

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATE GOVERNMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by 2 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read 3 as follows: "CHAPTER 5 PUBLIC ACCOUNTABILITY § -1. Definitions. As used in this chapter: 6 7 "Executive director" means the executive director of public 8 accountability. 9 "Office" means the office of public accountability. 10 § -2. Office of public accountability; executive 11 director. There is established an office of public 12 accountability that shall be administratively attached to the 13 legislature. The legislature, by a majority vote of each house 14 in joint session, shall appoint an executive director who shall 15 serve for a period of six years and thereafter until a successor 16 shall have been appointed. The legislature, by two-thirds vote 17 of the members in joint session, may remove or suspend the

- 1 executive director from office, but only for neglect of duty,
- 2 misconduct, or disability.
- 3 The salary of the executive director shall be fixed by the
- 4 legislature and shall not be diminished during the executive
- 5 director's term of office.
- 7 hire employees necessary to carry out the functions of the
- 8 office. All employees shall serve at the executive director's
- 9 pleasure.
- 10 (b) In determining the salary of the employees of the
- 11 office, the executive director shall consult with the department
- 12 of human resources development.
- 13 (c) The executive director and the executive director's
- 14 full-time staff shall be entitled to participate in any employee
- 15 benefit program plan or privilege available to other state
- 16 employees.
- 17 § -4. Oversight and administrative responsibility;
- 18 divisions. (a) The office shall assume oversight and
- 19 administrative responsibility for the office of the auditor,
- 20 office of the ombudsman, office of information practices, Hawaii
- 21 state ethics commission, and campaign spending commission.

1	(b)	There is established within the office the following
2	divisions	:
3	(1)	The audit division, which shall consist of the office
4		of the auditor;
5	(2)	The complaints division, which shall consist of the
6		office of the ombudsman and office of information
7		practices;
8	(3)	The ethics division, which shall consist of the Hawaii
9		state ethics commission; and
10	(4)	The campaign spending division, which shall consist of
11		the campaign spending commission."
12	SECT	ION 2. Section 11-311, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
14	"(a)	There is established a campaign spending commission,
15	which sha	ll be placed within the [department of accounting and
16	general s	ervices for administrative purposes. campaign spending
17	division	of the office of public accountability."
18	SECT	ION 3. Section 23-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended t	o read as follows:
20	"§23	-2 Auditor; appointment, tenure, removal. The auditor
21	shall be	appointed, hold office for such term, and be subject to

- 1 removal in the manner prescribed in [section 10, Article VII,]
- 2 article VII, section 10 of the Hawaii State Constitution. The
- 3 office of the auditor shall be placed within in the audit
- 4 division of the office of public accountability."
- 5 SECTION 4. Section 23-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 "\$23-3 Salary of the auditor and appropriations. (a)
- 8 [Effective July 1, 2005, the salary of the auditor shall be the
- 9 same as the salary of the director of health.
- 10 The salary of the auditor shall not be diminished during
- 11 the auditor's term of office, unless by general law applying to
- 12 all salaried officers of the State.] The salary of the auditor
- 13 shall be fixed by the legislature and shall not be diminished
- 14 during the auditor's term in office.
- 15 (b) The funds for the support of the auditor's office
- 16 shall be provided for in the act providing for the expenses of
- 17 the [legislature.] office of public accountability."
- 18 SECTION 5. Section 23G-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended to read as follows:
- 20 "\$23G-1 Legislative reference bureau; director,
- 21 appointment, tenure, removal, compensation, vacancy. The office



- 1 of the legislative reference bureau is established. The
- 2 legislature, by a majority vote of each house in joint session,
- 3 shall appoint a director for the bureau who shall serve for a
- 4 period of six years and thereafter until a successor shall have
- 5 been appointed. The legislature, by two-thirds vote of the
- 6 members in joint session, may remove or suspend the director
- 7 from office, but only for neglect of duty, misconduct, or
- 8 disability.
- 9 If the director dies, resigns, becomes ineligible to serve,
- 10 or is removed or suspended from office, the first assistant to
- 11 the director shall become the acting director until a new
- 12 director is appointed.
- 13 [Effective July 1, 2005, the salary of the director shall
- 14 be the same as the salary of the director of health. The salary
- 15 of the director shall not be diminished during the director's
- 16 term of office, unless by general law applying to all salaried
- 17 officers of the State.] The salary of the director shall be
- 18 fixed by the legislature and shall not be diminished during the
- 19 director's term in office."
- 20 SECTION 6. Section 26-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:



1	" (b)	The department shall:
2	(1)	Preaudit and conduct after-the-fact audits of the
3		financial accounts of all state departments to
4		determine the legality of expenditures and the
5		accuracy of accounts;
6	(2)	Report to the governor and to each regular session of
7		the legislature as to the finances of each department
8		of the State;
9	(3)	Administer the state risk management program;
10	(4)	Establish and manage motor pools;
11	(5)	Manage the preservation and disposal of all records of
12		the State;
13	(6)	Undertake the program of centralized engineering and
14		office leasing services, including operation and
15		maintenance and lease buyback processing pursuant to
16		subsection (d) of public buildings, for departments of
17		the State;
18	(7)	Undertake the functions of the state surveyor;
19	(8)	Establish accounting and internal control systems:

