A brief description of the applicant's background;

Within a native rain forest on the Big Island the Volcano Art Center (VAC) is a nonprofit, 501(c)(3) art, culture, and educational organization. The Volcano Art Center was founded in 1974 by a group of eclectic and energetic artists in the 1877 Volcano House Hotel, within Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park (HVNP) along the rim of Kilauea Crater.

In the late 1990's VAC grew beyond its single building capacity and expanded into Volcano Village. At that time, VAC signed an agreement with the Hawai'i State Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to lease a 7.4 acre land parcel containing roughly 5 acres known as the Ni'aulani Forest Reserve and established within its lease, a 1/7 mile loop trail. In exchange for the lease, VAC agreed to continue the generational legacy of land stewardship and to educate residents and visitors about its

importance as a natural and cultural resource. Today the Ni'aulani Forest is kept free of invasive species by volunteers, is home to an outdoor sculpture garden, holds on-site classes, community events, workshops, and guided forest tours.

Nestled beside the nurturing forest canopies VAC's Niaulani Campus is home to administrative offices, and Hale Ho o'mana, the educational building, which provides multi-purpose and classroom space for arts, education, environmental and community programs and events. students from throughout Hawai'i and beyond come o to study and enhance creativity, develop new skills and a deeper appreciation for the natural, cultural and creative force of the unique volcanic environment. VAC is passionate about the role of arts and culture as integral to a healthy island community and is dedicated to developing, promoting and perpetuating the artistic, cultural and environmental heritage of Hawai'i's people through arts and education. One of its best known programs is the award winning Na Mea Hawai'i Hula Kahiko performance series at the kahua hula in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. VAC adheres to an organizational environmental policy that promotes recycling, composting, minimizing waste, and energy usage whenever possible.

In order to service our community's current needs and in planning for increased participation, VAC is requesting \$400,000 in GIA funding for capital improvements, which include build-out, planning, engineering, and execution. The current Nia'ulani Campus facilities need updating to meet the current needs, and or our growth. The expansion will provide additional spaces for glasswork, woodworking classes and storage.

The goals and objectives related to the request;
 Goal 1: Provide additional workshop/class and storage space addressing the growing demand for arts, culture and environmental program in our immediate and surrounding community.

Objectives 1

- Build added multi-use workspace, with built-in storage space.
- Build additional storage areas for equipment.
- Securing funding for the expansion without impacting operational funds allowing VAC to enhance programming.
- Expand programs capabilities with open studio times to better serve the community's multi-generational needs.

<u>Goal 2:</u> Expand new and existing partnerships with Volcano School of Arts and Sciences (VSAS) University of Hawaii and Volcanoes National Park while complimenting artists and cultural practitioners relationships.

Objectives 2:

- Offering this additional new space for age-appropriate art, culture and environment classes during the school day.
- Utilizing existing partnerships with county of Hawaii economic development division, Hawaii Tourism Authority, AARP (American Association of Retired People), Island Artists and Cultural practitioners affords VAC the opportunity to provide a greater variety of programs to underserved people in East Hawaii communities
- Share resources to various community-based organizations such as Rotary, Volcano Community Association and Experience Volcano strengthens our organization's ability to help sustain programs.

<u>Goal 3</u>: Enhancing VAC's profile to educators, visitors and the community, ensuring long-term sustainability for the organization's diversity and boost the area's economy by supporting artists, cultural practitioners, and schools.

Objectives 3

- Bringing more people into the Volcano area by establishing VAC a destination, and place to experience and learn about arts and culture and Niaulani Forest.
- Provide more options for a multi-generational experience from families for seniors in the our community to reduce isolation and negative things that go along with it
- Boost economy/jobs for artists
- The public purpose and need to be served;

Support of this project allows VAC to increase meaningful offerings of arts, culture and environment workshops and programs in an area with limited resources and venues. Recent census tracts for our communities exhibit an average poverty level of 30% (Hawai'i Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism). The impacts the arts have in rural areas are known to: revitalize neighborhoods and promote economic prosperity; participation in the arts improves physical and psychological well-being; and provides a catalyst for the creation of social capital and the attainment of important community goals.

All attendees regardless of age, have an interest in learning and acquiring new skills, and benefit from the socialization aspects of a workshop setting. As seniors of the area have been the consistent audience, though other age groups are showing an increasing presence. Younger families with children are moving into the area, and the need for entertainment and fun learning experiences grows. Parents request activities and experience that involve the whole family. Participants from all areas of Hawai'i Island travel to Volcano and attend VAC unique workshops and classes. Our highly popular VAC

glass, ceramic, and mixed media studio offerings are filled to capacity, with requests for more.

With the requested GIA funding, VAC will expand the glass programs and introduce a woodworking program by increasing the number of workshops to accommodate the added students. In addition, basic glass and woodworking workshops will be offered on a frequent basis for those who just want to experience something new. By providing age appropriate glass and woodworking workshops, VAC will offer a complementary space to the art program at the Volcano School of Arts and Sciences, increasing outreach to more than 180 youth participants yearly.

