HOUSE RESOLUTION

EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR, AND URGING THE INTERNATIONAL AND DOMESTIC REPATRIATION OF, NATIVE HAWAIIAN ART, CULTURAL ITEMS, AND IWI KUPUNA.

1 WHEREAS, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of 2 Indigenous Peoples of 2007 affirms in Articles 11 and 12 that it 3 is the right of indigenous peoples to maintain, protect, and 4 develop their artistic and cultural artifacts and directs member 5 states to seek repatriation, and in certain cases redress, for 6 items inappropriately or unlawfully taken; and 7

8 WHEREAS, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and
9 Cultural Organization (UNESCO) reported in 2013 that, along with
10 trafficking in drugs and arms, the black market of historic
11 artistic and cultural items constitutes one of the most
12 persistent illegal trades in the world, reaching an estimated
13 value of \$60,000,000 globally; and

WHEREAS, the UNESCO 1970 Convention on the Means of Prohibiting and Preventing the Illicit Import, Export and Transfer of Ownership of Cultural Property provided the first international legal framework to combat illicit trafficking of cultural property in times of peace and has been ratified by one hundred twenty-seven countries including the United States; and 21

WHEREAS, the United Nations Intergovernmental Committee for Promoting the Return of Cultural Property to its Countries of Origin or its Restitution in case of Illicit Appropriation, established in 1978, works to promote bilateral and multilateral cooperation, negotiation, restitution, and general public awareness for the repatriation of cultural goods; and

29 WHEREAS, the Native American Graves Protection and
30 Repatriation Act of 1990 established penalties for those who
31 sell, purchase, use for profit, or transport for sale or profit

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any Native American or Native Hawaiian cultural item obtained in 1 2 violation of the Act; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Hawaii State Constitution affirms the importance of conserving historic or cultural places, objects, 5 and art, and subsequent statutes established penalties for those 6 who unlawfully reproduce, forge, sell, or exchange historic 7 objects, as well as for those who unlawfully transport iwi 8 kupuna out of the State; and 9 10 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian art, cultural items, iwi kupuna, 11 12 and other historic artifacts are indispensable parts of Native 13 Hawaiian culture and the culture of Hawaii as a whole and yet tragically have been subject to inappropriate or illegal theft 14 15 and transfer away from these islands; and 16 17 WHEREAS, among these items located abroad or out of state include 'aha 'ula, mahiole, kahili, pohaku ku'i 'ai, papa ku'i 'ai, 18 19 pahu, ipu, leiomano, niho palaoa, kapa, kapa pounders, ki'i, and 20 ancestral remains; and 21 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiian art and cultural items are 22 preservations of masterful craftwork and highly refined 23 24 techniques revered across the Pacific, which are tragically in 25 danger of becoming a lost art with each passing generation; and 26 27 WHEREAS, these artifacts are crucial elements in understanding and perpetuating traditional ceremonial 28 29 procedures, culinary practices, warfare, music, political 30 structures, dress, and other facets of the complex social, political, economic, spiritual, and intellectual fabric of 31 Native Hawaiian society; and 32 33 WHEREAS, artifacts lost from Hawaii are not limited to 34 those of Ancient Hawaii, but include an estimated five thousand 35 items that remain missing from 'Iolani Palace following the 36 overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawaii, including Kalakaua's bedroom 37 suite, military items in private collections, the Gothic Revival 38 39 Hutch last seen at the demolished Haleiwa Hotel, the King's 40 Library Venus de Milo plaster cast, and the spelter statues; and

WHEREAS, the unlawful or inappropriate removal of these items from the islands of Hawaii represents a deplorable robbery from future generations of Native Hawaiians of their identity, ancestral connection, and opportunities for revitalization and perpetuation of their culture; and

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7 WHEREAS, the unlawful or inappropriate removal of these 8 items from the islands of Hawaii is a detriment to all future 9 generations of Hawaii's collective community; and 10

11 WHEREAS, the Legislature acknowledges there are certain 12 instances in which historic Native Hawaiian artifacts have 13 legitimate reasons to be placed abroad or in the continental 14 United States, such as the willful exchanges that occurred with 15 voyagers or gifts sent by the Kingdom of Hawaii to other 16 nations; and

18 WHEREAS, in certain appropriate and lawful instances, these 19 artifacts may serve as their own cultural ambassadors by 20 providing education or advancing research, as well as providing 21 opportunities for Native Hawaiian and former Hawaii residents to 22 connect to Hawaii's history and heritage even if they no longer 23 live in the State; now, therefore,

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BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, that this body expresses its support for, and urges the international and domestic repatriation of, Native Hawaiian art, cultural items, and iwi kupuna; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body recognizes the work of the United Nations Intergovernmental Committee for Promoting the Return of Cultural Property to its Countries of Origin or its Restitution in case of Illicit Appropriation and strongly urges UNESCO and its member states to protect Native Hawaiian artifacts; and

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38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body recognizes the work 39 of the federal government to repatriate indigenous artifacts and 40 respectfully urges the Secretary of the Interior, Secretary of 41 State, Secretary of Commerce, Secretary of Homeland Security, 42 and United States Attorney General to consult with Native

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1 Hawaiian organizations and communities in repatriating Native Hawaiian art, cultural items, and burial remains; and 2 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body respectfully urges 5 the Secretary of the Interior, Secretary of State, Secretary of Commerce, Secretary of Homeland Security, and United States 6 7 Attorney General to work to determine the scope of illegal trafficking of these items domestically and internationally and 8 9 develop methods and explicit regulations to prevent its proliferation; and 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor, Department of 12 Land and Natural Resources, and Hawaii State Historic 13 Preservation Division are urged to continue cooperation with 14 15 domestic and international entities to encourage, conduct, and 16 facilitate repatriation efforts; and 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 18 19 Resolution be transmitted to the Secretariat of the United 20 Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues, Chairperson of the United Nations Intergovernmental Committee for Promoting the 21 Return of Cultural Property to its Countries of Origin or its 22 Restitution in case of Illicit Appropriation, Secretary of 23 State, Secretary of Commerce, United States Attorney General, 24 Secretary of the Interior, Secretary of Homeland Security, 25 Manager of the Federal Bureau of Investigation Art Crime Team, 26 27 Executive Director of the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, members of Hawaii's Congressional Delegation, Governor, 28 Lieutenant Governor, Chairperson of the Board of Land and 29 30 Natural Resources, Administrator of the State Historic 31 Preservation Division, Chief Executive Officer of the Office of 32 Hawaiian Affairs, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement, President of Bishop 33 Museum, and Director of the Friends of 'Iolani Palace. 34
