National Kidney Foundation of Hawaii (NKFH) aims to prevent kidney disease, improve the health status of those affected by chronic diseases, and increase the availability of all organs for transplantation in Hawaii. Building a healthy community and providing services that reaches a broader system level impact is central to our vision.

We expanded upon our traditional outreach programming to develop innovative services to improve health and well being of individuals who are at the highest risk for chronic diseases. Our team has facilitated transformation of traditional healthcare delivery into a value-based, quality outcome-driven system which prioritizes wellness over end-stage treatment. Clinical support provides a holistic patient-centered quality care approach for chronic disease that treats the full patient has been shown to be critical to the success of this paradigm shift. In additon, NKFH employs a combination of classes and programs that include interactive educational activities to reduce risk factors and improve health outcomes in participants.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The National Kidney Foundation of Hawaii is requesting a \$5 million capital grant to complete the final phase Senator Daniel K. Akaka Community and Resource Center (hereinafter "The Center"), a multipurpose complex being built in Kapolei wherein a large portion of Oahu's patients living with kidney disease reside. The Center will provide a wide range of direct services including clinical services, dietary counselling, medical screenings, chronic disease prevention classes, a meeting space for support groups and classes, teaching kitchen, office space and a facility for large community groups to use or host events.

The Center will provide people affected by kidney disease and other chronic conditions an advantage to preserve their health with clinical and prevention services, direct outreach, advocacy, and low-cost or free direct service programs. Participants will gain the ability and skills which can result in a lifestyle change to delay the progression of their disease and enhance the quality of their lives. The ultimate goal of The Center would be to create a sustainable and a truly "big picture" systemic impact in order to improve Hawaii's community health outcomes.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose and community need to be served includes six key factors that make The Center critical for Hawaii:

(1) Access to Care: The advanced nephrology (kidney) care available is primarily located in Honolulu. For chronically ill, low-income patients living on Oahu from the North Shore to the Waianae coast, traveling into Honolulu for appointments can be overwhelming. Unfortunately, delayed treatment or delayed referral to nephrology care is understandably associated with increased morbidity and mortality, resulting in higher costs of end stage renal disease. The Center will include clinical services, nutritional counselling, comprehensive screening, and education and support services much closer to Central and West Oahu patients to intervene in the debilitating spiral of

- kidney disease. With The Center, we aim to delay and prevent the need for dialysis.
- (2) Behavioral Risks: Factors such as lack of physical activity, obesity related to poor diet, smoking, and drinking alcohol all influence the development and progression of kidney disease. The Center will host programs structured around each patient's health challenges, nutrition programs taught by registered dietitians to manage disease symptoms and obesity, and support groups.
- (3) Chronic Disease Relationships: Chronic diseases such as unchecked hypertension, diabetes, and obesity all are "kidney killers", and this is especially true in Hawaii. Approximately, 1 in 3 adults with diabetes and 1 in 5 adults with high blood pressure may have chronic kidney disease (CKD). In Hawaii, 63% of kidney failure cases are attributed to diabetes. Diabetes is also inextricably linked to obesity. Nearly 80% of diabetes cases are diagnosed in overweight and obese individuals. Diabetes can have a harmful effect on most of the organ systems in the human body and is the frequent cause of end-stage renal disease. In a similar manner, high blood pressure, left unchecked, will destroy the delicate tissues of the kidneys. For all of these reasons, NKFH is working closely with primary care provider, community, and other nonprofits to support patients with diabetes, heart disease, and other chronic illnesses by assisting them in managing their health and well being to avoid or mitigate kidney disease.
- (4) Education and Health Literacy: Individuals screened for high risk of chronic kidney disease have demonstrated a lack of knowledge of high blood pressure, diabetes, and kidney failure. Nationally, 9 in 10 adults with chronic kidney disease do not know they have it. NKFH services increase general awareness and provides resources and assistance to help our patients learn about kidney disease, the treatment process, diet control, transplantation, health insurance coverage, and much more. The access to this information and support will help to mitigate the stress and worry nearly all patients go through when initially learning of, and then dealing effectively with, their diagnosis.
- (5) Early intervention: It is the best way to preserve kidney function and have a chance to avoid ultimate kidney failure and early death. Unfortunately, Hawaii has a severe shortage of nephrologists (kidney specialists), and even if a patient's primary care doctor refers him or her to a specialist early in their disease process, most nephrologists will not accept a patient with kidney disease until it becomes so severe that over 80% of their renal function is gone. Primary care physicians will be able to refer their patients for clinical services, nutrition counseling, access to education and support, and many other related services offered at The Center. This will help to preserve each

patient's kidney function, and in many cases, help avoid the cost and terrible, life-changing results of dialysis.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

In Hawaii, an estimated 197,000 individuals have chronic kidney disease and another 100,000 people are at-risk. Over 4,400 of our friends and neighbors are on dialysis and over 300 are waiting for kidney transplantation. Those in Hawaii are 30% more likely than the national average to be affected by kidney disease due to many factors including diet and nationality.

Patients often do not know they have kidney disease until they are in the emergency room in urgent need of dialysis. Many chronic diseases (i.e., diabetes, heart disease) are directly related to kidney disease. Compounding this, many patients starting dialysis have never seen a nephrologist (kidney specialists).

