Innovations Public Charter School Foundation (Innovations Foundation) supports Innovations Public Charter School. The mission of Innovations Foundation is to provide facilities, raise funds for capital campaigns, and to seek contributions to preserve the endowment for Innovations Public Charter School. The Foundation also seeks to improve community relations and invites the community to be part of the campus in school community partnership activities.

#### 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this request is to seek funds for infrastructure upgrades to the Innovations' Foundation Campus which include:

- Paving of parking lot and driveway of main entrance to community recreational area,
- Solar electricity system to create sustainable clean energy for the entire 9.298 acre facility,
- Re-roofing of administrative building and adjacent after-school use / kindergarten building.

These infrastructure upgrades will enable the Innovations Foundation to better serve the community. Innovations Public Charter School is located on 9.298 beautiful ocean view acres in the heart of Kailua-Kona. The Innovations Foundation is striving to utilize the campus as not only a top performing state charter school, but also as a thriving community center. The vision is to have community recreational facilities to serve all of West Hawaii. In 2015, the Innovations Foundation installed a community soccer field, 3,000 sq. ft. pavilion and basketball court where club and community teams can play and practice sports. In 2016, over one acre of new community gardens were planted. In 2020, a community recreational center is to be constructed. This community recreational center will provide afterschool dance, music, drama, robotics, healthy cooking and gardening classes. The recreational center will also be used by the school and garden teacher for healthy snack, lunch and afterschool meals. The recreational center construction costs are already fully funded. This request is for infrastructure upgrades which will allow better access and parking and sustainable green energy. Additionally, the Foundation will be replacing two roofs that are over 35 years old – all other buildings are new or have been fully renovated over the last five years.

#### 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Currently, Innovations Public Charter School serves 241 students (Kindergarten through 8<sup>th</sup> grade) in the heart of Kailua-Kona on the Big Island. Our rigorous project based curriculum, rich in the arts and technology, has created and overwhelming demand for enrollment in our school. The infrastructure improvements will allow us to better serve our community with weekend and afterschool programs throughout the year.

With the help of the West Hawaii community, Innovations has delivered excellence in education for the past 16 years. Innovations received Public Charter School of the Year in 2012 and most recently, in 2015, Innovations received both the Most Improved Public Charter School and the Director of the Year Award. These awards were attributed to:

• "Receiving a 20% higher performance rate for academic performance than comparable public schools in the same area as measured by the Hawaii State

Assessment" – Innovations has small class size, rigorous project based learning, and tutors in every classroom which translates to better student achievement.

Innovations Public Charter School Foundation secured in-kind, community donations, and commercial financing to purchase 9.298 beautiful fee simple ocean view acres in the heart of Kailua-Kona. With the help of community members, foundations and a state grant in aid, Innovations has constructed over 30.000 square feet of state of the art classroom, administrative and community recreational areas for its faculty, students and the West Hawaii Community. All facilities are fully permitted and ADA compliant.

The infrastructure upgrades are needed to keep the facility in excellent condition and provide green energy and adequate access to all existing facilities. The infrastructure upgrades will be the final piece tying in the gardens, soccer and basketball courts and outdoor pavilions and over 30,000 square feet of buildings together.

For the requested infrastructure upgrades, Innovations' Foundation board will take the same great care to provide the best quality infrastructure at the least cost to the state and community. The actual construction will be a bid process compliant with the Foundation's and the State of Hawaii procurement policies. All board members are non-compensated individuals that have no financial interest or conflict of interest in the project.

The Innovations Foundation Board and Leadership Team have established a Construction Committee lead by Lee Nelson, Business Manager, Ed Rapoza, Board Member, William Wong, CPA, Board Member and Schel Leatherman, Board Secretary. The Building and Construction Committee will act as the agent to 1) manage contracts, 2) obtain permits, 3) review progress of construction, 4) review the quality of construction, including arranging interim inspections, 5) process clarification requests and produce submittals, 6) approve contractor payment requests, 7) assure that all processes follow applicable laws and policies related to procurement of construction.

Innovations Foundation has an independent financial audit performed annually.
