A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHYSICIAN WORKFORCE ASSESSMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a critical
- 2 need for recruitment and retention of physicians to serve rural
- 3 and medically underserved areas of the State. The shortage of
- 4 physicians is as high as one thousand eight and is compounded by
- 5 the fact that Hawaii has the fifth oldest physician workforce of
- 6 all states, and more than half of the State's physicians will be
- 7 over the age of sixty-five within ten years. The physician
- 8 workforce assessment project has assisted with malpractice
- 9 reform, provision of thousands of hours of continuing education,
- 10 loan repayment for physicians working in areas of need,
- 11 preparation of local students for medical school, and
- 12 communication with physicians regarding continuing education.
- 13 The project is currently working to make regional physician
- 14 supply and demand maps and all available national data
- 15 accessible on the Internet, as well as to hire a physician
- 16 recruiter for all regions of Hawaii.



1	The legislature further finds that future efforts include
2	providing bonuses for providers practicing in underserved areas,
3	the formation of an office of rural training for promoting
4	practice in underserved areas in the State, state-matched loan
5	repayment relief to new providers, and scholarships for medical
6	students who practice in underserved areas. In many cases, the
7	increasingly high cost of education for health care
8	professionals binds graduates to a career path that provides
9	sufficient income to repay costly student loans. These career
10	paths most frequently lead physicians to professional practice
11	in highly specialized fields of care in urban areas rather than
12	in general practice on the neighbor islands or in rural areas of
13	the State where need for their service is greatest. Expanding
14	the use of funding received through the existing physician
15	workforce assessment fees will allow Hawaii to act rapidly to
16	provide tangible solutions for the physician workforce shortage
17	to help address the ongoing need for a strong physician
18	workforce in the State.

- 19 The purpose of this Act is to:
- (1) Repeal the requirement that no less than21 fifty per cent of the assessment fees deposited into

4	(2)	Repeal the monetary cap of expenditures from the
5		John A. Burns school of medicine special fund; and
6	(3)	Authorize the John A. Burns school of medicine special

8		commit to working in medically underserved areas of
9		the State as part of the Hawaii state loan repayment
10		program and provide scholarships for qualifying
11		medical students.
