BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PURPOSE:

To clarify the definition of the practice of medicine to provide uniformity of practice for both medical physicians and osteopathic

physicians.

MEANS:

Amend section 453-1, Hawaii Revised

Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION:

The definition of the practice of medicine was last amended in 2008 by adding a separate, distinct definition of the practice of osteopathic medicine. The Hawaii Medical Board (Board) notes that medical doctors and osteopathic doctors receive the same education and training and should thus be treated equally. Further, the Board believes that this definition should be updated because the practice of medicine includes not only the treatment of disease, as the current definition provides, but also the prevention of disease.

The proviso regarding care for the terminally ill is being deleted because it is covered within the broader definition which now includes, among other things, palliative care. The addition of "surgery; manual medicine;", "telehealth; the interpretation of tests, including diagnosis of pathology specimens, medical imaging, or any physical;", "to diagnose, treat, prescribe for, palliate, or correct" disease, and "prevent any human disease, condition, ailment, pain, injury, deformity, illness, infirmity, defect, physical or mental condition" would encompass more

activities of the current practice of medicine.

Impact on the public: This bill will help the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs improve the health and welfare of Hawaii residents by updating the definition of the practice of medicine to more accurately reflect the current practice of medicine and to provide uniformity of practice for medical physicians and osteopathic physicians.