NKFH has developed a more proactive, multidisciplinary approach to the identification and treatment of people with CKD by focusing its efforts on prevention before end stage and dialysis treatment. On the mainland, patients are usually seen much earlier; when their kidneys are still working at 50%. They have a chance to make lifestyle changes that often can avoid end stage renal disease. Due to the small number of treating physicians vs. the astronomically large and growing number of patients, most only start getting care at about 20% function - when it is too late to make those changes. We are working very hard with our primary care physicians and specialists to change this unfortunate paradigm, and preserve the health and lives of Hawaii's people.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Although, The Center will be located in Kapolei, it will be "the center" of all NKFH services to patients statewide.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

As the community health status worsens, the demand for prevention programs, improvement in health status, and the preservation of health intensifies. There is very restricted capacity to carry out programs that address these needs. To fulfill

NKFH's long-term goals of expanding existing programs and developing new initiatives, a larger facility will be required. The Center will enable NKFH to not only increase the number of people it serves but also, the number and variety of programs it offers.

The Center will include services such as:

- (1) Care management services and nutritional counselling.
- (2) Statewide prevention activities community screenings and educational programs at no cost to participants.
- (3) Community outreach and wellness services that improve public health.
- (4) Awareness campaigns and advocacy for public policy to combat the chronic disease epidemic and contribute to social welfare.
- (5) Youth education and empowerment programs.
- (6) Hands-on support programs for patient engagement and disease selfmanagement.
- 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

The Center's design plans for a 30,000 square foot three-story facility. The land has been acquired. The space designs will focus on easily accessible services, classes, teaching kitchen; and offices and conference room space. Additionally, NKFH has identified tenants to occupy the ground floor and half of the second floor. The people in the community will have access to the services and resources offered within The Center. There will be office space for staff and volunteers with expansion capacity. The lobby will be an attractive, appropriately-sized area designed to welcome volunteers, patients and guests. Lastly, there will be ample space to provide donor recognition opportunities.

Since its inception in 1988, the National Kidney Foundation of Hawaii (NKFH) has been at the forefront of the effort to eliminate kidney disease and improve community health.

NKFH serves the state of Hawaii, through education, screening services, advocacy and research. We have two main program tracks - direct outreach and clinical service. Direct outreach programs are designed to address the specific

needs of individuals affected by CKD. NKFH offers several screenings that identify the health status of our local population ranging from general kidney screenings to more comprehensive screenings (Kidney Early Detection Screenings). After a participant is screened, they are offered services to meet their needs. Programs for individuals at-risk and at the earlier stages of kidney disease include: Kidney Care Workshop, Diabetes Self-Management Program, and Eating Right for Your Kidneys.

If individuals are facing kidney failure, we have support programs, patient cooking programs, the Calabash cookbook, financial assistance funds, medical identification jewelry, and a kidney patient handbook. We also address transplantation including support of Team Hawaii, the Hawaii Donor Family Council, and support groups.

To increase overall CKD awareness in the general community, NKFH also offers Kidney 101 presentations and brochures, public service messages, and special events, like World Kidney Day. Finally, to complement community outreach efforts, NKFH also educates healthcare professionals about the kidney disease epidemic and proper care management techniques through continuing medical education classes, conferences and workshops for clinicians, and other clinical resources.

Beyond direct outreach activities, NKFH has another service line that involves systemic change in order to create sustained improvement in health outcomes. Clinical services apply health concepts and strategies that improve health outcomes, manage cost, and impact quality of life into reality. Our systemic initiatives began with the development of an alliance that brought together key stakeholders to lead a statewide initiative for early identification (statewide automatic GFR reporting and testing) and intervention (clinical services) which resulted in the redefinition of chronic kidney disease in Hawaii.

2. Facilities

NKFH currently owns offices on the 7th and 15th floor at 1314 S. King Street in Honolulu. But there is not nearly enough space for essential staffing, programs, or the direct services we provide to patients.

The new 30,000 square foot facility in Kapolei will have not only provide the space needed, but also many other benefits such as classroom facilities, teaching kitchen, wellness clinic, and parking for both staff and the patients and family members we serve.

The Center is currently in the final design stage and the grading preparation of the property will be commencing in the month of January 2020. The entire staff of NKFH, as well as the many physicians and patients we serve, are waiting for the completion of this new facility

Glen Hayashida has been President and CEO of the National Kidney Foundation of Hawaii since 1995. During this time, he helped advocate the establishment a new transplant center for Hawaii at The Queen's Medical Center, paved the way for Hawaii to become the first state to include glomerular filtration rate (GFR) measurements in all blood tests and assisted in the passing of state legislation to include organ donation as a disability for leave of absence benefits. In development is the kidney mobile project to underserved and at-risk communities. This project will present the public with screenings and educational information. In his 24 years as President and CEO, he has increased the organization's revenues from \$200,000 to \$2.8 million, with reserves of more than \$2 million.

The new space has been designed to include carefully planned income streams that will allow both the NKFH, and certainly this facility with all of its direct services, to become almost entirely self-sustaining.

These income streams are planned to include:

(1) Rental income from office space within the building which will be leased to other nonprofits who will share our facilities for their own population served.

- (2) A dialysis facility built and operated by a professional dialysis company, which will pay substantial lease rent, and provide much-needed services.
- (3) Resource Center rooms and kitchen can be space that can be rented for meetings and events.
- (4) Clinical Services will provide free services those in need and will also be credentialled to bill for insurance reimbursement for patients who are insured.

The Kidney Cars program which brings in enough income every year to cover much of our direct service programs, these initiatives noted above will provide a strong base of funding that will make it much easier to provide services without depending upon state, county, federal or private grants, or any patient's ability to pay.

For any nonprofit, sustainability freedom is truly the best of all worlds, and will give us the freedom to focus almost entirely on those we all serve throughout the State of Hawaii.
