defined, which goes against culture and traditions, which must be internally defined in order to be considered bona fide. (See quote from Papa Ola Lokahi-convened Kahuna Statement to the Legislature, 1998).

- Astronomical cost issues have not been addressed.
 - o This committee has an obligation to pass only measures that are feasible.
 - \$276,608.00 per year (DCCA's estimate) for 12 to 15 licensed midwives is just not feasible, especially when these costs would be passed on to the families they serve.
 - There is no measurable benefit to consumers for this cost, as a "licensed midwife" is essentially the same as a "NARM-Certified Midwife".

Additionally, existing concerns (in the first version of the bill) remain.

- Consumers are not helped by this measure, which would **limit choices**, **raise prices**, **and provide no measurable safety benefits**.
- The **exemptions do not actually exempt anyone** currently practicing traditional midwifery. For this reason, great damage and endangerment would result in our community.
- Some of the provisions are **unconstitutional**.
- Kanaka Maoli traditional practices are not protected. Again Papa Ola Lokahi does not currently have any mechanism to extend protection to traditional midwives or other birth-related practitioners as such (its mandates are currently strictly for laau lapaau, lomilomi, hooponopono and laau kahea). While this could potentially be developed in the future, at this time such protection would be entirely speculative. Law cannot be based on speculation.
- There is **no reasonable licensure pathway** for Hawai'i clinical midwives who are not CPMs. It is against the Hawai'i Regulatory Licensing Reform Act to offer a licensure pathway to a part of a profession, but not all of it, especially as NARM Certification is practically **logistically impossible** for Hawai'i midwives (thus shifting the recognized practice entirely to those trained outside of Hawai'i). The **costs** involved in licensing such a tiny cohort also need to be assessed prior to structuring legislation, as this Act also requires licensees to bear the full cost of issuance and administration. For a small cohort with complex needs, this could potentially be astronomical.

The lack of protection of traditional practices afforded by the bill's exemptions is serious.

The Kahuna Statement written for the legislature by the leading healers convened by Papa Ola Lokahi on October 31, 1998 (upon which the naming of POL in this bill is based) says clearly:

"...LICENSURE, AND CERTIFICATION ISSUES RAISED IN THE LEGISLATION ARE INAPPROPRIATE AND CULTURALLY

UNACCEPTABLE FOR GOVERNMENT TO ASCERTAIN. THESE ARE THE KULEANA OF THE HAWAIIAN COMMUNITY ITSELF THROUGH KUPUNA WHO ARE PERPETUATING THESE PRACTICES."

It must be remembered that ALL regulation of traditional midwifery limits, alters, and otherwise adversely impacts traditional Native Hawaiian healing, because **the central traditional practice in question is BIRTH**, not midwifery.

Traditional midwives who are not Hawaiian and do not qualify under SB 1033 are extremely important in the traditions that Hawaiian families are reviving from a nearly decimated cultural past. Many young Kanaka Maoli have the oral history of their grandparents to go on, but not much more. Non-Hawaiian traditional midwives play a crucial support role for ensuring safety, confidence and well-being as these traditions are brought back into being. Without them, the practices would still come back, but slower, with more loss and much less safety and support.

What is needed is COMMUNICATION, not regulation of something the State simply cannot understand.

My recommendation is to hold this bill, and instead consider the creation of a body that could effectively bring all concerned parties (DOH, cultural practitioners, traditional birth attendants, CPMs, student midwives, OBGYN/ER doctors, etc) together to build the needed comprehensive solutions to address real consumer protection and safety.

Position: Strongly support the regulation of midwifery and midwives engaged in the practice of midwifery by establishing licensure and regulatory requirements under the department of commerce and consumer affairs.

Dear Senator Rhoads, Senator Wakai, Senator Dela Cruz, Senator Keith-Aragan and Committee members:

We are very concerned about the safety of our mothers and their babies who decide on having a planned community birth and deeply respect the autonomy of women in making decisions for their own health and their pregnancies. Some mothers with low-risk pregnancies can safely deliver their babies outside of a hospital setting with midwives who are nationally certified and meet both national and international standards of education and competencies. However, even low-risk pregnancies can quickly, within a few minutes or even seconds, become high-risk during the labor and delivery process and there are many complications that can occur, particularly with high-risk pregnancies. Hawaii is one of 17 states that does not license or regulate midwives, leaving women in Hawaii with no way of telling who is certified to do a community birth and who is not. Virtually anyone can claim they are qualified to do community births regardless of their training or experience in obstetrics. A licensure process would help patients to determine who is qualified to safely deliver their baby in the community. A licensure process would also provide women with the information needed to make their own informed decisions and therefore would respect the autonomy of women in making their own health decisions.

To ensure that all of Hawaii's mothers and babies have a safe and happy birth experience, we urge you to support the Licensure of Midwives bill, as it is in alignment with one of the Senate's 2019 Sustainable Development Goals: Good Health and Well-Being through improving access to quality health care. This bill will ensure that community birth providers have had formal obstetrics education to care for mothers and their infants, follow patient safety regulations such as no high-risk pregnancy deliveries at home, adequately inform

their patients regarding their educational background and the possible risks of community birth, and require timely completion of birth certificates and other data for all planned home births.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on this very important Women's Health Issue.

Hawaii Maternal and Infant Health Collaborative, founded in 2013, is a public private partnership committed to Improving Birth Outcomes and Reducing Infant Mortality. The Collaborative was developed in partnership with the Executive Office of Early Learning's Action Strategy with help from the Department of Health and National Governors' Association. The Action Strategy provides Hawaii with a roadmap for an integrated and comprehensive early childhood system, spanning preconception to the transition to Kindergarten. The Collaborative helps advance goals within the Action Strategy by focusing on ensuring that children have the best start in life by being welcomed and healthy. The Collaborative has completed a strategic plan and accompanying Logic Model, *The First 1,000 Days*, aimed at achieving the outcomes of 8% reduction in preterm births and 4% reduction in infant mortality. To date over 150 people across Hawaii have been involved in the Collaborative. These members include physicians and clinicians, public health planners and providers, insurance providers and health care administrators. The work is divided into three primary areas, preconception, pregnancy and delivery, and the first year of life, and coordinated by a cross sector leadership team. Work is specific, outcome driven, informed by data and primarily accomplished in small work groups.

Aloha to the Legislators!

Aoki Birthing Care opposes SB1033 SD1. It is still a very badly written bill and it would be a disservice to our community to not have a comprehensive working group where ALL types of midwives and homebirth consumers are represented. It really would be a disservice to pass legislation without fully understanding how it will impact people on all islands.

Problems in the bill/amendment:

 p. 12 lines 9 and 10 which requires all midwives to get full licensure (and certification) by 2024, essentially nullifies the grandmother clause. Solution is to remove this line.

Some thoughts and possible resolutions on the bill are:

- 1. The costs alone to set up a CPM board are not feasible. As you are well aware, midwives do not charge nor get paid often since it is an act of service that we offer, payments received are very minimal. Each midwife to be licensed need a very reasonable licensing fee that makes sense and in balance with their work (\$100-\$300). DCCA's testimony stated the startup cost to be \$270,000 the first year and \$250,000 yearly thereafter to maintain a CPM Board. There are 5 CPMs that would be licensed. Where are the funds for this bill? In the bill there is "____" for the amount for what the midwife's payment would be.
- 2. Appropriates funds from the compliance resolution fund. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD1) What funds are available now? How much?

- 3. All CPMs in Hawaii that use drugs should work under the ACNM board. NARM and ACNM are already working together on standards and protocols. CPMs who do not use drugs should have their own board.
 - The alliance of boards of ACNM (American College of Nurse Midwives), CNM board, and NARM (North American Registry of Midwives), the CPM board, have midwives that are in both organizations because the exam, the protocols and standards are very similar. CNM and CPM both currently do homebirths, although CNM can also work in the hospital.
- 4. Both the "Traditional Midwifery" and "Native Hawaiian Healers description" need to be defined accurately in the bills. These Exemptions are important and would be part of the responsibility of the task force. (Pg 2 and 4 of SB1033 SD1)
- 5. Create the task force that many of us tried to organize in 2014. We suggest the following members must be included for success.

Task Force for Home Birth must include:

- 1 CPM
- 1 Traditional Home Birth Midwife
- 1 kanaka maoli indigenous practitioner of birthing
- 2 homebirth practitioners selected by legislatures
- 1 OB
- 1 ER
- 1 Papa Ola Lokahi representative
- 2 homebirth parents
- 1 non-voting member

Other Notes:

The Hawaii Home Birth Collective have never been consulted as the practitioner and organization that would be affected by this bill about how best to create a path to licensure and how this may affect our families. The misunderstanding that if a practitioner is licensed then that practitioner is good to practice needs a change in perspective as this bill sets the stage for false accusations.

Our concern is that midwifery model of care is separate, different and not a medical model of care such as conducted by OBs and CNMs. By forcing CPMs into a medical

model will destroy the essence of home birth and homebirth midwives. CPMs are not medical midwives, CNMs are. CPMs do not want to be medical midwives, this bill is forcing those who are not medical into medical care. We want to tolerate and exist along side the medical model. We do not see women giving birth as a factory or robots, and women and babies shall never be treated in a way that places them in a factory style care = medical protocol model/OBs/CNMs. Please stop covering up that this bill will not violate human rights or women's right to bodily autonomy or choosing their provider=who will attend their intimate birth.

The Hawai'i Home Birth Collective (HiHBC) and the Hawai'i Home Birth Elders Council strongly oppose SB1033SD1 for many reasons. Primarily we are concerned with its vague problematic language. Our organization represents a wide variety of home birth midwives: Certified Professional Midwives, Certified Nurse Midwives, Naturopathic, Traditional, Cultural, and Biblical Midwives. This reflects the many different pathways through which midwives can be trained.

SB1033SD1 restricts all types of midwives except licensed CPMs to use the title midwife. Our question is if SD1 exempts traditional midwives, can they still call themselves midwives even though it appears in the definition they can't advertise as a midwife? Once again this language is confusing. Also the fact that SD1 does not even list what kinds of midwives will be on the advisory board indicates a lack of understanding of the kinds of midwives that need to be represented on an advisory board.

HiHBC also requests that if the intent of the bill as written is to protect cultural practices then to require licensure within five years in no way supports this intention. The entire section that states all midwives must register and then be licensed must be removed. Please direct the self regulating Hawai'i Home Birth Collective and Hawai'i Home Birth Elders Council to do this job. HiHBC was formed specifically to register all midwives, provide informed consent, collect statistical data on home births in Hawai'i and provide accountability to the community.

Clearly a working group or task force is needed! Please convert this SD1 into a working group or task force and bring all involved parties together at one table to learn how to listen and respect each other for the benefit of all birthing families in Hawai'i and the future of Hawai'i generations to come! A Midwife Elder from our group would be honored to be invited to be part of that task force or working group.

We thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony on behalf of SB 1033 SD1 – A Bill for an Act Relating to the Licensure of Midwives.

The Hawai'i Affiliate of the American College Nurse-Midwives (HAA) previously submitted written and oral testimony for SB 1033 in support of licensure of certified professional midwives (CPMs) and certified midwives (CMs). The HAA continues to be in support of establishing a regulatory process for CPMs and CMs to attain licensure, however we have **strong reservations** regarding SB 1033 SD1.

The executive board of the Hawaii Affiliate of the American College of Nurse Midwives requests amendments to SB1033 S.D. 1 as follows:

Problem: inappropriate title protection

As the amended bill SB 1033 S.D. 1 is written, only Certified Professional Midwives will have title protection. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives will be prohibited from referring to themselves as midwives or practicing midwifery. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives should be exempt from title protection in this amended bill.

Proposed solution:

- 1) Any licensed person doing work within the scope of practice or duties of the person's profession that overlaps with the practice of midwifery; provided the person does not purport to be a midwife unless the person holds an advanced practice registered nurse license (APRN) as a Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM) pursuant to chapter 457, and/or holds national certification by the American Midwifery Certification Board.
- 2) Under exemptions. (a) Licensure shall not be required of:
 - (1) Certified Nurse- Midwives (CNMs) who are under the Board of Nursing pursuant to chapter 457 and are licensed as advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) through the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA).