3. Describe the target population to be served; and

The VAC serves the very diverse communities of the Big Island, from kamaamina to malihini to visitors. artists, performers, writers, scientists, and cultural practitioners from our community and all over the world, who come to VAC to experience Hawaiian culture, explore creativity, and connect with nature. Families and people of all ages, from a variety of backgrounds and walks of life, and from all over the island attend visual arts workshops for adults, art camps for youth, writing programs, music, dance, and entertainment events and workshops Free activities, discounts and scholarships help us reach economically disadvantaged students and seniors.

In 2018-2019, VAC's combined programing at the National Park and Niaulani Campus, provided exhibitions, programs, and entertainment for 2,560 Big Island residents, 950 neighbor island residents, and 1,300 mainland/international visitors. Annual surveys to stakeholders continually show that that our Nia'ulani workshops, classes and events served and additional 2,360 residents from the Big Island, primarily from rural East Hawaii communities. In addition, over \$900,000 of VAC net income is passed directly back into our local economy.

Volcano is an isolated community with limited services, so VAC has become the artistic hub where the community can interact, create and enjoy events. VAC has noted through years of experience that more families with young children are moving to the Volcano area, and more home-schooled children from Puna and Ka'u are participating in our programs. The art programs offered by VAC often overlap into their needed educational requirements. The Volcano area has a high population of seniors, more than 52% of the population is over age 50, many of whom are retired and living on a fixed income. 14.3% of the Volcano seniors are living below the poverty line. We provided scholarships and use of facilities to seniors and high-risk students from Ka'u and Puna who attend the Volcano School of Arts and Sciences and Kamehameha Schools.

4. Describe the geographic coverage.

Volcano Art Center's geographic reach is world-wide given that our gallery is located adjacent to the visitor's center in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park; which annually receives two million visitors from around the world. Numerous tourists also visit our

Ni'aulani campus to attend workshops, visit the Gallery, tour the Ni'aulani Forrest, or attend and event. The reach of our website expands our patron list for monthly mailings of our newsletter is distributed to over 3,000 email recipients. The current geographic demographics show 72% of visitors are mainland US based with the balance from Canada, Japan, Korea and Europe.

VAC programs serve all of Hawaii County, primarily East Hawaii and Ka'u. Our local community regularly participates in the variety of on-campus programs, concerts and activities. In addition, we are located adjacent to the Volcano School of Arts and Sciences, a K-8 charter school with which we coordinate various programs.

Our outreach arts education program, expanding in 2020 with the additional of a traveling workshop converted school bus to travel to areas with limited resources, bringing the arts to people who are unable to travel to attend programs. VAC works with over 300 artists participating in our galleries from all over Hawaii. In addition VAC regularly hosts artists from Hawai'i Nei and welcomes visitors from across the U.S. and around the globe.

V. Experience and Capability

In 2010 VAC built ADA compliant Hale Ho'omana, with the goal to increase arts and education capacity, and prepare for our future. The construction project was completed on time and on budget. In 2014 VAC received a GIA subsidy request to successfully equip Hale Ho'omana with equipment, materials and supplies.

In 2019 VAC added a covered multi-use outdoor area and a sculpture garden. VAC began development of the Niaulani Sculpture Garden under the direction of board member Julie Williams in 2017. The Garden, which opened in 2018, was made possible by grants from HSFCA, Hawaii Community foundation and sculptures on loan from 17 local artists on a rotating basis, Atherton Family Foundation, Cooke Foundation, and countless volunteer hours. Donations of native plants helped develop the design, which allows expansive as well as intimate views of the artwork on display. In April 2019 VAC installed two additional outdoor sculptures on loan courtesy of the Art in Public Places Collection from the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and The Arts.

A 20' x 20' covered outdoor multi-use area adjacent to the current ceramics studio was added to provide additional multi-use covered space. This outdoor work area was completed in Spring 2019, and was funded by the Atherton Foundation, with volunteer labor from the board and community.

The Fire Arts VAC expansion project will be managed by Mike Nelson, CEO. Mike brings considerable leading building project construction teams on a much larger level. He is in his sixth year at the helm of VAC, has intimate knowledge of the organization, vision, and communities it serves. Bill Hamilton, Board President committee has an extensive background in construction in Hawaii and Oregon. He will serve as the chairperson of the Construction committee. Fray Heath, Hawaii construction consultant, recently handled the Lyman Museum renovations, and will act as a consultant on the VAC expansion project.

2. Facilities

VAC is a Big Island arts center's Niaulani Campus is located in the village of Volcano, Hawaii. Bordering on the forest, the 3276 sq' administration building houses the Rainforest Gallery and staff offices. Nearby, 2898 sq 'Hale Ho`omana contains multi-use art, culture and environmental workspaces and Dietrich Hall. The 7.5 acre old growth Niaulani Forest contains trails, with a small covered Gazebo, used for nature lessons. All spaces are accessible to individuals with disabilities. VAC's main 2655 sq ft. Gallery is located in the Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. A facilities manager lives in a house on the Niaulani Campus, and he maintains the space to make sure everything is working properly.

