Re: S.B. 33, S.D. 1, Relating to Economic Development

The Department of Taxation (Department) defers to the Department of Business Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) on the merits of S.B. 33, S.D. 1, and offers the following comments for the Committee's consideration.

S.B. 33, S.D. 1, removes the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit (film credit) annual aggregate cap of \$35 million. The bill is effective July 1, 2019.

First, the Department notes that Act 143, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017 (Act 143), enacted the annual film credit cap of \$35 million effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2018. The Department continues to work with DBEDT to develop procedures and rules that are consistent with Act 143. DBEDT certifies the film credit by pre-qualifying productions, certifies qualified production costs, and certifies the amount of film credit allocated to each qualified production for the taxable year.

Finally, the Department suggests clarifying the effective date of this measure. The current effective date is July 1, 2019, but the aggregate cap of \$35 million applies to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2018. If the intent of this measure is to remove the aggregate cap established by Act 143 for tax year 2019, the Department suggests changing the effective date of this measure to apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2018.

Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Taniguchi, and Members of the Senate Committee on Energy, Economic Development, and Tourism.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) appreciates the intent of SB 33, SD1, provided this measure does not replace or adversely impact the Executive Budget.

The bill repeals the annual \$35 million rolling cap for the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit. Act 143 is currently in effect as of January 1, 2019, and the film office is already witnessing the negative impacts of productions choosing other locales for their projects, which in turn will affect our jobs in this clean industry.

Implementation of this first-ever spending cap poses severe administrative challenges as the state film office does not have the sufficient staffing to handle the additional layers of accounting required to adequately administer the cap. The administrative tasks of the film program and these statutory responsibilities must increase efficiency of the certification process going forward.

Established in July 2006 and enhanced in 2013, the tax credit program has met the goals intended by the Legislature to ensure Hawaii's competitive advantage in the industry. A competitive advantage that is in jeopardy if this spending cap is not repealed.

From 2006 through 2018, the program has delivered \$2.4 billion in estimated production spend, generating \$3.9 billion in estimated economic activity in the State since 2006, creating an average of nearly 3,000 industry jobs annually.

More importantly, the new spending ceiling will result in a loss of business to the State and will negatively impact Hawaii's global reputation as one of the premiere filming destinations in the world. Even with the roll forward provision, the State cannot assure industry the overall stability and predictability of the program that it requires to make these multi-million-dollar production business decisions.

SB 33 SD1 - RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Taniguchi and members of the Committee,

The University of Hawai'i (UH) supports this measure to repeal the annual \$35,000,000 rolling cap for the motion picture, digital media and film production income tax credit.

The University of Hawai'i greatly appreciates the strong support the Hawai'i State Legislature has given to the Academy for Creative Media System (ACM System), which now helps fund and coordinate collaboration among 17 different programs at all ten UH campuses throughout the islands. Most recently, ACM System lead the effort of students, faculty and staff from five different campuses in re-recording Disney's *Moana* into the Hawaiian language for distribution to all of our schools to encourage the learning of 'ōlelo Hawai'i.

Also, UH appreciates the Legislature's support for the film, television and digital content industry, which hires ACM graduates and makes it possible for them to stay in the islands with living wage jobs. In 2018, Hawai'i set a new record of almost \$477 million in direct production spending with an economic impact heading towards \$1 billion for our local economy. All three major production unions: IATSE, Teamsters and SAG report record membership numbers.

It is UH's belief that the new, \$35 million cap on the state's film, television and digital media tax credit, which took effect in 2019, will have a very deleterious effect on this robust industry and supports any efforts to roll back this cap completely. Already there are confirmed reports from the studios and networks, as well as independent projects, that they are reconsidering shooting in Hawai'i because of this cap and the uncertainty this has meant for their budgeting process. The decision of where to shoot a project is primarily one determined by incentives, as Louisiana, New Mexico and Michigan discovered when they restricted their tax credits and saw production plummet. Georgia, which has offered stable and consistent tax credits, has seen production spending rise from about \$100 million a decade ago to \$2.7 billion in direct spending with 455 films and television shows shot there in 2018 alone.

