SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES TO MONITOR PARKS AND OTHER AREAS
NEAR SCHOOLS DURING SCHOOL HOURS TO DETECT INDIVIDUALS WHO
MAY BE STUDENTS, AND TO ENFORCE THE STATE TRUANCY LAW.

1 WHEREAS, section 302A-1132, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
2 commonly known as the State's truancy law, generally requires
3 that children five to eighteen years of age attend school; and
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5 WHEREAS, truancy is one of the warning signs that a student
6 may be headed for delinquent activity, social isolation, or
7 educational failure due to dropping out of school; and
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9 WHEREAS, the lack of commitment to school is a risk factor
10 for substance abuse, delinquency, teen pregnancy, and dropping
11 out of school; and
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13 WHEREAS, those who do not graduate from high school utilize
14 more government-funded social services than high school
15 graduates, with the average high school dropout costing the
16 government more than \$200,000 over the course of a lifetime; and
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18 WHEREAS, in response to Senate Concurrent Resolution 74,
19 Senate Draft 1, Regular Session of 2009, the Department of
20 Education convened a Working Group on Truancy Rate Reduction to
21 develop guidelines to reduce the truancy rate in public schools;
22 and
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24 WHEREAS, one of the recommendations made by the Working
25 Group on Truancy Rate Reduction was to collaborate with law
26 enforcement; and
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28 WHEREAS, while section 302A-1136, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
29 vests enforcement of the State's truancy law with the Department
30 of Education, that section does not also relieve the chiefs of
31 police from enforcement of the same laws; and



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1 collaborating with schools to vigorously enforce the State's
2 truancy law; now, therefore,

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4 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirtieth Legislature
5 of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2020, that law
6 enforcement agencies are urged to monitor parks and other areas
7 near schools during school hours to detect individuals who may
8 be students, and to enforce the state truancy law; and

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10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
11 Resolution be transmitted to the Superintendent of Education and
12 chiefs of police of each county.
