1 **Fiscal Implications:** This measure may impact the priorities identified in the Governor's
2 Executive Budget Request for the Department of Health's (Department) appropriations and
3 personnel.

4 **Department Testimony:** The Department supports this measure directing the Department of
5 Agriculture, in consultation with the Department, to develop and implement a one-time pesticide
6 disposal program offering safe collection and lawful disposal of unwanted pesticides from bona
7 fide farmers. These waste chemicals can become a serious public health and environmental
8 threat.

9 This bill has tremendous potential to provide environmental and human health benefits for the
10 community by removing threats to residents, waterways, and the environment. This measure is
11 timely, as legal disposal options are limited in Hawaii, and the longer waste pesticides are left
12 unmanaged, the more likely the container will leak, the label will become unreadable,
13 someone will be exposed, or the chemicals will leach into the ground or wash into nearby
14 waterways.

15 Farmers and other businesses have a legal obligation to properly dispose of the waste pesticides
16 that they generate, including those qualifying as hazardous waste. Waste pesticide collection
17 programs have been established in other states that require farmers to provide inventories of
18 waste materials being received by the waste contractors conducting the events. With proper

1 documentation, hazardous waste pesticides can be properly managed as universal waste under
2 such a collection program.

3 **Offered Amendments:** The word “amnesty” should be replaced with “collection” in all
4 instances. The bill does not and should not provide amnesty from following waste disposal
5 regulations. Calling this a “collection program” aligns with language in the universal waste rules
6 for pesticides in chapter 11-273.1, Hawaii Administrative Rules.

Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 2565, relating to pesticides. The bill appropriates funds from the general fund to the Hawaii Department of Agriculture to develop, in consultation with the Hawaii Department of Health, a restricted use pesticide disposal amnesty program to provide a one-time, affordable, and environmentally accessible means for the disposal of restricted use pesticides from a bona fide agricultural entity; and directs the Department to convene a steering committee to guide and monitor the restricted use pesticide disposal amnesty program. The Department supports this measure provided it does not adversely impact the Administration's priorities in the Executive Budget and offers the following comments.

The bill addresses Restricted Use Pesticides (RUPs) only, and does not include any non-Restricted Use Pesticides, some of which have higher degrees of toxicity than RUPs. By targeting only RUPs, we do not achieve a significant reduction in potential contamination by unused pesticides.

An amnesty option for anonymous disposal of unwanted or illegal RUPs is very risky. RUPs are strictly controlled by the U.S. EPA and U.S. Department of Agriculture.



These pesticides are not available to the general public. They are only available to persons holding the appropriate license from the Department. Licensed applicators must keep accurate records of every milliliter of RUP products that they have purchased, what is currently in their inventory, and how they use the products. No amount of the material is allowed to be disposed anonymously.

While we support the concept of a one-time pesticide disposal program, the Department respectfully encourages the Committee to consider, in the alternative, establishing a pilot program that is specifically associated with agricultural pesticides of all types. Currently there exists on most counties a disposal program that is limited to household types of pesticide products. The Department would like to use a pilot program to obtain better data to determine how much volume of material would be associated with an amnesty disposal effort. Without this information the Department would be ill prepared to design a more comprehensive program to make a significant impact on removing unused and unwanted pesticide products from the State.

Chair Lee and Members of the Committee:

I am Tim Lyons, Executive Director of the Hawaii Pest Control Association, an association composed of pest control operators who perform structural pest control.

We support this bill with an amendment.

The discussion on this bill and its intent as introduced focused only on restricted use pesticides. Because our industry only uses one (1) restricted use pesticide and we virtually use all of it, we had no need of a pesticide disposal amnesty program however, in Decision Making the prior Committee expanded the scope of this bill to include non-restricted use pesticides, also known as general use pesticides. Our industry does use those and as a result we would very much want to be included in this program. The discussion in Committee also had a great deal of

concern that large agricultural users might avail themselves of this free disposal program and as a result, Standing Committee Report 184-20 notes that it is not intended for large agricultural operations. It also goes on to set a fee waiver limit at fifty (50) pounds. We think that limitation is fine and we have no problem with it. We would however like the record to show that this program can be made accessible to all users of general use and restricted use pesticides who can abide by that fifty (50) pounds limit.

With the above amendment, we are fully supportive of the bill and the program.

Dear Chair Lee:

On behalf of the Western Plant Health Association (WPHA), I am writing to express our support of HB 2565, which will provide a collection program for the proper disposal of illegal or unused restricted use pesticides. WPHA appreciates the interest of House members to provide a mechanism whereby individuals may safely dispose of unused products. WPHA represents the interests of fertilizer and pesticide manufacturers, agricultural biotechnology providers, and agricultural retailers in Hawaii, California, and Arizona.