This bill restricts the practice of and thus the access to traditional midwives. I want to make clear that I am not against licensure for midwives. However I am against SB1033 because of the restrictions it places on traditional and cultural midwives. I ask you to to look to Utah for midwifery licensure, they offer licensure for midwives but they do not require it. Utah allows all types of midwives to practice, and there is transparency about training and education, and the state actively educates their citizens on the differences. Let's not restrict access, let's educate hawaii instead.

I want to highlight the need for integration of birth professionals. We all want to create healthy outcomes for Hawaii's birthing families. Please I ask legislation to create a task force of traditional midwives, OB and licensed midwives.... all who attend birthing families. Please make the licensed and traditional birth attendants all sit together and have dialogue. This is the only way there will be true integration. This is the only way birth will become safer. Let there be a task force so that there is never another case where people have "no idea" what happened. Where they can ask what happened and create open communication. A task force would allow integration and dialogue between all people who attend birthing families. We need inclusion for safer birth... not exclusion. It would be best for this task force (with representation of all birth providers) to sit together and draft a bill. This way it would be agreed upon before spending the senates time. The Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council formed by Elder midwives who represent the variety of midwives in Hawaii would be the best. They have organized to self regulate the home birth midwifery community, work with the medical community and provide accountability. Every homebirth midwife on Oahu is member and it has representation from every island.

If we limit traditional midwives....The professions will be driven farther apart. If the goal is integration it must include everyone. Please create a task force for all birth

professionals and birth attendants so we can create the best care for all birthing families of Hawaii.

Please remove the line "all currently practicing midwives must attain full licensure pursuant to this chapter by January 1, 2024" from this bill. I do not agree with this.

This bill will make many midwives illegal. I am of birthing age and when I choose to have another child the midwife I would choose would be illegal under your new bill. I should get to decide who attends my birth. It is dangerous to restict womens choices. I am outraged that this bill seeks to limit the choices around my body and with whom and how I birth my baby. Its 2019 and women deserve birth autonomy.

It is not the homebirth community that is asking for this restriction to be placed on midwives. Families deserve to have cultural and traditional midwives attend their births, as it has who has been attedning their births since the beginning of time.

Again I oppose SB1033.

Senate Committee on Ways and Means, Honorable Chair DelaCruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran and honorable committee members,

The Hawai'i Midwifery Council stands in **STRONG OPPOSITION** of SB1033sd1.

It is our position that:

- 1. Childbirth is a normal biological function.
- 2. Childbirth is not a medical event.
- 3. Midwifery is not the practice of medicine.

This bill unreasonably restricts entry into the profession by ALL qualified persons by not allowing already practicing midwives to obtain a license. In many parts of the state there is already inadequate access to specialty healthcare; this bill would also further compromise many of Hawai'i's poorer and rural citizens. Requiring mandatory certification for the licensure of midwives, as defined by SB1033sd1 also interferes with body autonomy.

Traditional midwives have existed since the beginning of humankind. Midwife literally means, "with woman." There are two types of traditional midwives, the certified practical midwife (CPM) and the non-certified traditional midwife (DEM). To be VERY clear, both CPM and DEM midwives are traditional midwives. CPM credentialing began in the mid 1990's. This distinction has created a divide amongst traditional midwives, which in turn has created much professional, political, and economic competition between the sides. This bill would unfairly disallow at least one-third of the state's traditional midwives from obtaining a license or even using their title "midwife."

There are estimated to be fewer than 30 CPM and DEM midwives in the state of Hawai'i. In 2014 traditional midwives, both certified and non-certified attended almost 60,000 homebirths in the U.S. This legislation is written to specifically single out the practitioners involved in roughly 2.7% of the annual births in the U.S. Licensure for the fewer than 30 currently practicing unlicensed midwives in Hawai'i is a very costly endeavor, which in turn would create an undue financial burden on the few midwives who would qualify for licensure.

Please also examine how this bill is discriminatory and culturally insensitive in the state of Hawai'i.

With SB1033sd1's requirement of the CPM certification to attain licensure, it will eliminate the ability to seek licensure for at least one third of the state's currently practicing traditional midwives. Many of these are the elders in our communities with the greatest knowledge to share. This bill will make it impossible for them to obtain a license, practice midwifery or even call themselves midwives without first obtaining the CPM certification. Under subsection 6, License required, it clearly says that NO PERSON shall engage in the practice of midwifery or use the title "midwife."

The certifying NARM test:

- 1. takes approximately 8 hours to take
- 2. is only available to be taken at one testing site in the state
- 3. is only available in English

This bill makes no attempt at equal opportunity and is unabashedly discriminatory to non-English speaking midwives.

Globally, as well as in the United States, there are *many recognized pathways* of learning midwifery. Each holds their own unique place in the intricate web of our society. We cannot simply eliminate the oldest and most ancient version of a midwife without great consideration, especially with something as comparatively modern as legislation. The 1931 regulation of midwives in Hawai'i came on the heels of the illegal occupation and annexation of the Hawai'ian Kingdom in yet another way to attempt to eradicate its unique culture and rituals. The Hawai'i Midwifery Council believes that the repeal of this requirement in 1998 was done with great wisdom. The repeal allowed a legal split between the two groups of midwives. Allowing the nurse midwives to seek hospital privileges and prescriptive rights while allowing the traditional and cultural midwives to once again serve their communities without fear of prosecution.

Under subsection 6, License required; we ask for clarity where it says;

- 1. "no person shall engage in the practice of midwifery, or use the title "midwife."
 - (A) What is the non-certified midwife supposed to call herself, she IS a midwife?

Under subsection 7, Exemptions; we ask for clarity surrounding the following exemptions:

- 1. The exemption for "a person administering care to a spouse, parents, sibling, or child makes no allowance for unmarried partners, unconventional relationships, and hanai family members.
- 2. Where is the actual exemption for traditional midwives? SB1033sd1 clearly states that,
 - (A) Does not obtain, carry or administer legend drugs or devices. This puts birthing people and their children at risk.
 - (B) Does not advertise as a midwife.

This will take away the jobs of at least 10 midwives and further create a shortage of prenatal care to birthing persons state wide. In Hawai'i there is often limited access to specialty healthcare providers, especially on rural, less populated outer islands. This bill would serve to further widen a gap of prenatal and postpartum care for the ohanas with the greatest need.

The WHO has declared a global midwife shortage, declaring the immediate need for 500,000 midwives. An analysis done in 2011 by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) on 58 countries found a shortage of 350,000 midwives. SB1033sd1 is unwelcome in this context.

Instead of certification and licensure, Hawai'i's midwives would like to see the implementation of an all-inclusive statewide registry for ALL midwives who would like to be listed, regardless of their pathway or type of midwifery education. This would also honor the long-standing traditions and cultural practices of the VAST number of cultures represented in Hawai'i. The Hawai'i Midwifery Council working with the Hawai'i Homebirth Collective, LLC, and Mama Hawai'i have already taken the necessary steps to begin this process. Within this registry we would like to see the elders of the community sit together on a council that will hear complaints and with their collective wisdom, help facilitate a positive working relationship between the medical and holistic sides of childbirth.

Please deeply consider this important decision, it is not a simple or straight forward thing to require certification and licensure of ancient knowledge. Perhaps if ALL parties involved were to come together in a working group, we could find a resolution that doesn't leave any midwives behind in the process. Please invite a homebirth consumer, a non-certified traditional midwife, and a representative each of Hawai'i Homebirth Collective and Hawai'i Midwifery Council to take part in the working group.

Hawai'i is and has always been a unique place where we honor so many cultures and their traditions. We do not seek to do things as they are done on the mainland, we do them our own way. We owe it to every birthing parent to honor their culture and their ohana's birthing traditions. We owe it to future generations to fight for their birth rights! Birth rights are HUMAN rights!

Relating to The Licensure of Midwives

My name is Michael Robinson, Vice President, Government Relations & Community Affairs at Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system comprised of its four medical centers – Kapi'olani, Pali Momi, Straub and Wilcox and over 70 locations statewide with a mission of creating a healthier Hawai'i.

I am writing to offer comments on SB 1033, SD1 which establishes licensing for midwives in Hawaii. The bill creates a licensing scheme and oversight of the practice of midwifery which will improve consumer safety and afford greater quality of care for women who elect to deliver with a midwife and for their babies. However, we are concerned with certain aspects as outlined below.

- More specificity is needed to delineate educational requirements of certified professional midwives in order to obtain licensure and address scope of practice.
- More specificity is needed to acknowledge that licensed midwives should be authorized to obtain and administer certain legend drugs we feel are critical to have in deliveries such as oxygen, anti-hemorrhagic agents and epinephrine for neonatal resuscitation, to name a few.

Language addressing the above concerns was contained in the original version of SB 1033 and should be reinserted. While it is important to respect mother's choices with regards to delivery options, the safety and wellbeing of the unborn baby appear to be overlooked and must be considered.

Aloha to the Chairs, Vice-Chairs and members of the committees.

Papa Ola Lōkahi (POL), as a rule, leaves the discussion of certification and licensure to the communities of those professions. At this time, we have not identified any Hawaiian certified professional midwives that would be impacted by such a law, and just one student who may be impacted in 2020 or later.

As the Native Hawaiian Health Board, POL is solely interested in assuring Hawaiian cultural practices around pregnancy and childbirth, hāpai and hānau, are preserved and protected, as articulated in the Hawai'i State Constitution (Article XII, Sec. 7).

The Native Hawaiian Health Care Improvement Act (Title 42 USC 122) – through which Congress has established Papa Ola Lōkahi, the five Native Hawaiian Health Care Systems, and the Native Hawaiian Health Scholarship Program – recognizes and affirms Native Hawaiian determination to preserve, maintain and transmit spiritual and traditional beliefs, customs and practices.

The Hawai'i State Constitution reaffirms the "unique right of the Native Hawaiian people to practice and perpetuate their cultural and religious beliefs ..." Specifically, HRS 453-2 exempts traditional Hawaiian healing practitioners from medical licensure and designates Papa Ola Lōkahi with recognizing Kupuna Councils of traditional Hawaiian healers.

By virtue of these kuleana, our interest is in assuring that Hawaiian traditional practices of hāpai and hānau, by pale keiki and other practitioners, are not outlawed. To cover the full spectrum of hāpai and hānau in the proposed exemption, we would have the word "prenatal" changed to "perinatal." Should this bill advance, Papa Ola Lōkahi is preparing to accept the kuleana required to exempt practitioners.

Papa Ola Lōkahi is available to answer questions about Kupuna Councils. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to offer comments on SB 1033 SD1.

This is Leah Aquino. I'm the Molokai Representative of the Hawaii Midwifery Council.

I oppose this legislation because a small, yet important group of people would be put at a serious disadvantage if it were to be passed. There are traditional midwives in Hawaii that are not native Hawaiian. These women have attended hundreds of births and made connections with families and other midwives throughout the islands. If this legislation were to pass, these midwives would not be allowed to carry necessary equipment for their safe practice.

Women need to feel comfortable with their prenatal and midwifery care provider. It is highly possible that a woman would feel more comfortable with a tradtional midwife who has safely and successfully attended hundreds of births, including the births of friends and relatives, than the most recent transplant to the island that has just gotten out of school.

Please allow all women access to make their own choices, and allow all types of midwives a legal choice. If you have question about why this is so important, look to the Scandinavian countries where many more births are attended by midwives than doctors, c-section rates are vastly lower than the United States, and both maternal and neonatal death rates are much, much lower as well. Humans are well designed to give birth, and women have been assisting other women through the process since the very beginning. Credentials have never been required or necessary.

I am a Maternal-Fetal Medicine physician working at the University of Hawaii, John A. Burns School of Medicine, Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Women's Health. I provide high risk obstetric and diagnostic fetal imaging services at various hospitals on Oahu. I also teach medical students, residents and fellows how to provide compassionate, scientifically-based, women's health care. My views are my own and do not represent the University of Hawaii where I am an Assistant Professor. I am writing in strong support of SB 1033.

I am very concerned about the safety of our mothers and their babies who decide on having a planned community birth and deeply respect the autonomy of women in making decisions for their own health and pregnancies. Hawaii is one of 17 states that does not license or regulate midwives, leaving women in Hawaii with no way of telling who is certified to do a community birth and who is not. Virtually anyone can claim they are qualified to do community births regardless of their training or experience in obstetrics. A licensure process would help patients to determine who is qualified to safely deliver their baby in the community. A licensure process would also provide women with the information needed to make their own informed decisions and therefore would respect the autonomy of women in making their own health decisions.