My name is Gerard Elmore and I'm the Executive Director of `Ohina. We run a local short film showcase, labs program and a newly minted Films program. I'm writing to say that I strongly support SB33 SD1.

Since 1999, the 'Ohina Short Film Showcase (ohina.org) is Hawaii's largest annual short film festival dedicated to gathering and presenting original works by students, amateurs, and professional filmmakers. Although entries can come from around the world, there is only one requirement: a creative relationship to the Hawaiian islands.

In 2017, 'Ohina created its first ever annual Filmmaker's Lab with the goal of furthering our mission of supporting and educating the next generation of Hawaii storytellers and filmmakers.

The inaugural lab was hosted by Black Panther screenwriter Joe Robert Cole. Over the course of a two-day workshop, Cole met with local filmmakers to discuss their short film concepts and hear their pitches in a Hollywood studio-type environment, complete with questions, notes and feedback from Cole and the 'Ohina executive team. This year, we had Eric Pearson, co-writer of Thor: Ragnarok and Dana Ledoux Miller Miller, writer on Narcos, Newsroom lead the labs program. The results were tremedous. It sparked new ideas and inspired our local filmmaker participants to make their films.

This past year, we had thousands of people come to see local short films from the inaugral lab on Oahu, Lana'i, Maui, and Big Island. The response has been fantastic and the films continue to tour at various film festivals on the mainland.

We've grown rapidly the past two years and that's directly tied to the health of our film industry. Our partners share their resources to make the films. It's easier to ask for things when it's healty, busy within the industry. People are willing to help inspiring talent with their stories.

However, it will be hard to maintain and will be much harder to sustain if this tax cap remains.

I'm sure a number of my peers will step up and articulate why the cap is determential to our local film industry but I can't stress how important our tax incentives are for Hawaii film business. I've worked on numerous productions that have come from the direct result of our tax incentives. It's driven our industry and this industry is fueled by local talent, local filmmakers, students graduating from the Academy for Creative Media throughout the islands, and a number of our 'Ohina fellows.

We've done our part to help foster local talent but we are asking for help to keep the jobs, economic activity, and opportunities that are attached to our film state tax incentives. We want our local filmmakers to stay home, we want to create more job opportunities and most of all we want to show the world what Hawaii is capable of.

We don't need to look very far to see the impacts to other states that eliminated or reduced their tax incentives. The jobs, opportunities and their respective economies took a hit. Meanwhile, in Georgia, they are currently experiencing a massive boom. So much so that they don't have enough people to fill the jobs. That's because of their generous tax incentives and believe me, nothing to do with the "beauty" of Georgia.

With us, it's simple. Our current tax incentives work but limiting how much productions can use is like limiting a donut shop on the number donuts you can sell in a day/week/month. We are losing out on more opportunities for our local economy.

I humbly ask you remove the cap to ensure a healthy and vibrant film industry in Hawaii for many years to come. Let's not handicap it. Let's keep building it.

Aloha Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Taniguchi and Members of the Committee,

We strongly support SB 33 SD1, which seeks to repeal the annual rolling cap for motion picture, digital media, and film production tax credit.

We are the Largest Local Production Company in Hawaii

We have been working in Hawaii's film and television industry since 2001, starting as attorneys at the Hawaii law firm of Goodsill Anderson Quinn & Stifel where we represented local, independent and studio clients alike (including the hit ABC series "Lost"

and the Fox series "North Shore"). Since our formation of Island Film Group in 2007, we have been working full-time as producers of feature films such as "Princess Ka`iulani" and "Soul Surfer", network and cable television movies and series, as well as local, national and international commercial productions. Island Film Group has been involved with well over 150 projects to date. Island Film Group, in association with its business partner Hawaii Media Inc., also operates the largest privately-owned film, television and commercial production studio in Hawaii, located in Halawa Valley.

