CyberHawaii is committed to developing and enhancing Hawaii's public and private sector cybersecurity capabilities. Through collaborative partnerships with Federal, State, and County government agencies and local and national industry leaders, CyberHawaii has been preparing and supporting those on the frontlines of cyber defense.

II. Background and Summary

CyberHawaii, an affiliate of CyberUSA, is committed to creating a whole of community approach that mitigates and reduces cyber risk, develops educational and workforce pathways for students, and invests in training and support for both the public and private sectors to create a more cyber secure and resilient Hawaii.

Cyber is one of our nation's most significant concerns. The Department of Defense's establishment of Cyber as a war-fighting combatant command is a telling statement about our nation's need to play both offense and defense in the protection of our national security. Cyber risks affect all aspects of our lives and in the function of government, from utilities (power and water), telecommunications, fuel, healthcare, transportation and financial services, which comprise the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) 16 Critical Infrastructures. Cyber attacks have crippled state and county governments and targeted Hawaii's main industries—Defense, Tourism, Financial Institutions, Health, Construction and Retail.

CyberHawaii is an information and resource sharing organization committed to developing and enhancing Hawaii's cybersecurity capabilities. DHS' Homeland Security Information Network (HSIN) is the online platform that is used to communicate threat and threat mitigation matters between CyberHawaii members and our government partners.

CyberHawaii's objectives and goals are implemented through regularly scheduled meetings, workshops, symposiums, and thru an Education and Workforce Development Committee and a Resources Committee.

In line with Hawaii's P-20 approach to develop cradle to career pathways, CyberHawaii's Education and Workforce Development Committee has focused on cyber curriculum development in partnership with the State Department of Education, the University of Hawaii system, private institutions and nonprofit organizations. This includes facilitating student internships within public and private industry and running competitive programs that encourage students to consider a cyber career, such as GenCyber Camps, STEM Conferences, the CyberPatriot Program, picoCTF (Capture the Flag) Competition and CyberHawaii's Girl Scout's of Hawaii PSA and Poster Contest.

CyberHawaii's Resource Committee provides extensive outreach and resources to Hawaii public and private sector leaders and employees on the front lines through its Statewide Cyber Defense 101 workshop series. In addition to bringing federal and state leaders and local experts in the field to educate and engage with businesses and government representatives, CyberHawaii provides access to curriculum and training materials, assessment tools and cybersecurity support services.

The United States Indo-Pacific Command (INDOPACOM) initiated the Defensive Cyber Industry Consortium (DCIC) in order for Federal, State, and industry entities to proactively harden Critical Infrastructure/Key Resources (CIKR) cyber defenses and to synchronize response actions to ensure all sectors can operate during an enduring cyber crisis.

INDOPACOM operations are dependent on five essential CIKR sectors (electric utility, telecommunications, water/sewer, maritime transportation, oil/fuel) in order to maintain

defenses in the event of a cyber warfare event, where Hawaii would likely be isolated from the rest of the nation. INDOPACOM lacks situational awareness and an established coordination mechanism to ensure the protection of these five essential CIKR sectors and the State of Hawaii's capacity to provide a single credible point of coordination is limited.

CyberHawaii has partnered with INDOPACOM and the State of Hawaii Department of Defense in the implementation of the DCIC in Hawaii to accomplish the following objectives:

- Establish cross-sector, shared cyber threat situational awareness and response across the five identified critical infrastructure sectors
- Decrease aggregate risk and better prepare Federal, State and industry response options in the event of a CIKR cyber-attack against Hawaii by increasing resiliency against cyber-attack and decreasing service restoration timelines
- Integrate with the INDOPACOM Defensive Cyber Coordination Center

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

This request is submitted to support CyberHawaii's goal of improving the cyber capabilities and strengthening the cyber defenses of Hawaii's critical infrastructure companies and organizations, businesses, and government agencies and employees. As a result of Hawaii's geographic location and economic generators, it is critical that all public and private entities, whether large or small, are aware of their cybersecurity responsibilities and their connection to the community at large. CyberHawaii will continue its advocacy and assistance to develop the cyber capabilities and defenses across all sectors of Hawaii's economy and statewide throughout our communities.

The requested \$100,000 will assist CyberHawaii in conducting CyberDefense 101 trainings and workshops statewide through the following deliverables:

- Four neighbor island Cyber Defense 2.0 workshops, targeting specific supports and strategies for small and medium sized businesses, local utilities and infrastructure, and nonprofit organizations
- Five state government employee Cyber Defense 101 workshops (Hawaii, Kauai, Maui & two on Oahu) engaging and educating front line employees in cooperation with the State Office of Enterprise Technology Services (ETS)
- Execution of the Hawaii Corporate Security Symposium with the Department of Homeland Security which may be expanded to include international companies (allied nations of the U.S.).
- Three Industry Specific Workshops/initiatives focused on strengthening the cyber awareness and defense as it relates to their field (ie. Real estate, senior citizens, nonprofit organizations, financial institutions)

 Creation of a Speaker's Bureau to create access statewide to professionals and peers knowledgeable and experienced in cyber defense strategies and attacks

With ever expanding technological advancements, locally and globally cyber security is one of our most significant concerns as it poses a constant threat to national security as well as the health, safety, and quality of life of all our residents.

Keeping ahead of these threats means being on both the offense and defense when it comes to protecting public and private entities and individuals from attacks. Cyber risks affect all aspects of our daily lives from utilities (power and water), telecommunications, energy and fuel, healthcare, transportation and financial services. An attack on any one of these critical infrastructures could cripple our state and have devastating and long standing impacts on our well developed industries, let alone our state and county governments.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

A broad cross section of public and private entities, including but not limited to state departments and employees, nonprofit organizations, and Hawaii businesses and organizations statewide, including critical infrastructures such as transportation, energy and fuel, telecommunications, financial institutions, health, defense, tourism and construction. - Partnered with the Department of Homeland security (DHS) to put on an annual Corporate Security Symposium since 2018, with plans underway for 2020. More than 200 attendees participated in the full day event in 2019.
- Grown its membership to 31 dues paying members, 9 government partners, 8 strategic affiliate partners, and is reaching out to critical nonprofit organizations to join free of charge.
- Further establishing collaborative relationships with federal, state and local government agencies: NSA, FBI, DHS, USINDOPACOM, State Department of Defense, State Office of Enterprise Technology Services and the Board of Water Supply.
- Supported UH's GenCyber Camps for students and teachers as a collaboration with NSA and the National Science Foundation.
- CyberHawaii's Education and Workforce Committee led the first NSA Day of Cyber in Hawaii for students in the Fall of 2018 with prizes given to the winning schools: Kapolei HS and Kauai HS. 38 schools and 2,776 students participated.
- Expanded student outreach holding the first ever CyberHawaii Girl Scouts PSA and Poster Contest in 2019 and supporting students participating in the picoCTF (Capture the Flag) contest.
- Annually supports the Future Focus Innovation Conference's Cybersecurity session, bringing in such keynote speakers as Sony's Chief Information Security Officer at the time of their breach, U.S. Army Cyber Commander to the Dean of the NSA Cyber College, Glenn Hernandez of the US Cyber Challenge, and Kevin Klein, Homeland Security Advisor to the Governor of Colorado who was the first in the country to issue an emergency declaration due to a cyber attack.
- Brought in industry and federal resources to host workshops on resilience, business email compromise, and phishing alerts and campaigns.
- Participated in the University of Hawaii at West Oahu Internship Program.