To protect the safety of all Hawaii's mothers and babies, I urge you to support the Licensure of Midwives bill. This bill will ensure that community birth providers have had formal obstetrics education to care for mothers and their infants, follow patient safety regulations such as no high-risk pregnancy deliveries at home, adequately inform their patients regarding their educational background and the possible risks of community birth, and require timely completion of birth certificates and other data for all planned home births.

Because women's birth choices can be as individual as they are, I hope that this bill is held until a diverse group of women's healthcare practitioners can come to the table to contribute to the crafting of the bill -- mainstream women's healthcare providers such as OB-GYN physicians, CMs, CPMs, cultural practitioners, traditional birth attendants, religious practitioners and others in this diverse community.

I have another concern as well: Confining cultural and religious midwives to serve exclusively those "in that distinct cultural or religious group" sounds unconstitutional. Shouldn't every pregnant woman be allowed to be assisted by whomever they choose, free of racial and religious restriction?

My name is Nicole Floyd, I am mother and teacher here in our community.

I oppose HB 1033 for the following reasons:

- Regulating how, with whom and where someone gives birth interferes with reproductive rights, birth autonomy, privacy rights and birth traditions. My primary concern is for the welfare of mothers and babies and the preservation of culture, tradition and people's choices. Practitioners from the medical model, the midwifery model and the community have been establishing communication to sincerely and respectfully listen to each other and collaborate on comprehensive solutions to existing concerns. This is the answer, rather than the state governing how one births.
- This bill currently tries to regulate a profession without an in depth understanding of the various practitioners, roles and responsibilities involved in home birth practices. The medical hospital-based model it imposes doesn't take into account the population it is regulating and doesn't accurately represent the different models of home birthing.
- Every year that midwifery regulation comes up in legislation the community makes it clear they do not support governmental control. The proposed legislation will not make home births safer, will not improve quality or enhance provider availability to those who seek it. The practice of midwifery has been responsible, accountable and informally regulating itself since its conception. In response to pressures from outside the home birth community to formally regulate, The Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council has been created, reflecting the variety of practices that exist in Hawaii with over 200 years of combined home birth experience.. This Council shall be self-defined and self-regulated. Birth sovereignty must be left in the hands of the people, not the government.

For these reasons and more I strongly oppose HB 1033

Aloha!

I appreciate the desire to assist women and provide for their safety, but this bill is dangerous and must be opposed.

I do understand that the idea is that women are in danger when supported by unlicensed midwives, but this is absolutely not the case. This bill is written with the idea in mind that there is really only one type of midwife and that women obtain midwives for only one reason: to have a medical style childbirth at home.

Licensed midwives are a wonderful asset to our community for those women who want that type of midwife. However, many women choose care with unlicensed midwives exactly because they are unlicensed.

When a midwife is licensed, she is required to obey the rules of her licensure or she will lose her license. A very large number of women do not want the constant and specific testing required by licensed midwives by law, so they specifically choose unlicensed midwives for that reason. For many women, choosing a home birth occurs because of abuse they have already received at the hands of a doctor or a more medical midwife and they are looking for something less intrusive.

The fact is that when midwives are forced under licensure, an entire, huge subculture of home birthers are suddenly prevented from obtaining necessary medical care. If they cannot afford the licensed midwives, they typically choose to go unassisted. If they cannot get unobtrusive care because licensed midwives are not allowed to be as handsoff as the mothers desire, these mothers go unassisted.

Unassisted (completely alone) childbirth can be beautiful and is legal and an option for some, but by removing unlicensed midwives, you will be creating a large group of women who will choose unassisted because they cannot obtain the medical care they need on THEIR TERMS. Women who have been abused by the system do not choose to go with hospital care in lieu of this. They choose to go alone.

We know this because we see it everywhere in the United States where midwifery and lay midwifery (direct-entry or unlicensed) have been outlawed. The women in these

states choose unasisted rather than be put through their previous medical birth experiences and in women with a history of issues or in women who have not had adequate time to prepare for an unassisted birth, this can be dangerous to the mother and the baby.

Like abortion, if you remove a woman's right to choose, she will still choose to do what she wants, you are only making it less safe.

It is wonderful that you are choosing to allow only traditional Hawaiian midwives to practice unlicensed, but there are many cultures around the world and ALL of them deserve respect. We all deserve to have traditional midwives of our own culture to assist in our pregnancies and deliveries.

Do not allow this bill to pass. It is harmful to women in so many ways and will put both women and babies in danger.

There is nothing wrong requiring midwives to disclose their education status, but removing a woman's right to choose who is with her when she gives birth or where she can give birth is morally wrong and must not be allowed to corrupt our community.

I am a certified professional midwife with a small practice on Maui. I strongly support licensure and regulation of midwives (including myself). I want the protection for myself and for the community that licensure and regulation provides.

I want the broader integration into the health care system so I can more effectively collaborate with other providers when it is needed. Currently on Maui, two of the largest OB/Gyn practices, including the federally qualified heath center, are refusing to see patients who have even considered a community-based midwife for their care. And if after determining that they are having a healthy pregnancy a family decides to choose a community-based midwife, they are not only denied care by these practices—they are denied care for the rest of their lives. Meaning, for all future pregnancies or for any gynecological care they will either need to switch insurance companies (not always possible, for instance for families on Quest) or fly to Oahu to recieve care. This is not sustainable for families, and will simply cause more tension and poor outcomes for families.

Licensing and regulation will help by ensuring that all midwives have had proper training and education (one of the problems that Ob/Gyns on Maui are citing), that midwives are held accountable to the community (another of the problems cited by Maui Ob/Gyns) and that families are informed and protected.

I do feel amendments need to be made to SB 1033, but I have confidence in the work the Midwives Alliance of Hawaii is doing to make sure that this bill makes sense for midwives and families.

It is time for the state of Hawaii to protect families and become a leader in health care. Support midwives and pass this bill.

- 3) Only 6 of all the home birth midwives on all the Hawaiian islands want regulation, none on Oahu, and perhaps only 10-12 could get licensed if this bill went into effect, and yet the government is willing to spend probably a quarter of a million dollars a year to license this group when there are really no hard statistics that there is a problem with safety or availability and the people are not asking for it! Problem: inappropriate title protection

As the amended bill SB 1033 S.D. 1 is written, only Certified Professional Midwives will have title protection. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives will be prohibited from referring to themselves as midwives or practicing midwifery. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives should be exempt from title protection in this amended bill.

Proposed solution:

- 1) Any licensed person doing work within the scope of practice or duties of the person's profession that overlaps with the practice of midwifery; provided the person does not purport to be a midwife unless the person holds an advanced practice registered nurse license (APRN) as a Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM) pursuant to chapter 457, and/ or holds national certification by the American Midwifery Certification Board.
- 2) Under exemptions. (a) Licensure shall not be required of:
- (1) Certified Nurse- Midwives (CNMs) who are under the Board of Nursing pursuant to chapter 457 and are licensed as advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) through the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA).

So like all hospitals I got what ever doctor was on call. I had preeclampsia and it was a very stressful time for me. I didn't really understand what it was and what the procedures were that they were doing to me. I was very uncomfortable and being a first time mother was already weighing on my shoulder. I feel that if my midwife was able to have privilege's at the hospital I chose and see the whole process through I wouldn't have been so stressed out. We had be come friends which is not something you can say for some Doctors. After I had my daughter over the course of 2 years being in contact with her she had told me that she wasn't able to stay at the clinic she was at. Just finding out that I was pregnant again I was devastated and stressed even more then a first time mother expecting her second baby I saw numerous doctors trying to feel comfortable with them and feeling the same type of relationship I had with my midwife and none of them came close. I was completely overwhelmed and not ready to go through my 2nd pregnancy. I contacted my midwife/friend and asked her if there was anything she could do to help me find someone that would make me comfortable, after numerous attempts and tries with different types of doctors there was No one I felt comfortable with. After all of that and still not finding anyone She had offered me her services at an affordable manageable rate and she would come and do house visits with me until my time to deliver. Of course I knew from my previous birth that she could not be more active in the delivery part because of hospital liabilities and insurance issues. So again I had preeclampsia And with that I know that I have to get induced to keep me from having a Stroke. I was so grateful to my midwife for being there as soon as I checked in not as a midwife care provider but as my friend who could help guide me through All the steps they were taking she knew exactly what I wanted she knew my birth plan and how I wanted to deliver my baby she made sure that she communicated my concerns to all the doctors that were on call who were attending me. Aloha to the Legislators!

I am a Kaua'i CPM and I oppose SB1033 SD1. It is still a very badly written bill and it would be a disservice to our community to not have a comprehensive working group where ALL types of midwives and homebirth consumers are represented. It really would be a disservice to pass legislation without fully understanding how it will impact people on all islands.

I had to move from Kaua`i to receive training and education for 3 years. The cost to move, to live where you do not have family for support, to work in an environment that is not your home which you wish to serve most, the non-payment for training for 3 years, moving back costs...these are real problems and hinderances but I did it for the community who wanted more options in home birth care. I was blessed with excellent midwives who trained me but not being integrated in your community during the training had a lot of loss that I cannot recreate or fill because I could not be here, it was not available. This bill will further instigate difficulty in accessing midwives and training for midwifery students.

Problems in the bill/amendment:

 p. 12 lines 9 and 10 which requires all midwives to get full licensure (and certification) by 2024, essentially nullifies the grandmother clause. Solution is to remove this line.

Some thoughts and possible resolutions on the bill are:

- 1. The costs alone to set up a CPM board are not feasible. As you are well aware, midwives do not charge nor get paid often since it is an act of service that we offer, payments received are very minimal. Each midwife to be licensed need a very reasonable licensing fee that makes sense and in balance with their work (\$100-\$300). DCCA's testimony stated the startup cost to be \$270,000 the first year and \$250,000 yearly thereafter to maintain a CPM Board. There are 5 CPMs that would be licensed. Where are the funds for this bill? In the bill there is "_____" for the amount for what the midwife's payment would be.
- 2. Appropriates funds from the compliance resolution fund. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD1) What funds are available now? How much?
- 3. All CPMs in Hawaii that use drugs should work under the ACNM board. NARM and ACNM are already working together on standards and protocols. CPMs who do not use drugs should have their own board.
 - The alliance of boards of ACNM (American College of Nurse Midwives), CNM board, and NARM (North American Registry of Midwives), the CPM board, have midwives that are in both organizations because the exam, the protocols and standards are very similar. CNM and CPM both currently do homebirths, although CNM can also work in the hospital.
- 4. Both the "Traditional Midwifery" and "Native Hawaiian Healers description" need to be defined accurately in the bills. These Exemptions are important and would be part of the responsibility of the task force. (Pg 2 and 4 of SB1033 SD1)
- 5. Create the task force that many of us tried to organize in 2014. We suggest the following members must be included for success.

Task Force for Home Birth must include:

- 1 CPM
- 1 Traditional Home Birth Midwife
- 1 kanaka maoli indigenous practitioner of birthing
- 2 homebirth practitioners selected by legislatures
- 1 OB
- 1 ER
- 1 Papa Ola Lokahi representative
- 2 homebirth parents
- 1 non-voting member

Other Notes:

I nor the Hawaii Home Birth Collective have never been consulted as the practitioner and organization that would be affected by this bill about how best to create a path to licensure and how this may affect our families. The misunderstanding that if a practitioner is licensed then that practitioner is good to practice needs a change in perspective as this bill sets the stage for false accusations. There has been many HIPPA violations in hearings from ACOG, ACNM, CNMs, I think they forget how small the community of homebirth is as we know who they are speaking of, and we have not heard them receiving permission from families to utilize their health stories. Please note they need to be reminded and regulated through their organizations their own protocols and laws in violation before concerning about anything outside of their scope = home birth.