The Rolling Cap is Too Low

Already, film, television and commercial productions have registered productions with the Hawaii Film Office with projected tax credit claims of more than \$30m for 2019. Most of these productions are studio television series and feature films. If 2019 were to have the same level of film production as 2018 (\$477m), the two-year rolling cap would be inadequate to meet the state's tax credit obligations for a single year of production.

Proration Does Not Work

The Department of Taxation has issued proposed administrative rules to prorate the \$35m rolling cap based on the final Hawaii Production Reports (Report) submitted to the Hawaii Film Office. The proposal would require all claims to be made on a calendar year basis (notwithstanding the fact that some production companies have fiscal year ends). Reports are due within 90 days from the end of a claimant's tax year (i.e. the end of March 2020 for 2019 claims). This means that a claimant will not know the amount of its prorated tax credit until AFTER all Reports are submitted. An incentive only works if a party can rely on the amount of the tax credit benefit. In addition, if a claimant has a 3/31 fiscal year end, by the time the amount of the prorated tax credit is known, more than 12 months would have elapsed since the end of the claimant's tax year and the credit would be disallowed.

Alternatively, it has been suggested that the tax credit proration could be based on the time of filing of the Hawaii Production Registration (Registration) with the Hawaii Film Office. Since Registrations set forth the anticipated amount of qualified expenditures, the actual claim could be more or less than anticipated. And once Registrations totaling \$35m are filed there will be no incentive for additional projects to come to Hawaii. As stated in the section above, the Hawaii Film Office has already received Registrations totaling more than \$30m in anticipated tax credit claims.

Studio Productions vs Independent Productions

While much of the focus surrounding the tax credits is on the studio television and film productions, independent productions rely on the tax credits to help finance their productions. And independent productions are the training grounds for our local creative

talent, often times providing opportunities that are not available on studio productions. And while large studios are able to wait for a year or two to receive their tax credits, independent productions and their investors are not.

Uncertainty for Small Productions

As I submit this testimony, our company is in pre-production on a movie to be shot in Hawaii for the Hallmark Channel. Most Hallmark movies are shot in Canada where the exchange rate and the federal and local tax incentives make production financially viable. Given the uncertainty of the tax credit program for 2019 we may not be able to proceed with production.

Local Businesses Support the Film and Television Industry

Our company, along with many others, have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars in studio and production/post production facility renovations and equipment, as well as specialty equipment (drones, filming vehicles, car cranes, camera heads/gimbals, etc.) to meet the needs of all levels of film and television production in Hawaii. Providing local facilities and equipment help lower the actual and perceived cost of filming in Hawaii. But without a steady stream of production, these investments will be wasted.

Hawaii, both at the state and local business level, has investment millions to provide the necessary incentives to help build a robust film and television industry that employs thousands of local workers and puts many more millions into the local economy. Every other state that has capped its tax incentives has seen a precipitous drop in film and television production. The effects of the current cap have already been felt by Hawaii's local production community.

My name is Vans Stevenson, I am senior vice president of state government affairs for the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA). Our members include the leading producers and distributors of television programs and motion pictures worldwide in all venues from network television to internet streaming.

In addition to CBS, which as you are well aware, produces the locally based Hawaii 5-0 and Magnum PI television series, MPAA members include Disney, Fox, Netflix, Paramount, NBC Universal, Sony Pictures and Warner Media.

I am submitting this written testimony in support of SB33. This legislation makes Hawaii's production tax incentive program permanent by removing the current seven-year cap.

MPAA and its members submit that reinstating a permanent production tax credit provides stability and predictability for motion picture and television producers, who want to bring even more projects to Hawaii. This, in turn, extends Hawaii's economic reach into the world. We know both the State and the people of the Aloha State will benefit from good paying union jobs to significant economic activity.

Today, cost is the single most important factor for a producer in determining where a project will be located. Hawaii competes successfully against more than a dozen other states, as well as nations worldwide by attracting its share of motion picture and television productions.

By removing the cap and making the program permanent, Hawaii will create an even greater economic development opportunity.

The opportunity to attract even more of the growing share of over 500 scripted television and streaming service series currently in production as well as even more theatrical motion pictures currently in development...that range from network television series to Netflix original programs and features.