WPHA supports programs facilitating the safe disposal of all unused pesticides, so we suggest that the committee may want to consider providing a mechanism that provides the Chair of the Department of Agriculture (Chair) in consultation with the Department of Health, discretion in prioritizing what type of pesticide products require the most immediate action. Pesticide illness and accident reports around the country demonstrate that the greatest risk to public health or the environment from pesticides is the illegal storage and disposal of consumer based pesticide products. The Hawaii Department of Health's own surface water monitoring projects have demonstrated that the highest detections of pesticides are in urban water systems. Monitoring programs have demonstrated that the inappropriate or illegal disposal of pesticide products into storm drains or waste collection programs contributes to these detections. Unlike restricted use pesticides which requires handlers to demonstrate a professional level of knowledge in the handling and use of products, consumers are more likely to mishandle old or unused products due to their lack of awareness of environmental and health risks. As such, we recommend the committee consider providing the Chair discretion to make determinations for prioritizing product collections.

While WPHA does recommend greater flexibility in identifying or prioritizing product collections, we do believe that all programs in this area are worthwhile efforts to help eliminate unused products from being used either accidentally or illegally. Therefore, we are pleased to support to HB 2565. We thank the committee for its consideration of our comments.

Aloha Chair Lee, Vice Chair San Buenaventura, and members of the committee,

My name is Lauryn Rego and I am the Director for the Hawai'i Center for Food Safety (CFS). CFS is a nationwide public interest, sustainable agriculture nonprofit organization whose missions include the promotion of agricultural production methods that are beneficial to the ecosystem. We have over 950,000 farmer and consumer members across the country, including nearly 14,000 in Hawai'i. On behalf of CFS and our members, I thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony today regarding this important bill.

CFS has been dedicated to addressing the human health and environmental impacts of our increased reliance on pesticide use in food production, both in the State of Hawai'i and nationally. We were instrumental in providing legal and communications support in the passage of numerous ordinances relating to pesticide use and disclosure, including Act 45 (Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018), concerning uses of restricted use pesticides (RUPs) by agricultural users in the State of Hawai'i.

HB2565 HD1 requires the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture to create a one-time pesticide disposal amnesty program under which agricultural users may dispose of any unwanted RUPs and general use pesticides for little or no cost. CFS applauds the bill's recognition of the dangers of pesticides and the importance of their safe disposal.

I am writing in support of the intent of HB2565 HD1, and to urge this committee to pass the measure with the two proposed amendment below:

First, as written, HB2565 HD1 prohibits the Department of Agriculture from charging agricultural users for the safe disposal of their pesticides, so long as the total weight of the active ingredient in the formulated RUPs disposed of by the user does not exceed 50 pounds. We believe that the 50-lb RUP active ingredient threshold is too high, and impractical, since pesticides labels may express their size by either weight or volume. Previously, in classifying data from the Kauai Good Neighbor Program, the Department of Agriculture itself had classified large RUP users as those using more than 5 lbs. or 15 gallons of any single RUP. To ensure that the bill does not provide a way for large agricultural RUP users to shift their financial and legal responsibility to the State; at a minimum, 5 lbs. or 15 gallons of any single RUP as the cut off for free disposal under the pesticide amnesty program is appropriate. Large RUP users should bear the financial and legal responsibility for their use of these dangerous chemicals.

Therefore, we respectfully request the following amendment to section 2(c) of the bill (suggested deletions stricken and suggested additions underlined):

(c) The department of agriculture shall operate the restricted use pesticide disposal amnesty program as a free or low-cost program to encourage the safe and legal disposal of restricted use pesticides and non restricted use pesticides. The department shall not charge a fee for disposal of restricted use pesticides or non restricted use pesticides from a single agricultural entity so long as the amount of any single restricted use pesticide disposed of by the user is less than 5 pounds or 15 gallons that include an active ingredient of restricted use pesticide or non restricted use pesticide weighing less than fifty pounds. The department ~~shall~~ may impose a fee for disposal of restricted use pesticides and non restricted use pesticides so long as the amount of a single restricted use pesticide disposed by that agricultural entity is more than 5 pounds or 15 gallons, includes an active ingredient weighing fifty pounds or more.

We believe that agricultural companies that choose to purchase and use RUPs, so called because of their potential harm to public health and the environment, should bear the financial and legal responsibility to properly dispose of these chemicals. In publicly available court papers from the recent Monsanto pesticide violation on Maui, where Monsanto illegally stored and sprayed Penncap-M, a RUP that had been cancelled and banned by the EPA, the U.S. District Attorney stated that Monsanto “knowingly stored 180 pounds of Penncap-M hazardous waste, which it ultimately disposed of with a licensed hazardous waste disposal company on September 17, 2014.”¹ Thus, large agricultural users are perfectly capable of legally and safely disposing RUPs and pesticides in the state of Hawai‘i.

