HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO CONDUCT A STUDY ON RELEVANT PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY CONCERNS TO GUIDE DECISION-MAKING ON GAMING-RELATED ISSUES.

WHEREAS, it is important for Hawaii to diversify its 1 economy and address budget shortfalls; and 2 3 WHEREAS, legalized gambling is a recurrent and popular idea 4 to address these issues; and 5 6 WHEREAS, nearly every legislative session, including the 7 Regular Session of 2021, legalized gambling legislation is 8 9 introduced; and 10 WHEREAS, nevertheless, Hawaii is one of only two states 11 without any form of legalized gambling; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Hawaii's isolated geography makes the State 14 particularly sensitive to the destabilizing effects of outside 15 forces; and 16 17 WHEREAS, although most people gamble recreationally, a 18 small proportion of individuals are harmed by gambling, which 19 can have an impact on the larger community; and 20 21 WHEREAS, similar to Hawaii's natural resources, local 22 communities must be protected as a delicate ecosystem; and 23 24 WHEREAS, any industry that is potentially addictive should 25 be treated as a potentially invasive harm; and 26 27 WHEREAS, public testimony on legalized gambling legislation 28 has frequently referenced concerns regarding general crime, 29 organized crime, problem gambling, and other related issues, 30

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including sex trafficking, domestic violence, school dropout 1 rates, and undesirable tourism effects; and 2 3 WHEREAS, due to public opposition, proposals for legalized 4 5 gambling are swiftly rejected before sufficient debate can occur, leaving key questions regarding the efficacy of regulated 6 gambling unanswered; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, unregulated, illegal gambling and gambling-related issues are already impacting Hawaii; and 10 11 WHEREAS, although the Honolulu Police Department only 12 13 reported thirty-four arrests in 2019 and forty-four arrests in 2018 for gambling offenses, there are believed to be 14 15 approximately seventy to one hundred illegal gambling rooms on Oahu; and 16 17 WHEREAS, local authorities are also reporting an increased 18 demand for gambling due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and 19 20 WHEREAS, a 2009 study by the National Council on Problem 21 22 Gambling estimated that the social costs of gambling addiction in Hawaii from twenty thousand problem gamblers and ten thousand 23 24 pathological gamblers was \$26,300,000; however, no public funding was provided for gambling treatment and prevention; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, dedicated and protected funding for gambling research will help address these critical community issues; and 28 29 30 WHEREAS, to achieve a more productive discourse on whether Hawaii should pursue legalized gambling, research on relevant 31 32 public health and safety concerns is necessary to guide decision-making on gaming-related issues; now, therefore, 33 34 35 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 36 of 2021, the Senate concurring, that the Legislative Reference 37 Bureau is requested to conduct a study to guide decision-making 38 on gaming-related issues; and 39

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the research is requested to 1 address the following areas: 2 3 The prevalence of gambling problems before and after (1)4 5 initiation of legalized gambling, including: 6 7 (A) A baseline prevalence study to establish the current state of gambling along the spectrum from 8 9 recreational to problem gambling, broken down by demographic variables of interest, such as age, 10 gender, location, and community membership, and 11 to address the cultural characteristics of 12 13 gamblers and gambling communities; and 14 If gambling is legalized, subsequent studies, 15 (B) conducted at least one-year following the 16 initiation of legalized gambling, to assess 17 changes in gambling patterns and populations and 18 should evaluate the relationships to 19 20 gambling-related harms, such as comorbidity, unemployment, criminal activity, and other 21 22 factors commonly evaluated in research literature; 23 24 (2) Focused evaluation of gambling and the impact on 25 vulnerable populations, including research that: 26 27 Identifies the attitudes of individuals in these (A) 28 groups; how legalized gambling would positively 29 or negatively affect these individuals; and the 30 safequards that could be instituted to amplify 31 the positive and mitigate the negative 32 consequences; and 33 34 35 (B) Includes policy analysis to eliminate loopholes that create an incentive for predatory businesses 36 37 to emerge; 38 39 (3) Economic impact studies to assess the effect of gaming facilities on communities and the feasibility of 40 41 asset-based incentive programs for specific communities; and 42 43

3	surrounding communities; and
