#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN TRAFFICKING.

#### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that children in the 1 2 State are vulnerable to sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation. Foster children and runaways with histories of 3 abuse and neglect are at particularly high risk. LGBTQ+ youth, 4 5 immigrants, undocumented workers, and youth suffering from 6 mental illnesses and substance abuse issues are also highly vulnerable. Victims are often lured into sex trafficking 7 8 through emotional manipulation and control, force, fraud, or 9 threats. Sexually exploited children most often do not have the 10 ability or resources to escape and start a new life.

11 The legislature recognizes that, in the last decade, the 12 commercial sexual exploitation of children has garnered greater 13 attention in Hawaii and throughout the United States. The 14 department of human services has received an increasing number 15 of calls on its hotline for witnesses or victims of child sex 16 trafficking. However, because child sex trafficking is covert,

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it is difficult to accurately measure the scope of the problem,
and exploited youth may not identify themselves as victims.

The legislature further finds that, in order to adequately 3 serve children who have been sexually exploited, a statewide 4 5 human trafficking program is needed to develop and utilize comprehensive interagency case management strategies, protocols, 6 and a multi-disciplinary response that is both victim-centered 7 8 and offender-focused. The department of the attorney general 9 will provide leadership in addressing both commercial sexual exploitation and human trafficking more broadly. 10

11 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require: 12 The department of the attorney general to address the (1)13 needs of victims of human trafficking through the development of a statewide human trafficking program; 14 15 The department of the attorney general to provide (2) 16 reports to the legislature on the State's efforts to 17 address human trafficking and the commercial sexual 18 exploitation of children; and

19 (3) The children's justice program to coordinate the20 investigation and case management of child trafficking

3	SECTION 2. Chapter 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended			
4	by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to			
5	read as follows:			
6	<b>§28-</b> Human trafficking program. (a) The department of			
7	the attorney general shall develop and implement a program to			
8	prevent and to assist victims of human trafficking. The program			
9	shall:			
10	(1) Assess the current needs of the State's			
11	anti-trafficking response and:			
12	(A) Develop a statewide strategy to prevent human			
13	trafficking; and			
14	(B) Develop a plan to provide increased support and			
15	assistance to victims of human trafficking and			
16	victims of the commercial sexual exploitation of			
17	children;			
18	(2) Implement statewide strategies to address offender			
19	accountability through law enforcement efforts,			
20	prosecutions, and crime prevention efforts;			

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1	(3)	Promote public awareness of:
2		(A) Human trafficking and the commercial sexual
3		exploitation of children;
4		(B) The availability of services for victims of human
5		trafficking; and
6		(C) The availability of state and national hotlines
7		for victims and witnesses;
8	(4)	Produce and maintain information materials, including
9		a website, on the prevention of human trafficking and
10		the commercial sexual exploitation of children and on
11		the availability of public resources for victims and
12		witnesses;
13	(5)	Develop and provide comprehensive training on how to
14		prevent, identify, and address human trafficking and
15		the commercial sexual exploitation of children; and
16	(6)	Apply for and monitor federal funding for
17		anti-trafficking efforts.
18	(b)	The department of the attorney general shall submit a
19	report to	the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
20	convening	of the regular session of 2022 on the State's efforts
21	to addres	s the commercial sexual exploitation of children; and

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1	shall submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty			
2	days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2023 on			
3	the State's efforts to address human trafficking. Each report			
4	shall_include:			
5	(1)	Plans to assist county and state agencies in		
6		identifying and responding to victims;		
7	(2)	Best practices used in other states to identify and		
8		serve victims;		
9	(3)	A comprehensive evaluation of applicable programs and		
10		services currently offered by the State;		
11	(4)	Strategies for public outreach and education;		
12	(5)	An assessment of barriers that inhibit law		
13		enforcement, service providers, government agencies,		
14		and nongovernmental organizations in the State from		
15		supporting victims and holding offenders accountable;		
16	(6)	A review of criminal statutes in chapter 712 on		
17		prostitution and sex trafficking;		
18	(7)	Plans for a training program for educators, community		
19		members, members of law enforcement entities, and		
20		mandatory reporters of child abuse, including an		
21		outline of the training content and an assessment of		

