House Bill 1153, HD1, SD1 – Relating to Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports and offers comments on House Bill 1153, HD1, SD1 Relating to Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings which requires both chambers of the Legislature to establish rules for livestreaming legislative committee hearings to allow the public to present oral testimony remotely.

This bill would allow more ways for individuals, including individuals with disabilities to be included in the Legislative process. Under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), livestreaming public hearings and informational briefings need to be accessible to individuals with disabilities. Livestreaming will need to include captioning for people who are deaf or hard of hearing. DCAB would be pleased to provide advice and recommendations to the joint legislative access committee on making livestreaming accessible to such persons.

RE: HB 1153, HD1, SD1 Relating to Remote Testimony in Legislative Hearings

Article I, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i provides that "All political power of this State is inherent in the people and the responsibility for the exercise thereof rests with the people." In that spirit, and over the course of its history, the Hawai'i State Legislature has been dedicated to assuring citizen participation in its activities and has often been at the forefront of innovations that enhance that participation and make it more effective.

Technology has now reached the point where persons with disabilities, residents of rural Oahu, and neighbor island residents, can be enabled to more fully participate in the legislative process without experiencing inconvenient, expensive and/or time-consuming travel to the Capitol. Exactly how that should be done, without jeopardizing the need for an expeditious legislative process, may require further thought and deliberations, and that is exactly what HB 1153, HD1, SD1 would allow. HB 1153, HD1, SD1 does not presuppose a method, but neither is it just another "study." Truly action oriented, it mandates the outcome that remote testimony shall be allowed, and then leaves it to each house to figure out the details. That is the kind of balance that this Legislature is known for and can be proud of.

An earlier generation of Hawai'i leaders recognized that all residents of the State deserve equal educational opportunities, regardless of where they live. Now today's generation of leaders is better assuring that all have equal access to their government. Thank you for taking this next step.

I hope you will approve HB 1153, HD1, SD1.

Dear Senators,

Young Progressives Demanding Action (YPDA) advocates for public policies that reflect the values of young people throughout the State of Hawai'i. One of those values is that an open democracy is a necessary component to ensuring a healthy society that is free of oppression.

We appreciate that our state already has in place the Public Access Room, as well as the Capitol website to submit testimony. These resources help guide advocates, both young and old of various levels of experience through the process, and make participating in our democracy a lot more easier. However there is always room to build on our successes in making the system more accountable and easy to approach.

As the measure acknowledges, there are still many groups that face a hard time meaningfully participating in policy making. This includes neighbor islanders who have to worry about the cost of flying over to Oʻahu and literally putting their lives on hold for hearings that may take longer than expected to start/finish, residents who live outside of town or Oʻahu's urban core, and to those in the disabled community who face an even harder time participating in the process.

There are issues that come up every session that affect these communities. Submitting written comments is very important, but committee meetings are a time when you can go into depth, expand on your testimony, and tell your story. It has the power to change minds. By taking on the creation of a remote access program for the legislative process, we can change the game for these communities. If they aren't able to come to Honolulu, or even instead of coming to Honolulu, they'll be able to participate and give testimony on important legislation from their home islands. We should consider expanding the role of the County's remote testimony sites to

include legislative hearings, as well as put some remote testimony sites on college and university campuses.

Alongside considering the needs and interests of our neighbor island residents, this legislation includes language to make sure that even if you live on O'ahu where the Capitol is, those who live away from the urban core or those who face any barriers due to disabilities, will be considered and represented in this program, expanding the pool of democracy. Making sure these groups are able to participate is seriously important, and will help in bringing more members of the public into the legislative process to be a part of shaping public policy.

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO strongly supports the purpose and intent of H.B. 1153, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 which establishes the remove legislative access program and requires the House of Representatives and the Senate to establish procedures for the public to present remote oral testimony at legislative committee hearings.

Due to the fast-paced legislative timetable, it is often a severe financial hardship for neighbor island residents to actively participate in our democratic process. For example, when the Legislature was considering the privatization of the Maui Region of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, employees had to take time off of work, purchase airline tickets – often with only 48-hours notice, and arrange ground transportation to attend and testify in committee hearings. Many of our members chose to expend their valuable time and money to share their expertise and ensure their voices were heard, but we firmly believe many more would have taken advantage of remote testimony technology. We are confident that this same situation is all too familiar for too many neighbor island residents, regardless of the issue at hand. The establishment of a Remote Legislative Access Program ensures equal access to committee hearings no matter where a Hawaii resident resides.

Chair DELA CRUZ, Vice Chair KEITH-AGARAN, and Members of the Senate Ways and Means Committee

Common Cause Hawaii supports HB 1153, HD1, SD1, which will (1) establish a remote legislative access program within the legislature's public access program, to be supervised by the joint legislative access committee and (2) require each house of the legislature to establish procedures and necessary information infrastructure for the public to present oral testimony at legislative committee hearings through remote testimony.

Common Cause Hawaii is a nonpartisan, nonprofit, grassroots organization focused on upholding the core values of American democracy through increasing civic engagement and breaking down the barriers to participation in our government. HB 1153, HD1, SD1 will assist with increasing civic engagement and breaking down the barriers to participation in our government by permitting people who live outside of the Oahu urban core, live on neighbor islands, experience access obstacles due to disabilities, are homebound, etc. to participate more easily in the State legislative process.

Several states have pioneered remote committee hearings – Alaska and Nevada. Michigan and the Virginia Senate also hold occasional remote hearings by request of a committee chair and for issues especially relevant to residents outside the capital city. Colorado conducted a pilot remote testimony project, which started in 2016. The Nebraska Legislature partnered with Nebraska Educational TV in 2015 to offer videoconferencing at more than a dozen sites that use the technology for distance learning. Even the Hawaii State Legislature has provided remote testimony as a pilot project in certain committees.

