A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, in the current job
2	market, nearly sixty-five per cent of available positions
3	require postsecondary credentials. Industry-recognized
4	credentials are important because they teach the specific
5	knowledge and skills that are required for an occupation or
6	industry. Full-time employees with industry credentials earn
7	more than their uncredentialed counterparts, and, in some cases,
8	the salaries of credential holders who do not hold college
9	degrees are similar to the salaries of college graduates.
10	The legislature also finds that the State has critical
11	shortages of qualified and credentialed workers in sectors
12	including health, education, air travel, and technology. Given
13	the recent downturn in the State's economy and the rise in
14	unemployment, it is especially important for Hawaii to equip its
15	students for the existing job market. To this end, the
16	Promising Credentials project, a collaborative effort aimed at
17	using Hawaii labor market data and local employer insights to
18	identify high-value industry credentials in the State, was

- 1 launched. This information will enable local career readiness
- 2 programs to better tailor their offerings to Hawaii's job market
- 3 and to deliver more effective services to both students and
- 4 employers. However, there is a need for the data to be
- 5 disaggregated by credential and to be consistently collected and
- 6 reported by state agencies.
- 7 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 8 (1) Require the state board for career and technical
- 9 education to oversee and review annually the statewide
- data collection processes, reporting requirements, and
- 11 business rules related to the student attainment of
- industry-recognized credentials;
- 13 (2) Require the state board for career and technical
- 14 education to provide an annual report to the governor
- and the legislature on students' attainment of
- industry-recognized credentials; and
- 17 (3) Include career and technical education and credential
- data in the statewide longitudinal data system to help
- assess the longitudinal education and workforce
- 20 outcomes of students who attempted an educational
- 21 course, training program, career program,

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1	postsecondary program, or other workforce training
2	program.
3	SECTION 2. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by adding a new section to subpart C of part I to be
5	appropriately designated and to read as follows:
6	"§304A- Industry-recognized credentials; data
7	collection. (a) The board shall review annually the statewide
8	data collection processes, reporting requirements, and business
9	rules related to the student attainment of industry-recognized
10	credentials. The board shall ensure consistent data collection
11	and transparent reporting across relevant state educational
12	systems and agencies. The board shall provide an annual report
13	to the governor and the legislature on students' attainment of
14	industry-recognized credentials.
15	(b) All state data collection processes, reporting
16	requirements, and business rules shall support the collection of
17	student-level data to include data that is disaggregated
18	specifically for Hawaii's population, including but not limited
19	to disaggregated data for Native Hawaiians and Pacific
20	Islanders, of industry-recognized credential attainment.

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- 1 (c) The board's annual report shall be published digitally
- 2 and shall be made available to all relevant stakeholders,
- 3 including students and families, educational institutions,
- 4 educators, employers, and community members.
- 5 (d) As used in this section:
- 6 "Board" means the state board for career and technical
- 7 education.
- 8 "Industry-recognized credential" means a credential
- 9 recognized as having value to the holder of the credential in
- 10 the labor market in Hawaii."
- 11 SECTION 3. Act 46, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, is amended
- 12 by amending section 13 to read as follows:
- "SECTION 13. Section 27-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended to read as follows:
- 15 "\$27-7 Departmental data sharing. (a) The department of
- 16 education, the University of Hawaii, the department of labor and
- 17 industrial relations, and other state agencies, as appropriate,
- 18 shall share data through the statewide longitudinal data system
- 19 to support research that will improve educational and workforce
- 20 outcomes [and meet the longitudinal data requirements of the
- 21 federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, as

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- 1 amended]. The data to be shared shall be determined jointly by
- 2 the department of education, the University of Hawaii, the
- 3 department of labor and industrial relations, and other state
- 4 agencies, as appropriate, and shall be shared no less than
- 5 annually.
- 6 (b) The department of education, the University of Hawaii,
- 7 the department of labor and industrial relations, and other
- 8 state agencies, as appropriate, shall share data in a manner
- 9 that safeguards the confidentiality of student education
- 10 records, as defined by the federal Family Educational Rights and
- 11 Privacy Act, and workforce data, as provided by applicable
- 12 federal and state laws, rules, and regulations.
- 13 (c) The statewide longitudinal data system shall store and
- 14 analyze career and technical education data it receives from all
- 15 state educational systems and workforce training agencies
- 16 pursuant to section 304A- to analyze the cross-agency
- 17 longitudinal education and workforce outcomes of students who
- 18 attempted an educational course, training program, career
- 19 program, postsecondary program, or other state-supported
- 20 workforce training program. Data to be shared shall be

- 5 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 6 provided that section 2 shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
