HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, MAYOR OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU, AND HONOLULU CITY COUNCIL TO REROUTE FARRINGTON HIGHWAY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE 1998 MAKAHA BEACH PARK MASTER PLAN.

WHEREAS, Makaha Beach Park used to be the home of sand 1 2 dunes, which were relocated to provide sand to Kaiser, Sand Island, and other beach parks in Honolulu; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, international surfing champions from Makaha Beach 6 Park include Richard "Buffalo" Keaulana, the "Queen of Makaha" 7 Rell Sunn, Sunny Garcia, Rusty Keaulana, Duane DeSoto, and many others: and 8 9 WHEREAS, Makaha Beach Park on Oahu's leeward coast is a 10 11 favorite spot for locals and visitors, and is home to iconic surfing competitions including Buffalo's Big Board Surfing 12 Classic, Rell Sunn's Menehune Surf Meet, Bradah Mel's Waterman's 13 Championships, and Keiki Surf Kontest, among many others; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the City and County of Honolulu Department of 16 17 Parks and Recreation annually lists Makaha Beach Park as one of the top-ten most visited parks on Oahu; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, Farrington Highway parallels the shoreline and splits Makaha Beach Park into two halves, with the beach on the 21 makai side of the highway and restrooms, showers, a parking lot, 22 and a canoe hale on the mauka side of the highway; and 23 24 WHEREAS, because the beach park is bisected by Farrington 25 Highway, it creates unsafe conditions where beachgoers, 26 particularly small children, frequently have to cross the busy 27 28 highway to get to the beach; and

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WHEREAS, the close proximity of Farrington Highway to the 1 2 shoreline has resulted in serious damage to the highway from 3 storms and waves; and 4 5 WHEREAS, in 1983, strong waves eroded a portion of Farrington Highway, which cased the Department of Transportation 6 7 and the City and County of Honolulu Department of Parks and Recreation to request a shore protection study from the United 8 9 States Army Corps of Engineers (Engineer Corps); and 10 11 WHEREAS, in 1985, the Engineer Corps concluded that Farrington Highway should be realigned further inland and away 12 from the shoreline to protect the highway from future wave 13 14 damage; and 15 16 WHEREAS, subsequent to the study and recommendations from the Engineer Corps, the City and County of Honolulu acquired 17 additional park properties mauka of Farrington Highway to expand 18 19 the beach park and lobbied the State to fund the relocation of 20 the highway further inland, which the State was unable to fund; 21 and 22 23 WHEREAS, in 1998 the City and County of Honolulu developed a master plan for Makaha Beach Park that proposed to reroute 24 Farrington Highway further inland and away from the beach, as 25 26 well as expanding the beach park with new picnic areas, fields, and restroom facilities; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, the 1998 Makaha Beach Park master plan was never 30 executed due to a lack of funds; and 31 32 WHEREAS, at the urging of area residents, former City Councilmember Kymberly Pine asked the Oahu Metropolitan Planning 33 34 Organization to authorize a feasibility study for the potential mauka route realignment of Farrington Highway at Makaha Beach, 35 36 which the organization unanimously approved; and 37 38 WHEREAS, despite the approval for the feasibility study, 39 the study was never executed due to a lack of funds; and 40 41 WHEREAS, beach erosion at Makaha Beach Park caused by 42 rising sea levels and runoff from Farrington Highway has led to

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1 approval of emergency permits and measures by the Department of Land and Natural Resources, including partnering with private 2 heavy equipment operators and machine owners to move sand from 3 the east end to the west end of the beach, to prevent further 4 5 erosion; and 6 7 WHEREAS, in 2010 the City and County of Honolulu Department 8 of Parks and Recreation and the Department of Land and Natural 9 Resources' Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands commissioned 10 a study which concluded that erosion at Makaha Beach Park poses a serious safety concern and, like in the 1985 Engineer Corps 11 study, recommended that Farrington Highway be realigned further 12 inland to mitigate beach erosion; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the urgency to repair the Makaha Bridge has been a 16 public safety concern for Waianae residents for many years; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Farrington Highway is the only transportation 19 route to travel south in the Makaha area; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the Department of Transportation Highways Division has proposed to replace two existing wooden bridges along 22 Farrington Highway, Route 93, between milepost marker 23 numbers 13.95 and 14.21 in Makaha on the Waianae Coast of Oahu; 24 25 and 26 27 WHEREAS, Makaha Bridge No. 3 and Makaha Bridge No. 3A were constructed in 1927 and currently support two eleven-foot lanes 28 with a two-foot shoulder on the makai side of the bridge and a 29 one-foot shoulder on the mauka side; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, both bridges have been classified by the 33 Department of Transportation as deficient and require 34 replacement; and 35 WHEREAS, to meet existing roadway design requirements, the 36 proposed project will require additional areas beyond the 37 existing right-of-way to accommodate the increased bridge spans 38 and structures necessary for embankment protection, channel 39 widening, and guardrail improvements; and 40

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1 WHEREAS, the proposed wider right-of-way will affect lands on the mauka and makai sides adjacent to the project site; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the Waianae community believes placing the 4 5 project's temporary bypass road on the makai side of Farrington Highway will cut off and strand residents and tourists west of 6 7 the project, should the five-year flood level standard temporary roads be washed to sea by inland flooding or ocean surge; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, the Department of Transportation will begin preparations for the replacement of the Makaha Bridge No. 3 11 and 3A on March 8, 2021, starting with clearing the area makai 12 13 of the existing bridge to prepare for installation of a temporary bypass; and 14 15 WHEREAS, because of this imminent construction, the issues 16 17 raised by the Waianae community about the location of the 18 temporary bypass are more pressing than ever; now, therefore, 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 20 Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 21 of 2021, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 22 Transportation, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, and 23 24 Honolulu City Council are urged to reroute Farrington Highway in accordance with the 1998 Makaha Beach Park Master Plan; and 25 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 28 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the members of Hawaii's Congressional Delegation, Governor, Director of Transportation, 29 30 Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, Mayor of 31 the City and County of Honolulu, Chairperson of the Honolulu City Council, Executive Director of Oahu Metropolitan Planning 32 Organization, and Chairperson of the Waianae Neighborhood Board. 33 34 35 OFFERED BY: Cecht 36

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
