Established in 2002, The Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawaii is a community-based, 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization located in Hauiula, Oiahu. Our mission is to promote and preserve elements of Asian and American traditional and cultural values that positively contribute to the social, economic, and educational progress and spiritual well-being of our multi-ethnic island communities.

The Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawai'i has always welcomed people from diverse backgrounds and cultures as we believe that there is unity in diversity, and we share the

spirit of Aloha with one and all. Dating back to initial migration of Laotian farmers to Kahuku, the Laotian community continues to contribute positively to the greater north O'ahu community.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goals and objectives of this capital project is to establish a welcoming community gathering space, where community members can come together in a safe and serene place without having to travel far from home. Once completed, the Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawai'i's multi-purpose community center will serve as the north O'ahu community's meeting center (communities from Kahuku to Ka'a'awa), where residents can host community meetings and events or celebrate special occasions with family and friends.

Nationally, community centers create public spaces for community events, exercise classes, meditation retreats, and other community events in safe and inviting environments. While the process of building community centers are often times difficult and costly, they provide incalculable benefits for the communities where they are constructed. There are a multitude of benefits that a community center can provide including a safe and covered place for community events, a space for youth to interact with one another and establish relationships, promote community involvement, improve the value of a community, and promote better health and happiness through exercise.

Once completed, our goal is to have the community space occupied by community groups and members throughout the week, creating a community gathering space in heart of Hau'ula on the Island of O'ahu.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

After years of community-led discussions regarding the need for a multi-purpose community center in north Oʻahu, the leadership team at the Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawaiʻi has responded by raising critically needed funding and initiating construction of a multi-purpose community center from the betterment of the north Oʻahu community. The community center will serve as a permanent community space that will address our rural community's need for a community space for generations to come.

To ease rural isolation, the Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawai'i began constructing a multi-purpose community center on the organization's 5-acre parcel located on Puhuli Road. The center is approximately 60% completed and is slated to open to the public by 2021. Complete with a commercial grade community kitchen, multi-stall restrooms, and ample covered air-conditioned space, the multi-purpose community center will become the social and civic hub of the north Oʻahu community.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The target population for the proposed multi-purpose community center includes residents and students residing between Kahuku and Ka'a'awa. The breakdown of this population includes:

Kahuku – 2,614 La'ie – 6,138 Kahalu'u – 4,738 Hau'ula – 4,148 Punalu'u 1,164 Ka'a'awa – 1,379 Brigham Young University - Hawai'i – 2,952

Our community (from Kahuku to Kaʻaʻawa) is home to five (5) Title 1 schools, with Title 1 eligibility percentages ranging between 49.49% – 66.03% and Brigham Young University – Hawaiʻi. Irrespective of family's financial capacity, members of all communities should have access to safe spaces where they can go to socialize, exercise, get back to nature, and care for themselves. Once completed, the new multipurpose community center will serve as a gathering place for north Oʻahu residents, creating a stronger, more unified community.

Describe the geographic coverage.

In rural north Oʻahu, there is a need for a welcoming community gathering space, where community members can come together in a safe and serene place without having to travel far from home. Once completed, the Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawaiʻi's multi-purpose community center will serve as the north Oʻahu community's meeting center (communities from Kahuku to Kaʻaʻawa), where residents can host community meetings and events or celebrate special occasions with family and friends.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

To support the sustainable improvement in the well-being and quality of life our local communities, especially low to moderate income rural areas, the Lao Buddhist Foundation of Hawai'i will construct an 11,000 sq. ft. multi-purpose community center on the organizations 5-acre parcel located on Puhuli Road in the rural town of Hau'ula. Once the original settlement in Hawai'i for first generation of Laotian farmers, the north O'ahu community is home to a diverse population of Hawai'i residents. We believe that diversity unifies our north O'ahu community and we are in the process of building a community space that will further bring together our community members.

The multi-purpose community center will host a variety of features that will positively impact the lives of our north Oʻahu residents. The community center will be complete with a certified community kitchen to help implement public health strategies to prevent food insecurity through reducing social isolation, improving food and cooking skills and empowering participants. As contributing members of Hawaiʻi's farming and agriculture industry for decades, the Laotian community will offer our north Oʻahu community members healthy eating and cooking workshops with the intent of creating a healthier and sustainable community. The 5-acre parcel that the community center sits upon is filled with an organic community vegetable garden and fruit trees, creating a garden-totable atmosphere, an environment that inspires healthy living and wellness.

Additionally, the 11,000 sq. ft. multi-purpose community center will double as an emergency community shelter in the case of natural disaster. The large open floorplan makes it ideal to house emergency evacuees during times of natural disaster. Once completed, our team will work with the Red Cross and other disaster relief agencies to create another emergency shelter options for our friends and neighbors.

The center is approximately 60% completed and is slated to open to the public by 2022. Complete with a commercial grade community kitchen, multi-stall restroom facilities, and ample covered air-conditioned space, the multi-purpose community center will become a social and civic hub of the north O'ahu community once completed.

To complete this capital project, LBFH will need to complete the following constructionrelated items.

Sihavong brings to the Foundation, decades of professional experience working with Fortune 50 companies and continues to infuse his knowledge, skillsets, and professionalism into the capital campaign. 

- Owner's representatives work with their project owners regarding the close out of their construction process. Other duties offered by an owner's representative includes field supervision, budgeting and cost control.
- Regardless of product type or services they sell, their foremost tasks are to attract buyers as well as purchasing agents in their services or merchandise and to properly address clients' concerns and questions. Owner's representative demonstrates products and advises their clients on the function of the products in order to increase revenue and reduce costs.