The vision of the Hawaii legislature to create jobs and stimulate the economy is being realized because of the production incentive. You have attracted and hosted Hawaii 5-0 for eight seasons...and now magnum PI, for a second season. Both television series together employ nearly 1,000 cast and crew members.

In addition, Hawaii has been the location recently for several major theatrical motion pictures including most recently Hobbs and Shaw, the Fast and Furious spin-off starring Dwayne Johnson and Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom, both from Universal Studios; as well as Jungle Cruise from Disney Studios that was filmed on Kauai.

SB33 creates stability and predictability for producers. SB33 paves the way for Hawaii 5-0 and Magnum PI in future years upon renewal, as well as, potentially, new television and streaming series as well as motion picture productions.

Production economy activity in Hawaii was estimated to be 500 million dollars, which is total spent over the past five years.

This year alone an estimated 300 million will be invested into Hawaii's economy.

Because of the tax incentive program, Hawaii has enjoyed a vibrant motion picture and television industry. This translates into jobs in a wide range of industries well beyond production casts and crews. Page 4: The proposed strikethrough would lift the deadline for a company to file its credit claim within twelve months after the close of its taxable year, after which time the credit would be lost. This amendment will provide important certainty to taxpayers in the event there are a large number of certifications submitted to the state at the end of a taxable year. Any possible back-up of the certifications might cause a production company to lose its eligibility for the credit if the approval is delayed.

Page 14: Retroactivity from January 1, 2019 would eliminate the administrative uncertainty related to currently active productions and whether their funds would be capped or require additional certifications.

My name is Bob Toyofuku and I am presenting this testimony on behalf of the NBCUniversal in strong support of S.B. 33, Proposed SD 1, Relating to Economic Development.

The Proposed SD 1 removes the maximum amount of tax credits (\$35,000,000), commonly referred to as the "cap," which went into effect as of January 1st of this year. The State of Hawaii has historically offered a stable, predictable and uncapped incentive program, which when combined with stunning locations and a talented, collegial workforce, has allowed companies like NBCUniversal to film some of its most iconic content in the state. Over the past 9 years, Hawaii has been hosted filming for signature titles such as *Battleship*, *Jurassic World* and *Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom*. During this time, NBCUniversal spent in excess of \$117MM on labor, goods and services in the Hawaii economy, shot 540 location days, and hired over 9,094 Hawaii workers in front of and behind the camera. Indeed, NBCUniversal just recently filmed on Kauai, , hiring 135 local workers and spending more than \$8MM on local hotels, \$650K on local vehicle rentals and \$1.5MM on location fees.

With an uncapped stable incentive, Hawaii has competed successfully with leading global production centers to attract film and television projects produced for worldwide distribution. From 2016 through 2018 productions filming in Hawaii generated more than \$990MM in spending with steady growth year over year.

As global production continues to grow (495 scripted series were produced last year, an increase from 422 in 2015 and 288 in 2012 and feature film production is increasing on average 7% per year), there is an opportunity for Hawaii to continue attracting direct investment and expanding its production base.

With the current amount of filming already been done in the state, incentives under the \$35MM cap will quickly be exhausted which will inhibit future growth in state's the entertainment industry. Proposed SD 1 is imperative in order to maintain a positive trajectory in economic development in the state.

- When I am not working, the state is disbursing a full week of unemployment insurance instead of having a production company paying me 4 to 5 times this amount with medical insurance, social security and state tax deductions.

The movie Industry is a safe industry, working under strict safety rules, we are all professionally trained for our craft. We leave the filming locations cleaner than we found them, the explosions (Pearl Harbor, Tears of the Sun, King Kong, Tropic Thunder, Middway), the car chases (Hawai'i Five O, Magnum PI), the submarine (Last Resort) the dinosaurs (Jurassic World) The gorilla in the jungle (King Kong), the monster creating a tsunami in Waikiki (Godzilla) and the plane crash (Lost) are all fake. The dreams we give to people, of a paradisiac island (Blue Hawai'i, 51st Kiss, Aloha) The sandy beaches and turquoise water (Bay Watch, Blue Crush, Water World), The motorcycle chase in the jungle (Jumanji), the story telling (**Princess Kaiulani**), those dreams are forever on film. We are sending a free brochure that will last eternally and will be available to anyone around the world. Prior to working in the industry my income was less than 30K per year as a private school teacher in 2014. As I became established in the film industry, my salary has increased to over 80K per year. I now qualify for a mortgage because il have been able to show consistent income in the last two years. This is largely due to having two episodic tv shows filming on Oahu and a steady stream of movies filming on Oahu and Kauai.

