# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATE FINANCES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

11	PART III
12	SECTION 6. The University of Hawaii cancer center (UH
13	cancer center) reduces the burden of cancer through research,
14	education, patient care, and community outreach. The UH cancer
15	center is the only National Cancer Institute (NCI)-designated
16	cancer center in Hawaii and the Pacific region. The UH cancer
17	center is a member of the Hawaii Cancer Consortium along with
18	five hospital groups and the University of Hawaii John A. Burns
19	school of medicine (JABSOM).
20	JABSOM educates and trains health care professionals,
21	including physicians, biomedical scientists, and allied health

- 1 workers. JABSOM also conducts fundamental medical research and
- 2 translates discoveries into delivery practices. Because JABSOM
- 3 is a community-based medical school without its own university
- 4 hospital, it partners with private hospitals in the community to
- 5 achieve its educational mission.
- 6 The public funds and other resources the State has made
- 7 available to JABSOM and the UH cancer center have been
- 8 substantial. The magnitude of state funds and other resources
- 9 provided to the University of Hawaii, the distinction of the
- 10 university being the sole public institution of higher education
- 11 in the State, and the UH cancer center being the only NCI-
- 12 designated cancer center in Hawaii underscore the importance of
- 13 establishing complementary strategic priorities and coordinating
- 14 the management and deployment of state resources appropriated to
- 15 JABSOM and UH cancer center.
- 16 It is in the public's interest that State resources be
- 17 efficiently and effectively managed to optimize the public
- 18 benefits. Just as co-locating the physical facilities for
- 19 JABSOM and UH cancer center on adjoining sites in Kakaako
- 20 promotes synergistic efforts, the legislature determines that it
- 21 is a statewide concern to ensure that the management of public

- 1 resources provided to JABSOM and UH cancer center be integrated,
- 2 coordinated, and focused on common priorities to avoid
- 3 unnecessary duplication of administrative expenses or
- 4 conflicting priorities.
- 5 Placing resources devoted to training and educating
- 6 physicians and conducting cancer research in an integrated
- 7 university organizational structure as opposed to stand-alone
- 8 and duplicative organizations will foster a uniform strategic
- 9 vision. Unified leadership will also allow better coordination
- 10 with the University of Hawaii's private partners in the hospital
- 11 community and with other state agencies.
- 12 The legislature finds that as a matter of statewide
- 13 concern, the UH cancer center should be more closely affiliated
- 14 with JABSOM and be administered as an organized research unit of
- 15 JABSOM. Merging JABSOM and the UH cancer center's
- 16 administrative services and infrastructure teams will offer
- 17 efficiency by eliminating redundancy and sharing administrative
- 18 expertise and experience to reduce processing delays.
- 19 The legislature notes that several outstanding medical
- 20 schools at other universities integrate their cancer research
- 21 programs closely with their medical schools. For example, the

- 1 Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis is the
- 2 parent institution to the Siteman Cancer Center. The Siteman
- 3 Cancer Center is designated as a comprehensive cancer center and
- 4 holds an "exceptional" rating from the NCI. The MD Anderson
- 5 Cancer Center in Houston, Texas is a comprehensive cancer center
- 6 and operates in close affiliation with the McGovern Medical
- 7 School as part of the University of Texas Health Science Center
- 8 at Houston.
- 9 The legislature also notes that from 2014 to 2016, the
- 10 University of Hawaii developed business plans, hired
- 11 consultants, and made presentations to its board of regents on
- 12 the university's plans to integrate the University of Hawaii
- 13 Kakaako health science campus and eliminate operational
- 14 redundancies between JABSOM and the UH cancer center. Further,
- 15 the University of Hawaii frequently groups different organized
- 16 research units within a larger administrative structure. For
- 17 example, the school of ocean and earth science and technology
- 18 encompasses several outstanding research units, including the
- 19 center for microbial oceanography: research and education and
- 20 Hawaii institute of marine biology.