My concern is that midwifery model of care is separate, different and not a medical model of care such as conducted by OBs and CNMs. By forcing CPMs into a medical model will destroy the essence of home birth and homebirth midwives. Of course, if that is the intent of this bill, I can see how you will pass it right along to the next committee. CPMs are not medical midwives, CNMs are. CPMs do not want to be medical midwives, this bill is forcing those who are not medical into medical care. We want to tolerate and exist along side the medical model. I write today to express how important midwife licensure is for the state of Hawaii, its women, and its children. I am currently five months pregnant and in those five months, I have endured a lack of care that should not be possible in today's day and age from both my insurance provider and the obstetrics area that works with them. I elected to go with a midwife for my prenatal and birth care for many reasons, chief among them being the level of personal care and the availability of my health care provider. My midwife not only sees me on the normal monthly basis, but is available on an almost continual basis via phone and text should I have any questions or need any help. As a first-time mother who lives 5000 miles away from her nearest family member, this accessibility of care is important to me. Additionally, the midwife not only provides medical care, but also emotional support. It is her first priority to make sure that my whole well-being is cared for; not only my child. She and I are partners in this care, and one of her main objectives is to keep me informed and provide me with everything I need to understand what is happening so that I can make as informed decisions as I can. This is drastically different than the care I have received by more 'traditional' medical professionals and their insurance counterparts. My initial OB/GYN provider refuses to see pregnant women after 12 twelve weeks, so this left me needing to find an OB to whom I could transfer. I made appointment after appointment, and I was turned away time and time again. Many of them did not even let me make it past the first minute of a phone conversation. Not a single OB doctor on island would see me. Electing to have the personal care a midwife provides excluded me from any and all "traditional" medical care. As midwives in the state of Hawaii are precluded from licensure, this also prevents my midwife from sending in lab work, ordering the tests that I need for my child, as well as enabling her to refer me to specialists should something go wrong. As it turns out, this became necessary in my case. Working closely with my midwife, we found a supportive Naturopath ND who is able to order tests for me. One of those tests was a routine ultrasound. My husband and I went in expecting to see a perfectly healthy baby and find out the gender of our child. One of these things happened. In the course of the ultrasound, the radiologist found a spot on or near the lungs of my baby. This would require further testing, as Maui does not have the imaging technology to see with any clarity or definition what it could be. A trip to Oahu became necessary. The radiologist and the ND felt it was necessary to refer me to The Fetal Diagnostic Center at Kapiolani. The referral was made. The appointment set.

However, Kapiolani is an entire island away and I am a high school teacher with little salary. A plane trip with a week's advance notice is not something we can afford, especially given how expensive the ticket prices are. My insurance, HMSA, is supposed to cover travel. However, since my ND is not an HMSA provider, they refused to accept the travel request-- they would not provide travel for a medically necessary test in a high risk situation. We tried numerous ways to get around this. I am currently waiting on our last gasp attempt-- but at best I will not find out whether or not my travel has been approved, let alone arranged until the day before I am meant to leave for my appointment. This situation has required hours of waiting on hold, pleading with my former care providers to send the request and and immeasurable amount of stress and quite a few anxiety attacks. I already have a documented anxiety disorder; to be told that a) there's potentially something wrong with my child, and b) that getting the care we needed to take care of him may be prevented by the apathy of the bureaucratic red tape is both incredibly cruel and literally detrimental to the health of my child and myself. None of this would have happened if my midwife were able to have the license and ability to provide the care my baby and I need. One fax and one phone call later, and everything would have been settled.

Going forward, it is incredibly important to have midwives have the availability to care for their clients. Passing this is absolutely necessary to care for the keiki of our islands and the mothers that bring them to life. I urge you in no uncertain terms to do what is right for mothers and babies and support the licensure of midwives in the state of Hawaii.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony. My name is Jacqueline Gupton, and I have lived, worked and been part of the Kona community on the Big Island for over 20 years. My husband was raised in Hawaii since the age of 8, and we have raised our 3 children, now ages 16, 14 & 13, here in Kona. My husband and I sought out a traditional midwife for our first pregnancy in 2002 because we wanted a homebirth, and used our local contacts to inquire about finding the right Midwife. Her reputation preceded her, as she was described to us as the most knowledgeable and skilled midwife we would ever meet. This became very evident in that first meeting, (through to the birth of our 3 children, continuing through the 15 years we have come to know and love her). We naturally asked for her credentials at that initial meeting, and although she had no license or certificate to show us, she told us how many births she had attended. She could have given us any number to exemplify her experience, but rather than focus on the number, she described to us the types of births she had been a midwife for, the different challenges both the women and the babies presented during labor and delivery, and how she had handled or overcome these challenges with successful outcomes. She described in great detail how she had used her lifelong skills from catching hundreds of babies (including many when she lived in Costa Rica where the nearest first aid facility was 40 miles away) to her philosophy on how to offer the very best pre and postnatal care for both momma and baby. We were most moved by her deep respect and love for the Islands, and how the energy of birth and that of the Island intertwined to connect us all.

Because of the amazing birth experiences I had with my own children, along with a natural calling, I am currently an apprenticing midwife on the Big Island and a member of the Hawaii Midwifery Council. My teachers/preceptors are both Traditional Midwives, and one of these preceptors is the very midwife who attended all 3 of my children's births, and I have described above. My other preceptor is her former student/apprentice, now a practicing traditional midwife, who is 'paying it forward' by also taking me under her wing to pass along this beautiful knowledge and tradition. I have chosen to apprentice with these wonderful women and Midwives for obvious reasons given in this testimony, however, if SB1033 passes, I will be robbed of the opportunity to learn the art of Midwifery from these great women. Not the profession, but the ART of Midwifery. SB1033 needs to recognize the resource within our midwifery apprenticeship tradition and offer other avenues for both legal practice and education as a traditional midwife. Simply requiring the taking of a written test to acquire national

licensure for the legal ability to practice midwifery in Hawaii dismisses the decades of experience and practice held by traditional midwives. Provisions need to be made for the inclusion of Traditional Midwives regarding legalization and regulation of the profession in Hawaii. I write and respectfully request your consideration of this testimony.

My name is Babatunji Heath,

I oppose SB1033 SD1 because despite the dramatic revisions and obvious attempts to reign in the more restrictive and confusing language of SB1033 it still falls short.

It will not make home birthing safer as it will force midwives of all kinds to practice outside of the law again. Taking us back to the situation that existed when midwifery was 'regulated' in Hawaii.

SB1033 SD1 fails to bridge the gap between the home birth community and obstetricians. A task that Senators recognized in past years needed to be addressed before a well drafted bill could be introduced. A mandated 'Task Force' or 'Working Group' needs to be formed as the various 'Stake Holders' did not work together in 2018 as prescribed to draft this bill. On one side, the community of midwives, now represented by Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council, gathered to discuss licensure and self regulation and proposed a bill of their own to protect birthing choices. On the other side Nurse Midwives, ACOG and the Department of Health worked together and SB1033, a bill that favors a particular medicalized model of midwifery was submitted. Sadly, the two often opposing sides did not work together. As result Senators are once again dealing with bill that faces much opposition.

A bill of this nature has the opportunity to improve all birth experiences and outcomes accross the board. If communication between obstetricians and midwives could be improved we would have a better chance of reducing the rising rate of maternal mortality and cesarians as well as dangerous last minute hospital transports of women with complications who fear mistreatment by hospital staff because of their choice to have a home birth.

Furthermore, simply making the statement "The legislature notes that practicing midwifery according to this Act does not impede one's ability to incorporate or provide cultural practices" does not protect cultural practitioners if the language of the bill undermines it i.e. "No person shall engage in the practice of midwifery without a valid license issued pursuant to this chapter" Since receiving said license may require a cultural practitioner to change their techniques and adapt their practice to meet the standards now imposed.

Lastly SB1033 is a not an economical use of our tax dollars. It's irresponsible to spend nearly a quarter million dollars a year to license perhaps 10 midwives when there has been no call from the home birth community for regulation nor is there any true hard evidence that home births in Hawaii have poorer outcomes than hospital births in Hawaii.

I hope you will consider these points and join me in opposing SB1033 SD1.

As a CNM and former director of the midwifery education program at Emory University, but currently living in Manoa, I wish to state that I continue in support of SB1033 but with **strong reservations** as it is now amended as S.D. 1.

As the amended bill SB 1033 S.D. 1 is written, only Certified Professional Midwives will have title protection. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives will be prohibited from referring to themselves as midwives or practicing midwifery. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives should be exempt from this amended bill and it should so state in the bill.

Proposed solution:

- Any licensed person doing work within the scope of practice or duties of the
 person's profession that overlaps with the practice of midwifery; provided the
 person does not purport to be a midwife unless the person holds an advanced
 practice registered nurse license (APRN) as a Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM)

IN OPPOSITION

Aloha, I strongly urge you to oppose SB1033. While at first glance this bill may appear to protect women, in actuality it will LIMIT womens rights.

I am a proud veteran who was born and raised here in Hawaii. I have given birth to 3 beautiful children in the past 6 years. With my recent pregnancies I have experienced both standard obstetric hospital (OBGYN/Nurse) care as well as out of hospital midwifery care. I can say without question that the care I received in the hospitals by OBGYNs/Nurses was substandard to the care I received by midwives at home here in Hawaii. I could give countless examples, from the amount of regular tests and checkups, to the thoroughness of my appointments and the continuity of care - Hawaii midwives were far superior in knowledge, indepth of care and followup.

SB1033 would force Hawaii midwives to follow the standard obstetric hospital model of care. This is backwards. The US ranks 47th in the world for maternal mortality and 98% of births are taking place in hospitals. Clearly the medical model for birth is not solving this crisis. Perhaps OBGYNs and Nurses in the standard obstetric model should be forced to be educated and regulated using the midwifery model.

HB490 would limit the rights of women. Women like me, who have defended our Nation and have full medical insurance that will cover hospital care and birth, and yet I have chosen to spend my hard earned personal money on the incredible service of midwives. More and more women in Hawaii are choosing to spend money out of their own pocket for the services of midwives. Why would women be doing this?

It would be a great tragedy to force over regulation and licensure on Hawaii midwives. SB1033 would unreasonably restrict entry into the midwifery profession by qualified people. SB1033 would also cause an artificial increase in the cost of midwifery services as a direct result of regulation.

As we have seen with the midwife situation in Oregon, legislation was passed promising regulation would help insurance to cover the cost of midwives. In actuality the laws have limited Oregon women's midwife choices, and created disastrous situations where midwives who have cared for women throughout their pregnancy and have helped women during hours and sometimes days of labor get paid zero dollars if they end up transferring to a hospital for an emergency. Clearly this situation endangers the lives of women and babies and is a direct result of the legislation that Oregon passed.

Women in Hawaii should have the right to choose the type of care they wish receive during their pregnancies and deliveries. Hawaii midwives are incredible, life saving invaluable assets for Hawaii's future. Let us learn from their tremendous knowledge and centuries of practice and not oppress them and force them to adopt the broken obstetric medical model of education and care. I STRONGLY URGE you to stand up for WOMENS RIGHTS and OPPOSE SB1033.

Aloha honorable JDC Chair Karl Rhoads, JDC Vice Chair Glenn Wakai, WAM Chair Donovan Dela Cruz, WAM Vice Chair Gilbert Keith-Agaran and all committee members of JDC and WAM,

I appreciate your careful attention to the testimony you receive regarding SB1033 SD1 and realize since there is no opportunity to testify orally you will be relying on written testimony and any communication you can gather from concerned parties ahead of time. Please I would encourage you to contact me for any questions you may have that could help you better make a decision at the public decision making session on Tuesday February 26, 2019 or a different vote on the floor the following day.

Many of us are very concerned that SD1 does not clarify or correct the problems of the original SB1033, in fact in adds additional problems. I strongly opposed SB1033 and I am strongly opposing SD1 as it stands. More importantly since you are the two committees responsible for the legal and financial concerns for this bill I see big problems in both of these areas. Because of the vague language regarding "midwife," the fact that they took out "cultural and spiritual exemptions" and the fact that it is not clear who exactly needs to register, the attorneys I have consulted with agree there could be many legal arguments about what this bill really means. In addition only six home birth midwives in all the Hawaiian islands want this regulation, none on Oahu, and maybe 10-12 would seek licensure if this bill were to pass. How can the government justify over a quarter of a million dollars a year or more to pay for this when there is no statistical evidence to show that there is a problem and the community is not asking for this? In other states where there are more CPMs perhaps this is a more viable option. In Hawaii it simply is not at this time.

If you want to push this bill forward, please further amend it restrict people from calling themselves either a licensed midwife or a licensed CPM, and DO NOT restrict people from calling themselves a "midwife." In addition, specifically take out the entire section that states all midwives must register and leave that to the self regulating Hawaii Home Birth Collective organization that is already formed to register all midwives, provide informed consent, collect statistical data and provide accountability to the community.