1	(9)	Under the direction of the chief information officer,
2		provide centralized computer information management
3		and processing services; and
4	(10)	Establish a program to provide a means for public
5		access to public information and develop an
6		information network for state government[; and
7	(11)	Assume administrative responsibility for the office of
8		information practices]."
9	SECT	ION 7. Section 84-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
11	"(a)	There is established within the ethics division of
12	the offic	e of [the auditor for administrative purposes only]
13	public ac	countability a commission to be known as the state
14	ethics co	mmission. The commission shall consist of five members
15	appointed	by the governor from a panel of ten persons nominated
16	by the ju	dicial council. Each member of the commission shall be
17	a citizen	of the United States and a resident of the State.
18	Members o	f the commission shall hold no other public office."
19	SECT	ION 8. Section 84-35, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended to	o read as follows:

1 "\$84-35 Staff. The ethics commission may employ and at 2 pleasure remove [such] persons, including an executive director, 3 as it may deem necessary for the performance of its functions. [Effective July 1, 2005, the salary of the executive director 4 5 shall be the same as the salary of the director of health.] The 6 salary of the executive director shall be fixed by the 7 legislature and shall not be diminished during the executive 8 director's term of office. The commission shall fix the 9 compensations of its employees within the amounts made available 10 by appropriation therefor. The employees of the commission 11 shall be exempt from chapter 76." 12 SECTION 9. Section 89C-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended by amending the definition of "appropriate authority" to 14 read as follows: 15 ""Appropriate authority" means the governor, the respective 16 mayors, the chief justice of the supreme court, the board of 17 education, the board of regents, the state public charter school 18 commission, the Hawaii health systems corporation board, the 19 [auditor, the ombudsman,] executive director of public

accountability, and the director of the legislative reference

1	bureau. These individuals or boards may make adjustments for
2	their respective excluded employees."
3	SECTION 10. Section 92F-41, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
5	"(a) There is established an office of information
6	practices within the [department of accounting and general
7	services for administrative purposes; provided that:
8	(1) Any quasi-judicial functions of the office of
9	information practices shall not be subject to the
10	approval, review, or control of the comptroller; and
11	(2) The comptroller shall not have the power to supervise
12	or control the office of information practices in the
13	exercise of its functions, duties, and powers under
14	section 92F-42.] complaints division of the office of
15	<pre>public accountability."</pre>
16	SECTION 11. Section 96-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended to read as follows:
18	"§96-2 Ombudsman; office established, appointment, tenure
19	removal, qualifications, salary, vacancy. The office of
20	ombudsman is established[-] within the complaints division of
21	the office of public accountability. The legislature, by a

1 majority vote of each house in joint session, shall appoint an 2 ombudsman who shall serve for a period of six years and 3 thereafter until a successor shall have been appointed. An 4 ombudsman may be reappointed but may not serve for more than 5 three terms. The legislature, by two-thirds vote of the members 6 in joint session, may remove or suspend the ombudsman from 7 office, but only for neglect of duty, misconduct, or disability. 8 No person may serve as ombudsman within two years of the 9 last day on which the person served as a member of the 10 legislature, or while the person is a candidate for or holds any 11 other state office, or while the person is engaged in any other 12 occupation for reward or profit. [Effective July 1, 2005, the 13 salary of the ombudsman shall be the same as the salary of the 14 director of health. The salary of the ombudsman shall not be 15 diminished during the ombudsman's term of office, unless by general law applying to all salaried officers of the State.] The 16 17 salary of the ombudsman shall be fixed by the legislature and 18 shall not be diminished during the ombudsman's term of office. 19 If the ombudsman dies, resigns, becomes ineligible to 20 serve, or is removed or suspended from office, the first

1	assistant to the ombudsman becomes the acting ombudsman until a
2	new ombudsman is appointed for a full term."
3	SECTION 12. Section 96-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by amending subsection (e) to read as follows:
5	"(e) The funds for the support of the office of the
6	ombudsman shall be provided for in the act providing for the
7	expenses of the [legislature.] office of public accountability."
8	SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the general
9	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
10	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2021-2022 and
11	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
12	year 2022-2023 for the operating expenses of the office of
13	public accountability.
14	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of
15	public accountability for the purposes of this Act.
16	SECTION 14. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed

Report Title:

Office of Public Accountability; Auditor; Ombudsman; OIP; State Ethics Commission; Campaign Spending Commission; LRB; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes the office of public accountability to assume oversight and administrative responsibility for the office of the auditor, office of the ombudsman, office of information practices, Hawaii state ethics commission, and campaign spending commission. Requires the salaries of the auditor, director of LRB, executive director of the Hawaii state ethics commission, and ombudsman to be set by the legislature. Appropriates funds.
