## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO REDUCE THE USE OF STANDARDIZED TESTING IN HAWAII'S PUBLIC EDUCATION SYSTEM.

1 WHEREAS, enactment of the federal No Child Left Behind Act in 2001 and Race to the Top program in 2009 shifted national 2 education priorities from inquiry-based teaching to standardized 3 4 testing; and 5 6 WHEREAS, the nation's schools spend growing amounts of time, money, and energy on standardized testing, in which 7 8 student performance on standardized tests is used to evaluate 9 individual students, educators, and schools; and 10 WHEREAS, an overemphasis on standardized testing has 11 12 adversely affected public schools, teachers, and students by narrowing academic curricula; reducing arts and cultural 13 14 education; causing teachers to teach to the test; decreasing 15 whole-child and vocational programs; and creating a climate of compliance and fear among students, teachers, and 16 17 administrators; and 18 WHEREAS, the adverse effects of standardized testing most 19 20 directly affect low-income students, English-language learners, students from ethnic-minority backgrounds, and students with 21 disabilities; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, according to a 2014 study conducted by the 25 National Education Association, seventy-two percent of teachers feel considerable pressure to improve test scores and a majority 26 of teachers report spending too much time on testing and test 27 28 preparation, with the average teacher spending approximately thirty percent of the teacher's time on tasks related to 29

30 standardized tests; and



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WHEREAS, a 2014 PDK/Gallup poll on public attitudes toward 1 2 public schools found that only thirty-one percent of parents support using standardized test scores to evaluate educators; 3 4 and 5 6 WHEREAS, there is a diverse and bipartisan movement to opt out of standardized testing led by students, parents, teachers, 7 8 administrators, and organizations, which includes the National 9 Center for Fair & Open Testing and United Opt Out National; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Department of Education administers 12 standardized tests in multiple grade levels that are aligned 13 with the Common Core State Standards, including the Smarter Balanced Assessment; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the Department of Education has active contracts 16 17 with third-party entities to facilitate standardized testing and test-based curricula that total approximately \$60,000,000; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, the estimated cost of standardized testing does 21 not include time spent on test preparation, interim testing, classroom materials related to standardized testing, computer 22 equipment and personnel needed to administer standardized tests, 23 24 and the opportunity cost of educational programs eliminated to 25 increase time for standardized testing; and 26 27 WHEREAS, in 2015, President Barack Obama criticized the 28 proliferation of standardized testing throughout the nation and called on school districts to limit the amount of time spent 29 30 preparing for and taking standardized tests to no more than two 31 percent of a student's instructional time; and 32 33 WHEREAS, in 2019, former Vice President Joseph Biden pledged to reduce standardized testing in public schools if he 34 35 was elected President of the United States, saying that, 36 "teaching to a test underestimates and discounts the things that 37 are most important for students to know,"; and 38 39 WHEREAS, the federal Every Student Succeeds Act provides states with increased flexibility in the use of standardized 40 41 testing, including eliminating federally mandated inclusion of standardized tests in teacher evaluations, allowing states to 42



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1 choose what test to use for annual school assessments, 2 permitting states to institute a cap limiting the amount of time 3 that students spend preparing for and taking standardized tests, 4 and providing funding to states for auditing and streamlining 5 assessment systems; and 6 7 WHEREAS, a survey of public school principals in Hawaii conducted by Ward Research in July 2016 found that: 8 9 10 (1)Eighty-five percent of principals agreed that instructional time spent preparing for and taking 11 standardized tests should be reduced; and 12 13 14 (2) Eighty-four percent of principals felt that the Department of Education should consider changes in the 15 16 Smarter Balanced Assessment; and 17 18 WHEREAS, a survey of public school teachers conducted by 19 Governor David Ige's Every Student Succeeds Act Team found that ninety-one percent of teachers felt that the State should 20 consider changes to its current testing program; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, Hawaii's Blueprint for Public Education, developed 24 by Governor David Ige's Every Student Succeeds Act Team, called for reconsideration of Hawaii's membership in the Smarter 25 26 Balanced Assessment Consortium; and 27 28 WHEREAS, numerous states have begun implementing authentic 29 assessments, which de-emphasizes standardized testing and 30 instead focuses on student performance indicators that promotes 31 critical thinking, open-ended questioning, and collaborative 32 learning; and 33 34 WHEREAS, at the beginning of the Regular Session of 2021, the Department of Education was facing approximately 35 \$400,000,000 in budget cuts that jeopardized teacher and staff 36 37 positions, curricular programs for vulnerable students, and other educational services; and 38 39 40 WHEREAS, the continuation of unnecessary standardized tests would deplete school resources that would be better devoted to 41 42 maintaining school staffing levels, providing personal



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1 protective equipment, and delivering essential learning 2 programs; now, therefore, 3 4 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 5 Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2021, that the Board of Education and Department of Education 6 7 are urged to reduce standardized testing in the public education 8 system; and 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education and 11 Department of Education are urged to replace standardized 12 testing with authentic assessments that promote critical thinking and align classroom instruction with real-world 13 14 problem-solving, including assessments based on project-based learning; and 15 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is 18 requested to submit a report to the Legislature on its efforts to reduce standardized testing in public schools no later than 19 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 20 21 2022; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 24 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, 25 Chairperson of the Board of Education, and Superintendent of 26 Education.



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