One of the challenges Hawai'i Legislators seem to have in regulating midwives is the difficulty in understanding clearly the differences between a hospital birth, community birth, birth center birth, free standing birth center birth, home birth, free birth, a CNM, CM, CPM, direct entry midwife, traditional midwife, cultural/spiritual midwife, doula, or the different organizations ACOG, ACNM, MAH, and HiHBC. It has been mentioned that the stakeholders met together before this bill was written, and it must be noted that is simply not a true statement. There are clearly many more stakeholders than one might think! Once again I am more than happy to meet with any of you to provide any further information on any of the places of birth, people or organizations mentioned above.

Clearly a working group or task force is needed! Please convert this SD1 into a working group or task force and bring all involved parties together at one table to learn how to listen and respect each other for the benefit of all birthing families in Hawai'i and the future of Hawai'i generations to come!

I am the Hawai'i Affiliate of the American College Nurse-Midwives (HAA) President and our executive board previously submitted written and oral testimony for SB 1033 in support of licensure of certified professional midwives (CPMs) and certified midwives (CMs).

I continue to be in support of establishing a regulatory process for CPMs and CMs to attain licensure, however I have **strong reservations** regarding SB 1033 SD1.

As a Certified Nurse Midwife practicing midwifery in the state of Hawaii, I request amendments to SB1033 S.D. 1 as follows:

Problem: inappropriate title protection

As the amended bill SB 1033 S.D. 1 is written, only Certified Professional Midwives will have title protection. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives will be prohibited from referring to themselves as midwives or practicing midwifery. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives should be exempt from title protection in this amended bill.

Proposed solution:

- 1. Any licensed person doing work within the scope of practice or duties of the person's profession that overlaps with the practice of midwifery; provided the person does not purport to be a midwife unless the person holds an advanced practice registered nurse license (APRN) as a Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM) pursuant to chapter 457, and/ or holds national certification by the American Midwifery Certification Board.
- 2. Under exemptions. (a) Licensure shall not be required of:

I am a mother of 3 children, one born at Kapi'olani, one born at a mainland hospital, and the youngest born at home. After stressful experiences delivering at hospitals, I chose to birth my youngest at home. I did my research and selected an experienced, competent midwife. I asked important questions and felt completely comfortable and trusted her. She did a far more thorough job at my regular prenatal appointments than my OB (I saw both concurrently) and I trusted she would discover any potential issues much sooner.

For my delivery, I rented a pool to have a water birth. It was set up a few days before I went into labor, and my midwife kept in touch as I went through the early stages of labor. When labor advanced, she arrived, and helped me guide my son into the world. Despite his large size- 8lbs 12oz, 22 1/4" and a 14.5" head- I didn't tear and and no complications. Everything went smoothly and I was able to rest and recover at home.

This bill would eliminate my choice to deliver safely at home and force women to choose between delivering at a hospital or at home unattended- which is surely far less safe than having a trained and experienced midwife present. The risks of homebirth are very low when attended by a midwife, and eliminating this option will hurt women. The cost of my delivery and prenatal care was just \$3,000, and for women who don't have adequate insurance it's much less expensive than a routine hospital birth.

In addition, this bill punishes Native Hawaiian practictioners and forces an undue burden on them and their clients.

I stronglu urge you to reject this bill as it is harmful to women and their babies.

Please join me in OPPOSING SB1033 SD1. This bill has made some steps to be more inclusive. However, there are still problems and clarifications needed.

There needs to be clarification on whether traditional midwives are exempt or not. Currently, the bill states they are exempt. However, the bill also restricts who can purport themselves as a midwife, call themselves a midwife or advertise as a midwife. So, is a traditional midwife exempt or not? Who can call themselves a traditional midwife? Which traditions are exempted or, ideally, all of them are? If they cannot call themselves a midwife, how can they be a traditional midwife?

In addition, currently practicing midwives need to be licensed by 2024. This is unacceptable because it requires one to become a CPM which is only one pathway to becoming a midwife. It is very difficult to educate as a CPM in Hawaii. It would require leaving Hawaii to complete the requirements. This is a hardship on established midwives and on student midwives whose home, family and community are in Hawaii. In addition, who is considered a currently practicing midwife? Please remove p. 12 lines 9 and 10 which requires all midwives to get full licensure (and certification) by 2024, essentially nullifying the grandmother clause exempting traditional midwives and currently practicing midwives.

DCCA stated that it would cost more than \$250,000 to certify an estimated 13 midwives in their testimony for SB1033. This cost is exorbitant! Only 6 homebirth midwives in Hawaii want licensure and none on Oahu want it. Many midwives in Hawaii, including my midwives, could become illegal.

Please consider the laws in other states such as the Utah model where many different kinds of midwives are allowed. Please change this bill to a working group/task force and include ALL stakeholders - such as traditional midwives and homebirth mothers/families who are directly affected by the outcome of this bill. It is time for us to work together to find what will work best in our unique state that celebrates our melting pot of cultures.

Aloha,

I am from Hawaii. Born and raised here. We've experienced both hospital obstetric care and home births with a midwife for our 3 beautiful children (2012, 2013 & 2015).

Please continue to allow Hawaii voters to have all of our different options. We are asking for birth autonomy which demands different practices for different people. Accordingly, any regulation that directly or indirectly results in less choice over time for woman when it comes to childbirth, reproductive rights, or accessibility to midwifery care will have a much more profound impact on Hawaii Families compared to those in the mainland because of the limited options available here. It is a big concern because what we currently have here in Hawaii is super special and needs to be protected. It's something to be proud of.

In the mainland, there are so many more options available to women when it comes to midwifery care and choices in childbirth. Hawaii doesn't have the free-standing birthing centers, access to midwives in hospitals, women health centers, support organizations, or Midwifery schools that the mainland has. Nor do we have the same resources and healthcare options that other states has when it comes to prenatal, labor, birth, and postpartum care and breastfeeding support services outside a hospital setting. And women can't easily travel to other states to obtain those services like woman in the mainland can. There are even fewer options for families on Molokai, Lanai, Kauai, or remote areas of the big island. Midwives provide a great service in areas that lack doctors and hospitals by filling dangerous gaps in obstetric services and maternity care.

In addition, mainland states have so many more midwives compared to Hawaii. This helps keep licensing fees low. How do we ensure licensing fees on such a small midwifery profession here in Hawaii doesn't make it prohibitive to be a midwife or unaffordable to benefit from the service? And since they commonly make less then nurses and doctors, it would seem unfair to require midwives to pay a licensing fee that is higher than what nurses and doctors have to pay. (The licensing fee could be reduced through direct legislation but what would the annual fiscal impact on the State be? We're talking somewhere in the ballpark of a quarter of a million dollars a year to license this group when there are really no hard statistics that there is a problem with safety or availability and the people are not asking for it.)

Another issue is that Hawaii doesn't have the midwifery support and educational organizations dedicated to Midwifery that exists in other States. Without a similar support network that helps educate and advocate for women's rights and access to midwifery care to the public, state legislators and health care policy makers, how do we ensure Hawaii will not experience more and more restriction over time when it comes to autonomy and birth rights for women?

For example, in Oregon, things have become more and more restrictive over time. And a lot of this has to do with who the Director in place is. (If the Director that is making all the decisions has the common medical approach/background to pregnancy—then, understandably, they wouldn't know the nuances and look beyond their scope of practice and their experience when it comes to oversight). Any adverse outcome causes more restriction which leads to less options because it cinches the belt of regulation and makes things more restrictive on women. For instance, Oregon's 42-week restriction on out-of-hospital births is forcing Oregon mothers to make a decision at 41.5 weeks. For those who don't want to be induced, it promotes tactics of how to avoid induction so they can maintain their human right to give birth as she wishes. This is not good for mothers and babies. Another example of an unintended consequence of their system is that midwives in Oregon don't get paid when the mother transfers to the hospital which likely impacts the decision-making process of both midwives/mothers during challenging moments during labor. (It should be noted that adverse outcomes happen in the hospital too. The result is an increase to the physician's malpractice insurance premiums but it doesn't subsequently end up making it more restrictive for the Doctor to do his/her job. I should also point out the misconception that complications in hospitals are rare when in fact the U.S. has the highest rate of maternal mortality in the industrialized world).

These are a few of the differences between Hawaii and the mainland that helps explain some of the issues and concerns unique to Hawaii. We have a small and amazing group of skilled midwives providing a service to a small segment of Hawaii families that really want it. It fits well with the culture and demographics and island geography. It helps provide choices and accessibility for woman, and we need to protect what we have here.

The Hawaii Regulatory Licensing Reform Act makes it clear that Hawaii should provide only the minimal level of regulation necessary to protect the public. Licensure should be used only as a last resort as it is the most stringent form of regulation available in the state.

This bill will make some midwives illegal. Licensing fees, costs, increased restriction religious, personal, or philosophical reasons will likely cause some to not seek license. And if things become more and more restrictive over time like it has in Oregon, it will likely drive some Hawaii midwives to quit or move to another state that is less restrictive on their profession. All of which will limit the cultural/traditional/religious midwifery passed on from generation to generation here in Hawaii, and limit native Hawaiian woman's rights and reduce options for all Hawaii mothers interested in a midwifeassisted home birth.

A less stringent and less costly option is for the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council formed by Elder midwives who represent the variety of midwives in Hawaii to self-regulate the home birth midwifery community, work with the medical community and provide accountability.

Either way, a working group should be set up to bring all the involved parties together at one table to tackle the problem in a bottom up approach that really takes into account the PEOPLE of Hawaii (not just the organizations or agencies) but the traditional, cultural, spiritual, lay, nurse and certified midwives along with the medical community and the birth community to capture the nuances, respect, cultural aspects, benefits and what the people of Hawaii want and need for the benefit of all birthing families and our future communities. Hawaii could be a shining example for other states.

Please, no passage of this bill in its current form! Thank you.

My name is: Selena Green, CPM (Certified Professional Midwife)

I am in strong opposition of SB1033 SD1 as it stands. The following are my reasons for opposition:

- 1. I recognize the senators attempt at amending SB1033, however SD1 creates new issues because the language is too vague.
- 2. SD1 is not specific in regards to who is exempt and the definition of traditional midwives is misleading, they are required to get full licensure by 2024, so that is not an exemption.
- 3. This amendment doesn't make clear who are the "midwives" on the advisory board, if passed it could exclude midwives who are important stakeholders.
- 4. Because ALL stakeholders were **NOT** included in the making of this bill, the language is not inclusive and could criminalize many midwives and restrict the consumer's rights to informed decision-making. We need you to call for a **working group/task force** that would include all involved parties to come together and agree upon a way to work together.
- 5. I am a Certified Professional Midwife and African American woman, who also practices as a cultural, traditional and religious practitioner. SB1033 SD1 as written would not allow me to identify as a "midwife". I am a Certified Professional Midwife and have the right to call myself a midwife! You cannot legally prevent me from the title that I have earned through my schooling.
- 6. In Hawai'l where we celebrate being culturally sensitive and diverse we should be creating integrative models of care that co-exist respectfully without controlling or repressing the other.
- 7. I oppose this bill because it cannot fiscally support itself. There are only 6 midwives (non CNM's) that support regulation in Hawai'i and approximately 10-12 midwives that would qualify to be licensed if this bill passed. According to the DCCA, it would cost approximately a quarter of a million dollars a year to fund a program for midwives. This does not make any sense. Any midwife that wanted to get licensed would not be able to afford the licensing fees.
- 8. There is **NO** transparency, there are no statistics to support the need for a bill. A working group could gather statistics on all sides of the birthing issue. There needs to be a recognition that the reason for ACOG to push for regulation is their need to control the market share, not the safety of the consumer!