However, I am concerned about the stability of the industry due to the cap on the Motion Picture, Digital Media, & Film Production Tax credit. I cannot rest assured that my employment will remain stable enough for me to move forward on purchasing a home. I fear that the industry will suffer a tremendous lull if the ceiling on the credit is not removed.

With the cap in place, we see production companies utilizing Hawaii for a shortened period of principal photography and moving the other states that do not impose a limit on the tax credit such as Atlanta. My name is Brad Starks and I'm a freelance photographer and producer/actor based here on Maui since 2014 and live in Upcountry Maui. I also am CEO and Senior Digital Content Manager of NIMTC (Neighbor Islands Movie And Television Consortium) and NIFG (Neighbor Island Film Group). I also act as coordinator / producer with ACTNOW PRODUCTIONS. We work with local talent in developing their skills to get booked on TV, film and video jobs. As a freelance producer I've worked on well over 100 TV/film productions for major networks such as A&E, Travel Channel, MTV, CBS, NBC, ABC, Netflix and major film studios. Most recently was the reality show for USA network called "TEMPTATION ISLAND". The action - adventure film "CITY OF GOLD" that was shot on Maui 3 years ago has caught the eye of major filmmakers in Hollywood. The film outperformed top Hollywood blockbusters like "Shape of Water" and "Spider-Man: Homecoming". I created NIMTC & NIFG as a grass-roots digital conduit to spread the word of upcoming productions and work opportunities to local, first time, freelance workers. To date we have been able to successfully place more than 500 local Maui residents on tv/film and photo shoot productions. Since becoming a member of the Maui film/TV community I've been blessed to support myself solely through commercial productions from mainland and throughout the state of Hawaii from private clients and Hawaii based brands. When big and small commercial productions come to Maui, mainlanders need help getting organized and hiring people that not only know the island but can provide valuable knowledge needed to get all the work done according to their demanding work schedules. They benefit from and learn what I call "Local Maui Protocol" from the local workers they hire. Maui workers are hard working, professional and defense "Aloha" generously. Every mainland production team that has come to Maui has always commented on how great they loved their time shooting here. The Major Studios bring productions here because of our tax incentive and hard working professional workers. Our incentive has been severely restricted by a \$35 million dollar cap. This basically tells production companies to limit the costs of what they can spend. This is not a good policy. From talking with our current film commissioner and several other contacts in NYC, LA, and Chicago, there are several filmmakers that have their

eye on Maui to bring more work and spend millions of dollars. Last year, Maui brought in almost a BILLION dollars in revenues! The economic impact of what we can do this year is limitless! The film tax credit creates good high-paying jobs by attracting high end productions to Maui and generates revenue for our county. Let's not limit the intake of this work! I've seen the work benefit many in helping them feed their families, put kids through college and get many started on new careers.

Currently the film industry in Hawaii enjoys a 20-25% Motion Picture, Digital Media, & Film Production Tax credit. This credit is designed to encourage production in the state, and it attracts productions that employ many of our members. Hawai'i must be willing to beyond tourism support other industries that are willing to abide by Hawai'i State Labor Law and give opportunities to careers here in Hawai'i that would normally not come here without monetary incentive. Usually, I am a strong opponent on the provision of cut taxes. This industry through its presence here in Hawai'i can stimulate other businesses through the purchase of supplies, materials etc. that go into the production of films motion picture, digital media other areas that constitute the "film" industry. Hawai'i by virtue of its geographic isolation production must buy supplies from Hawai'i or provide evidence thereof pursuant to HRS §235-17 (d)5. This will inturn support businesses here create more jobs to increase in demand for goods and services and allow for a larger tax base.

