Founded in 2006, Mālama Kaua'i is a community-based, 501(c)3 nonprofit organization that focuses on advocating, educating, and driving action towards a sustainable Kaua'i. In the last few years we have honed our focus on increasing local food consumption and production, as well as building community capacity and growing interest in sustainable tourism.

Mālama Kaua'i has ran the Kaua'i School Garden Network since 2010, and the Kaua'i Farm-to-School Hui since 2018. We also launched the island's first Farm-to-School pilot projects at 2 Hawaiian charter schools from 2014-2019.

The goals and objectives related to the request;

Goal: The goal of the Kaua'i Farm-to-School Hui is to build collaborations that further increase local food access for in-school youth.

Objective 1: By the end of the grant, 50 stakeholders islandwide will be participating in the Kaua'i Farm-to-School Hui Stakeholder group.

Objective 2: By the end of the grant, the Farmer Equipment Reimbursement Program recipients will be awarded and improvements made to farm-to-school distribution channels.

Objective 3: By the end of the grant, all Kauai DOE School Cafeteria Managers will have been provided 4 to 5 from-scratch cooking trainings and will have implemented these techniques and foods into their cafeterias.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Farm-to-school benefits our keiki, our farmers, and our general economy. As a nonprofit organization, we are adept at utilizing funding very efficiently and with little bureaucracy, allowing us to be a great support to the larger institutions leading these efforts.

Currently we have convened and collaborated a Hui of ~40 stakeholders across island in various sectors including education, agriculture, health, food access, and more. Some of the members include Hawaii Department of Education, University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, Hawai'i Farmers Union United, Kumano I Ke Ala/ Aloha Aina Poi Co., Kaua'i District Health Office, Hawai'i State Department of Health, Get Fit Kaua'i, Zero Waste Kaua'i, Hawai'i Food Bank - Kaua'i Branch, Farm to Keiki, Kaua'i Cattlemen's Association, Kaua'i Animal Education Center, Hawai'i Pacific Health, among others. Funds are needed to keep convening these stakeholders and host meetings.

Farmers on the island are inadequately supported to meet GAP/FSMA requirements, allowing them to meet new regulations and distribute to schools. While there have been many technical assistance and training options offered, very little support has been provided to farmers in making the minor upgrades needed to become more compliant to food safety rules and recommendations. These small pieces of equipment and supplies may include mini off-grid solar systems, refrigeration, wash tables, water filtering systems, handwashing sinks, harvesting bins, etc. Every farm's need is different. The Farmer

Equipment Reimbursement Program will help to meet some of these for the farms who are working to distribute to the DOE's Aina Pono program or Hawai'i Food Bank's school food pantries program.

Kaua'i DOE Cafeteria Managers are currently learning to prepare from-scratch meals for students. We would like to supplement their basic culinary training currently being offered by School Food Services Branch with culturally-specific trainings on items that local farmers and producers at a high volume - such as ulu and taro - to help them incorporate keiki-friendly recipes into their menus, and thus purchase more of these products from our local farmers in the future.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The Kaua'i Farm-to-School Hui project serves various sectors in the farm-to-school movement on Kaua'i including schools, farmers and food producers, health organizations, food banks/access orgs, chefs and culinary professionals, and more. The beneficiaries of this work are diverse and ultimately the children (health and food access) and the farmers (economic impacts).

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

This project covers the entire island of Kaua'i, and Ni'ihau as they desire.

- Represent Kaua'i within the Hawai'i State Farm To School Hui, Hawai'i Good Food Alliance, and other statewide networks, attending monthly and quarterly meetings; assist in facilitation of development, trainings and outreach

Mālama Kaua'i (MK) has provided similar services and programming on the island of Kaua'i for over a decade, working directly with farmers and schools. They are currently the island leader in farm-to-school knowledge and efforts - MK has ran the Kaua'i School Garden Network since 2010, and the Kaua'i Farm-to-School Hui since 2018. They also launched the island's first Farm-to-School pilot projects at 2 Hawaiian charter schools from 2014-2019. They have also provided technical assistance, education, and grant distribution services to benefit farmers for many years.

2. Facilities

Staff work from a combination of home offices, and time at Kuleana, a coworking space in Lihue. A majority of the work with this project is also done in the field visiting various farms and schools across the island. The Kuleana coworking space is centrally located on Kaua'i and provides private desks, community seating and conference rooms and builds upon community networking. Fieldwork consists of visits to school gardens and farms; meeting with schools looking to start onsite gardens; school food pantry tours; and meeting local agriculture and livestock producers on their farms.

The Kaua'i Farm-to-School Hui Stakeholder Meetings are held at HA Coffee Bar in Lihue, which is central on the island. HA is a non-profit coffee shop that partners with local coffee and food producers and provides their workspace to non-profits at a low cost. The space is large enough to hold up to 70 attendees, and is available during the evenings when participants have desired to meet.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

MK started this program in 2018, with support from the Department of Health.

Megan, Project Director for the Farm-to-School Project within Mālama Kaua'i, has been with the organization since 2014, working closely with farmers and schools islandwide. Her farm-to-school role includes all project administration, grant management, staff oversight and management, budget management, and assistance with program delivery. Her background knowledge, work experience and relationships in this work and its related sectors continue to lay the groundwork which we build upon in this project.

Megan supports general day-to-day operations, program management, fundraising, and marketing as our Executive Director and Project Director. She was previously the Director of Operations and has been with the organization since 2014. Megan has a diverse background that spans nonprofits, startups, and educational institutions with over a decade of focus on workforce development, organizational capacity building, business development, and program launches and turnarounds. She has a Bachelor of Science in Management and Public Policy with a focus on Human Resources and is a published author on creating job programs. She has also served on the Advisory Board of the University of Hawaii's Kaua`i Master Gardener program and is an active Steering Committee Member of the Hawaii Good Food Alliance.


Joell Edwards, Project Manager for Farm to School has been with the program since May 2019. She leads the collaborative stakeholder group of farm-to-school partners within Kaua'i island's education, agriculture, healthcare and food access sectors to advance implementation of strategic food systems projects, incubating their ideas into tangible projects.

In her work thus far she has not only led stakeholder convenings but has partnered with and worked as a conduit between state agencies, public and charter schools, local food producers, and community partners to advance farm-to-school efforts on Kaua'i. She coordinated school food waste audits with Kokua Hawaii Foundation on nine Kaua'i schools in preparation for the launch of 'Aina Pono menus and will coordinate the same effort post menu implementation. She is the regional coordinator for Hawai'i Department of Education (HIDOE) School Food Services Branch (SFSB) Garden to Cafeteria Program; and a member of State Farm to School Hui Steering Committee and School Food Systems Hui.

Joell came to Mālama Kaua'i as a key volunteer during April 2018's flood and has a strong history in nonprofits, including over a decade of service as a Board Member for foundations and organizations in health, human services, and hunger. She is also a Certified Learning & Development Specialist with extensive project management and marketing experience, who is passionate about facilitating increased local food access.
