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HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING AND ADOPTING THE GOALS SET FORTH IN THE DIGITAL EQUITY DECLARATION FOR HAWAII ADOPTED BY THE BROADBAND HUI.

1 2 3 4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, digital equity is the condition in which all Hawaii residents, keiki to kupuna, have the information technology capacity to participate fully in the State's society, democratic process, and economy, including civics, social and cultural activities, employment, lifelong learning, and access to essential services; and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, digital equity requires ubiquitous and affordable access to broadband and the internet, digital tools, and the knowledge to thrive in an increasingly digital world; and
11 12 13 14 15 16 17	WHEREAS, the digital divide, also known as digital inequity, has been a pressing community issue for many years, separating those in rural communities and those from socioeconomically disadvantaged circumstances from the rest of modern society; and
17 18 19 20 21 22	WHEREAS, a lack of adequate broadband infrastructure, internet-capable devices, affordable high-quality broadband service, and technological know-how creates inequitable digital access; and
23 24 25 26	WHEREAS, digital infrastructure investments have faced challenges with misinformation within our communities about the effects of those technologies; and
20 27 28 29	WHEREAS, digital inequity is rapidly emerging through racial, economic, and geographical boundaries and is amplified among Hawaii's most vulnerable and underserved populations; and

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1 WHEREAS, stay-at-home and work-from-home orders related to the SARS-CoV-2 virus (COVID-19 pandemic) have made digital 2 3 connectivity a necessity across all economic sectors and 4 demographics; and 5 6 WHEREAS, the need for social distancing related to the 7 COVID-19 pandemic has forced many social functions to occur 8 online; and 9 10 WHEREAS, those without digital connectivity may become socially isolated, lonely, and suffer from mental health issues; 11 12 and 13 14 WHEREAS, Hawaii's high unemployment rate during the COVID-19 pandemic has led to families cutting home internet 15 16 subscriptions in order to prioritize food and rent expenses; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the lack of internet access disproportionately 19 affects native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander communities, 20 with the percentage of those households without internet access 21 being almost double that of the state population as whole; and 22 23 WHEREAS, in 1824 King Kamehameha III, Kauikeaouli, 24 proclaimed "He aupuni palapala koʻu (mine is a kingdom of literacy)"; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, the King's appreciation for the written language 28 and education resulted in extremely high literacy rates among 29 native Hawaiians; and 30 31 WHEREAS, today, Hawaii finds itself in a similar situation 32 where society must adopt a new form of digital literacy to succeed in a digital age; and 33 34 35 WHEREAS, a pivot towards this new form of digital literacy will empower Hawaii's residents to realize their full potential; 36 and 37 38 39 WHEREAS, the Broadband Hui is a multi-sector conglomerate 40 of public and private organizations and individuals whose months 41 of thoughtful conversations led to the compilation of

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well-articulated visions and goals known as the Digital Equity 1 2 Declaration for Hawaii; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Digital Equity Declaration is published on the 5 Broadband Hui's website (broadbandhui.org) and encourages 6 "Broadband for A.L.L. (Access, Literacy, Livelihood)"; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the Digital Equity Declaration, in alignment with 9 the 2020 Broadband Strategic Plan, sets a foundation for collective action among private- and public-sector partners by 10 providing a vision and goals that will move Hawaii toward a more 11 12 equitable digital future; now, therefore, 13 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 15 Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, the Senate concurring, that this body supports and 16 17 adopts the goals set forth in the Digital Equity Declaration for Hawaii adopted by the Broadband Hui; and 18 19 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the goals of the Digital Equity 21 Declaration, which support the Aloha+ Challenge, Hawaii's statewide sustainability framework, are requested to be included 22 23 in the Aloha+ Dashboard and updated regularly to track progress; 24 and 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to Hawaii's congressional 27 delegation; Governor; Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu; 28 29 Mayor of Maui County; Mayor of Hawaii County; Mayor of Kauai 30 County; Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; 31 Director of Labor and Industrial Relations; Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs; Superintendent of Education; President of 32 33 the University of Hawaii; Chairpersons of each county council; Chief Executive Officer of Kamehameha Schools; Executive 34 35 Director of Hawaii Green Growth; and Chairperson of the Economic Development Alliance of Hawaii. 36

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