However, with that said I would like to make a friendly amendment, That HRS §235-17 (d) be amended by inserting a section(s) in subsection (d) to be amended a read:

"(7) Provide evidence to increase the potential pool of Hawai'i talent to allow for more for local residents of Hawai'i to join labor unions toward the furtherance of the local film and television and digital media industries and support domestic capacity."

"(8) Provide evidence that the Host culture was consulted by why of consulting firms in Hawai'i that specialize in accurate depictions of host culture: language, arts, hula, in areas not otherwise specified."

The suggested amendments to this will bring a stronger connection toward local Hawai'i residents which fosters a symbiotic relationship where the community will see the film industry (even with the possible interruptions due to filming and production etc.) as a beneficial and necessary component to the job market here in Hawai'i whereas currently, public perception is that the industry to "closed off" only to a select group.

Thank you for the opportunity to give testimony and suggestion which can strengthen the language on this bill to support the needs of state and residents.

Every other election cycle the number dropped lower and lower, until one day the \$296 Million dollars allocated was spent two years before anticipated. This left the state with no money for film productions and immediately two shows closed shop and left.

HBO's Ballers finished their third season in LA and Netflix's Bloodline said goodbye to the Florida Keys forever. Both shows were successful but neither renewed for another season and it was not due to a lack of viewership. Losing the incentive caused a ripple effect in many industries across Florida which forced a lot of my friends and family to leave the state, myself included.

Every industry benefits from having a major motion picture or television show produced in their state. Georgia has been reaping the benefits of a **40% tax incentive with no cap** and in 2017, I saw an economic impact of **\$9.5 BILLION dollars**, \$8 Billion in 2016. Like many others in the film industry, I left Miami and followed the tax incentives to Georgia and California, but I never felt at home in either of those places. My love for the islands helped me decide to plant roots in Honolulu. I have been blessed to be able to work on Hawaii 5.0, Magnum P.I. and various commercials because - for the moment - we are busy. Oahu is the first place I have been able to call home since leaving Miami, and I hope to one day start a family and raise my keiki here.

I experienced **the repercussions of a cap** on the tax incentive first hand, and **it is hardly noticeable at first** but once the downward spiral begins **it accelerates exponentially across all industries**. Do not make the same mistake as Florida politicians by assuming tourist dollars are enough to sustain the local economy because when productions stop shooting in your town everyone suffers. We work in an industry where the possibilities are endless, please do not put a limit on what is possible for the people of Hawaii by setting a ceiling on our tax incentive.

I have also seen the film business change to the point that film tax credits are the single most important factor in determining where fiming is done. A case in point is Louisiana. There was a period where a majority of work outside of L. A. was shot there beccause of their generous tax credits. When they imposed a 50 million cap on those credits work virtually vanished and Atlanta, Detroit, and New mexico became the go to states. Hawaii is unique in that can offer warm weather and tropical film locations which can be difficult to duplicate elsewhere. The hurricane damage to the infrastucture in Puerto Rico and the increasing violent crime in Mexico have made those locations much less desireable. This gives Hawaii a strong position in providing those unique locations. I have personally benifitted from the tax credits that have been put in place in Hawaii. We have enjoyed the busiest period i can remember during my time in the business. These tax breaks are nt just a benifit for the working members of the film industry. The myriad of vendors, hotels, restaurants, stores, and attractions throughout our state also recieve incresed busines during film production periods. All this money gets spent and respent time and again for every possible expense these employes experience. Most purchases generate revenue through excise tax, or property tax, or income tax, etc. that would not exist without this additional income. In closing I ask that we dont wait until the negative effect of this tax credit cap beome evident. Let us continue to benifit from the revenus streams that the film business createsand abolish the cap.

We have a strong base 3 crews deep of highly skilled born and bred technicians I am proud to support when recommending to incoming producers. I aslo write Purchase Orders and Check Requests to outside vendors and can attest to the huge amount of money directly spent to local vendors.