- 9. I am a founding elder member of the Hawai'i Home Birth Collective,LLC that has in excess of 25 practicing midwives compared to Midwives Alliance of Hawai'i that has only 6. Hawai'i Home Birth Collective,LLC is inclusive of all types of midwives and has an "elder council" with elders/kapuna on every island to answer grievances and complaints from the consumer and other parties. We are collecting statistics and will be able to address what is actually occuring with home birth in Hawai'i. However, the hospitals, must also be transparent with their statistics which they are not currently.
- 10. Lastly, I oppose this bill because Birthing families have the right to give birth and be attended to where it is most appropriate, be it home, community, clinic or hospital, and to be able to choose the support system for their births, including but not limited to traditional midwives, cultural midwives, religious midwives, family and community members. This bill seeks to regulate the consumer's choices.
- 11. Again, I appreciate the attempt at changes to SB1033, but a more inclusive and comprehensive solution is needed and that takes **ALL** of the stakeholders using real communication and understanding to accomplish this!

Please oppose SB1033 SD1 as it stands.

I am a both a homebirth parent and a consumer of a non-certified midiwfe. My wife gave birth to our son at home, at the age of 41. The experience was profoundly wonderful. I am not in support of certification or licensure of birth in any form.

There are estimated to be fewer than 30 homebirth midwives in the state of Hawai'i. Approximately one-third of whom won't qualify for licensure. Licensure for fewer than 20 midwives in Hawai'i is a very costly endeavor, which in turn would create an undue financial burden on the few midwives who would qualify for licensure. It in turn would also create a financial hardship on me, the consumer who payed out of pocket for my midwife.

Childbirth is a normal biological function, it is *not* a medical event or the practice of medicine. The skills of a midwife are compiled from ancient knowledge that predates the modern medical era. Childbirth does not need regulation of any sort. Requiring mandatory certification for the licensure of midwives, as defined by SB1033sd1 interferes with body autonomy.

Instead of this bill, the majority of Hawai'i's midwives support the creation of an all-inclusive statewide registry of midwives who work in the community birth setting, regardless of their pathway or type of midwifery education. This would also honor the long-standing traditions and cultural practices of the VAST number of cultures represented in Hawai'i. I am a mother to five children ages 3 to 20, four of whom where born at home with non-certified midwives. I had my first baby in a hospital in the 90's. I was so traumatized by that experience, it inspired me to become a midwife. I attended my first birth as a student in 1995. I studied midwifery through the apprenticeship model. It took me 9 years to obtain the skills necessary to be a primary midwife. I was trained by a non-certified midwife, as she was trained by a non-certified midwife, and so on. This bill will not allow me to obtain a license or to continue to practice safely as a non-licensed midwife. How do those of us who will be forced out of practice continue to support our families?

There are estimated to be fewer than 30 homebirth midwives in the state of Hawai'i. Approximately one-third of whom won't qualify for licensure. Licensure for fewer than 20 midwives in Hawai'i is a very costly endeavor, which in turn would create an undue financial burden on the few midwives who would qualify for licensure. It in turn would also create a financial hardship on the consumer who pays out of pocket for their midwife.

Traditional midwives have existed since the beginning of humankind. There are two types of traditional midwives, the certified practical midwife (CPM) and the non-certified traditional midwife (DEM). To be VERY clear, both CPM and DEM midwives are traditional midwives. CPM credentialing began in the mid 1990's. This bill would unfairly disallow many of the state's traditional midwives from obtaining a license or even using their title "midwife." The majority of uncredentialed midwives are the longest practicing, elder midwives within the community.

My name is Ms. Alexandra Kisitu, I am a researcher at UH Manoa, a birthworker, a PhD candidate and a mother. I am writing to expressing my strong OPPOSITION to SB1033 SD1. My doctoral research focuses on mothers who choose out of hospital birth in Hawai'i as well as the safety of homebirth, the cultural lineage of midwifery, and the medical model/midwifery model.

I strongly OPPOSE this bill for three reasons - even with the amendments, these reasons still stand as the vague terminology, DCCA cost report, safety concerns, and decline of midwives that this bill would create, if passed, would be WORSE for consumers, WORSE for public health, and WORSE for midwives and families. Furthermore, the language is so vague and limiting that this bill would violate human, religious, and cultural rights and the state might be sued for these violations. The DCCA also determined that the cost to implement this bill is unfeasable for consumers and for the state.

Whatever amendments (SD1) that were made unfortunately did not solve the concerns of your constitutents due to the bill's vague language. Certainly, the state would have difficulty with this in implementing the law and establishing any resulting case law that would result from enforcement of the bill.

If we want to make a clear good bill and the best birth outcomes in Hawaii we need the legislators to CALL FOR A WORKING GROUP to bring all the involved parties together at one table and bring a bill to them next year that we can agree upon ahead of time and not waste your time and your constituents time year after year.

Only 6 of all the home birth midwives on all the Hawaiian islands want regulation, none on Oahu, and perhaps only 10-12 could get licensed if this bill went into effect, and yet the government is willing to spend probably a quarter of a million dollars a year to license this group when there are really no hard statistics that there is a problem with safety or availability and the people are not asking for it. I am happy to share research from my own doctoral studies that confirm that regulation and licensure does not equate to safety or increase public health.

I look forward to your OPPOSITION of this bill and its amendments. I am hopefully we can all come to a better bill next year with a WORKING TASK FORCE that can tease out some of the issues embedded in the bill, ease the state from working these out, reduce costs, and keep birth safe for all women and midwives.

- * studies show that homebirths usually lead to fewer complications and interventions (per studies http://onlinelibrary.wiley.com/doi/10.1111/jmwh.12165/abstract).
- * the intended exemption does not actually exempt traditional or Biblical or Native Hawaiian midwives. Does the requirement to register apply to nurse midwives?
- * legislators should form a working group that INCLUDES all types of midwives and consumers of homebirth. Aloha Honorable Congress men and women,

My name is Roxanne Estes. I am a long time resident of Hawaii of nearly 42 years. I am a practicing Home Birth Certified Nurse Midwife. Certified Nurse Midwives are licensed to practice in all 50 states of US. In Hawaii Certifed Nurse Midwives have been licensed for the past 50 years and are an integral part of our health care system both in the hospital and outside the hospital. This bill infringes on already firmly established laws regarding Certified Nurse Midwives.

I have strong reservations regarding SB 1033 SD1.

Problem: inappropriate title protection

As the amended bill SB 1033 S.D. 1 is written, only Certified Professional Midwives will have title protection. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives will be prohibited from referring to themselves as midwives or practicing midwifery. Certified Nurse-Midwives and Certified Midwives should be exempt from title protection in this amended bill.

Proposed solution:

- Any licensed person doing work within the scope of practice or duties of the
 person's profession that overlaps with the practice of midwifery; provided the
 person does not purport to be a midwife unless the person holds an advanced
 practice registered nurse license (APRN) as a Certified Nurse-Midwife (CNM)
 pursuant to chapter 457, and/ or holds national certification by the American
 Midwifery Certification Board.

- Certified Nurse- Midwives (CNMs) who are under the Board of Nursing pursuant to chapter 457 and are licensed as advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) through the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA).

I am a Native Hawaiian mother of three young children born at home under the care of highly trained and skilled midwives. I have also attended several births in hospitals and homes in multiple capacities—as a doula, friend, sister, and as a midwife's assistant.

While I am a strong supporter of midwifery care and support licensure for CPMs who want it, I oppose this bill (SB1033 SD1) in its current form.

This bill limits the birthing choices available to women/families by making it illegal for some of Hawai'i's midwives to practice. Families need to be free to choose both their caregivers and where they will receive that care.

I find the definitions in the bill problematic along with the exemptions, which are even narrower than some we've seen in previous bills.

I support licensure for CPMs who want it, but not via this current bill, not at the expense of so many traditional midwives, cultural practitioners, student midwives, and most importantly, the families who choose to birth them.

I also support the convening of a Working Group Working Group including Native Hawaiians, practicing homebirth midwives, homebirth consumers, and representatives from all islands are voting members of the working group. Those giving and receiving the services deserve to have a say in laws that affect them directly. There have been previous attempts to convene a working group--but none of those working groups have included these voices.

My name is Adaure Ezinne Dawson I am a 37 yeard old african American Woman that has resided in Hawaii for nearly 10 years. I strongly oppose this bill. As a consumer of homebirth I have been able to have 2 of my 5 children at home with a midwife of my choice. I was fully informed of her practice, skill level, and life saving measures. I felt confident in her as my provider because I did my research and trusted my gut. She served my family wonderfully. She had 2 apprentices with her that were knowledgeable and respectul and also traditonal midwves. They were also closely monitored by their teacher, my midwife. They truly practiced the midwives model of care and not the Western medical model of care. That gave me much peace of mind because I know the maternal death rate for African American women in the United states is staggeringly greater then it should be. By approving this bill you take away a womans right to a birth attendent that will fully honor her, her body, her culture and her sacred tradtions. Why would you limit a womans choice? This is a civil rights issue. The bottom line is that requiring mainland certification will make many of our currently practicing midwives illegal, and it will effectively strip many women of their right to choose. If we have the right to choose an abortion, we should have a right to choose whichever midwife we feel most comfortable with, regardless of certification. If you do not let her have this choice you are creating more dangerous pathwaways to illegal births and creating a civil rights issue. Consumers are wise and no one wants to have an unsafe/terrible birth experience (in or out of the hospital) so this bill needs to be opposed so that those women who are choosing a birth attendant can do so without feeling judgement from othr providers who are less willing to incorporate their birth traditons and recognize the birth practices that a woman wants employed during her birth. As a woman of color I know how important it is to feel and be heard by my birth attendants and I hate to imagine a world where that choice is taken away I'm certain it will result in a much more trauma filled society.

Here are some points I would like to make concerning this bill with its amendments.

1. it has created new problems due to its vague language, which does not make it clear who is truly exempt and who needs to register, who are they calling a midwife and what types of midwives are they putting on the advisory board? All of this is unclear!

- 2. If we want to make a clear good bill and the best birth outcomes in Hawaii we need the legislators to CALL FOR A WORKING GROUP to bring all the involved parties together at one table and bring a bill to them next year that we can agree upon ahead of time! There are transport issues and many other concerns a working group can help with! Traditional, cultural, spiritual, lay, nurse and certified midwives along with the medical community and the birth community can come together, listen with respect and learn from each other for the benefit of all birthing families and our future communities.
- 3. Only 6 of all the home birth midwives on all the Hawaiian islands want regulation, none on Oahu, and perhaps only 10-12 could get licensed if this bill went into effect, and yet the government is willing to spend probably a quarter of a million dollars a year to license this group when there are really no hard statistics that there is a problem with safety or availability and the people are not asking for it! Let's figure out a better way!
- 4 We have an organization currently called Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council formed by Elder midwives who represent the variety of midwives in Hawaii. They have organized to self regulate the home birth midwifery community, work with the medical community and provide accountability.
- 5. This bill will make some midwives illegal, one of the midwives who served me during my births is included and many women I know also use her as their midwife, that will not make birth safer for Hawaii by making some favored midwives illegal.

I OPPOSE SD 1033 SD1. This bill is poorly written and highly restrictive to the majority of home birth midwives that are currently practicing. Certain amendments have been made in this new bill, but the language is vague and unclear. Again, it is trying to take the term "midwife" and define it in such a way that only certain people fall under that category. Midwife means "with woman". The line "all currently practicing midwives must attain full licensure pursuant to this chapter by January 1, 2024" needs to be removed. Perhaps a working group may be formed with ALL parties interested to come up with another bill? Another option of accountabilty may be the Hawaii Homebirth Elders Council, which will be lead by elder midwives from all islands working together with midwives & the medical community.

If this bill is passed, the reality is, many women will still invite midwives who are considered "illegal" to support them at their births. The practice of underground midwifery is a dangerous. Lives are truly at risk when you cannot work together with the hospital.

The practice of midwifery is as old as time. It is an ancient art that is a personal choice, not based on fear or control. The model of midwifery is very different from the medical model of obstretrics. And yet there is a place for both practices in the world of birth. When a woman chooses a "midwife" to be by her side, she chooses someone whom she trusts in her heart.

I believe in integrative medicine. I believe in working together. I am writing in extreme opposition of the SB1033 proposed bill about Midwifery Licensure.