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1		whether mandatory training is required and in what
2		intervals;
3	(8)	Statewide assessment tools for first responders,
4		medical professionals, and service providers for use
5		in identifying victims;
6	(9)	Plans for prevention strategies that mitigate the risk
7		factors for victims and offenders;
8	(10)	Recommendations for enhancing statewide collaboration
9		and coordination through multidisciplinary teams,
10		committees, and task forces;
11	(11)	An analysis of the existing data regarding
12		trafficking, which may include but shall not be
13		limited to the following:
14		(A) Data specific to the commercial sexual
15		exploitation of children, including:
16		(i) The number of reports to state and national
17		hotlines alleging the sexual trafficking of
18		a child;
19		(ii) The total number of children suspected to be
20		victims of sex trafficking, including
21		demographic information and information on

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1		whether each child was previously served by
2		the department of the attorney general or by
3		the department of human services;
4	<u>(iii)</u>	The total number of children confirmed to be
5		victims of sex trafficking, including
6		demographic information and information on
7		whether each child was previously served by
8		the department of the attorney general or by
9		the department of human services;
10	<u>(iv)</u>	Data collected by state-contracted
11		providers, including the types and aggregate
12		costs of services provided to children who
13		are suspected or confirmed victims of sex
14		trafficking, the number of children
15		receiving each type of service, and the
16		total number of new children and families
17		served through these providers; and
18	(v)	The number of prosecutions and convictions
19		in the State, delineated by county, for
20		crimes related to human trafficking or the
21		commercial sexual exploitation of children;

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1		<u>(B)</u>	Data specific to sex and labor trafficking;
2		<u>(C)</u>	The identification of any gaps in the State's
3			ability to collect data; and
4		<u>(D)</u>	Recommendations for improving data collection and
5			data sharing among service providers, non-
6			governmental organizations, and government
7			agencies, including law enforcement; and
8	(12)	Any	proposed legislation.
9	(c)	The	department of the attorney general may submit
10	additiona	l rep	orts to the legislature providing data, status
11	updates,	and r	ecommendations, as determined by the department.
12	(d)	Ever	y public official and state and county department
13	<u>shall ren</u>	der a	ll necessary assistance and cooperation within the
14	official'	s or	department's jurisdictional power to share
15	informati	on an	d to assist the program in carrying out its duties
16	<u>under thi</u>	s sec	tion.
17	(e)	As u	sed in this section:
18	"Chi	ld" m	eans a person under eighteen years of age.
19	"Com	merci	al sexual exploitation of children" means any
20	sexual ac	tivit	y involving a child for the exchange or promise of
21	anything	of va	lue by any person.

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1	"Huma	an trafficking" includes "severe forms of trafficking
2	in person	s", as defined in title 22 United States Code
3	section 7	102(11), and "sex trafficking", as defined in
4	section 7	12-1202 and title 22 United States Code

6	SECT	ION 3. Section 588-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
8	"(b)	The purpose of the program shall be to:
9	(1)	Develop, achieve, and maintain interagency and
10		interprofessional cooperation and coordination in the
11		investigation [ <del>of</del> ] and case management of
12		[intrafamilial and extrafamilial] child sex abuse
13		[and], serious physical child abuse, and child
14		trafficking cases[+], including cases involving the
15		commercial sexual exploitation of children;
16	(2)	Facilitate in an impartial manner the professional
17		gathering of information by public and private
18		agencies and their providers for court proceedings
19		involving child victims and witnesses;
20	(3)	Reduce to the absolute minimum the number of
21		interviews of child sex abuse and child trafficking

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1		victims so as to minimize revictimization of the
2		child;
3	(4)	Coordinate the therapeutic and treatment program for
4		child sex abuse and child trafficking victims and
5		their families;
6	(5)	Provide for a multidisciplinary team and case
7		management approach [ <del>which</del> ] <u>that</u> is focused first, on
8		the alleged or suspected child sex abuse or child
9		trafficking victim's needs and conditions; second, on
10		the family members who are supportive of the child and
11		whose interests are consistent with the best interests
12		of the child; and third, on law enforcement and
13		prosecutorial needs;
14	(6)	Provide for the training and continuing education of
15		skilled professional interviewers of child sex abuse
16		and child trafficking victims; and
17	(7)	Serve as the focus of information and referral for
18		child sex abuse and child trafficking programs."

21	SECT	ION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2060.

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#### **Report Title:**

Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children; Human Trafficking; Attorney General; Prevention; Treatment

#### Description:

Establishes a statewide program overseen by the department of the attorney general to provide services and assistance to commercially sexually exploited children and victims of human trafficking. Requires the attorney general to submit annual reports to the legislature. Requires the children's justice program to coordinate the investigation and case management of child human trafficking cases, including cases involving the commercial sexual exploitation of children.