Lastly I am involved in booking of travel, accomodations, reservations etc and know that the average film guest in the islands spends and exponentially larger amount daily than our most lucrative guests the Japanese Tourist. I once crunched the numbers and a film visitor spends on average approximately five times as much daily. Understandably taken at face value economists may say in black in white that the State is paying out more than they are getting back directly but that is not the case if you look at the broader picture and the invaluable impact to the island's ecomonly as a whole. What's more, every time our beloved home is featured on-screen it becomes an opportunity to showcase the many trasures of our land and draw the film tourist who will spend money to see where their favorite shows and movies were filmed.

The ripple effect of accomodating large media and film projects here is felt positively far and wide in our local community. I fear that if we place a cieling the negative impact of NOT having work for the film and TV industry will harm families and our economy. Aloha,

My name is Kevin Sawicki and I've been working professionally in Hawaii's film industry for 5 years. I am based in Honolulu, Hawaii. I am in **support of SB33 SD1** to have the **ceiling be removed.**

These tax benefits encourage in-state film production and should continue to be increased and developed to keep our competitive edge against other states and countries. These tax incentives directly increase the creation of jobs, small businesses and infrastructure development, the generation of tax revenue, and increased tourism as **positive** byproducts of the incentives.

The immediate effect of a tax incentive is the direct production spend for the region in hotel rooms for visiting cast and crew, lumber for sets, food for catering, fuel for trucks and generators, to the secondary expenditures of crew members who go to local restaurants for dinner, the dry cleaners for their laundry, and the need for everyday items from toothpaste to shampoo. These expenses average in the millions of dollars on a typical Studio feature which usually carries approximately a 100 traveling crew members and **employs another 100-300 crew locally.**

In addition to expenses and labor, the production provides hands-on training for local employees to learn key skills in the trade of filmmaking and helps to develop the experienced crew base that will make the area more valuable in reducing the number of crew a production will need to import the next time around.

Film tourism has become a significant multiplier of the initial investment by the region in providing increased tourism marketing opportunities at a fraction of the media buy necessary through taking advantage of the extensive marketing efforts by a studio. A perfect example of this is what Kualoa Ranch has been doing, by having film productions leave props from the film and pay to install signs with the movie poster and name for their tour routes. (i.e. Jurassic Park, King Kong, 50 First Dates, etc)

As a 28 year old filmmaker, I am very fortunate to have been given the opportunity to interface and work on a lot of the larger film productions that have come to Hawaii (Magnum P.I., Hawaii Five-O, Kong: Skull Island, Godzilla vs Kong) as well as

many smaller commercials and projects that still qualify for the tax incentive. Our film industry has allowed me to start my own business and save enough money to finally purchase a home in January of 2019!

I am a living example of the way the tax incentive has benefitted a resident in our state, but I have worked side-by-side with hundreds of other local residents and know the impact of the film industry and tax incentive are far-reaching.

Please remove the ceiling and pass SB33 SD1.



Local 665 represents over 1,100 stagehands, film and television workers throughout the State, up from 753 in 2014 (see graph). Last year was our busiest year-to-date, and we continue to train new workers to keep up with the demand. Hawai'i's film industry creates good-paying jobs. As our State loses residents to the mainland, we have been blessed with two television shows and several films that allow us to remain in our homeland, work in an industry we love and provide for our families.



We have enjoyed an uncapped industry for over ten years. Our numbers have grown, and the economic impact is at almost a BILLION dollars. That's new money — not lateral money — that comes into the State and reaches far into the economy, allowing people to buy homes, create businesses and increase their quality of life. Keeping the cap will indicate to employers that investing in our film industry will stifle a return on their investment. Other cities have suffered when a cap was implemented because employers went to uncapped markets. The cap will drastically affect our earning potential and make it very difficult to have Just One Job, let alone living in the most expensive State in the nation.