- 1. This bill is against human rights, violates our birthing rights, freedoms, choice to birth assistants, and removes opportunities of safe birthing practices.
- 2. For 21 years the public and political forces have stopped this type of bill and will continue to oppose bills like it for multitudes of valid reasons.
- 3. Licensure doesn't make safer birthing situations. As requested in the past hearings on this issue, The Hawaii Department of Health has yet to provide statistics that would prove a variety of midwifery practices are more dangerous than the obstetrical and medical midwifery model of care. Without any statistics, this bill is being made on anecdotal stories instead of actual facts. We do know, however that the United States spends more money on pregnancy care and also have the highest maternal mortality rate in the developed world (and both numbers are climbing) with those parallel models of care prioritized in this bill. Protecting the many complexities of the midwifery model of care may be Hawaii's unique opportunity to SAVE mothers!
- 4. Licensure recognition sounds good in theory, but not at the expense of the other types of midwifery practices that operate in Hawaii. As has been seen in most other states, midwifery licenses scopes of practice eventually limit our freedoms of normal, physiological birthing processes. The state licenses dictate what a woman can or can't do, its no longer based on the woman's intuitions or morals or individual needs. Licensure can remove freedoms of women having twins without a c-section, vaginal births after cesareans, etc, regardless of her midwife's skill set or experience.
- 5. Though desired licensure does not insure health insurance covering midwifery practices, as proven by previous testimonies from health care providers.
- 6. The definitions of "midwife" as listed in this bill, take the namesake of birthing culture which has been around to thousands of years, and claims them under the new licenses, all of which have been around for less hundred years and some like CPM have been available for only thirty. It does not make sense why short

term degrees are given more priority than years of experience, as some of the midwife's negatively affected by this bill have been practicing longer than the licenses have been available. This bill assumes a CPM that has done 75 births and done some basic research has more experience and expertise than "traditional midwives" here on island with hundreds to thousands of births, let alone longer positive influences in our local community. It takes a paternalistic angle, assuming women are ignorant and incapable of researching their options and therefore the state needs to help them understand what different types of midwives are. In doing so, it narrows the scope of midwifery into three distinctly medically trained types of midwife. This bill demeans and demotes other types of midwives claiming they are now subject to a new name, "Traditional Birth Attendant", and claims these TBAs have no formal training. This demotion and assumption violates Hawaiian, cultural, ethnic, and universal human birthing practices that currently exist and flourish on our islands. It makes the majority currently practicing home birth midwives illegal and causes big issues on outer islands where access to health care is different.

- 7. This bill seems to be written by a group of litigious, hospital style midwife lobbyists that do not understand or care about the differences of personalized care between the medicalized hospital model versus traditional midwifery models. There are many reasons why educated people, including hospital nurses and doctors choose traditional midwives over medical midwives, as they want what is best for THEIR families. Its THEIR choice! Home birth rights are violated and removed by this bill as the options for safe home birth practices and the non-medical midwives who can help them are limited or non existent by this enforcing this bill.
- 8. When looking for other states to compare legislation, Utah seems to include more types of midwifery care that are also found in Hawaii rather than alternate models like the restrictive Oregon model that was suggested by senators earlier in the month.
- 9. The groups invovled with the decision making on the license should be home birth midwives primarially, with limited power and voice from people who do not do home deliveries. There should not be supreme power by a director, rather a large voting body of home birth practicioners along with people who receive the services, such as a mother and father representatives.

I hope you see why the legislation should oppose this bill SB1033 as it removes human birthing rights here in Hawaii. This bill forces midwives to have western medicalized training, which in turn, forces the woman to have a medicalized birth if she chooses a midwife. Please vote no on SB1033 and prevent wasting more time in our legislation with this issue as is.

Dear Honorary Comittee Members,

I appreciate the intent of this bill however the concerns it is attempting to address will not be resolved by simply licensing some midwives and eliminating others. There needs to be a solid rationale for continuing to push this bill year after year. There have been hundreds of pages of testimony IN OPPOSITION from the constituents of Hawaii asking to keep their midwives legal. Hawaii's midwives are an integral part of the vast communities within our glorious islands. They are as varied as the people they serve and well loved and trusted by their communities.

- 1. Licensure will not resolve the issue of accessibility. In fact this bill greatly limits access. This bill will wipe out the majority of midwives currently attending home births. By doing this and attempting to replace them with mainland midwives, women would be at the hands of strangers. Women often feel comfortable with women who are "like" them. Women who represent their values and feel unjudged for being their truest expression of themselves, especially when they are in a state of vulnerability. These new midwives may or may not know how to hold the space for the journey because they may have no cultural context for the family they are serving, leaving a gap that may never get fully filled. This is especially true for rural areas and already being reflected nationwide.
- 2. The education required by this type of licensure is far from accessible to most of the currently practicing midwives in our islands and while the five year "grace period/"grandmother clause" is a nice gesture, it is not at all realistic. Please, bare with me here...

In Hawaii, CPM preceptors are extremely limited and with less than 2% of births performed "out of hospital" (avg 18,500 births per year, approximately 375 "out of hospital" births - accidental and planned/attended births are combined in this number), it would take *decades*to get the rest of the currently practicing midwives through the education systems suggested in this bill.

WHY?

Most midwives in Hawaii attend 15 or less births per year. The majority of midwives practicing home births in Hawaii ARE NOT CPMs.

To become a CPM, one must attend at least 75 deliveries under the supervision of a certified preceptor in order to take their certification test.

According to DCCA Testimony for the hearing held on 2/21/19, this bill aims to license 13 CPMs in the state of Hawaii. I am not sure where that number came from? Not all of the CPMs currently practicing in Hawaii are certified preceptors. With fewer midwives, there will be fewer births attended, presenting fewer opportunities for a student to gain the experience in a reasonable amount of time. The numbers just don't add up and makes it next to impossible to obtain full licensure within 5 years without actually leaving the islands.

This bill will drastically reduce the number of available midwives to ALL areas of the Hawaiian islands (especially rural), and limits the number of women who can TEACH! There are midwives within our communities who have caught many hundreds of babies over the course of several decades! According to this bill, the knowledge they carry is deemed "informal training" but in most professions, experience stands superior. The more you do, the more you see, and practice makes precision. It is important to remember that there are many ways of learning and knowing. In fact Universities offer "honorary degrees" for experts in the field who have learned and mastered their craft by other means. I do hope the legislation recognizes this.

The only way to attain an "experienced midwife" CPM certificate will no longer be available in 9 months time. This means that if the experienced midwives of Hawaii cannot collect/obtain all the records (300 births), incur the cost (several thousands of dollars), and provide all the necessary paperwork, AND pass the test by January 2020, they will have to start over again as a student CPM (with little to no pay, but having to pay for their certification).

The Hawaii Regulatory Licensing Reform Act clearly states, "Regulation must not unreasonably restrict entry into professions and vocations by all qualified persons." Becuse of the lack of reasonable access to the required educational components of this bill, this is EXACTLY what will happen.

3. Licensure will not resolve the issue of affordability to the families. **a.**HMSA, Hawaii's leading health insurance carrier, already stated in their testimony last year that they WILL NOT PAY for CPM attended births. **b.**It has also been proven in many other states that insurance pays so little to a midwife that it is incredibly challenging for them to maintain a practice that is either manageable number wise to allow quality care, or they have to stop attending births because they cannot afford their livelihood. The latter of this dilemma is more likely, as there are very few people actually choosing home births. **c.**In addition, this bill will increase the overhead of the midwife by charging SEVERAL thousands of dollars each year to maintain a license. Again, I quote the DCCA in their testimony on 2/21/10 stating that "The Department estimates that the startup costs would be \$276,608.00 with recurring costs totaling \$254,688 per year. Ultimately, the applicants and licensees would be required to defray these costs. "The DCCA also states, "the costs associated with implementing regulation for an

approximated 13 licenses would be exorbitant." Exorbitant indeed, averaging \$21,000 per year. Even if this bill were able to license 50 midwives, the cost of a yearly license is \$5500 (in addition to the cost of continuing education credits yearly). **d.**The majority of the currently practicing home birth midwives accept sliding scale rates, trades, and payment plans in order for families to receive the services they are seeking.

4. From a philosophical standpoint (and a large part of the testimony collected over the course of the past 5 years), for many women, the bottom line is "my body is MY eminent domain". Women are watching and as more states require licensure, that within a matter of a few years, that license becomes tighter and tighter, and what was originally presented as choice is no longer a legal choice. Women are concerned about the systematic reduction of their basic bodily rights slowly being stripped away under the guise of "safety". Women are smart enough and have access to a myriad of information and educational materials to make decisions about their bodies. It is demeaning that the government is deciding otherwise. As licensure becomes the national standard, we have watched as free birth is also on the rise across the nation. There are MANY reasons why this is happening; accessibility, criminalization, over medicalization are simply a few. "Criminalizing women for helping other women have babies tells us that all women are still not free to make our own decisions, even about something so extremely personal." _ Cristen Pascucci, founder of the birth rights organization, Birth Monopoly.

It is hard to believe that in 2019 and 5 rounds of this type of licensing bill, we are again facing this sort of one sided legislation that has been called out by representatives from past hearings. House Representitives have stated collaboration is the pathway to a more harmonious solution. I please urge you to follow this suggestion! We need a state mandatedworking group which displays the needs and desires of ALL the stake holders, not just the ones these medical organizations deem suitable. Hawaii's home birth midwives have been ready and willing to participate, but are rarely brought to the bargaining table. If they are, it is the midwives already carrying a CPM certificate (special interest). In an attempt to find solutions, several of Hawaii's home birth midwives have set up and are exploring a self regulating registry, collecting STATS, providing a pathway for grievance complaints and accountability, an elder's council for review of difficult cases that arise in the community, and more. They have been calling OBs who are willing to see women for tandem care to try to meet, working as doulas in order to interface with the hospitals, and working to continue to nourish the positive relationships we have cultivated within our birthing communities. We want integrative and RESPECTFUL collaboration and communication. We all want what is best for women and their babies. Limiting choice and access is simply not the answer. In addition to skill, transparency, time, and TRUST gives women better outcomes. We CLEARLY need continued conversation, time, mutual respect, and honesty to build that trust and provide better care and outcomes for families, regardless of the birth model they choose. The eternal optimist in me believes that Hawaii's families will be heard loud and clear in 2019 and TOGETHER we can create something better than SB1033-SD1.

Aloha Senate Comittee,

My name is Laura Acasio and I am from Hilo. I am a DOE teacher, a child birth doula, lactation counselor and a child birth educator. I am also a mother of two, one if which was born preterm at Kapiolani Hospital and one was born safely at home with our Midwife. I am grateful for all the options and available choices for where to birth given the differing circumstances between my two children.

I am writing to strongly OPPOSE SB 1033. While there could be some merit in a form of licencure program, this bill has many flaws that will be detrimental to mothers, babies, and midwives in Hawaii.

Out of well over 100 midwives in our state, only 6 of all the home birth midwives on all the Hawaiian islands want this specific regulation. Of all, perhaps only 10-12 could get licensed if this bill went into effect, and yet the government is willing to spend probably a quarter of a million dollars a year to license this group when there are really no hard statistics that there is a problem with safety or availability and the people are not asking for it. Also, most midwives currently practicing already hae clients that will give birth when this bill is scheduled to take effect. It is not safe or appropriate for those clients to have their care dropped towards the end of their pregnancy.

The amendments (SD1) that were made solved some the problems of the original bill, however it has created new ones due to its vague language. SB 1033 (SD1) does not make it clear who is truly exempt and who needs to register. For example, in the exemption of "person acting as a traditional midwife" and to "provide cultural practices" are vague and essentially meaningless in our current era of mixed traditions and cultures and adopted lifestyles and beliefs. Unclear definitions provide for large holes that can be discussed and clarified in open discussions by all parties.

All legislators should CALL FOR A WORKING GROUP to bring all the involved parties together at one table and bring a bill next year that we can agree upon ahead of time. There are transport issues and many other concerns a working group can help with. Traditional, cultural, spiritual, lay, nurse and certified midwives along with the medical community and the birth community can come together, listen with respect and learn from each other for the benefit of all birthing families and our future communities.

There is a solution, however we can do this better with communication and collaboration.

Please look as a model at the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council formed by Elder midwives who represent the variety of midwives in Hawaii. They have organized to self regulate the home birth midwifery community, work with the medical community and provide accountability.

This bill will make some midwives illegal and that will not make birth safer for Hawaii. Many of these midwives practice in a very safe manner and have highly positive birth outcomes despite not being licenced. I believe that the way this particular bill is written has the great potential to make homebirths much less safe rather than safer as intended.

