DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this resolution. DHS has a large stake in reducing inequalities and the impact and the incidence of poverty in Hawaii, and to promote the social and economic mobility of Hawaii's residents. DHS provides benefits and services to one in four Hawaii residents, or nearly 360,000 individuals. Benefits and services include financial assistance, supplemental nutrition assistance programs, child care subsidies, rental assistance, an array of services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness, education and employment supports, health insurance, protective, and vocational rehabilitation services.

DHS is part of the national movement to improve the delivery of human services lead by the National Governors' Association, the American Public Human Services Association, Ascend of the Aspen Institute, and others. DHS is adopting a service integration and multigenerational approach, is redesigning its business processes, and continues to improve its technology systems. DHS is also engaged in its first departmental strategic plan to improve overall program outcomes

and establish outcome measures of services for children, parents, and families geared to reduce adverse risks and increase protective factors that promote educational attainment and wage progression that lead to economic self-sufficiency.

Ultimately, the goals of our transformation are consistent with the 2030 Development Agenda to end poverty. We are redesigning our system and services to support the improved well-being of individuals, families, and the community, reduce intergenerational poverty, reduce dependence on public benefits, and reduce the human and fiscal costs of poverty.

There is also clear evidence that low income populations often bear the negative impacts of modern industrial life, and that one's physical environment has profound impact on one's health and well-being. The need for preservation of the environment and equitable development principles are foundational elements for Hawaii's residents to thrive.

PURPOSE: The purpose of this resolution is to engage, endorse, accept, and adopt the AARHUS Convention to Achieve the United Nations Paris Agreement, The 2030 Agenda, and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