This grant would allow VAC to increase existing capacity by adding additional multiuse facilities for workshops, classes etc, that include necessary storage and room for tools.

The committee will be responsible for planning and execution of plans and permitting. Our Accounting Manager will be in charge of all financial administration for the project, and Development Director will seek additional funding for the project and also supplies and materials.

Michael A. Nelson, Chief Executive Officer and Project Manager

After several years with Walt Disney organization, Ringling Bros., Radio, Television and various Sheraton Hotels and Resorts, Mike became the Managing Director of the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel in Hollywood CA, where he led the operating and constructions teams through a \$30 million renovation, and served on the host committee of Hollywood's 100th anniversary celebrations. Shortly after the Roosevelt's grand reopening, relocated to Hawaii to became Director of Marketing for the rebranding of the Hilton Hawaiian Village and opening of the Ali'i Tower, as well as providing oversight for three other Hilton properties. This led to an opportunity grow his own event-destination management company that produced special events and provided meeting and convention services with partners in the Hawaii travel industry. In

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2014 Mike was hired as the Executive Director of the Volcano Art Center Mike has overseen the building of the multiuse covered work area, and the sculpture garden.

William Hamilton, Board President and Construction Committee Chairperson grew up in the Portland, Oregon area. He was drafted in the U.S. Army in 1966 and spent several years as an Engineer Company Commander with duty rotations in Vietnam, various locations in the Pacific, and a tour in Iraq. After release from active duty, Bill remained in the military reserve while operating his own construction business on Maui and Oregon. While on Maui, Bill was an active in the Chamber of Commerce, Maui Historical Society and Maui Visitors Bureau. Bill moved to Volcano in 2015 and is an active member in Volcano Rotary and VFW. As an artist, Bill takes pride in fine woodworking, furniture making, and restorations.

Emily Catey Weiss, Development Director and Galleries

Emily earned a B.F.A. from Ohio State University in 2000, which paved the way for Emily Catey Photography, LLC, which she ran successfully in Hale'iwa on Oahu's North Shore. From 2004 to 2009 she was involved in various civic, business and state organization in the revitalization of Honolulu's Arts District, and served as President of the Hale'iwa Arts Festival. She moved to the Big Island in 2009, and joined VAC as Program Director. Currently, Emily is responsible for oversight of the VAC Gallery in the National Park, as well as Rainforest Gallery located on the VAC Niaulani campus in Volcano Village, and gallery and program funding. Her philosophy is grounded in the belief that cultivating, sustaining and celebrating the arts is essential to a vibrant community.

Andrew Simon, Accounting Manager. Andrew has a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration from Colorado State University and has held finance positions from Washington D.C. to Johnston Atoll. Andrew oversees all accounting. He keeps VAC staff and Board of Directors informed with timely, accurate record keeping of income, expenses, volunteer hours, and event details. Andrew is responsible for the tracking of grants, contracts, departmental revenues, and expenditures ensuring compliance with agencies and donors.

Architect - Paul F. Morgan AIA. Paul is the president of Suzuki/Morgan Architects. Ltd. (SMA) and is a registered architect in Hawaii and Washington State. 



Project Narrative for New classroom 616 square feet of enclosed space adjacent to existing classroom building and using same construction style and finishes

CIVIL/SITE WORK:

Verify location of existing nearby septic drain field and determine finished grades for project.

FOUNDATION: Slab on grade over crushed rock with WWM in slab and rebar per structural drawings at thickened edges and footings.

FRAMING:

2x6 wood studs for tall gable end walls; 2x4 for shorter studs

MISC METALS:

Simpson connectors and hurricane clips as required by code.

ROOFING & WATERPROOFING:

Sub slab rigid insulation

Batt insulation under roof sheathing - R23 (verify county requirement)

Batt insulation in walls - R19 (verify county requirement)

Tyvek or equal at exterior envelope

Waterproofing over roof plywood sheathing and under corrugated roofing

HPM metal corrugated roofing

DOORS AND WINDOWS:

Standard windows: Marvin or equal vinyl double hung and awnings; match existing

Doors match existing wood swinging doors

Overhead hung wood barn door rolling on overhead tracks

EXTERIOR FINISHES:

5/8" rough sawn plywood with 1x3 battens @ 8" oc. Paint

INTERIOR FINISHES:

1/2" Gypsum Wallboard painted

No ceiling

SKYLIGHTING:

Translucent corrugated roofing on curbs; match existing

PLUMBING:

2 hose bib faucets and one utility sink with cold water tap

HVAC:

Natural ventilation; no AC. If task exhaust may be required. Can be installed under separate permit.

POWER:

Existing elec panel at NE corner of existing building; power needs to be evaluated by Elec Engineer.

LIGHTING

Match existing but with LED tubes and bulbs; spacing and location to be verified with Elec Engineer.