Thank you for hearing my testimony. I hope you can hear all those speaking out against this bill and know that many are not 100% opposed to regulation or even a form of licencure. Rather, the way this bill is written a WORKING GROUP can do much better, be more comprehensive and productive to support rather than condem the birth community.

TESTIMONY IN STRONG SUPPORT OF SB1033, RELATING TO THE LICENSURE OF MIDWIVES

Dear Senator Dela Cruz, Keith-Agaran and WAM committee members, and Senator Rhoads, Wakai and JDC committee members:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in strong support, of SB1033. I agree with both State Auditor's Reports No. 99–14 and No.17–01 determination that the midwifery profession should be regulated.

My situation is that I'm currently being investigated for practicing medicine without a license. I have been a midwife for over 21 years! The letter I received from RICO states that: "...you may be practicing medicine by offering prenatal care, newborn care, and perinatal medical care. According to the informant, you do not limit your practice to "comfort of the mother" during labor as a "doula". You also inform patients about status of pregnancy, the health of the baby..." This has been a terrible assault on midwifery, on myself and on the families that I work with. I have asked Rico as well as the HI Medical Board Executive Officer to please tell me what I'm doing that is practicing medicine so that I may differentiate it from practicing midwifery, because I desire to stay in compliance with the law. (I believe that I have been in compliance with the law because practicing midwifery is not illegal.) No one can give me an answer to my question; because the practice of midwifery is not defined in our law. I implore you to please define and regulate the practice of midwifery.

I have a unique perspective on licensure. I learned the art of midwifery the old fashioned way, in an apprenticeship with an elder midwife from 1995–1998. I considered myself a "traditional midwife". Eventually I became licensed in 2007, when it became the law in my former state. I had not been in favor of licensure because I was afraid, like many others, that licensing would over–regulate midwives. On the contrary, it was a great improvement. Some of the benefits I experienced from becoming licensed:

- the ability to contribute to society with my gifts and skills without the risk of being charged with practicing medicine without a license
- the ability to collaborate with other care providers because they recognized my license to practice
- Access to laboratory services, life-saving medications and insurance reimbursement.

• Access to improved educational opportunities, updates from state agencies and the public health department.

The benefits that families experience with licensure are also very important:

- There will be established standards of skill level, education, record keeping and disclosure on the part of any potential licensed midwife they are considering.
- Improved access to care, financial assistance for the costs and a complaint process for unsafe practices in the community.
- Better birth outcomes!

SB1033 uses the International Confederation of Midwives definition of a midwife. This definition is accepted throughout the world and by all U.S. national midwifery certifying bodies and professional organizations. I believe that women in Hawai'i deserve the opportunity to work with a midwife who has demonstrated nationally recognized competencies.

I believe that licensing midwives will increase their integration into the healthcare system, which has been proven to improve birth outcomes, including increased breastfeeding, vaginal deliveries and vaginal birth after cesareans, and decreased interventions and neonatal death. https://journals.plos.org/plosone/article?id=10.1371/journal.pone.0192523.

Aloha, my name is Melissa Danielle Haile and I stand in opposition of SB1033 SD! I would first like to acknowledge the traditional, indigenous, and invaded territory of the Kanaka Maoli on whose land we are gathered. It is important to acknowledge the land as both a mainlander and as a black woman of color as it relates to this bill which has the potential to erase and even criminalize traditional Hawaiian healing practices and birth traditions as well as the traditional practices of the cultures of the people that live, love, and give birth in Hawai'i.

It is easy to deny black and indigenous people of color their rights if we historicize their struggles and simply pretend they don't exist. This includes the practice of midwifery, a tradition intrinsic to one's cultural identity. As a birthworker and a woman of color, I would like to highlight that bills such as this perpetuates systems of oppression that have dispossessed black and Indigenous people of their lands and denied their rights to self-determination, which includes birth autonomy.

To pass this bill as it is written is disengenuous. It standardizes a medical model of care without regard to an expectant's right to choose their birth attendants. It fails to require cultural competencies of licensed midwives, competencies that includes the history of traditional and indigenous birthing traditions of Hawai'i and other cultures that have made clinical midwifery what it is today, essentially coopting and appropriating midwifery as its own invention. It fails to acknowledge the history of obstetrics and gynecology, which has and continues to include unethical experimentation, procedures, treatment and violence on and of enslaved and other vulnerable women in the name of science and compliance. All of this informs a birthing person's choices in childbirth.

It is misleading in its wording that exempts traditional midwives in one paragraph, and then requires all midwives to be licensed by 2024. It says that unlicensed midwives can only attend "low-risk" births, but can not call themselves midwives in doing so.

This bill, as it is written, will render all out-of-hospital births attended by midwives and other birth attendants illegal. If we say we care about maternal health outcomes, then we must include ALL of choices in childbirth.

This bill was drafted without the input of key stakeholders, including but not limited to midwives who attend homebirths as well as the people who would be impacted by this

bill. These constituents have been intentionally excluded from the organizing around the licensing of midwives.

The DCCA has already determined that it is cost-prohibitve to establish the infrastructure for licensing, to both the agency and to the midwives that would be eligible for this licensure. To pass this bill as it is written from this standpoint alone, is fiscally irresponsible.

I come from a legacy of grand midwives, women who offered a continuity of care to expectants who at one time were not allowed to give birth in hospitals. It is important to highlight that it has been less than 60 years that black and indigenous women of color have been allowed to birth in hospitals.

This legacy gave shape to modern midwifery and obstetrics. To deny access to the full practice and scope of midwifery which includes homebirths dishonors this legacy.

Women have been giving birth long before medicine, long before hospitals.

Given that there are no pathways to midwifery in Hawaii, this bill will severely restrict and limit the profession and its ability to grow and sustain itself. It would open up an influx of professionals from the mainland that are not equipped to address the unique cultural and socioeconomic layers that impact the birthing and lived experience of expectants here in Hawai'i. It will severely limit the income potential of businesses such as mine, which offers ongoing non-medical support to expectants along the full-spectrum of their journey.

Respecting a person's right to choose where and how they give birth, means lawmakers must also do their due diligence with regards to acknowledging traditional and indigenous birthways and birth autonomy as they work to protect these rights and establish a standard of midwifery care.

I ask that instead of this bill, that you seek instead to form an inclusive taskforce of all interested parties to help move forward the work in creating a comprehensive, culturally competent, progressive, and safe birthing outcomes for all residents and the practitioners who serve them.

Aloha honorable committee members,

Thank you for taking the time to understand the multifaceted and complex nature of midwifery, childbearing, traditions, and body autonomy. I am testifying in STRONG OPPOSITION of SB1033 as it stands.

I write to you as a homebirth student midwife who was once in favor of a bill very similar to this introduced in Hawai'i in 2017. I've since understood that even though it might be nice for midwives to have lab rights, and licensure- midwifery is about so much more than that. There are various types of midwives, and there are various types of birthing individuals who have the right to choose which type of midwife aligns with their beliefs about their birth and their health.

Historically we have seen how colonialism has gone around the world oppressing, banning, and criminalizing the worshiping of any god other than the colonizers, speaking a language other than the colonizers, or as most relevant to the problems within this bill, using traditional healing practices that differ than those imposed and approved by the colonizer. We now know how detrimental, and inappropriate it was to criminalize traditional and indigenous ways of living. Passing this bill perpetuates this colonialist mindset.

The boards that certify Certified Professional Midwives (CPM's) began as entities that celebrated and embraced various types of midwives. Throughout the years they have increasingly narrowed their scope of practice to that which aligns with allopathic medicine. By choosing to only recognize CPM's and CNM's within Hawai'i as legal Mdiwives is to act in the same ways colonialism has repeatedly- oppressing traditional and indigenous people around the world and claiming their way to be the only way to be. Passing this bill is to say only our colonialist approved medicine is appropriate and valid- anything else is illegal and of no value. Your traditional ways are no longer legal-you must abide by our colonial medicine.

Can we please break the outdated chain of perpetuating this colonialist mindset? Can the oppression and disintegrations of traditional midwifery stop being perpetuated by the government? Can Hawai'i be a leader and pave the way for truly integrative midwifery regulation that respects and protects traditional midwifery?

At the last hearing for this bills companion bill (HB490) Representative Scot Matayoshi stated he was present at the previous years hearing for a similar bill which was killed with the directions that a task force be created and meaningful dialogue held amongst stakeholders throughout the off season. The representative expressed he was disappointed that this had not happened. I appreciate him being able to recognize that this bill is still not the answer that the community agrees upon.

I'm also disappointed that a task force was not created with actual stakeholders such as traditional midwives from every island, and homebirth consumers as voting member of the task force as this is who would be predominantly affected by this bill. I would support an amendment to this bill which called upon such an integrative task force.

I would also like to point out that there have been many similar attempts throughout the years to regulate midwives and those bills have been killed. This bill is just as problematic. It limits legal options for birthing individuals to choose their midwives, and shows no recognition of the value in various types of midwifery knowledge.

Let us build bridges of communication amongst various practitioners and less division. We don't all have to be the same to communicate and support birth. Please, lets protect and nourish the diversity we are honored to still have alive in Hawai'i. Such diversity is being threatened throughout the nation. Let us not follow that mistake.

Please help Hawai'i pave the road for midwifery integration that is respectful of diversity and OPPOSE SB1033.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing this testimony in strong opposition of HB 490 and SD 1033 SDI. I am opposing on the grounds that such legislature would infringe upon the rights of women in Hawaii to receive prenatal care and give birth with a provider of their chosing. It also continues to attempt to strip away the practices of indigenous and cultural practitioners in favor of the medical model of care, which not all of us wish to involve in our pregnancies and births.

I am a Registered Nurse holding active licensure both here in Hawaii as well as in the state of California. Most of my nursing backround is in Emergency medicine, but I worked as a Nurse at a birth center for a short time. I have four children, and have given birth with a CNM in the hospital, a CNM in a birth center, and two different CPMs at home. My last home birth was here in Hawaii. Having experienced the most medicalized model of midwifery care with the birth of my first child and then during nursing school, I have gravitated further and further away from this model of care for myself and now feel much more aligned with traditional practices. I have done years of study and research into pregnancy and birth from many varying perspectives, and have begun to apprentice as a traditional midwife. Looking at the statistics and outcomes for medicalized birth vs. low intervention birth for low-risk mothers in this country and around the world, it is clear to me that low-risk birth is not a disease and therefore medical intervention can only complicate and interfere with a normal and natural life process. I have come to find myself most trusting and comfortable with prenatal and birth practices which rely on traditional teachings and restrict intervention and technology to an as-needed basis: when/if complications should arise ONLY. At this point in my life, should I become pregnant, I would ONLY wish to seek the care of a midwife whose philosophy aligns with this.

The wisdom and knowledge of birth workers may be obtained from many different sources. To assert that those trained within the system of formal education and medicalized birth care have superior knowledge to those who have been trained in ancient ways passed down between generations of women since the beginning of time (and all the various methods of midwifery education in between) is to attempt to

intervene in a most sacred and intimate practice. To place further regulations and restrictions on how birth workers practice and women's freedom to chose her provider is yet another effort to strip away the rights and freedoms of traditional practitioners, indigenous peoples, and all women. A woman should be free to chose to give birth with a provider whom she feels most comfortable, safe, and aligned with. This will look very different for all women, and should be honored and respected, not regulated and restricted. Education should be the main goal of safe birth practice and should not be limited to one view point. I hope these freedoms will not be further infringed upon.

I oppose SB1033 SD1. While this revision of the bill makes a better attempt at not interfering with a consumer's choice of birth attendant, it is still putting higher importance on the Western medical model of care. Many in the home birthing community prefer a provider who does not implement such practices.

Body autonomy is easier to infringe upon when there are laws that attempt to regulate all birth attendants. At present, midwives are able to attend many types of births that the majority of OBGYNs recommend cesarean sections for. Such births include breech presentation, multiples, age of mother, a labor that is longer than x amount of time, and vaginal birth after cesarean. I am concerned that a bill that regulates all midwives will, in the future, prevent midwives from attending births where OBGYN's have traditionally performed cesarean sections for because in OBGYN community they are considered high risk.

Before any bill is passed to regulate midwives, and the type of credentials and education required to practice lawfully, a task force should be assembled. The task force should include a representative of everyone affected by such a bill. If a bill is deemed necessary, after the task force begins working, then every member can make sure that all angles protecting the rights of home birthing consumers are taken into account.
