## Executive Office on Early Learning

### **Report to the 2021 Legislature: December 21, 2020**

#### **History**

The Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) was established by Act 178, Regular Session of 2012, and signed into law in June 2012. On July 1, 2015, EOEL was transferred from the Office of the Governor to become attached to the Hawaii Department of Education (HIDOE) for administrative purposes only.

EOEL is charged with developing an early learning system that shall ensure a spectrum of high-quality, developmentally appropriate early learning opportunities for Hawaii's children throughout the state, from prenatal care until the time they enter kindergarten.

Act 122, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014, appropriated \$3 million for the establishment of Hawaii's first State-funded prekindergarten program as a part of that system. EOEL launched the EOEL Public Prekindergarten Program (Program), through a partnership with HIDOE, at 18 department schools and 20 classrooms across the state starting the 2014-15 school year. The Program was statutorily established by Act 109, Regular Session of 2015.

Act 276, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019 (Act 276), required the following classrooms to be incorporated into the EOEL Public Prekindergarten Program:

- Charter school prekindergarten classrooms that were previously funded through the federal Preschool Development Grant;
- Weighted student formula-funded prekindergarten classrooms (HIDOE has identified only 2 such classrooms since 2019, and we understand 1 of these classrooms shifted to Title I funding); and
- Prekindergarten classrooms for children to provide general education settings for children whose individualized education programs require such placement (HIDOE has identified no such classrooms since 2019).

Act 276 also placed private partnership-funded classrooms in the public schools under the administrative authority of EOEL.

## **Context**

In School Year 2019-2020:

- The EOEL Public Prekindergarten Program consisted of 44 classrooms at 36 department and charter schools, across 6 islands.
  - Ten new classrooms are also scheduled to open in School Year 2020-2021 with funding provided through Act 276.
- There were 5 private partnership-funded prekindergarten classrooms at 5 department schools that we were informed about.

**This report provides the following information on the aforementioned classrooms for School Year 2019-2020, as of December 21, 2020:**

1. The number and location of classrooms;
2. Numbers of students served and aggregated by birth month as of the date on which the official enrollment count is taken;
3. Sources of funding for each classroom;
4. Quality of teacher-child interactions relating to social emotional support, classroom structure, and quality of learning experiences, as assessed using a formative assessment tool selected by the office; and
5. Child outcomes relating to all areas of childhood development and learning, including cognitive, linguistic, social, and emotional approaches to learning and health and physical development, as assessed using a formative assessment tool selected by the office.

Due to school closures in April 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, teachers and children did not experience a typical full year of teaching and learning – children were in school for only three out of the four quarters. Virtual connections with families and virtual learning opportunities cannot replace the quality of in-person learning experiences for young children. In addition, assessments of children’s development and learning, as well as the quality of teacher-child interactions, cannot be properly conducted through virtual sessions. As such, the results of the assessments reported here, which were conducted earlier in the year, do not reflect the development and learning that would be expected over the course of a full school year.