According to the 2018 State of Hawaii Data Book, Hawaii has a total population of just over 1.4 million people. City and County of Honolulu has a population of slightly over 990,000. Hawaii County has a population of under 200,000 people. Maui County has a population of over 164,000. Kauai County has a population of over 71,000. Thus, approximately 435,000 people live in Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai Counties, which is about one-third (1/3) of the State.

Testifying before the State Legislature is a particularly effective form of advocacy. However, for people living in Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai Counties, this may be cost prohibitive and logistically impossible with arranging time off from work and/or for childcare / family-care to fly to Oahu for a hearing on very short notice. Thus, one-third (1/3) of our population, our citizenry living with disabilities, and people fighting Oahu's traffic are shutout and should not be shutout of the Hawaii legislative process.

Further, air travel to and from Oahu is particularly detrimental to our environment, given greenhouse gas emissions associated with the aviation industry. Thus, remote testimony should be encouraged and promoted, lest we forget that Hawaii has a carbon neutral goal by 2045, pursuant to HRS § 225P-5 (2018).

When people know what their government is doing and can observe their government in action, then this is a functioning democracy. When people are able to communicate with their elected officials to make their voices heard, then this is a representative democracy. As Abraham Lincoln said, "[G]overnment of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Common Cause Hawaii supports HB 1153, HD1, SD1, and Common Cause Hawaii respectfully urges the Committee members to pass HB 1153, HD1, SD1 out of your Committee.

I am a coffee farmer in Kona in Hawaii County. Hawaii coffee farmers have many important issues before the legislature. However, for those of us farmers on the neighbor islands we are faced with short notice of hearings, expensive air fares (if seats are available), and loss of a day's work on the farm--all for what is often as little as 2 minutes of live testimony--and with as many as 6 separate hearings on bills as the make their way through the legislative process.

When there is readily available technology to create a fairer system, why has the legislature been reluctant to act?

Please pass HB 1153--and bring fairness to neighbor island citizens.

My name is Shar Chun-Lum, and I am a member of Save Ala Moana Beach Park Hui. I have spent many hours providing testimony in person at the City Council to get our points across, not only for issues at Ala Moana, but other issues that affect me as a taxpayer.

I have seen the value of being there in person to testify versus submitted good testimony. For example, questions can be asked of the testifier during the meetings. Testifiers often have more to add after others have voiced similar opinions.

I believe that the action called for in HB1153 HD1 SD1 is necessary to provide fair representation for the taxpayers of our State. It is an unfair financial and physical burden to require Neighbor island residents to fly to O`ahu to be able to present their concerns on issues that affect them.

The Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i strongly supports HB1153 HD1 SD1 which establishes a remote legislative access program, specifies requirements for developing the program, and appropriates funds.

It is the right of all citizens to participate in their representation in a Democratic government. However, taking the time and money to travel to the Capitol to testify is a privilege that many do not have. They may be working multiple jobs, taking care of children, elders, or sick family, or simply not have the time off or luxury of a flexible work schedule. Remote testimony encourages a wider demographic of participants and promotes greater diversity among the voices heard at that capitol.

Furthermore, it is in all of our best interests to reduce carbon emissions and part of the State's own goals. If the state truly wishes to reduce carbon emissions, there must be a decrease in air and gas vehicle travel. Establishing a remote testimony process is a direct action to reduce carbon emissions from travel, especially if the process allows people to testify from their own personal electronic device in their home or office.

Lastly, it would help the neighbor island legislators themselves foster a greater relationship with their communities while they're away during the legislative session. Comments:

Several states have pioneered remote committee hearings – Alaska and Nevada. Michigan and the Virginia Senate also hold occasional remote hearings by request of a committee chair and for issues especially relevant to residents outside the capital city. Colorado conducted a pilot remote testimony project, which started in 2016. The Nebraska Legislature partnered with Nebraska Educational TV in 2015 to offer videoconferencing at more than a dozen sites that use the technology for distance learning. Even the Hawaii State Legislature has provided remote testimony as a pilot project in certain committees.

According to the 2018 State of Hawaii Data Book, Hawaii has a total population of just over 1.4 million people. City and County of Honolulu has a population of slightly over 990,000. Hawaii County has a population of under 200,000 people. Maui County has a population of over 164,000. Kauai County has a population of over 71,000. Thus, approximately 435,000 people live in Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai Counties, which is about one-third (1/3) of the State.

Testifying before the State Legislature is a particularly effective form of advocacy. However, for people living in Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai Counties, this may be cost prohibitive and logistically impossible with arranging time off from work and/or for childcare / family-care to fly to Oahu for a hearing on very short notice. Thus, one-third (1/3) of our population, our citizenry living with disabilities, and people fighting Oahu's traffic are shutout and should not be shutout of the Hawaii legislative process.

Further, air travel to and from Oahu is particularly detrimental to our environment, given greenhouse gas emissions associated with the aviation industry. Thus, remote testimony should be encouraged and promoted, lest we forget that Hawaii has a carbon neutral goal by 2045, pursuant to HRS § 225P-5 (2018).

When people know what their government is doing and can observe their government in action, then this is a functioning democracy. When people are able to communicate with their elected officials to make their voices heard, then this is a representative democracy. As Abraham Lincoln said, "[G]overnment of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

We support HB 1153, HD1, SD1, and we respectfully urge the Committee members to pass HB 1153, HD1, SD1 out of your Committee.