Second, as the Monsanto violation case shows, safe pesticide disposal is only one part of the solution to keeping our citizens and the environment safe from the harms of pesticide applications, the other problem is the unlawful misapplication of pesticides. Thus, we respectfully request that the bill be amended to include stronger measures and better public transparency on pesticide misuses by inserting language to require increased pesticide fines for pesticide violations, as well as require annual summary reporting from the Hawai‘i Department of Agriculture on pesticide violations.

Again, we appreciate the intent of the bill, but feel strongly that agrichemical users, not the State nor its resources, should be responsible for safe use and disposal of these dangerous chemicals that they choose to apply and use in our environment. For these reasons, we urge you to amend this bill by lowering the threshold for free disposal, and requiring increased fines for pesticide violations, as well as better public reporting regarding pesticide misuse incidents in the State.

HB2565 provides free disposal of pesticides containing up to 50 pounds of active ingredient, which would often translate into much larger amounts of formulated pesticide product. In previous assessments, large pesticide users have been defined as those using more than 5 lbs or 15 gallons of pesticides (formulated product). To ensure that the state is not allowing large multi-billion dollar agricultural corporations to shift their financial and legal responsibility to taxpayers, a threshold of 5 lbs/15 gallons should be adopted as the cut off for any amnesty program. Large agricultural users should be responsible for the financial and legal responsibility of the disposal of toxic pesticides they are using.

YPDA advocates for public policies that reflect the values of young people throughout the State of Hawai'i. YPDA is in **support with amendments to HB2565 HD1**, Relating to Pesticides. This measure would establish an amnesty program for the disposal of Restricted Use Pesticides (RUPs).

Our organization continues our dedication to the keiki and their future in our advocacy, striving to create a better world for them. It is for the sake of future generations that we need to demand further accountability and meaningful enforcement of our pesticide laws. We deserve to live in healthy communities where we don't have to live in fear of pesticide drift. We appreciate and support the intent of this bill. Helping people both easily and safely transition out of Restricted Use Pesticides (RUP) is important to transitioning us to a sustainable future of organic land management.

However this measure is concerning as large agrochemical interests may use this to pass on their responsibility to the state government and regular people. **Please amend this measure to exclude large agrochemical users from this measure.** It is agrochemical interests that have abused these pesticides on a massive level. For years now there have been incidents, notably in Kaua'i, Maui and Moloka'i in which toxic (and banned) pesticides have drifted into schools, communities, and even our natural resources like lands and our waters. In November of 2019 we saw Monsanto, now Bayer pled guilty and paid \$10

million as part of a plea agreement with the United States Environmental Protection Agency for illegally using the banned pesticide Penncap-M on Maui and Molokai. \$10 million isn't enough to cover the years and years of damages. Proper accountability needs to be allowed to happen. We the people should not have to pick up the pieces. Please consider our amendment.

Aloha Chair Lee, Vice-Chair San Buenaventura, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau strongly supports HB 2565 HD1, which establishes the Pesticide Disposal Amnesty Program within the Department of Agriculture to provide a one-time, affordable, and environmentally accessible means for the disposal of pesticides from a bona fide agricultural entity and convenes a Program Steering Committee to guide and monitor the program.

While some of Hawaii's counties already provide for periodic *residential household* hazardous waste collection, **farmers are not eligible to participate** in these events. Many mainland states periodically hold unwanted pesticide collection events specifically for farmers and ranchers. Unfortunately, because of Hawaii's isolated location and the need for numerous island collection sites, a program of this type is logistically complex and costly, but with proper planning and funding, it will benefit both farmers and ranchers, and their communities.

HFB supports a State-sponsored pesticide disposal program to help farmers properly dispose of unwanted pesticides. We appreciate that the previous committee expanded the proposed program to include all pesticides, not just restricted use pesticides. We respectfully request two amendments to the bill.

1. That the sections of the bill referring to "collections with a duration of fourteen consecutive calendar days" be deleted. The duration of collections should be determined by the department, working closely with an experienced contractor (and if appropriate, a Steering Committee) selected by the agency to conduct the collection and disposal. This is a very complicated and expensive undertaking, not only because of our isolated geography and the fact that we are trying to

accommodate six separate islands, but because of the extremely strict federal laws regulating the identification, manifesting, storage, transportation, and disposal of these materials. The number of days on each island must be strategically coordinated to avoid legal glitches, logistical nightmares, and exorbitant program costs.

2. HFB would like to partner with HDOA to help with this program, as we have knowledge and experience in this area. We assisted the agency in the last agricultural pesticide disposal program conducted eleven years ago. We respectfully request that HFB be included as part of the Pesticide Disposal Amnesty Program Steering Committee.