What we do requires technical expertise, and the technology keeps changing. Some of the bigger shows bring the latest technology to our doorstep which would cost thousands of dollars to travel to the mainland to learn. No one uses a Blackberry anymore. That's just an example of how a piece of equipment can corner the market one day and then cease to exist the next. If we are to remain competitive, we need to be able to work with the newest equipment and adapt to a changing environment. Big shows bring that gear, and we get hands-on training.

Our film industry needs to continue to thrive for many years to come. The students of the ACM program and the West Oahu Student Film Academy need to have good, stable jobs when they graduate, or they will go where the work is. If that happens, we will be educating someone else's workforce.

In closing, our technicians appreciate Chair Wakai, Vice Taniguchi and the committee's continued support of the film industry. We humbly ask that the committee pass SB 33, SD 1, RETROACIVE TO JANUARY 1, 2019, so that Hawai'i's film industry may continue its upward growth.



Aloha, Chair Glenn Wakai, VIce Chair Brian Taniguchi and ETT Committee Members:

I started in the film business over 20 years ago as a driver. In those days, film companies would ship their trucks and equipment into the State, and their drivers would come with them. If it had a CA license plate, a CA driver was needed to drive it.

Today, I am a Transportation Captain on features and TV shows. I own two equipment and truck rental companies. I have invested hundreds of thousands of dollars of my own money into buying Honeywagons, cast trailers, 4x4 stakebed trucks, box trucks, etc. I have invested close to a million dollars just to purchase the land we park the trucks on. These trucks are all driven by Hawaii drivers - every single one of them. As I buy more equipment to meet demand, more Hawaii drivers are being hired to drive them. These films bring good-paying jobs.

Film companies are very concerned about the cost of shipping equipment to Hawaii, so they are very relieved to learn that we have movie equipment here in the islands. Having the inventory here really helps with their budget, but the real reason they come here is because of the film tax credit.

These films have allowed me to purchase a home for me, my wife and our twin children. Both of our children go to a private school and are being raised in a good environment. They are learning to be good citizens, which is priceless. I'm not sure where we would be without the income I earn from the film industry.

If the \$35 million cap keeps films from coming here, I stand to lose everything! These trucks are specialized trucks, used only for film work. I couldn't repurpose them for other industries. If work goes away, they will sit idle, and I would need to close at least one of my companies.

I urge the committee to remove the cap from the tax credit, retroactively to January 1st, 2019. It was doing what it was designed to do and has consistently brought jobs to the State and allowed many of us to thrive in our industry. If there is a budgetary shortfall, let's find a solution without crippling a healthy, film industry.

Aloha kakou. I am Mary Ann Changg. I have been a proud member of I.A.T.S.E. Mixed Local 665, Hawaii's Film Industry union, for twenty plus years. I work part-time primarily as a make-up artist. With more production, maybe I could work full time. A year ago, I suggested eliminating the \$35 million ceiling. I am so happy to be here today to say, "Yes, away with the \$35 million cap!"

Hawaii's cap, is just a bit over one-tenth over California's, which dedicates \$330 million in funding towards four production categories: TV Projects, Relocating TV, Indie Features, and Non-Indie Features. Of the \$330 million in funding, \$66 million is set aside for relocating TV series." In comparison, New York has a cap of \$420 million. Last year, Atlanta, Georgia, currently known as the "Hollywood of the South," which has no cap, and was ranked #1 in production dollars then, brought in \$9.5 BILLION, completing a record 455 TV and film productions, while giving \$800 million in credits. Georgia Governor Brian Kemp called the entertainment tax credit "an amazing success story." Hawaii's \$35 million cap is so teeny tiny!

To date: Atlanta and the U.K. is tied for second in Film and TV productions, with Canada as number one. None have tax credit caps. Good news Today, many in Hollywood want to boycott Atlanta, Georgia, because of recent political, religious, LGBT and racial issues. Perfect timely for Hawaii to produce bigger incentives and interest to bring more productions here. Hollywood already wants to come here. Let's make it even nicer for them.

We had a good year in 2018 and it seems to be still growing into 2019. Industry infrastructure is slowly building in the Kapolei, Kaka'ako, Halawa areas, utilizing previously unused warehouses.