1	To m	aintain the NCI designation as a cancer center
2	consisten	t with NCI guidelines, the director of the UH cancer
3	center sh	all continue to have a direct line of reporting and
4	accountab	ility to the provost of the University of Hawaii at
5	Manoa.	
6	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this part is to require:
7	(1)	The director of UH cancer center to be appointed by
8		the University of Hawaii's board of regents upon
9		recommendation from the provost of the University of
10		Hawaii at Manoa instead of the dean of JABSOM;
11	(2)	The UH cancer center to be administratively affiliated
12		with JABSOM;
13	(3)	The director of the UH cancer center to report to the
14		provost of the University of Hawaii at Manoa and
15		coordinate with the president of the university;
16	(4)	Funds expended from or originating from the University
17		of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund established by
18		section 304A-2153, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for JABSOM
19		or the UH cancer center to be used for educational
20		purposes only; and

6	SECTION 7. Chapter 304A, part IV, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
7	is amended by adding a new subpart to be appropriately
8	designated and to read as follows:
9	" . Cancer Research Center of Hawaii
10	§304A- Cancer research center of Hawaii. (a) There is
11	established an organized research unit, hereinafter known as the
12	"cancer research center of Hawaii", to conduct cancer research.
13	The cancer research center of Hawaii shall be administered by a
14	director to be appointed by the board of regents upon
15	recommendation by the provost of the University of Hawaii at
16	Manoa with the concurrence of the president of the university.
17	The cancer research center of Hawaii shall be affiliated with
18	the John A. Burns school of medicine; provided that the director
19	of the cancer research center of Hawaii shall report to the
20	provost of the University of Hawaii at Manoa and coordinate with
21	the president of the university.

- (b) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, funds 1 2 expended from or originating from the University of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund, established under section 3 4 304A-2153, for the school of medicine or the cancer research 5 center of Hawaii shall be used by the school of medicine or the 6 cancer research center of Hawaii for educational purposes only. 7 (c) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, funds 8 expended from or originating from the research and training 9 revolving fund, established under section 304A-2253, for the 10 school of medicine or the cancer research center of Hawaii shall 11 be used by the school of medicine or the cancer research center 12 of Hawaii for research and research-related purposes only. 13 (d) The cancer research center of Hawaii's research agenda 14 shall focus on research, education, patient care, and community 15 outreach and should reflect an understanding of the ethnic, 16 cultural, and environmental characteristics of the State and the 17 Pacific region. The cancer research center of Hawaii may:
  - (1) Engage in international research collaborations;

- 20 (3) Participate in projects and programs of the National21 Cancer Institute."

- 1 SECTION 8. Section 304A-2153, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows:

1	(b) Any law to the contrary notwithstanding, the board of				
2	regents may authorize expenditures of up to \$3,000,000 annually,				
3	excluding in-kind services, from this fund for the purposes of				
4	promoting alumni relations and generating private donations for				
5	deposit into the University of Hawaii Foundation for the				
6	purposes of the university. Any expenditure authorized pursuant				
7	to this subsection shall be for a public purpose and shall not				
8	be subject to chapters 42F, 103, 103D, and 103F. The university				
9	shall submit a comprehensive report to the legislature detailing				
10	the use of any funds authorized by the board under this				
11	subsection no later than twenty days prior to the convening of

#### Description:

Part I - By October 1 of each year, requires each department to submit program measures, costs elements, and accounting reports Specifies that for all non-general funds to the Legislature. the cigarette tax revenues deposited to the credit of the cancer research special fund shall only be used for capital expenditures and only until 7/1/2041. Part II - Makes certain special funds subject to deductions for central service expenses into the general fund. Beginning 7/1/2021 transfers to the credit of the general fund surcharges and cigarette tax revenue allocated to the trauma systems special fund. Part III -Requires the cancer research center of Hawaii to be affiliated with the John A. Burns school of medicine with direct lines of reporting to the provost of University of Hawaii at Manoa and coordinate with the president of the university. Requires funds expended from the tuition and fees special fund for the John A. Burns school of medicine or cancer research center of Hawaii to be used for educational purposes only. Requires funds expended from the research and training revolving fund for the John A. Burns school of medicine and cancer research center of Hawaii to be used for research and research-related purposes only. Amends the reporting requirement on the Hawaii cancer research special fund from semi-annually to annually. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD1)
